Lessons Learned From Solomon's Life

• The life of Solomon may be studied under the following divisions: (1) Solomon the wise king. One of the most beautiful incidents recorded in Solomon's experience is his humble petition for wisdom at the beginning of his reign. 1 Kings 3. The gift was granted, so that he became the wisest man of his time. (2) Solomon the Temple builder. The actual history of the temple began with king David, who wished to show gratitude to Jehovah by building Him a magnificent house. But it was revealed to him that this honor should belong to his son, Solomon. (3) Solomon, the apostate. Later he was moved with the ambition to become a great emperor like those of the Gentiles. He burdened the people with taxation and engaged in commercial enterprises that later introduced worldliness and idolatry into Israel. To strengthen himself politically he married foreign princesses who led him into idolatry. Thus Solomon the Wise became Solomon the Foolish.

This lesson deals with Solomon the temple builder. The work is completed and the time has come for the formal dedication of the shrine to Jehovah.

The Power of the Presence of the Ark
The first step in the dedication was to
bring the ark out of the old tabernacle
and deposit it in the holy of holies of
the new sanctuary. This ark, which was
a gold-covered chest, surmounted by the
angelic cherubim, represented the throne
of Israel's divine King, who dwelt there
in visible presence between the cherubim.
This divine manifestation was in the form
of fire enwrapped with a cloud. What
that resplendent presence meant to the
people of the Old Testament, Christ's
glorious, invisible presence means to the
people of the New Testament.

- (1) The presence of the ark is the glory of Israel. When the ark was captured, the people exclaimed in dismay and helplessness, "The glory is departed from Israel, for the ark of God is taken." 1 Sam. 4:22. And how helpless is a Christian without the power of Christ! For such an one to testify of the presence of Christ would be like a man with parched lips and swollen tongue telling people of a fountain that will satisfy the thirsts of man.
 - (2) The presence of the ark was the

joy of God's people. 2 Sam. 6:15, 16. One of the most compelling arguments for the reality of the gospel is the joy that it brings to people. A joyful Christian does not need to argue and debate about Christ and the Bible. The sun does not argue—it shines! Joyous Christians do not contend with the weapons of logic and philosophy for the truth of the faith—they just testify and shine!

(3) The absence of the ark is the defeat of God's people. Why were the Israelites defeated when they marched against the Canaanites? Num. 14:40-45. The answer is, "The ark of the Lord departed not out of the camp." Num. 14:44. Said Christ, "Without Me ye can do nothing." John 15:5. To present Christ without His power would be like playing the pipe organ with the power shut off. There would be plenty of movement and exertion—but no music! Or, to change the illustration, the fact that we are moving does not necessarily mean that we are advancing. A merry-go-round does quite a little traveling—but it doesn't get anywhere!


Making Way for God

As soon as the ark was deposited in the holy of holies the glory cloud (referred to by the rabbis as the Shekinah) filled the Temple. This constituted the real dedication and consecration of the Temple. By this act Jehovah as much as said, "I am pleased with the house that you have built for Me, and accept the spirit of worship and devotion that prompted its construction. The heaven and the heaven of heavens cannot contain Me, for I am the One who inhabits eternity, but for your sakes, I condescend to localize Myself and dwell in your midst." The Eternal One has not changed. Hundreds of years later, in the person of His Son, He stooped to dwell in a tabernacle of clay and live with

us. John 1:14. He is still the same today. To those who present their bodies as temples, He has promised to dwell in them by the New Testament Shekinah —the Holy Spirit.

But notice that the Lord's presence filled the temple when the priests were come out of the holy place. Man must get out of the way when God comes in; self must stand back when the Holy Spirit fills. How often has the obtrusiveness of man's nature hindered the full manifestation of God's glory! One time Jehovah planned to reveal His glory by bringing water from the rock in response to a word from Moses. But Moses let his temper get in the way. Num. 21:7-13; Psalm 106:33. The glory of God might have been revealed in the administration of Saul if he had not allowed stubbornness and self-will to get in the way. It was surely Jehovah's will that David's reign should continue in uninterrupted victory and prosperity; but David permitted impurity to get in the way. 2 Sam. 11. When Christ announced His intention of proceeding to Jerusalem there to glorify God in His death, Peter permitted presumption to get in His way. Matt. 16:22, 23.

Instances and illustrations could be multiplied to show how the perversities of human nature become stumblingblocks in the path of God's glory. But sufficient have been mentioned, perhaps, to enable us to see the lesson: The glory of the Lord is coming towards us; the best thing that believers can do is, like John the Baptist, to prepare the way before



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Him, and then—get out of His way!

Christ and Solomon

The Lord Jesus declared concerning Himself, "Behold, a greater than Solomon is here." Matt. 11:41. One of the many reasons why He was greater than Solomon is the fact that He built a larger and better Temple than he. Solomon's Temple was a glorious structure and institution. The old rabbis taught that Solomon's Temple possessed the following glories that were absent from the second Temple (that is, the one built after the captivity and enlarged some years before Christ's coming). (1) The holy ark wherein were the tablets of the covenant, the pot of manna, and Aaron's rod that budded; and where God was to dwell between the cherubim that covered it. (2) The Shekinah, or the divine glory. (3) The miraculous Urim and Thummin, an object that enabled the priest to ascertain the divine will. (4) The holy fire that came down from heaven. (5) The gift of prophecy, or of the Holy Ghost.

Let us observe how all these glories were restored and increased a thousand fold at the dedication of the New Testament Temple. Eph. 2:20-22; Heb. 3:6: 1 Peter 2:5. For some time prior to His ascension the Lord Jesus had been gathering the materials for the temple -living stones represented by His disciples. Before the day of Pentecost the material was assembled in the upper room, and when the day of Pentecost was fully come, "they were all with one accord in one place." Then followed the divine consecration of this spiritual building, when "suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance." The spiritual glories of Solomon's Temple were restored-and more than restored. For that Temple was localized in one ctiy; this new Temple is everywhere and in all lands. That Temple suffered destruction and the departure of the glory of Jehovah. But concerning this spiritual Temple the Lord Jesus has said, "The gates of hell shall not prevail against it," and "Lo, I am with you alway, even to the end of the world."

RESPONSIBILITY

Our Lord lays down a massive fact. "It is as when a man sojourning in another country, having left his house, and given authority to his servants, TO EACH ONE HIS WORK." Mark 13:34. God never called a soul to salvation whom He did not simultaneously call to service.

• IN A FORMER article I tried to show that God is absolutely unlimited in action; that unlike us humans He can do seemingly contradictory things at the same time; that at a time when His judgments are in the earth, and His wrath is being poured out, He can exercise mercy, and can mightily revive His work

The inspired prophet knew this, hence his prayer. Christ's first advent was preceded or accompanied by a great revival. Doubtless His second advent will be preceded or accompanied by a mighty revival. God grant it. Let us be in expectation. The greatest revival of all time, the mightiest outpouring of divine power, is before us.

When the Spirit brooded over the empty and lifeless earth and hatched it into life, thus preparing it for the habitation of man, He did not brood over a spot of the globe but He enveloped it with His brooding presence. In like manner will the Spirit envelope the earth when the Spirit is poured out upon all flesh. He will move in keeping with the greatness of His love, in keeping with the greatness of Christ's sacrifice, "not willing that any should perish," in keeping with His almighty power.

He could not be true to His nature and promises and do less. In Isaiah 53, God promised Christ that He should see the travail of His soul and be satisfied. Does anyone suppose that since He tasted death for every man, He will receive but little compensation for so great a sacrifice?

The promise comes to us: "My God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus." Phil. 4:19. What a marvelous promise! What imagination can even dimly picture His riches in glory? I shall not attempt it. The world's greatest need now, as then, is spiritual.

I wonder how many that read this feel needy? I do. When I consider all that I have received through Christ Jesus, I feel rich; but when I consider what He purchased for me that I have not received, I feel poor in spirit. I would like to be out in a great outpouring of Latter Rain, with no raincoat or umbrella, and get thoroughly soused. Hal-

lelujah! The godly church needs it, that the heart of the contrite might be revived, and the fires kindled anew on the altar heart of Christendom. The backslidden church needs it to powerfully awaken the drifters, and thereby many who have become lukewarm may be recovered. The careless world needs it to shake its people out of their terrible indifference.

How appalling the need of the sindarkened world! I long for and daily look for a visitation from heaven that will supply all our need according to God's riches in glory, by Christ Jesus; a time when the Word will again be preached with supernatural power, when all the sick will be healed, when multitudes will be added to the church daily, when the Spirit will fall spontaneously on whole roomfuls and housefuls of people, and great grace shall be upon all the saints; a day when all the gifts of the Spirit will be in full exercise in the church, by a mighty resurgence of the Spirit who dispenses gifts severally as He wills.

We are told to covet earnestly the best gifts; but to seek the same for our own glory would surely lead to confusion and open the door to the adversary. We need this greater manifestation of the Spirit bringing the graces of the Spirit, the love, the meekness, the self-control so essential in our lives. We need also to pray for wisdom, that in understanding we may be men. Amen.

• The 68th Psalm begins with the words: "Let God arise, let His enemies be scattered: let them also that hate Him flee before Him. . . . As wax melteth before the fire."

"He Giveth His Beloved Sleep"

• THE DISCIPLES were in the boat in a great storm. They were troubled because they were taken up with the visible -the tossing billows, the raging wind. The Son of God lay asleep. He knew it was written, "Whoso hearkeneth unto Me shall dwell safely, and shall be quiet from the fear of evil." He had been hearkening unto the word of the Father and so He knew that there should no evil befall Him. He could rest and trust His Father to give Him in His sleep the renewing of the virtue He had spent during the day. He knew that even the stormy wind was fulfilling the will of Jehovah. Yes, the enemy might seek to do his worst, but He knew He had power over all the power of the enemy. And He exercised that power, dismantling the power of the enemy that would seek to destroy those who were His.

He gives to His own power over all the power of the enemy, so that they need not fear. They can rest; they can lie down in sleep, knowing that the Lord will keep them in safety. In the night seasons when there is little or no activity of spirit, soul, body and mind, the Lord can do much. Do you think that Adam would have let God operate on him and take away a rib when he was awake? Everything in the man would have resisted the operation that God wanted to perform. But in his sleeping hours there could be the subtraction, and there could be the addition, so Adam when he awoke found a companion who supplied a great need in his life.

God had said, "It is not good for the man to be alone." There was a need, and God supplied the need in the night season when Adam was asleep. Trust Him that when you are asleep He will make the necessary subtractions and the necessary additions. He sees what you require, and in the night seasons He can meet and supply your every need.

There are times when special seasons of prayer are needed—when He calls His own to prayer. That night in Gethsemane He called for His disciples to stand with

Him in prayer, but they slept. There were nights the Son of God spent in prayer, and that meant much for the kingdom, more than had He been asleep. And in the night there can be hours of communion with God and petitions that will mean much for the kingdom. But He knows the natural man needs sleep, so He will give to His beloved sleep, and He will give to His beloved *in* sleep.

Peter could sleep in the prison. The Lord would preserve him. He could trust his soul to the well keeping of his Creator, and he slept in quietness. But God sent His angel and awoke him in time to make his escape.

Trust your sleeping hours to the One who knows your every need. Trust Him to supply just what He sees you need in the night seasons when the mind is not occupied with the many things which would hinder the working of the Spirit of God. But in the night seasons He is active. He that keepeth Israel neither slumbers nor sleeps. In the night season He kept back the walls of the Red Sea so that Israel could go across dryshod, but at the right moment He let the angry billows come down upon the enemies of Israel. In the night seasons He can work and frustrate the power of the enemy. Commit your sleeping hours to One who will work in the night seasons. He can give you songs in the night, songs of praise because you know that He works. "My Father worketh hitherto and I work." Yes, He works in the night seasons to give to His beloved that which will satisfy.

Adam had no complaint to make about what God wrought while he was asleep, and you will have no reason to complain when your eyes are open to see the infinite benefits that are wrought for you in the hours when you are asleep.—S.H.F.

THE WORD OF GOD

George Muller testified: "The first three years after conversion, I neglected the Word of God. Since I began to search it diligently, the blessing has been wonderful. I have read the Bible through one hundred times and always with increasing delight. I look upon it as a lost day when I have not had a good time over the Word of God. Friends often say, "I have so much to do, so many people to see, I cannot find time for Scripture study." Per-

haps there are not many who have more to do than I have. For more than half a century I have never known one day when I had not more business than could get through. For forty years I have had annually about thirty thousand letters and most of these have passed through my own hands. I have nine assistants always at work corresponding in German, French, English, Danish, Italian, Russian, and other languages. Then, as pastor of a church with twelve hundred believers, great has been my care. Besides, I have had charge of five immense orphanages; also, at my publishing depot, the printing and circulating of millions of tracts, books, and Bibles. But I have always made it a rule never to begin work till I have had a good season with God. The vigor of our spiritual life will be in exact proportion to the place held by the Word in our life and thoughts.'

After George Muller's homegoing at the age of 96, his son-in-law stated that he "had read the Bible from end to end nearly two hundred times." In the last years of his life, George Muller read through the Bible four times a year.

purposes of God, upon His wisdom, His grace, His power, His Word—in fact, on all that God is. Faith sets its eye on God alone and refuses to look at anything else.

Christ said, "Have faith in God." The marginal rendering of this is: "Have the faith of God." Pray for the faith of God. This is the sort that removes mountains. This sort of faith does not think for a moment of the things that are convenient and that would work out well for the natural man. It sees only God and God's high purposes. It seeks alone the glory of God.

Pray for the faith that is "the faith of God." It is a gift of the Spirit. As the saints use the gifts God gives them, He will give more and more. It is His delight to give freely. He delights to pour out His Spirit, to pour out His power, that His own may be fully equipped for service in His kingdom, and that they may move through the world triumphant over all the power of the enemy, in humility serving their Lord and Master.

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The Sign of a Man's Knees in the Sand

• For three and a half years there had been neither dew nor rain in Israel. Their dire distress had divided the people into seven companies. Spiritual death and declension in our own land today seem to have divided us into similar companies. The story of Israel's dearth is told in James 5:16-18 and the 17th and 18th chapters of First Kings; ours is told in press and pulpit, playhouse and prisonhouse, courts and capitols—EVERYWHERE.

COMPANY ONE. The Ahabite self-seekers. "Ahab went up to EAT and to DRINK."

1 Kings 18:42. Feeding their stomachs and gratifying their craze for amusement and pleasure, the Ahabites are a mighty company in America today.

Company Two. The mourners over the drought. The Scriptures do not need to mention this crowd. They are a sure crop in every drought. We can see them gazing mournfully at the deep cracks in the earth—signs of the worst drought Israel ever had suffered—but they were

not closing a single crack by their plaints. They are still with us today.

COMPANY THREE. The seven thousand who had not bowed the knee to Baal-Israel's MODERN religion. 1 Kings 19:18. But neither were they bending their knees to Jehovah to any apparent purpose. Looking for the restoration of the worship of Jehovah in Israel, they were doing nothing effective to bring it to pass. They represented the solid but silent body of Church members who today listen appreciatively to an orthodox pastor, or without protest to a destructive modernist.

Company Four. The straddlers, or "middle of the road" men. The sample shown was Obadiah. He was a believer in Jehovah and a supporter of the prophets, but running with the machine (1 Kings 18:13-16). He tried to look out for the glory of God with one eye, and for his position in Ahab's corrupt court with

the other. Obadiah's name can be written many times, with varying spelling, in our land today.

Company Five. The "bread and water" prophets. A hundred prophets of the Lord, in a cave, divided into two camps, looking for their bread and water. This is perhaps the saddest spectacle on the whole horizon. Here were men, called of God to the prophetic office, and having God's message, hiding from danger in a cave, looking to Obadiah for their daily supply of bread and water, but neither preaching the Word nor praying for a revival. We need not look in vain for this company in our midst today.

Company Six. The sky-gazer—a lad with an intent, wistful face, gazing upward, looking for the "sign of a man's hand in the sky." 1 Kings 18:43, 44. Spiritual, unselfish, unworldly, we love the lad; yet he was doing nothing to bring to pass that for which he longed and watched. We must look beyond the

gazers for the sign of a revival, to find the man whom God used to turn the tide.

Company Seven. One man—Elijah. He wrote the sign for which God was looking—"The sign of a man's knees in the sand." It was when Elijah furnished that simple sign, which any one of the others might have furnished, that there was the "sign of a man's hand," "a sky overcast with clouds," "a sound of abundance of rain," and "a very great rain." Clad in an ox-hide mantle, knees in the sand, and head between his knees, one man won the victory.

While the Ahabites today look for their restaurant signs and movie signs; while the calamity mourners look for more and deeper cracks in the spiritual life of the Church; while the seven thousand with dustless knees listen with equal urbanity to orthodox or modernistic sermons; while the Obadiahs look to some Ahab for the signals of the machine; while the hundred prophets of the Lord look for their "bread and water" instead of declaring the whole counsel of God; while the sky-gazers gape for some supernatural sign in the heavens—God is watching for "the sign of a man's knees in the sand."


In what respect does the one differ from those of the other six? Not physiologically—he was a man. Not psychologically—he was a man of like

passions. Not theological-Ly—he was a righteous man; but so are all believers in Christ. He differed geo-graphically—"As Jehovah liveth in whose presence I stand." 1 Kings 17:1. He lived in God's presence, hence his knowledge of God's will, his courage and certainty in prophecy, and HIS RESIST-LESS POWER IN PRAYER. His life was not Ahab-ward, nor earth-ward, nor other-ward. Therefore, he furnished the sign for which God looked, and is still intently looking-"THE SIGN OF A MAN'S KNEES IN THE SAND."

Weeping Followed by Joy

• THE BIBLE is the book of human experience. It deals with every emotion and condition of life. Today we choose for consideration the words found in the 30th Psalm. "Weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning."

Many are the causes of weeping. Joseph in Egypt wept as he made himself known to his brothers. I think his tears were the result of mingled emotions. His tender heart could not forget the sorrow his brothers had caused him, neither could he help sympathizing with them for the sorrows through which they had passed. Memory-what feelings it brings! Who has not thought on the past with its many experiences and felt his heart moved? Tears have started from the eye, sometimes through grief, sometimes through tender mem-

A group of brothers and sisters, long separated from each other, had a reunion. As they recounted the experiences of their childhood, tears rolled down their cheeks. They had known the common heartaches of youth; renewal of fellowship caused the past to spring into memory. Many are the crushed hopes, the heartbreaking sorrows, as well as the joys.

When David sang the Psalm from which we have quoted, he stood before his palace which was being dedicated. He perhaps thought of the time when he had been pursued unjustly by King Saul. He had slept in caves, gone hungry, living the life of a fugitive. Memory of these times may have brought tears. Then as he looked toward his now finished home, seeing how beautiful it was, he may have wept the more, but they were now tears of appreciation and joy. The sorrows of his pilgrimage were now passed. Through the loving kindness of God he now enjoyed a settled habitation. How great was his appreciation.

I remember a time when we were lonely. Winter was coming on and we were without home or shelter. That was many years ago, but never does the summer end and winter chill appear that I do not think back and thank God for a roof over our heads and for comforts of a simple home.

If tears have been your lot, be of good cheer. Look to Jesus. He understands, for He too has wept. The shortest verse in the Bible consists of these words, "Jesus wept." He wept with the family of dead Lazarus. He wept at the coming desolations of Jerusalem. Jesus is not unmindful of us. He is touched with the feeling of our infirmities. in the night of your afflictions, Jesus is with you. And do not forget that the morning is coming. There is a morning without clouds. God is going to wipe away all tears from all eyes. Isn't that good news? Let us pray; let us pour out our hearts to God. If you have broken hearted. If life has been disappointing, why not tell it to Jesus? We cannot escape give you rest."

I met a missionary who had buried his wife in the jungles of Africa. His heart was overwhelmed, but he found no relief in tears, until one day when a letter arrived from his old and widowed father in which he had written, "Son, I know all about it." When the missionary read those words, the fountain of his heart broke. Relief came as he sobbed out his heart. What brought the relief? He realized there was one that understood, one that had passed through circumstances which were similar, one who fully sympathized. Friend, you have a Friend who understands. Jesus knows all about our troubles. It is He who says, "Come unto Me." God bless you. God comfort you. Take your sorrow to Him who died on the cross for you.

Answered Prayer in Famine Time

 In February, 1914, the district where we are living was reduced to a state of famine, caused through the failure of crops the previous year. There was yet another month before the wheat would be ready for harvest, and often we saw people out in the fields and on the hills seeking for roots and anything else that they could get to eat. Many had come to us from time to time for help in various ways, but towards the end of February we were not in a position to help them further; and one day, when the Christians came to us, we had to tell them that we had nothing left.

But, I added, there was something we could all do. They seemed surprised and enquired as to what else they could do. I told them that we could pray, for we have a prayer-hearing and prayer-answering God. Their reply was, "If it is a matter of prayer, we will come every day, and join you in supplication to

So each afternoon was given to intercession, and on the fourth afternoon, while we were at prayer, a man came in and called me to

come and see what was taking place. We all went out, and there I saw, away in the north, a very dark cloud coming towards us. I told the people that I thought we were in for a big storm, and we watched the cloud as it came across our district and passed on.

As it passed it rained heavily, not ordinary rain, but a deluge of little black seeds, which fell in such abundance that the people were able to go out and shovel them up. As soon as the storm was over and the seed was examined, almost the first question asked was, "What is it?" (reminding us of the children of Israel in the wilderness, who asked a similar question when the manna fell), for such seed had never been seen before in that district and no one knew what it was.

They beat the seeds, thus removing the husks, and inside they discovered a small white kernel, which they boiled, and to their joy they found it was edible. That night we had a season of praise, at which not only the Christians and enquirers, but many of the others, joined us in returning thanks to God for His wonderful provision and answer to prayer at this time of need. I may add that so abundant was the supply that it sustained the people until the wheat harvest in the following

The Israelis have decided that the hundreds of thousands of Arabs who formerly lived in Palestine, and who fled before the menace of war, will be reimbursed for their land, but they will not be permitted to return. Possibly 900,000 Arabs are thus rendered homeless. Comments Donald G. Barnhouse, in *Revelation*: "Israel must remember that there are promises to Ishmael as well as to Isaac, and they will drink a bitter cup if they continue in their cruel and heartless way. The land has been sworn to Jacob, yes, but Jacob is to rule it one day in righteousness and not in cruelty."

TEN JEWS TO ONE ARAB

George Weller, of the Chicago Daily News foreign service, reports that, whereas there used to be about two Arabs to one Jew in Palestine, today there are about ten Jews to one Arab! The Jewish population of Israel has grown to around 1,100,000. The Arab population has dwindled, since the outbreak of Arab-Jewish hostilities, until there are only between 70,000 and 130,000 Arabs left in Israel

He says that many Arabs have slipped quietly back into Palestine and been absorbed into the new nation Israel. The policy of the new state has been to permit all Arabs who are within its borders to stay and become Israeli citizens if they want to. However, there are 800,000 Arab refugees who are still outside Palestine and are living on Allied relief. The task of feeding the refugees is divided among three relief societies.

JEWISH SELF-CONFIDENCE

Robert Gamzey, editor of the *Intermountain Jewish News* of Denver, says that Israeli citizens are so obsessed with the tragedy of Germany that they are certain the Hitler process will be repeated in this country. Gamzey said that for this reason they do not hesitate to demand that American Jews should transfer everything they have of their worldly goods to Israel before the pogroms start.

"The prevailing mood in Israel now is that of optimism, self-confidence, self-assertion, bordering almost on expansionism," Gamzey states. "The average Israeli, native, old-timer, or new arrival, is convinced that there is nothing in the world that Israeli cannot achieve, militarily, economically, culturally and in every field of human endeavor."

Beware, O Jews, lest thou say in thine heart, "My power and the might of mine hand hath gotten me this wealth." Remember the Lord thy God, for it is He that giveth thee power to achieve. Deuteronomy 8:11-20.

CHURCH BUILDINGS GOING UP

Across the land, a billion dollars' worth of Protestant churches are in process of erection. More than half of this amount is being spent in the South, and most of that by a single denomination—the Southern Baptists, reports Pathfinder.

THE PROGRESS OF APOSTASY

"The progress of apostasy throughout Christendom is illustrated by the terrible defection in New College, Edinburgh, that has been made public recently," says Revelation. In a meeting that crowded a large hall in Edinburgh, Lieutenant Colonel L. M. Davies spoke on "What is happening at the New College?" The subject covered the teaching of Prof. Oliver S. Rankin, who insisted, in spite of the fact that our Lord claimed to be the object of the Old Testament prophecies, that no prophecy referred to Him. Prof. Rankin further denies the Biblical account of the creation, the fall, the deluge and even the histories of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

Prof. Rankin has taught that Jehovah originated as multiple demon gods which later merged into one. When asked if he believed in the resurrection of our Lord he answered a categorical "No." The meeting passed a resolution calling upon the Committee on Education for the Ministry either to remove Prof. Rankin as an apostate from the historic faith of the Church of Scotland or else to make it clear that the church has abandoned that faith.

A LETTER FROM ISRAEL

A Baptist missionary, who had just returned to Palestine, wrote a letter from Jerusalem, on April 13, 1949, in which he said:

"Two things are impressive about the people of Jerusalem as we see them today.

"One is the oft-repeated word 'miracle.' Few are the exceptions: in fact, I personally have talked to no one who does not say that it was really a miracle that the Jews of Jerusalem were saved. We now know how little ammunition, guns, and material were actually in the hands of Israelis. At the middle of May (1948) they seem to have had only two real tanks; yet with them and smaller guns they stopped a well-equipped Arab army with many more such vehicles. The great majority seem to believe deeply that only God saved them.

"The other impressive thing is the spirit of the people. With victory has come a new stability, a new hope for the future. At least three people I know who talked of leaving Israel for greener fields in some other country now say they cannot even consider leaving. The common struggle has brought about a strengthened morale.

"With all of it has come a new tolerance as well. Missionaries are being welcomed and treated with the greatest of courtesy. I have seen no instance of maltreatment or disrespect of Jewish Christians as yet. Not that there is no prejudice still against Christians, but security has definitely increased tolerance."

THE JEWS GIVE THANKS

A grocer who came to Palestine 50 years ago, 92-year-old Juda Cohen, had a comment on the tremendous celebration in Israel of the new state's first year of life. He is quoted (in *The Jews in the News*) as saying: "Not since I first came here have I seen so many people praying—not even at the Wailing Wall, or in Jerusalem's synagogues."

"TERRITORY OF THE DEVIL"

"Germany has become the territory of the devil," writes Douglas G. Stewart, in The Voice of Europe. Mr. Stewart is an undenominational evangelist, and writes direct from Germany. "God's people as never before are in the minority. Germany has gone through two world wars and lost both. There are no optimists in this land. They know that World War III is just around the corner. Again their country will become a battlefield claiming millions more of precious lives. The people are paralyzed with fear: fear of the godless hordes which threaten from the East. They know that they have not long to live, and instead of turning to God as a nation the people of the cities on the whole have decided to sell themselves to the devil.

"There is a tremendous growth in atheistic thought and propaganda. The people I spoke to profess no need of God and denied His existence. It is a fact that atheism has become the accepted creed of a large percentage of the population of this country. God is unreal to multitudes. In Germany alone some 2½ million have given themselves over to total heathenism; and apart from the small percentage of believers, those who are not atheists or infidels have taken up a neutral and indifferent attitude to the claims of the gospel."

Pray for Europe. What is true of Germany is true of most of the continent today.

PRAYER FOR RAIN

A missionary in the Africa Inland Mission tells how the people of the community were deeply concerned over the lack of rain. Normally, the largest amount of rain fell in early December, but these days slipped by, one after the other, with only slight showers. Food supplies were low. The missionary consulted his record, and noted that during the years when hearts were spiritually revived, the rainfall increased proportionately. So he began to search the Scriptures to see if this was one of the ways God has of speaking to His people when they become careless. He found several instances in the Scriptures where God allowed His people to suffer famine, due to lack of rain, when they had disobeyed His commands. Thereupon, he preached the following Sunday on the text 2 Chron. 7:13-14, God's words to Solomon in time of famine, saying that if the people would humble themselves, pray and turn from their wicked ways, He would hear and heal their land. The preacher reminded his hearers that they had become lax in their Christian life and service; had allowed doubts to creep into their minds concerning God's goodness; and then challenged them to put God to the test by obeying His Word. A time of heart searching followed, and more than thirty people confessed their sins and prayed earnestly. That very night came a refreshing rain. Next day the people gathered for prayer, and there was more rain; the following Sunday there were more confessions and prayers. By the end of December there had been the heaviest rainfall on record for that locality.-Inland Africa.

Account of Visit to Africa

H. B. GARLOCK Field Secretary for Africa

H. B. Garlock, who has just returned from a visit to the African fields, gives the following account of his travels:

● LEAVING SPRINGFIELD on the second flight of the AMBASSADOR on November 26, 1948, I arrived in Upper Volta on December 14. On December 15 I accompanied the AMBASSADOR to Nigeria, where some missionaries disembarked and others were picked up, and then to Accra, the capital of Gold Coast. At Accra I bade farewell to the plane. It was difficult to keep back the tears as I watched the giant ship leave the runway with its precious cargo of missionaries, and head into the western sky and home.

I was in Gold Coast until after New Years. All of the stations were visited. Gold Coast is experiencing a gracious revival, particularly in the Kumasi area. During the past year several hundred have been saved, a number have been healed, and many have been filled with the Spirit. The revival has been largely under national leadership.

Leaving Gold Coast I traveled by car through Dahomey westward across Togoland, Upper Volta, the Sudan, French Guinea, and the Senegal. Six more capable, consecrated couples could well be placed in different areas of French West Africa if funds were available for their fares, outfits, and maintenance while on the field. In some densely populated areas of French West Africa our missionaries are the only Protestant witnesses.

I took a boat from Dakar, French Senegal to Freetown, Sierra Leone, a British colony. Our missionaries have a fine work in Sierra Leone among the Themne and Kru tribes.

In Liberia, next visited, making the trip from Sierra Leone by plane, it was my privilege to see a number saved among both the literate and the illiterate groups. Since my stay in Liberia a revival has broken out at Monrovia.

During Mrs. Garlock's and my visit in Liberia in 1945-1946 I traveled about 550 miles on foot in order to contact the various stations in the Liberian hinterland. This year I traveled in our Speed-the-Light plane from one station to another. Distances that take from one week to two weeks to make on foot are covered in an hour or so by plane. What a blessing the airplane is to missionaries!

I spent six weeks with our missionaries and workers in Belgian Congo, in the heart of Africa. Several fine indigenous churches have been established in the Congo forests among a very responsive people during the past few years. The Congo work is making rapid forward strides.

On May 19 I started on my return trip to the States by way of Belgium and France. A number of our missionaries have studied in a language center in Brussels, Belgium for work in the Belgian Congo. Paris, France has a similar language center for missionaries going into French territories in Africa. I was able to stop at both centers, and to have conferences with our missionaries now in language

study at the centers before leaving Europe on the AMBASSADOR with our conferees and visitors of the Pentecostal World Conference in Paris.

It was encouraging to see that the gospel is going forth with great power on so many of the African fields, also that a national church is being formed. To me, though world conditions may be generally depressing, the outlook for Africa seems rather bright. May God grant that the gospel may continue to go forth to the hungry tribes.

The Kumasi Revival

• THE REVIVAL IN THE KUMASI area of Gold Coast continues. Thus far this month more than one hundred and twenty souls have found Christ as their Savior and Lord. Besides the constant stream of new converts many are meeting the Lord in consecration and are receiving their Pentecostal experience.

The Christians are being taught that tithing is God's method of financing His church. One of the African pastors inspired his congregation's faith on tithing in teaching from Malachi. When the day arrived for his people to bring their tithes into the storehouse they came expecting a blessing. The blessing came—the Holy Spirit descended upon the entire congregation, and all but two or three received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit.

With blessings also come persecutions. In one of the jungle churches the burden for lost souls gripped the believers and some went out through the jungle preaching. Arriving at one village they greeted the chief and asked permission to preach. Permission was given and the service started, but after it was under way the fetish priest and his followers, with

a group of Roman Catholics, descended upon the small group of believers with clubs. The Christians were clubbed out of the village.

Having expected to spend the night in the village the Christians had luggage with them. Their possessions were forgotten in their attempt to escape their persecutors. The village people said that if they would send the wife of the leader of the group back to the village she might have the luggage. The woman returned, but was set upon and beaten to the ground; however, she finally managed to get away. The experience was new and the Christians were perplexed until we read to them Christ's teaching from Matthew 5:9-12. They have now forgiven their persecutors and are rejoicing in that God counted them worthy to suffer for Him.

What a privilege to be associated with missionary endeavors! We, and the believers, need the strength that your support in prayer can give, so, dear friends, pray for us.

 WE ARE HAVING MANY visitors at our church. Each service brings someone new. Last Sunday a woman we had never seen before came to Sunday School, and requested a service in her home. We do not want to disappoint her, so are arranging for a service at her home on Friday night.

During the Easter season the Catholics have processions every day. A farm mother wanted her little girls to be dressed as angels in the processions. She did not have the money to buy the girls white dresses, white shoes, and wings. Someone suggested that she go from house to house and beg for money to make the purchases, which she did. The mother was to stay in town all week. On Thursday night before Easter one of the women from our church came in contact with her, and invited her to attend our service that night. The invitation was accepted, and Friday night the woman was at church again and gave her heart to the Lord.

The mother returned to her home, to give her testimony, a new creature in Christ. On Easter Sunday she brought her husband to church. He, too, gave his heart to the Lord. 
Evangelist Mayme Williams arrived here on April 6. With Ruth Melching there are now four of us from the South Florida District united in efforts for Christ in the Far East.

Twice during the Easter season this year we saw penitential processions. Images of Christ were fixed on large platforms and were carried in the processions on the shoulders of four or six men. The images were shown in different stages of the trial and crucitixion. There were also images of the Virgin Mary and some of the saints. Each effigy was escorted by men with fancy-shaped lanterns held aloft, and was followed by hundreds of men, women, and children, dressed in white, carrying lighted candles and singing songs of a mournful character. We especially shrank from the image of Christ in a hearse.

On Good Friday morning we had to wash blood from our clothes after watching one of the processions. We saw a number, stripped to the waist, with cloths over their faces, and vine wreaths for crowns, lashing themselves with scourges. At certain points they stretched out in the dust and were beaten by others with leather shoe soles fastened to long bamboo poles. The sound of the blows was similar to drums. It was most horrible. Blood streamed down, staining lower garments and even the ground, as well as splattering the onlookers. One man carried a heavy cross.

Twelve were baptized in the new baptistry, and ten children were dedicated to the Lord the day the church was dedicated.

BULGARIAN CHRISTIANS NEED PRAYER

A letter received from Nicholas Nikoloff, of Plainfield, N. J., tells how greatly the Christians in Bulgaria need our prayers at this time. Brother Nikoloff is Chairman of our European Advisory Council. He writes:

"No doubt you read in the papers of the arrest and trial of fifteen Protestant ministers, among whom are the leaders of our Assembly of God churches in Bulgaria. As a missionary to that land, I have worked among the various Protestant churches and have had part in organizing and establishing the Assembly of God work there, which is now the largest and most active Protestant body in that country. I know all the preachers whose names were published in the newspapers. I know that they are innocent and that they are being persecuted for the gospel's sake.

"A letter which I received from that country

reveals that a country-wide wave of persecution is raging and that the believers are suffering great privations.

"It is apparent that the imprisoned church leaders have been subjected to torture, and perhaps the 'drug treatment,' since the papers state that they have 'confessed' their guilt. Among them is a frail woman, an outstanding Christian worker, who was physically very frail the last I heard from her.

"When our brethren saw the wave of persecution rapidly approaching them, they made special request for American Christians to fast and pray for them that they may stand the test and remain true to Christ. We must not fail them in this hour of tribulation. Did not Paul tell us, in 1 Corinthians 12:26, that we are members of the same body, 'and whether one member suffers, all the members suffer with it'?"

Miracles of Healing

at Williamsport, Maryland

• A VERY GRACIOUS and unusual visitation from heaven is reported by V. W. Miles, Pastor of the Pentecostal Assembly of God in Williamsport, Maryland.

Sister Louise Nankivell, evangelist from Chicago, came to Williamsport in April for a series of meetings. As she preached the Word, God stretched forth His hand to heal. There were many marvelous healings, and as news of this spread abroad it caused large crowds to gather. Many sought the Lord for salvation.

The doctors put a steel brace on him, and told him he would never work anymore without the brace. He found he could not work without pain when he took it off.

On April 24 he was healed in the Williamsport meetings. He left his brace hanging in the church when he went home, and he says: "I have been working ever since without pain, and without my brace."

Wife Healed of Nervousness

Charles Mellott's wife was suffering from a very nervous condition; she worried about every little thing. On April 19 she went to the Williamsport meetings. The evangelist said, just before the sermon, "There is a sister here from another church who has a nervous condition, and she is worrying; if she will just come to the front of the church, she will be healed."

Mrs. Mellott says: "I knew she was speaking of me, so I went forward and was prayed for. And, praise God, I've never been nervous since, and I don't worry. I've rolled off my burdens on Jesus."

Before the meetings ended the crowds were too large for the church, so it was decided to resume the meetings June 12 in a larger building. Va., was obtained, and Pastor Miles reports that, as of June 21, the Lord has been saving souls, giving healings, and working miracles at every service from the very opening night. He writes: "We have just concluded one week of meetings, and there has been miracle after miracle, from night to night, even exceeding our fondest expectations. The working of the Spirit of the Lord is far in excess of anything we can put into words; one would have to be present to appreciate it."

JUBILEE OF THE GIDEONS

Fifty years ago a commercial traveler named John H. Nicholson was unable to get a hotel room one night, in the small town of Boscobel. Wisconsin; but was offered a bed in a double room, if the other occupant did not object. After inquiries had been made he found himself sharing the room with another commercial traveler, and before retiring, he remarked to

his companion, Mr. S. E. Hill, that it was his practice to read a chapter of the Bible, and to pray every night. "Praise God!" said Mr. Hill; "let us do it together. I am a Christian

These men then discussed the possibility of forming an association of Christian "men of the road," and the movement when it took shape was called "Gideons." After providing clear-type Bibles for hotels throughout the United States, Canada and other countries, the Gideons looked around for new fields to conquer. They began to provide Bibles for hospitals and prisons; then for service men and women.

Chaplains reported that men frequently remarked, when offered New Testaments during the war, "Why are we given this only now when we are facing death? No one has asked us to read the Word of God before!" This turned the thoughts of the Gideons to the children, and investigations revealed that 75 per cent of America's boys and girls were receiving no Christian influence or training whatsoever-the percentage was as high as 86 per cent in some places.

So the Gideons set themselves to the goal of providing every child with a New Testament; but with the methodical thoroughness which marks all their work, they avoided any indiscriminate giving, and concentrated upon the age group which would be best able to understand and appreciate the books. In the course of a few years all the children of North America will be offered a New Testament as they pass through the Fifth Grade.-Life of

In the language of the military, "Ambassadors, Advance" would be a direct order. It differs little from "Forward, March." To disobey might result in a court-martial.

Any wide-awake Ambassador must advance or lose ground. To stand still is to depreciate. In boot camp men were told, "If it's on the ground, pick it up; if it's moving, salute it; if it's standing still, paint it."

The Servicemen's Division, as a part of the C. A. Department, has found that it too must advance or expect to retreat, and to retreat would be to turn back to Satan territory previously wrested from his control.

There are scores of men in the military service spiritually minded whom the Servicemen's Division could strengthen in the faith if only their names were included in the Servicemen's Division mailing list. There are hundreds of unsaved men who could be helped if they were to receive a copy of the special service bulletin, REVEILLE. Former servicemen, now patients in the Veterans' hospitals,

need the ministry of a Pentecostal pastor, but the names of these veterans are unknown to the Servicemen's Division.

The blank below provides space for names of military personnel or of V. A. hospital patients. To the veterans we will send a copy of CHAT, the Pocket Chaplain. Added to this, both the veteran and the man on active duty will be contacted regularly by correspondence. Personal letters received from any correspondent will receive personal attention.

A Bible Study Course is made available without cost to the hospitalized veteran as long as he is a patient, and to the fellow in the service at a reduced rate.

Samples of REVEILLE No. 18, will soon be sent to more than 1,000 chaplains of the armed forces and V. A. hospitals. A printing of this third peace-time issue of Reveille sufficient to meet all requests from chaplains will cost \$1,000, and a new issue of CHAT, now in demand, will cost hundreds more.

President Truman's Committee on Religion and Welfare in the Armed Forces has called attention to the fact that over 70% of the 700,000 men who entered the service in 1948 were under 21 years of age. "These minors are now serving their country throughout the world. They are away from home-town friends, family and familiar church," said the committee in a statement prepared for the press.

The Texas District Council, realizing men in this age group are more susceptible to the gospel than any others, has established a Christian Service Center at Killeen, Texas for the benefit of army personnel stationed at Camp Hood. While such a center adds to the physical comfort of a man away from home, this one will also be a center of evangelism. The gospel will be preached.

The Servicemen's Division contributed \$1,000 toward the expense of decorating and furnishing the Killeen Center. This and all other ministries of the Servicemen's Division are made possible only through offerings.

While on furlough, during our visit to Canada, we learned the sequel to this story of the cloud. Dr. Hewitt, of the C. I. M., who used to labor in the north of China, heard me tell this story at a conference, and a few days later we met at a friend's house. He told me he was very thankful to have learned of this incident and then related that, when in North China at the time I had spoken of, he had witnessed that dark cloud passing over their district, and that after the storm he had seen men dragging out of the near-by river various pieces of furniture and wreckage of houses which were supposed to have been carried through the air by the storm; that he often wondered where the cyclone had spent itself, and he was delighted to hear me tell the rest of the story.

We surmise that the great storm must have arisen away in Mongolia, and caused the wreckage of places where the seed was stored up (as we know now that this seed, which is called Kao-Liang, is cultivated in Mongolia), and the wind being so great all was carried away. The furniture and wreckage were allowed to drop on the way, but the seed was carried more than fifteen hundred miles to the district where the need was so great and where prayer was being offered.

What a wonderful God is our God! Truly, we can say, there is nothing too hard for Him to do.—Evangelical Christian.

ALASKA NATIVES PROGRESSING

It's summer now in Alaska, too—and no need for daylight saving time since each day is almost twenty hours of continuous sunshine. (Semidarkness and mosquitoes prevail in the remaining hours.) With this change of season, a new round of activities begins for our workers in Alaska in an attempt to reach as many as possible of the people during the brief time when traveling is somewhat easier.

Miss James writes us from Nikolai, where she and Miss Rodli have been teaching: "Our school came to a quick close on May 4th when I had to take one of the young girls from my class to the tuberculosis sanatorium in Seward. The doctor tells us there is no hope for her, as one lung is gone and the other is badly infected. Her healing would be a marvelous testimony in this place of darkness and superstition—please pray with us for her. We know God is able!

"When I returned, I learned that Miss Rodli had been very busy teaching our people to garden. They have never gardened before, so didn't know much of anything about it. We have quite a garden and are surprised at how well the vegetables grow in this land.

"While the past year has been a real strain working with people who understood no English, we are very much pleased with the progress of our twenty children in day school and our fourteen adults in night school. They learn very readily and far exceeded our expectations! We have services twice a week and the people are grasping the messages now and beginning to memorize Scripture. It sounds so good to hear them quote the precious promises in their broken English. God is dealing with their hearts, and we feel that some will surrender themselves to Him soon.

"And now to get ready for the Daily Vacation Bible Schools which we will soon be conducting in Anchorage and McGrath."

MORE PRECIOUS THAN GOLD

In 1849 there was a rush for gold. In 1949 there is a world-wide "rush" for the Bible, reports the American Bible Society. A Russian D. P. in an Italian sanitarium wrote to the Society, saying:

for which I am grateful to the Italian Government and people. After all these experiences I have learned that the Holy Scriptures and prayer are the only remedies which give true consolation."

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
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
