Christians in Congress

According to *Christian Life*, there are "considerably more than a hundred bornagain Christians in the 82nd Congress of the United States." This disclosure should move us to pray the more for the national legislature.

Lutherans and Television

The Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, is undertaking what is described as by far the largest Protestant television program yet planned. The Synod has voted to spend \$750,000 to produce a series of 26 half-hour religious TV programs of a dramatic nature.

Roadside Signs

The Methodists of South Georgia are tired of seeing so much liquor advertising. At their annual conference they decided to erect roadside signs throughout the state, depicting the harmful effects of alcohol and urging total abstinence.

The Lutheran Hour

The weekly radio program known as "The Lutheran Hour" is showing an operating deficit of \$165,000. The Lutheran Laymen's League, meeting for a convention at Sioux City, Iowa, voted to raise \$250,000 by September to wipe out the deficit and provide the radio program with a financial reserve.

Religious Tolerance in Israel

The Government of the State of Israel is following a commendably tolerant attitude toward all religions. Some people thought that when the Jews realized their dream of an independent Jewish state they would suppress all non-Jewish religious activity, but that has not proved to be the case. There is freedom of religion in Israel.

The Ministry of Religious Affairs, for example, issues a pamphlet called "Christian News from Israel," in which the Government presents the Christian activities in the land of Israel with absolute fairness.

Another example of tolerance is found in a Government booklet entitled, "Christians in Israel," which gives an upto-date survey of all the religious groups, including Roman Catholic, Greek Catholic, and Protestant churches. The material in this booklet is written by the leaders of the respective churches. For instance, there is a paragraph regarding the Bible Evangelistic Mission, saying that it "represents some of the leading Pentecostal movements in various countries, and particularly the Pentecostal Jewish Mission. Its object is to preach the full gospel of Christ and to lead to the knowledge of Christ as the Saviour."

The building in which the Bible Evangelistic Mission carries on its work in Jerusalem is owned by the Assemblies of God. Let us pray that many, both of Jews and of Arabs, may be brought to a saving knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Separation of Church and State

The Attorney-General of the U.S., J. Howard McGrath, is being criticized for telling the National Roman Catholic Educational Association in Cleveland that there should not even be a fence between church and state, let alone a "wall of separation." They accuse him of betraying the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which he is sworn to uphold.

A Jerusalem Proclamation

The World Zionist Congress will meet in Jerusalem, August 14. The Congress will discuss the desirability of issuing a Jerusalem Proclamation to replace the Basle Proclamation—issued by the First World Zionist Congress in Basle in 1897 —in view of the fact that the aim of the Basle Proclamation, the establishment of a Jewish state, has been achieved.

The Bible in Gold Coast

The British and Foreign Bible Society plans to present a specially bound copy of the Fanti Bible to the new Parliament in Accra, in Africa's Gold Coast. At the initial session of the newly elected Parliament more than 75% of the members wished to take the oath on the Bible, though the country is only about 14% "Christian."

Fulfilled Prophecy

The press carried another fulfillment of Bible prophecy recently. In Matthew 24:5 Jesus warned, "For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ." The press story was that Argentina's Eva Peron has taken a further step in exalting her husband, and spoke of him as a god to the people of that country.

Daniel's story of Nebuchadnezzar had a similar episode. We wonder what will happen to Peron!

A New "Denomination"

Radio gospel programs are a blessing to shut-ins, but to a great many ablebodied people they are just a poor substitute for church attendance. During a recent church canvass a woman was asked to what religious denomination she belonged. She replied : "My mother was a Baptist, and my father a Methodist. Speaking for myself, I'm radio."

No Evolutionary Change

A recent item in *Life* entitled, "The Smallest Mammal," referred to a shrew, the descendants of which today weigh about eight ounces. The article stated: "The fragment proved that this tiny creature—like the opossum, the oyster, and the horseshoe crab—has run the gantlet of time without evolutionary change."

Comments Wilbur M. Smith in Our Hope: "Year by year indisputable evidence is turned up showing the utter baselessness of this whole nineteenthcentury hypothesis of biological evolution."

Advertising the Movies

Would your church be willing to spend twenty dollars for advertising, in order to get a thousand people to attend a particular service? The movie makers would. The motion picture industry spent \$66,750,000 in advertising in 1950. The average weekly attendance for U.S. theatres last year was 60,000,000 which means that for every paid admission there were two cents paid for advertising. We do not suggest that churches should copy the movie makers in their advertising methods, but perhaps if God's people would invest more heavily in radio evangelism, tract distribution, and other gospel enterprises they would see more people coming to Christ.

Methodist Ministers and Tobacco

Fearful that an effort will be made to delete the tobacco question from the Methodist discipline, when the Methodist Church has it quadrennial General Conference in San Francisco next year, the Methodists of Minnesota have gone on record as saying:

"We view with deep concern, from a health, financial and moral point of view, the increase of the tobacco habit."

They voted to continue the practice of putting the following question to all candidates for Methodist ordination: "Will you abstain from the use of tobacco and other indulgences which may injure your influence?"

Another resolution called on Minnesota's 110,000 Methodists to use their "combined purchasing power" in favor of grocery stores, restaurants, and hotels where alcoholic beverages are not served or sold.

The Miraculous Power of God

God said, Let there be light; and there was light. Genesis 1:3.

LET ME ASK three questions: Is there any such thing as the miraculous power of God? Is there any need for such power? If there is such a thing and if there is such a need, how can we bring the miraculous power of God to bear upon that need?

The first chapter of Genesis tells us that God spoke the word and the Spirit moved and the worlds came into existence. Bible history begins with a miraculous manifestation of the supernatural power of God. Had it not been displayed, there would be no universe today. Out of nothing God spoke everything into existence. Had Jesus Christ not been miraculously raised from the dead, the Book of Revelation never could have been written; and if it were not for the Book of Revelation with its "Even so, come, Lord Jesus" we would be in the dark so far as knowing what the consummation of this present age is going to be. Had we not experienced the glorious moving of God's Spirit in our individual lives we would be lost today.

The answer to the first question, then, is obvious. There is a mysterious, supernatural, miraculous power that emanates from the very person of God that is real and glorious, and we need that power in our midst today.

It was my privilege to speak at a Youth for Christ meeting in Nashville, Tennessee. There were some 3,000 people present, and at the conclusion of the altar call a very old gentleman said to me, "Brother Webb, I would like to give you an autographed copy of my book." He identified himself as a Presbyterian preacher, and the book seemed to be a story of what God had done many years ago.

I said, "Thank you, I'll surely appreciate the book," and I put it in my brief case. I am ashamed to say that many weeks went by before I took time to read that book, because I felt that I was living in a glorious present experience and in the prospect of something better still and I was not so much concerned

over what God may have done in past years.

One day I was traveling with Brother Lawson, now Superintendent of the Southern Missouri District, and I brought out that book. I ran across some things in it that thrilled my heart. I said, "Brother Lawson, listen to this!" And I began to read some of the history of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

Over in Kentucky there was a crying to God by a number of people in a rural area. When the minister came to have communion on the appointed Sunday of the month, he preached and said, "Unless your heart is right with God you ought not to take communion." This old gentleman, the writer of the book, was a young man in that meeting. He recorded that a spirit of weeping seized upon the people and they began to run out of the building and into the nearby woods to pray. Soon the weeping and repentance in the woods had reached such proportions that the preacher ceased preaching and said, "We will not go on with the communion service until the people finish praying.'

However, the prayer continued throughout the rest of the morning and throughout the afternoon. People went home and told their relatives. They came and fell under conviction, and for three days and three nights those Presbyterians prayed constantly. The glory of God was manifested and scores and scores of people at one time were

lying prostrate under the power of the Lord.

As Pentecostal people we would do well to pray down a renewal of the Holy Spirit's convicting power. Oh, that we who know the Lord would be seized afresh by God and be caused to lay aside everything and say, "Lord, here am I." We would do well to press into a new place of fellowship with the Holy Spirit. There is the supernatural! The Word is replete with instances where only the miraculous power of God answered the need of His people.

Moses, for example, became the deliverer of the children of Israel from Egyptian bondage, because of the miraculous demonstration of the power of God. Moses turned aside to see the bush that burned yet was not consumed. When God saw that Moses turned aside to see, He spoke to Moses. If you want to hear from God, my friends, take notice of what God is doing round about you. Then you will be in a fair way of hearing from the Almighty.

Moses turned aside to see this phenomenon. He supposed that the branches of the bush would drop away and the whole be turned to ashes. But to his amazement the bush burned on without being consumed. O God, give us Pentecostal people a conception of the moving of Thy Spirit, a fresh understanding, and a quick response to every indication of Thy divine presence.

This fall I shall have been an Assemblies of God preacher for twenty-six years. From the time I first came into this glorious Pentecostal experience I have lived in the experience of the moving of the Spirit of the living God. The same warmth of the Spirit still glows in my heart as I realize the possibility of greater things than we have ever known.

Every name of God by which He revealed Himself unfolded what He desired to be to man. With the name Jehovah-rapha came the revelation that He desired to be the Healer of His people. With each succeeding revelation of Himself, God showed His miraculous power to His people. Praise God for the revival of Divine Healing that we see in our land today. In spite of some exaggerated claims and some strange methods, I do believe that there are

more people being healed now than at any time in the twenty-six years of my experience in Pentecost.

Thank God for each evidence of the supernatural in healing power, but I believe we would be wise to seek the Lord for a revelation of His power in other directions as well as in the healing of our physical bodies. For example, we need to pray for pungent supernatural conviction to come upon the people. And we still need pioneer preachers to go into new places not yet reached by the Pentecostal message and to prove what God can do.

You remember the experience of the young servant of Elisha when they were surrounded by the enemy at Dothan. The young man said, in effect, "It's all up with us. We might as well surrender. The enemy has surrounded us." But Elisha prayed, "Lord, open the young man's eyes; let him see the invisible hosts that are with us." A revelation of the supernatural was given to the young man, and he saw the mountain filled with the armies of God. Oh, it is a thrill to experience the supernatural power of the living God!

When Elijah's mantle fell, Elisha started back. I wonder if he did not feel like a young preacher just starting out in the ministry, who says to himself, "Let's see if it will work over here." Let us have faith to reach out and to believe God to roll back the hindrances and to give a marvellous answer to prayer. If you are a young preacher, and you never have gone to a community where there is no assembly and started from scratch, then you have missed one of the most thrilling experiences in life.

A young man had been after me for two years to leave Granada, Minnesota, and to come to Appleton, Wisconsin to hold a meeting. Elvin Ray and I, both single young men, said, "That's the will of God for us to go there." Finally I resigned my church and wrote to Appleton saying that we would come and hold a meeting. The young man wrote right back, saying, "We'll get a big tent and we'll look to God."

We arrived in due time to discover that the young man had moved to Chicago. The tent was at the freight house with nearly twenty dollars of demurrage on it. Twenty dollars was a lot of money then. My first impulse was to say, "We have plenty of places to hold meetings-we'll just go on our way." Then God whispered to my heart, "Didn't you say that this was My will?" So we went ahead and put up the tent. For three weeks we never had as many as forty-five people in a tent $50 \ge 70$, a mere handful in that roomy tent.

I was doing the preaching, and I did pray, but much of the credit for the Appleton church, humanly speaking, goes to Brother Ray. When I said, "We might as well quit-three weeks and not a soul saved!" Brother Ray said, "Let's try to believe God." He went home that night to spend it on his knees. As he prayed God moved in my heart and we became greatly burdened. Others said, "We will pray."

One day a truck rolled up with five or six colored boys in it. One of them got out and came into the tent and said, We'd like to sing in your meeting."

"Well," I replied, "we don't have much of a meeting for you to sing in. We'd be glad to have you, but there isn't much here."

He said, "We've had a meeting cancelled and we believe this is where we ought to be."

We put a notice in the paper, and had a good turnout. God gave a real break through and eventually there were sixty or seventy saved and a number filled with the Spirit. Out of the prayers of God's people a miracle came into being. A church was organized, and Brother and Sister Lindquist became the first pastors.

The Bible says that we wrestle against principalities and powers, against wicked spirits in heavenly places, but there is a power that can prevail against the enemy and it is ours for the taking. There is great opposition to the work of God all about us. The popular magazines of the day advertise liquor, beer, and cigarettes and make every conceivable suggestion to evil. There is an evil force that drives people to commit the most heinous crimes. Often those who are arrested for crime will say, "I don't know why I ever did such a thing; I seemed to be driven by a force that I could not resist." The devil is on the job today and if ever we needed the moving of God, it surely is now.

There is only one way, as far as I know, to bring the power of God into contact with the need, and that is for forgiven sinners, mightily anointed with the Holy Spirit, to become the instruments in God's hand to meet the need of a sinful world. It has pleased God to take ordinary folks with an extraordinary blessing and to reveal Himself through them to a world in need. God is not bound to any particular personality. He is not forced to use any select few. Wherever God's people are they can touch Him, and God, through them, can touch others.

I think that one of the most striking examples of contact with God is found in Genesis 15. Abraham said, "Lord, how shall I know?" He was in fellow-

ship with God, but on this occasion he wavered. He said, in effect, "Lord, I want to believe; help Thou my unbelief." Does that sound anything like your own condition?

What did God do with Abraham? He did not say, "Get away-from me, you miserable backslider with no faith after all I have done for you." God took up Abraham's challenge and said, in effect, "If you want real assurance, go out and build an altar. Cut the sacrifice in pieces and lay each piece against another."

As soon as the sacrifice was in order, the fowls of the air came down to steal it away. No sooner will you determine to draw near to God than that "fowl of the air," the devil himself, will try to snatch away your determination.

How many times we have knelt in church or in private to say, "Lord, forgive my prayerlessness. Help me to be more faithful." We promised God we would pray more, and in thirty days we were praying the same thing. Well, God is working in us not only to will, but to *do* His good pleasure. You do not have to go on half defeated. In Christ there is victory. I believe that sanctification is progressive. I believe it is "from glory to glory." But, bless your heart, if you are following it (Heb. 12:14), one of these days you are supposed to catch up with it. There is a

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Evangelize or Fossilize

ALTHOUGH THE Pentecostal revival started a generation ago, there are thousands of villages and towns where there never has been a Pentecostal meeting, and we are responsible for this tragic state of affairs. Woe unto us for our lethargy and complacency.

The Pentecostal preacher who can stay as pastor of an assembly and continue twelve or even six months without seeing souls saved, either in his assembly or in the virgin soil of the villages or towns surrounding his church, is not only dead; he has COMMENCED TO MORTIFY. He will soon be keeping company with the bones in Ezekiel's "boneyard."

Evangelization means winning souls, and if we do not win souls we shall fossilize. "Do the work of an evangelist," was Paul's injunction to Timothy, and the work of an evangelist is to "win souls" by proclaiming the evangel, and by intercession and travail.

PALLIATION '

To palliate our conscience, when souls are not won, with the sedative of God's promise, "My Word shall not return unto me void," is a despicable contortion of Holy Writ and an excuse for not travailing, weeping, crying, burning, and blazing with a divine intensity for those who are heedlessly rushing into the flames of an endless hell.

We may preach the Gospel, for that is the meaning of the word "Evangel," but God does not bless the Gospel when preached by cold, frozen, lukewarm, iceberg lips. Neither is it academical, homiletical, analytical, or oratorical preaching which will bring sinners to feel that they are going to drop into hell fire any minute, but it is BLAZING, BURNING, FIERY, WHITE-HOT PREACH-ING WITH THE HOLY GHOST sent down from heaven.

It should be pointed out very emphatically that the text referred to above ("My Word shall not return unto Me void . . .") does not refer to the preaching of the gospel. The gospel must be preached with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven, and if sinners are not saved then we must pray, travail, weep. cry, groan, and become violent in supplication and intercession until the altars or inquiry rooms are crowded with penitents.

SOOTHING SYRUP

How is it that many of our members never bring a sinner to hear the gospel? Is it not because the pastor is failing to fulfill his vocation? How is it that some who very rarely win souls, console themselves with the soothing syrup of "I AM A TEACHER"? This attitude is due to a false interpretation of Ephesians 4:11, 12. The literal interpretation of that passage (and this interpretation is confirmed by eminent Greek scholars) is, "And He Himself gave the apostles, and the prophets, and the evangelists, and THE TEACHING PASTORS, FOR THE EQUIPPING OF THE SAINTS FOR THE MINISTERING WORK, resulting in the building up of the body of Christ.'

Jesus was a Teacher but He was preeminently a burning, blazing, white-hot soul-winner. He was continually preaching the gospel, and winning souls every day. Jesus was continually teaching them, but pre-eminently He was teaching them how to win souls. The parable of the sower is an address on soul winning. The parable of the lost coin is a soul-winning message, and the same applies to the parable of the lost sheep. The parable of the good Samaritan is a soulwinning message. . . . "Go and do like-

wise." The parable of the great supper is a soul-winning message. . . . "Go into the streets and lanes and compel them to come in." His teaching was dominated by His blazing passion for the lost. Some who claim to be teachers are, unfortunately, floundering about in what they call "DEEP TEACHING," whereas if they were blazing with a consuming passion for the lost they would, in the words of Ephesians 4, be "EQUIPPING THE SAINTS" for the greatest business of all businesses, "THE SOUL-WINNING BUSINESS."

Some of these profound teachers never even give an address on soul winning; and if they do, it is like a shower bath of cold snow, because it does not come from a burning fire in their very bones.

Pastors, let us rise to our calling and remember that according to Ephesians 4 we must turn every one of our members into fiery, white-hot soul winners. If we are not doing this, we are failing to make full proof of our ministry.

SHEEP AND LAMBS

How often we have heard the term, "Confirming the churches"! It seems to me that the majority of our members have become confirmed sterile sheep. They are certainly getting fat, but what good is a fat sheep if it does not produce lambs? The shepherd will not waste any further time upon it; the butcher is called, and it is soon hanging in the butcher's shop. Jesus will not tolerate lambless sheep. Did He not say of the fruitless fig tree, "CUT IT DOWN"? On more than one occasion the Saviour revealed His attitude towards barren Christians, who lack evangelical zeal and thus never win souls or even bring sinners to hear the gospel. Did He not say of the barren vine branch, "It is withered . . . cast forth, men gather them and they are cast into the fire and burned"? Did He not condemn the man with one talent for his failure to gain another talent or a few talents? What a revelation it would be if, in one of our conventions, all the Christians who had failed to win a soul during 1951 were asked to stand to their feet. Woe unto us! How can anyone claim to be filled with the Spirit, when he has not won one soul during the past seven months?

The individual or the assembly that fails to EVANGELIZE or WIN SOULS, will certainly FOSSILIZE. They become "withered." Their testimony withers; their spiritual life withers; their Spirit-filled experience withers.

Let every pastor turn every member of his assembly into a blazing, white-hot soul winner who will snatch the lost as brands from the burning fires of a neverending hell.

A House Divided Against Itself

THERE IS NOT much doubt about it. The church in China is going through the darkest hours of its modern-day history. Behind the "bamboo curtain," at the mercy of the new government regime (and even "the tender mercies of the wicked are cruel"), the Chinese Christians are being forced to abandon all connection with the church outside China; forced to accuse their leaders and fellow Christians of insincerity; and forced to revise the teaching of the Word of God.

How do we know? Not by letters any more, for almost all of our former correspondents are now afraid to pen a letter to anyone outside China. To send or to receive such a letter is construed by the government to mean that the sender or receiver is conniving with foreign governments, plotting to overthrow the Communist regime, etc.

But there are still reliable methods. One is that of conversation with persons coming out of China, preferably Chinese. Another is that of reading newspapers published in China. A third source is other publications, such as *T'ien Feng*, the official church magazine under the Communists. These publications are smuggled out quite easily; some can even be sent out through the post.

Recently we did receive a letter from the Assemblies of God of a certain district, written evidently under duress, in which they said that under the new government they had become entirely indigenous, and wanted nothing to do with the organization outside China. They declared in the letter that we had taught them erroneously in times past, and that under their new leadership they were learning the true way to operate. We were not greatly troubled at the receipt of such a letter, for others have received them, too, and all are so similar that it is evident they are dictated.

It is by reading T'ien Feng (Heavenly Breezes) that one gets the clearest view. Here is pictured the awful view of the church destroying itself under the driving of the government. Says the government: "There is rottenness in the church. You must unite to drive it out. If you know anyone who has connived with foreigners or taught the doctrines of capitalism, you must accuse him at once so that he can be done away with." Thus begins the awful curse of accusation, one Christian telling what evil he knows about the other; and if no accusations are made, the government accuses you or your church of being in sympathy with America. You are thrown into jail, and the church may not hold meetings any longer.

Chinese who have been in America, or who have worked with Americans or other foreigners, are the ones in greatest danger. Some of these apparently have come out boldly, hurling violent accusations against others in order to try to clear their own skirts. Sadly we report concerning Marcus Ch'en, widely known in China as a pastor, Bible teacher, evangelist and world traveler. He has denounced America and its "imperialism" and openly embraced the new tenets of Communism. All of this might be forgiven; but now he has accused a fellow Chinese and a fellow Christian, Pastor Joseph Ku. And today, Pastor Ku languishes in prison.

Pastor Ku formerly was a movie star. He lived a wild life. Suffering imprisonment at the time, which he well deserved, he was ministered to by Brother Mussen, a Pentecostal missionary, and was wonderfully saved. Later he was baptized with the Holy Spirit, and dedicated his life to evangelism. He suffered much persecution but maintained a beautiful spirit. Other suffering also came his way. His former wife and two children were aboard a steamer loaded with war freight during the war with Japan, which blew up. He lost his family, but he remained faithful to the Lord. He married again, eventually—a very sweet, Christian wife.

God has mightily used Pastor Ku. In Shanghai he held special meetings, attended by thousands. We have heard of those wonderful meetings from many sources. Hundreds were healed and filled with the Holy Spirit; and many, many took their stand for Christ. How we rejoiced as we heard the good news, confirmed again recently by one who came from there and who had talked with several of those who were healed, and had attended one of the meetings when 700 tarried for the Holy Spirit at one time.

But now? Marcus Ch'en has accused Pastor Ku, bringing up things from his past before his conversion, falsely stating things concerning him since his conversion. Pastor Ku has been forced to make a so-called "confession" and in this way a mighty servant of Christ has been brought low, a glorious voice muted. The "church" is calling for his execution! Some have reported him already shot.

This news especially grieves us because we know Pastor Ku so well and love him so dearly in the Lord. But what of the many others, similarly accused? Many of these also are in prison today, many have already been executed. And still the awful accusations go on.

A house that is divided against itself shall not stand. The Lord taught this, and the Communists know it very well, and they have devised a method by which they hope the church will destroy itself: let each accuse the other. How diabolically cunning! Just as soon as a missionary leaves, the leader who worked with that missionary is forced to accuse him. If he will not do so, the government in turn accuses the leader, and he is thrown into jail. No one is safe, but the ire of the government is directed particularly against the leaders. Some things are amusing —in a way. Even dead missionaries are accused! Great anathemas are read against the dead. Thus do the people prove that they hate even the memories of the missionaries who served in China years ago.

Let them say what they will against America, or against the missionary. But when they accuse one another, advocating the imprisonment or death of another Chinese of their own race and blood—do they realize that this is the beginning of the end? Pray for them, that they will realize this before it is too late, before they have destroyed the church with their own hands.

And let us in America take from this a lesson. How prone we are to gossip about one another, to tell the little, slighting thing about our brother, to call the attention of others to his faults. What is this but the beginning of accusation? In the Bible the devil is called the accuser of the brethren. Let us beware of taking the devil's place, lest some day the habit of accusation shall have grown upon us until we, too, are willing to accuse our brother at the request of the government, or to divert the eyes of men from our own sins by drawing attention to the shortcomings of others.

Methodists Have 1,421 Overseas Missionaries

THE METHODIST CHURCH has 1.421 active missionaries serving overseas today-245 more than it had in 1946 when the Communists began tightening controls in China, it is announced by Jesse C. Engle, an executive of the denomination's Board of Missions and Church Extension. Two factors account for this, Dr. Engle says: the large number of young people who are volunteering for missionary service, and the transferring of seasoned missionaries from China to other parts of the world, especially to countries in which there are large immigrant populations from China. These countries include Malaya, Burma, Sumatra, Borneo, Indonesia, and the Philippine Islands.

"While almost all Methodist and other missionaries have left China," says Dr. Engle, "some because of Communist restrictions upon their work, and some because their presence would be an embarrassment to Chinese Christian colleagues who might be accused of 'association with enemies of the people,' the fact is that they left the work—the hospitals, schools, and churches—in trained and competent Chinese hands. The missionary may be out of China; but the Christian witness and service goes on."

ELIJAH TRUSTS IN GOD

Lesson for August 12

1 Kings 17:1-16

God raised up Elijah the prophet to warn sinful Ahab, to pronounce chastisement in the form of drought, and to endeavor by such means to bring the king and Israel back to God.

The name Elijah is said to mean, "My God is Jehovah," or, "My strength is Jehovah." Some think of God as One who strengthens; others think of Him as being Himself their strength. The one thinks of help *from* God; the other that *God Himself is his help*. It is in this latter class that we find Elijah.

1. Elijah Warns Ahab

The home of Elijah was in Gilead, in the mountainous country east of Jordan. He lacked the culture that the schools in Jerusalem might afford, but he had no lack of spiritual fervor. In his approach to Ahab, without formality he said, "As the Lord God of Israel liveth, before whom I stand, there shall not be dew nor rain these years, but according to my word." v. 1. He had God's message and needed not to apologize. Let us not think, however, that we are to imitate Elijah. Because he was very brusk is no reason why we should be. Let Elijah be himself. Let us be what we are,

2. Elijah Goes to Cherith

When Elijah had brought his message of drouth to Ahab, the Lord made provision for the prophet during this period. "The word of the Lord came unto him, saying . . . hide thyself by the brook Cherith." vv. 2, 3. Then the Lord told him how he was to be sustained (v.4). It is believed that Elijah remained near the brook for a full year. During that time the Lord never failed him. What his daily provision was we are not told. All we know is that he was to drink from the brook and to be fed by the ravens. The lesson for us is that we are to be content with such things as God provides us, trusting Him for our daily bread, being assured that, as we are obedient, the Lord "will never leave us nor forsake us."

3. Elijah by the Brook

God wrought a miracle in sustaining Elijah. Did His miraculous care become commonplace to him after a while? Were the water and food finally taken for granted and did the sense of appreciation become less? God help us when Divine manifestations no longer cause us to reverence Him. May they never lose their sacredness. If they do, we may find our brook dried up. Israel in the wilderness became wearied of God's miraculous provision. When the manna first began to fall they rejoiced exceedingly. Later they loathed "this light bread" (Num. 21:5). The time came when the Lord let Elijah's brook dry up. How about our brook? How about our spiritual zeal, our love? Is Christian profession taking the place of sacred devotion and love for the souls of men? If God's grace ceases to be appreciated, its blessings will be withdrawn.

4. Elijah Is Tested

When the brook dried up, possibly Elijah was faced with perplexity. Had he not gone to the brook at the word of the Lord? Was God still with him? Was he not God's prophet? Many questions could come to his mind. Is it not thus with us when God takes blessings from us on which we have come to lean? Because God has blessed, we are prone to think that the blessings will continue whether we are grateful or not, and whether we reverently seek God or do otherwise. When this attitude is taken, the blessings dry up.

5. Lessons from the Testing

When God removes His blessings it indicates that He is speaking to us. We may have been living in them. God would have us live in Him. He remains, even though His bless-ings be withdrawn. "The just shall live by faith." He would turn us from things, and the worship of things, to Himself. When God let the brook run dry, He had new experiences for the prophet. He would have him leave the brook and go to Zarephath. Israel enjoyed their stay at Seir until God said, "Ye have compassed this mountain long enough." Deut. 2:3. For Elijah to be obedient to this new call required that he walk the full length of Palestine, from the vicinity of Jordan to idolatrous Syria, and that he take this step in faith.

6. Elijah Moves North

While Elijah resided near the brook he had absolutely his own way. None was there to interrupt him. It was a solitary life, but it was his own. In going to Zarephath matters would be different. Syria was the birthplace of Jezebel. The people were idolaters. Why should God send him entirely out of his beloved Israel and place him among strangers? Such questions are not easy to answer. God knows the "why" and it is for us to follow. We all have had times when our lives have hung on a question, "Lord, why is this? Lord, tell me why." The Lord did not tell Elijah why; He just said, "Go;" and Elijah obeyed. Thus "the just shall live by faith."

7. Elijah Tested at Zarephath

God had told Elijah that at Zarephath He had commanded a widow woman to feed him (v. 9). While encouraging faith, this experience must have required humility. Zarephath means "a place of refining metals." God saw there was metal in Elijah which needed further refining. When He tests us it is for a similar purpose.


When the widow came out to whom Elijah was directed, behold, she was in dire poverty. Her condition could not have been much worse. Perhaps Elijah had thought it would be a widow with wealth that would sustain him. It must have been humbling indeed for a strong and well-fed man to ask a starving woman to give to him at a time when she was preparing for herself and her son the last that they had. Perhaps you say, "Elijah knew what God would do." I am not so sure of that. God usually meets us in our hour of need. Elijah knew this woman was to be his hostess, and as he ventured in obedience, faith sprang up. When the woman told him of her poverty, quickened faith said, "Fear not, make a little cake for me and your need will be supplied." We must not expect great faith before we take the first step of faith. It is as we move in faith that greater faith comes. As Elijah assured the widow, his own faith grew strong. May the Lord make us obedient to Him knowing that "the just shall live by faith."

OUR FOREIGN LANGUAGE BRANCHES

Encouraging reports are coming from our Foreign Language Groups. S. J. Wasilenko, Superintendent of the Russian Branch, states that the Lord has richly blessed their group through this past fiscal year as never before. Special speakers for their annual convention were Fred Vogler, Home Missions Director, and T. R. Brubaker, Superintendent of the New York-New Jersey District.

A PASTOR VISITS OUR OFFICE

A short time ago we were pleased to receive in our office Brother Mike Paveloff, pastor of our Russian Gospel Temple in Los Angeles, located at 207 South Townsend Avenue. Brother Paveloff told us of the fine church building the Lord has enabled them to obtain for \$5,000. It is valued now at approximately \$45,000. The main auditorium will seat about 200, and the young people's auditorium will accommodate about 100. The basement contains twenty-one rooms suitable for Sunday School use, besides dining room and kitchen. "God gave it to us," Brother Paveloff declares. The church was organized about eighteen years ago.

The Gospel Temple is one of our thirteen assemblies affiliated with the Russian Branch of the Assemblies of God.

Brother Vogler, when visiting their annual convention in Jersey City a few weeks ago, found the Russian Branch to be a progressive group of brethren who have caught the vision of enlargement, and states that they are hoping to establish several new churches within the coming year.

There are many communities in various parts of America where thousands of Russianspeaking people are concentrated. The children speak English, but the parents in many cases speak only Russian, and so it is necessary for the services to be carried on in the Russian language.

A large number of the Russian-speaking people have been brought up in the Greek Orthodox Church, but Brother Paveloff and his wife were members of a church known as the "Russian Molakan Holy Spiritual Jumpers." It is reported that there are ten thousand members of the "Jumpers" in Los Angeles alone. Their creed is a mixture of Judaism and Catholicism. Their meetings are marked by much ritual, but undoubtedly the sect grew out of a genuine spiritual awakening which came to these people many years ago.

Brother and Sister Paveloff were saved from the spiritual darkness of the "Jumpers" seventeen years ago. They report that until about a year ago the outlook at the Gospel Temple was rather disheartening. The average attendance in Sunday School was only 35 to 40. But these past several months have been a period of blessed revival. The Lord has been saving many young people in the regular meetings, and others have been saved in special evangelistic meetings. As a result, they have recently had two wonderful water baptismal services, and their Sunday School attendance is averaging around 100 each Sunday.

God has been pouring out His Spirit in the meetings in a wonderful way. Many times it has been impossible for the pastor to deliver his sermon, for the Spirit has fallen upon the meeting, and the people have started to pray before the sermon could be given. As a result, many souls have been saved and many believers have been filled with the Holy Spirit.

Brother and Sister Paveloff request the prayers of the EVANGEL readers for the continued blessing of the Lord upon their church and upon all the Russian-speaking assemblies of the U. S. A.

UKRAINIAN COUNCIL CONVENES

The Ukrainian Branch Council was held at Stamford, Connecticut, May 31-June 2. The ministry of J. R. Flower, our General Secretary, and Fred Vogler was greatly appreciated by the Ukrainian brethren.

The reports of the Ukrainian Branch Presbyters showed definite progress in the work of the Lord. Three new ministers were added to the Branch, and a new work opened in Bridgeport, Connecticut. The Branch assumed the responsibility of financially supporting five missionaries among the Slavs in the D. P. camps of Germany, and is also sending gospel literature in the Ukrainian language to all parts of the world to refugee Ukrainians. The publishing of the twenty-page Ukrainian language periodical "Evanhelsky Palomnyk" is going into its eleventh year. The periodical has proven to be a distinct blessing in the field of evangelism among the Slavs. (Free sample copies may be obtained upon request. Write to the Ukrainian Branch, 9 East 7th Street, New York 3, New York.)

The conviction of the brethren in this session was that the time is very short, and the work yet to be done is great. The Branch passed several resolutions with the intention of encouraging ministers and assemblies to do more for the salvation of souls in the coming year. The brethren of the Ukrainian Branch sincerely ask an interest in the prayers of the saints.

ITALIAN BRANCH COUNCIL

The Fourth Annual Convention of the Italian Branch was held in the Broadway Tabernacle, our Italian assembly in Paterson, New Jersey, May 26 and 27. The host pastor was Philip D'Angelo, and special speaker was Fred Vogler.

The Superintendent of the Italian Branch, Quirino Grilli, gave an excellent report concerning the growth of the Branch, and commended the various departments for their good work. The General Secretary, Anthony Piraino, also gave an encouraging report, showing that the increase of ministers and of co-operating churches is over 30%. Twentytwo ministers and eleven churches were added to the fellowship during the past year. At present there are eighty-six ministers and forty-six assemblies affiliated with the Italian Branch. Missionary giving for the year totaled \$10,773.96.



For some time I suffered with heart trouble. At first I did not know what it was. In the fall of 1945 I went to see a heart specialist. Dr. Burkelow of Rogers, Arkansas, who is now deceased, examined me. He told me that I had a heart ailment that no one could cure.

That night I attended a service at our church. Before the meeting began my wife told the pastor, Brother Ferren, what the doctor had said about my heart. He asked me to come to the altar for prayer, and then he called the saints to come and pray for me. The house was filled with the presence of God. Before the prayer was finished I felt the arteries of my heart expand, and what a relief! I was free of the burden that had held me down so long.

The doctor had asked me to come back in three weeks. After he examined my heart again, he said, "There is not a thing the matter with your heart."

This healing took place five years ago, and not a symptom of the heart trouble has returned.—W. E. Brace, 211 E. Oak St., Rogers, Ark.



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THE WATER OF LIFE

Mrs. Stuart Watt tells the following thrilling experience that came to her husband while he was engaged in mission work in Central Africa.

He was out on a mission tour, and thirty miles from the mission station, every water supply had failed and strength was exhausted. Twenty miles ahead was the nearest point where water could be obtained.

Two of the strongest natives were urged forward to obtain water and return, while the remainder of the exhausted party crawled forward in slow, painful stages of a few hundred yards. Thus stage after stage was made until the sun was high in the heavens, gleaming in all its tropical fury. As the hours passed the intense agony of thirst became more acute, the mouth foaming, and the tongue so clave to the palate that Mr. Watt could only speak with great difficulty. Eventually he could only make about a hundred yards at a time, with the aid of the men, who partially supported him. On his body he retained the barest clothing so that as little moisture as possible should be lost by perspiration.

At last he realized that the climax had come. To the native who kept by his side he gasped out: "Sudie, I can go no farther. If the men do not bring water, here I die."

He threw himself down under partial shade. Then with an effort he stretched out his hands to the burning heavens, and prayed to God for one drop of rain to cool his feverish body. While he was praying a little cloud appeared in the heavens. Borne by some Goddirected current it can.e directly over where the missionarv lay, and instantly there fell a few big, . avy drops. He pulled his vest widely open so that the large drops might fall on his heated breast. The drops increased in number until there was a little shower of rain.

To use Mr. Watt's own words: "I opened my mouth and thrust out my tongue to catch the precious fluid. In about five minutes or less the cloud was spent but I was revived. My clothes were quite wet on one side. I got up and felt greatly strengthened. I said to Sudie, 'Do you see what God has done for us?' 'Yes, master, I see it,' came his response. I was then enabled to proceed, in short stages, all that afternoon until sundown, when I met my two faithful porters laden with their water vessels."

How dependent we are upon an adequate supply of water. But we need the water that we cannot see, the water that Christ gives, more than we do the natural water that we recognize as so indispensable. It is the water of life, which is promised to every thirsty soul who is tired of his sin and will trust in the Saviour. And today the invitation goes forth, "Let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." Rev. 22:17.

place in God where everything else is swept away and He becomes all in all.

I am thinking of the church in St. Cloud, Minnesota, where it seemed that we could not go further. We had incurred obligations

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which we could not meet at the moment. We concluded that we would go into debt no further, that we would pay what we owed; then, unless there was an answer to prayer, we would say, "We've failed here."

One afternoon about 2 p.m. I went into the study of that church. (There were others praying, but I am telling of my own experience.) I knelt down to pray and about 5:30 it dawned upon me that the afternoon had passed. I found myself lying prostrate on the floor. There were pools of tears there, and I felt so in the immediate presence of the living God that it seemed anything was possible. It would have been a greater surprise to me if something had *not* happened. Oh, that indefinable something that is communicated to the soul that is in touch with God!

The result? For three successive Sundays, in the midst of depression years, someone rolled up a wad of money each week-two twenties and a ten, in a little tight balland dropped it into the offering. That was the difference between going on and having to admit defeat. Friends, it meant a quickening of faith in God that nothing else would bring. It was not the money that meant so much, but the answer to prayer. That same mysterious supernatural power is still available to us; and, glory to God! I am sensing a moving of the Spirit that is heartening to my soul. All about us there is evidence of a stirring in answer to prayer. Take courage, friends. The God of Abraham, of Isaac, and of Jacob, is our God today.

In conclusion, I present this thought. Abraham said, in effect, "Lord, give me a new touch, a new revelation of Your power." God said, "Do this." So Abraham laid the sacrifice in order, and the fowls swooped down to take it away. I have always imagined that Abraham took a club, and when one of the birds swooped down he made a vigorous pass at it. He took it upon himself to fight the devil, so to speak. Those birds, the type of the enemy, would have devoured the sacrifice he was offering to God. The Bible says that he fought them off until the going down of the sun. As he beat those birds away, there appeared a smoking lamp that passed up and down between the pieces of the sacrifice. A rather weird, unearthly experience. No hand held that lamp. It floated in the air. This phenomenon was the evidence of the divine presence.

Someone may ask, "What are you trying to say, preacher?" Just this: that, connected with the blessings of God, there is an opposing force seeking to rob us of them, and that with the blessings of God in answer to prayer frequently will come experiences of the supernatural that you have never known before.

I like to "remember the days of old." I like to look back to what God *did*, but recently I was reminded by Isaiah 43:19 that God cried out, "Behold, I will do a *new* thing." We are not tied to the old. We are joyously linked with the revelation of what God desires to *be* to us all *now*.



THE CHUPPAH ... by Ruth Specter

Used in the marriage ceremony of the Jews is a canopy or "Chuppah" of equal length and width, made of either silk or satin, supported by four staves (one in each corner) which four guests carry. Over the staves on the canopy there is printed one of the following phrases in Hebrew: "The Voice of the Bride, The Voice of the Groom, The Sound of Gladness, The Sound of Joy" (Jer. 33:11).

This Chuppah reminds the Jew of the litter in which the bride was carried in the processions of long ago. It also brings to remembrance the ancient tent life of Israel and stands as a picture of the future home of the couple. The groom (Chassan) is led first under the canopy, and then the bride (Cholee) follows after.

Close the eyes of the natural man to this "Chuppah" and let the eyes of the spiritual man be opened! Read Rev. 21:16— "And the city lieth *foursquare*, and the length is as large as the breadth... The length and the breadth and the height of it are equal." Yes, as the saints of God look upon the canopy of Jewish custom they can see the future home of the Bride and the Heavenly Bridegroom. The Women's Missionary Council of Texas District had its annual convention in Fort Worth in June, in connection with the District Council. All of the officers were re-elected for a two-year term, as follows:

God met with us in our 8 a.m. prayer meet-ings. Our 16 Sectional Directors and 16 Secretaries had a business meeting prior to the convention. The annual program was on Thursday afternoon. Among those who took part were Mrs. W. S. Graham of Baytown and Mrs. Roy Steger, President of the Oklahoma W. M. C. Mrs. W. R. Steelberg brought the afternoon message, her subject being, "Woman, an Help Meet" (Genesis 2:20).

The annual report showed that in the year ending April 30, 1951, the Women's Missionary Councils of Texas District distributed 108,403 Councils of Texas District distributed 108,403 Evangels and other religious papers, 75,028 tracts, 1,341 Testaments, 2,578 Gospels, and 872 story books. They held 1,479 prayer meet-ings, 500 prison services, made 17,087 hospital calls, 48,264 house-to-house calls, and 48,685 other sick calls. They gave out 61,214 garments, 4,541 pairs of shoes, 318 quilts, sent six boxes of clothing to veterans in Bible School, three boxes to displaced persons overseas, four boxes to National Children's Home and 21 boxes to to National Children's Home, and 21 boxes to foreign missionaries. The combined report of the local W.M.C

groups showed that a total of \$62,774.05 was contributed during the year. Of this total, \$9,363.21 went to foreign missions, \$5,590.31 to \$9,505.21 went to foreign missions, \$5,590.31 to home missions, \$12,269.10 for groceries given, \$13,647.96 for local church buildings, and \$7,974.31 for local parsonages. In addition to the above, the District office of the W. M. C. disbursed \$6,711.51 during the year, including \$3,098.09 for the Vassar Nur-

sery in India, \$1,400.00 for a lot for the District

Secretary's parsonage, and \$1,017.53 for ladies' room at Southwestern Bible Institute. The women are hoping to do more for God within the coming year.—Mrs. E. B. Crump, Secretary-Treasurer of District W. M. C.



He labored as a pastor and evangelist, working much of the time in neglected communities and among foreign-speaking people. Failing health kept him from preaching very much in recent years. He, was 74 years of age.
