NEWS BRIEFS FROM THE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE

### **American Family Shrinking**

The latest statistics on families in the U. S. show a continuing shrinkage in size. The average now is 3 persons, as compared to 3.2 in 1940. Birth control methods are blamed for the decrease.

### Opportunities in Japan

One day's advertisement in three leading newspapers of western Japan recently brought 2,200 inquiries concerning Christianity into the office of the united Church of Christ in Japan. This indicates a vast opportunity for Christian missions.

### "Peace and Safety"

In spite of the political unrest in the Far East, Singapore is experiencing a large-scale building boom. Government and armed-services housing projects account for some of the activity, while businessmen and financiers are sponsoring other construction projects, including three skyscrapers.

### Persian Airlift Ends

The airlift between Iran and Israel ended recently with the arrival at Lydda airport of a Near East Skymaster with 72 Jewish immigrants from Teheran. Some 20,000 Jews have been flown from Iran in the past year. No more flights will be made, but immigration will continue by land and my sea.

### More Bible Scrolls Found

A Hebrew University professor has announced the discovery of additional Bible manuscripts in a cave near Jericho, close to the spot where important scrolls were found in 1947. It is expected that the new finds will open up a fresh era of Biblical research. Further manuscripts probably will be discovered if and when it is possible to investigate systematically almost one hundred such caves in the Jericho region.

### No Bananas on Sunday

The people of Niue, a Pacific island near Samoa, are staunch churchgoers. Virtually all are adherents of the London Missionary Society. They also export bananas. In fact, bananas are their third biggest source of income. Recently they were faced with a problem due to the fact that the ship always called on a Sunday to do business. They made the right decision. They refused to export bananas on Sunday.

### "Mr. Magic Carpet"

The Jewish press carried a touching item concerning the Israel plane which crashed a few weeks ago on the mountains of Israel, killing the pilot and all the crew. There was a pilot from Texas who had taken a job on the airlift called "The Magic Carpet," shuttling between Iraq and Israel. He personally had flown tens of thousands of Jewish refugees to the promised land, and as a result he came to be known as "Mr. Magic Carpet."

This pilot remarked to a friend that he believed he would never lose a life or a plane as long as he was ferrying Jews back to their ancient homeland; and so it proved. The operation was completed without a single crash.

The plane that crashed in Switzerland was piloted by "Mr. Magic Carpet," but it was flying a heavy shipment of Israel products. There was not a refugee on board.

### Liquor Forces Win

Temperance leaders at Washington expressed keen disappointment when the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Commission voted 7-6 against reporting to the floor a bill which would have banned liquor advertising from radio and television. The measure would not have affected beer advertising.

The measure was fought bitterly by distillery interests, and was opposed by the broadcasters, which may mean that liquor advertising is due to be increased on radio and to be introduced on the television networks. Said one of the Temperance leaders: "We lacked enough letters from the people back home. If we had had just 10,000 letters to match the organized campaign put on by the distilleries, we would have carried the day."

### Construction Controls Lifted

Church construction, feeling the pinch of government controls and a shortage of building materials, was 16% below the 1951 level during the first quarter of 1952, but the lifting of stringent controls has brought an increase for the second quarter. The Government has authorized the construction of 674 new churches and additions for the three-month period, having a total estimated cost of \$150,000,000.

### A Canal Through Israel?

The Jerusalem *Post* recently carried the news that the Weizmann plan for a canal constructed through the Negev, as an alternative to the Suez Canal, was gaining support in the British House of Commons. It was even suggested that the British Government take the initiative since the canal would enable Britain to maintain its position in the area. The cost, it was said, would not be excessive.

The routing of sea traffic through Israel certainly would bring much added prosperity to the new nation.

### **Divorces Analyzed**

According to Watchman-Examiner, a recent study of 12,000 divorce cases showed that in 6.4% of the cases both parties were Catholic; in 6.8% both parties were Protestant: in 15.2% one was a Protestant, the other Catholic; and in 71.6% cases there was no church affiliation.

Another report states that a survey of 2,000 students of both Protestant and Roman Catholic background showed that more than half would be willing to marry without regard to religious belief! Ministers ought to warn youth that if a marriage is going to last it should have a religious basis—and both parties should be of the same faith.

### The Best-Loved Hymns

A survey made recently throughout Southern Baptist churches revealed that "Amazing Grace" is the best-loved hymn in the Southland. The ten preferred hymns in their order of preference are as follows: Amazing Grace, What a Friend We Have in Jesus, The Old Rugged Cross, Just As I Am, All' Hail the Power, At the Cross, Blessed Assurance, Sweet Hour of Prayer, When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, and There Is a Fountain Filled With Blood.

In the Eastern States the favorite seems to be "The Old Rugged Cross." Jack Wyrtzen for three Saturday nights asked his vast radio and television audiences to write and name their favorite hymns, and the five most widely chosen are: The Old Rugged Cross, What a Friend We Have in Jesus, In the Garden, It Is No Secret, and The Love of God.

# SELLING OUT -- for God

A Challenging
Address by
J. PAUL BRUTON,
Missionary to
Togo-Dahomey
(West Africa)



I USED TO WONDER what kind of spirit it was that caused men and women to leave their homes and go as missionaries into foreign climates that breed disease and death. I used to wonder what could move someone like our Sister Lulu Bell Hough to endure years in a concentration camp in China and then plead to be sent back again to take the message. Or what would cause Betty Frink to go to Nigeria and lay down her life with blackwater fever. Or what would constrain David Wakefield to go with me to Bassari when the French doctor just a few minutes before had warned against his making the trip.

What kind of spirit is this that caused a young man like Oren Munger to lay aside a great musical career and go to Nicaragua with the message of Life? His friends told him he was throwing his life away by going to Central America-and it looked as though they were right, for he lived there only two years. I saw a picture of his young wife standing grief stricken at the grave. Some would say he threw his life away, but actually he saved his life; for Jesus said, "Whosoever shall lose his life for My sake shall find it." Munger sold out for God. He laid aside his ambition to obey the call of God, and I am told that under his short ministry in Nicaragua a revival was started that resulted eventually in more than five hundred people receiving the Baptism of the Holy

I repeat, what kind of spirit is this? It is the spirit of Christ, who said: "The kingdom of heaven is like unto treasure hid in a field; the which when a man hath found, he hideth, and for joy there-of goeth and selleth all that he hath, and buyeth that field." Matthew 13:44. The Son of God saw unsaved men and women as a treasure hid in a field, and He sold everything in order to buy them. He even gave His life to make us His.

An address given March 9, 1952, at Central Assembly in Springfield, Missouri, stenographically reported.

And now He has put that same spirit in His missionaries making them willing to give up all that they have in order that precious souls in heathen darkness might be bought up for God.

Men have made great physical sacrifices for other great causes besides the gospel. It was my privilege during World War II to be pastor of a church in Long Beach, California. One of the great Naval hospitals is located there, and I saw the wounded brought in. Some came in with a leg missing, or with both legs missing. Some came back from the islands of the Pacific with faces disfigured from exploding mines and shells. I saw young wives and children as they ran with streaming eyes and flying hair to meet that husband or father who had just come back from the battlefront. I had to turn away with blurred eyes as a young man with a stump of what used to be an arm was vainly trying to encircle his wife and children with it.

One of the most pitiful sights I saw was a blinded sailor who was caressing the features of his wife whom he no longer could see. He then reached down and touched the curly head of his child whom he never had seen, and felt her features. These young men sold out physically because they loved their country and their families, and because they were determined to protect their homes. How much more should we who know Christ be willing to sell out for the love of lost souls, and for the sake of the heavenly home that God has prepared for His people!

I stood on the quay in Takoradi and watched as one of the best friends I ever had came stumbling down the gangplank. I accompanied him and his family to their home, then went with him the day he entered the hospital in Africa. I sat there by his bedside and said, "Raymond, don't you think you ought to go back home to America and regain your health?"

Raymond Sanders looked at me and said. "This is home." He had forsaken

father and mother, sisters and brothers, houses and lands, for Christ's sake. He was willing to sell out physically, even to the laying down of his life, for the gospel's sake.

We should be willing to sell out physically for Jesus' sake, and we should be willing to sell out financially as well. Our treasures will be worthless when Jesus comes, if we hoard them. My heart has been stirred these past seven or eight months more than ever in my life as I have seen God's people give thousands of dollars for Foreign Missions. One woman came down the aisle and laid on the altar a beautiful diamond ring. She said, "The sentiment of that ring means nothing compared to the souls of men that are crying for the words of Life."

I'll never forget a young man who laid on the altar the pink ownership certificate of an automobile and said, "I want to give it that men might hear the gospel."

One woman in San Bernardino, California, sold her house and gave the proceeds to send the gospel to the ends of the earth. I have come out of these missionary services night after night feeling that I had been walking on holy ground. I didn't feel that I was even worthy to be called a missionary, or that I had ever made any sacrifice, when I saw God's people across the length and breadth of this land giving their money for missions.

Another great illustration of financial sacrifice is our good Brother Ralph M. Devin who went to Indonesia. He had a business worth a quarter of a million dollars in the Northwest. God spoke to him. He left his business in the hands of others and went out to stand in the steaming jungles, and finally to give his life for his testimony. His son-in-law, John Tinsman, told me that when Brother Devin died they sent a cablegram to Sister Devin saying: "Catch the first boat home. We are getting ready to come out and take your place." Sister Devin replied: "Come home? You can

come out if you want to, but I am not coming home, for God has called me to preach to these people just as He called my husband." She is still continuing the ministry that he began when he made that financial sacrifice for the kingdom of God.

Finally, there is something that should apply to each one of us. We should be willing to sell out with our time, particularly time for prayer. Never let missionary prayers become commonplace, for you little realize the power they have on the mission field, where the missionary is battling the powers of darkness. Sometimes the missionary is facing death and certain destruction and it is only because some faithful child of God somewhere has fallen on his knees that God brings the missionary safely through.

For instance, eight months ago I received word that it was time for us to leave Africa, and I traveled seven hundred miles to the coast. There in the port city of Accra is a beautiful airport that was constructed by the United

States government during World War II for ferrying aircraft into North Africa and on to the European theater of conflict. The Pan-American Airways and other lines now fly into this place regularly en route to Leopoldville in the Congo and to Johannesburg, South Africa. I went to the Pan-American Airways desk and said, "I am the man who called you from Komasi. I want three and a half tickets on the plane that leaves tomorrow."

He replied, "I'm sorry, Mr. Bruton, but we only have two tickets on that plane. If you will wait until tomorrow there is a chance that we can give you three and a half tickets." (After I got home Brother Weidman wrote me and said that there were nine cancellations the next day, and, if we had waited, certainly we would have boarded that plane.)

I stood there wondering what to do. In my heart I was complaining a bit, saying, "Now we have almost broken our necks to get down here to catch this plane, Lord, and why should we be unable to get tickets?"

Then I raised my eyes in the other direction and saw a sign pointing to the Air France desk. I walked over. The attendant sold me three and a half tickets on Air France. We left the same day. Two and a half days and ten thousand miles later, we came across from Shannon, Ireland, to Boston and New York. The first thing I did was to telephone my son, whom we had not seen for two years. When he answered, his voice went all to pieces. He was unable to talk for a while! Finally, when he regained the power of speech, he said, "Dad, thank God you are safe!"

"What are you talking about?" I asked.

"That plane that you cabled us you were taking—the Pan-American—crashed in Liberia and all forty people on board were burned to a crisp."

Before I had been in the States a week, I was preaching in the camp meeting in Costa Mesa, California. As I was finishing my message, in which I had told about the plane, a woman came running down the aisle. She said, "Don't tell us the day! Don't tell us the hour! It was such-and-such a Thursday, such-and-such an hour!" I looked around and said to my wife, "It checks out perfectly, except that there is a difference in the hour." But then we considered the

eight hours difference in time between Africa and California and discovered it was exactly the same hour.

She said, "I was on my way to the Assembly of God church, to attend the Women's Missionary Council meeting. I was driving my car along the 101 highway. God spoke to me and said, 'Pray for the Bruton family. They are in mortal danger.' I stopped my car, got out beside that six-lane highway with the cars whizzing by in both directions, and prayed until I knew God had delivered the Brutons from whatever danger they were facing."

A good missionary friend of mine was sitting out on his front porch in Nigeria one night rocking their little baby. He got up, walked into the house in the darkness, and started to put the child down on the bed. Something stopped him as though he had heard an audible voice. He backed up, stood there in the darkness for a moment, and called to his wife, "Velma, bring the lantern quickly!"

While his wife was coming from the front porch with a kerosene lantern, several thousand miles away in Fresno, California, a woman was calling the mother of this missionary on the telephone. She asked, "What is the matter with Ralph and Velma?"

The mother said, "There is nothing the matter that I know anything about."

This woman said, "I know there is something the matter, because I have been under a terrible burden of prayer and it is about to kill me right now."

While this conversation was going on in America, Sister Cobb, in Africa, walked into the room with the lantern, and there lying in the middle of the bed was a black cobra, one of the deadliest snakes in the world! One bite and you would be dead in ten or twelve minutes—and there is no known antidote for the poison. This reptile can also shoot its poison through the air up to ten or twelve feet, and when it hits your eyes it causes instant blindness.

They were able to kill this snake, and the lives of this missionary and their child were spared, because nine thousand miles away a woman heard the voice of God and fell on her face to pray. She was willing to sacrifice her rest at night to intercede until God answered prayer.

There may be missionaries laboring on the field whose work may seem more

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# Watch the Near East!

Prophecy is rapidly being fulfilled as early kingdoms stir themselves again.

THE WORLD'S history began in the Near East. The reference to Assyria and Euphrates in Genesis 2:14 identifies the location of the Garden of Eden as being in the Mesopotamian valley. Noah's ark rested on Mt. Arrarat in Armenia and the tower of Babel was erected on the plans of Shinar. Nimrod began his empire building at Babylon and from thence he went into Assyria and built Nineveh. (These cities became the Early Babylonian Empire, the first of the series referred to in Revelation 17:10). Abraham's first home was in the Ur of the Chaldees. Thus the Near East was the starting point of the great cycle of human his-

Profane history too has had this area as its great staging ground. Here the armies of Nabopolasser fulfilled Nahum's prophecy in the destruction of Nineveh and the host of Darius the Mede and Cyrus the Persian overthrew the empire of the Babylonians, Nabonidus and Belshazzar. And here came Alexander the Great thundering across the Mesopotamian plains as the he-goat of Daniel 8 to trample in fury the ponderous armies of the Medo-Persians. The four divisions of the Grecian Empire lay along this valley and its outer edges. This area constitutes the bridge between three continents-Europe, Asia, and Africa—and its countries have been buffer states and bottlenecks for ages. The kings of the South (Egypt) have attacked and suffered attack through Palestine and its border countries.

Prophecy tells us that the spotlight of world events will once more be turned on the Near East. Great Babylon is to be rebuilt on the plains of Shinar (Zech. 5:11; Rev. 18), the Antichrist is to arise from the northern division of the old Grecian Empire (Turkey and Assyria), the mighty battle of Armageddon is to be fought on the plains of Galilee, and Jesus is to plant His feet on the Mount of Olives, which is before Jerusalem on the east.

And now the Near East is in a state of turmoil. Israel has siezed the opportunity afforded by Britain's relinquishing of the mandate, to attain her absolute independence. Iran has chased the British lion out of her country, even at

the cost of national bankruptcy. Egypt struggles violently to expel the British from the Suez and the Sudan. Libya has come into national existence and Tunisia rebels against France. The whole area is in great unrest, offering invitation and opportunity to the Russian hordes to sweep into the vacuum and bring upon their heads the fulfillment of Ezekiel 38 and 39. The winds are now striving upon the great sea (Mediterranean). Daniel 7:2. And soon the beast will rise up out of the sea. Rev. 13:1. The child of God waits with his prophetic watch in his hands counting the mere minutes until the Master comes. 1 Thess. 4:

### A New Japanese Bible

It is reported that a new translation of the Scriptures for the Japanese people is greatly needed. The present Bible was written in the classical Japanese language that was popular three generations ago, but that language was archaic and now it is almost obsolete.

"While books, magazines, and newspapers now are all written in a simplified language, the Japanese Bible marches stiffly on in its old, classical language, twice as difficult to understand as the King James version is for America's youngsters," says Kenneth Joseph. "It is good news, therefore, that the Japan Bible Society plans to have the entire Bible newly translated within three years. A new translation of the Gospel of John in very simple Japanese has just been published by the Evangelical Publishing House."

# Establishing New Churches

Ethel M. McClendon, Cuba

THREE MONTHS have passed since my return to Cuba and so much has happened in the three months that it has seemed more like three years. During the period we have opened eight outstations and five new Sunday Schools.

Since the evangelistic campaign at Victoria de las Tunas a few months ago the people throughout this section have been asking for services. While I was on my furlough my co-worker, Hilda Reffke, had to tell the people, "When Miss McClendon gets back. . ." With the building program of the main church and the works already started she was unable to branch out further. I am back now and we are going full-speed ahead.

When I left Cuba last May our Victoria de las Tunas services were held in a tent—a tent full of holes. Today we have a fine church building with a seating capacity of 500. Of course it is not all paid for yet nor all finished either, but we are thankful that we have the auditorium space. Pray with us that we will be able to clear the debt and to build Sunday School rooms. We must still have classes in our home. Every class is crowded. There must be more space for our Sunday School pupils.

We are conducting twenty-three Sunday Schools each week in this section, with attendance in all of them reaching an average of more than 1,000. Besides the regular services in Victoria de las Tunas we also are conducting *preaching* services at nine outstations. You will be interested in knowing that land has been given at five of the stations for chapels. The people are providing the labor and the materials for building.

Nightly there are services at from two to four places. We have no free nights. The

people are begging for us to bring them the gospel and we cannot refuse. It means traveling for miles over dusty roads through sugar cane and banana fields but it is worth it. Hearts are hungry. We would appreciate your remembering us in prayer that the Lord will give us the necessary strength to carry on for Him.

One of the places now being reached formerly was a spiritualistic center. Since we have gone in, the spiritualists have not been meeting. A number of them have been won to Christ. Some have received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit. A chapel is under construction at that particular station.

At another point the town mayor has ordered the spiritualistic center torn down. The lumber is going into a chapel.

We meet in such places as store buildings, yards and stadiums. It has not made much difference how or where we have met. The great consideration has been that the gospel go forth. But of course as the works are established there must be permanent meeting places for the people,

It has been amazing to see how the yearold Christians have taken hold of the outstation work. They testify, lead in the song services and sometimes even give out the Word.

We have a daily fifteen-minute radio broadcast. It is heard by hundreds. For some of the converts who cannot attend our meetings anywhere it is the only spiritual food. God is blessing in the broadcasts.

No doubt you have been reading in your newspapers about the change-over in the government here. Although there has been a forty-five-day ban on public gatherings the restrictions have not been applied to us.

# Bible Student Recovers After Prayer

IN JANUARY one of the students of the Southern Asia Bible Institute, located in Bangalore, became ill. As the days slipped by his temperature mounted and pleurisy and other complications developed. The entire school was praying, but God had not undertaken.

At the request of the student a physician was called. We were advised to move the sick young man from the dormitory to our home. Hospitals here are crowded and patients do not always receive the best of care.

One night the young man's temperature dropped from 106 to 97 in a matter of a few hours. We had a night nurse with him. We were to be called if there was any change in the patient's condition. At the time that we were awakened heart stimulants were being administered. It seemed that the student could not hold out much longer.

Brother Cawston began praying immediately. As he prayed he was given the assurance that "faith would turn the night into day." He turned to me and said, "I have the assurance that the student is going to recover."

There was no outward change, but we returned to bed and to sleep.

Two days later the student's temperature had dropped as low as 95, but knowing that the Great Physician had the case we felt little alarm.

As I write now the lad is at his parent's home in North India regaining his strength. His improvement has been gradual. He was confined to his bed for five weeks.

The father of the student is one of our pastors in North India. The son was sent to us to be trained for the ministry to take his father's place

We ask that you pray for the complete recovery of the student, that he may be able to return to school at the beginning of the school year in July.

It is a financial struggle for the young people of India to attend Bible School. As you pray for the recovery of the one student please remember also the other young people looking forward to Bible School, that their needs will be met. Should you desire to invest in the training of one of our Southern Asia Bible Institute students it would be a good investment and would be appreciated. Expenses for each student run close to \$15 a month.

The first year of the Southern Asia Bible Institute was a profitable one indeed. We are expecting an enrollment of thirty-five for the coming term. During their vacation period a number of the young men and women have engaged in gospel work.

### LAURA KRITZ WITH CHRIST

A MESSAGE was received by the Foreign Missions Department on April 28 advising that Laura Katheryn Kritz, missionary for many years to Latin American fields, had gone to be with the Lord.

Sister Kritz had been in failing health for a number of months. She suffered from a cancerous growth. In June, 1951 her condition was such that it was necessary that she give up her work at the Alba Bible Institute at Monterrey, N. L., Mexico, where she had taught for three years, to return home. Though there was much prayer for her, she did not receive the healing touch needed from the Great Physician. Medical science could do nothing for her. She was called away on Sunday, April 27, at the home of a sister, Mrs. Etta Fosha, at Jerseyville, Illinois. Funeral services were conducted on April 29 and burial was in Illinois.

Laura Katheryn Kritz was born at Batchtown, Illinois on July 20, 1896. She attended the Illinois State Normal University. After teaching in the public schools in Illinois for nine years she took up missionary work among Spanish-speaking people in Texas, teaching from 1923 to 1924 in a church day school in San Antonio. She entered Central Bible Institute in Springfield then for Bible training and upon graduation became a member of the faculty of the Latin American Bible Institute in San Antonio, remaining with the Institute for a number of years. From 1944 to 1947 she served as a missionary to Costa Rica.

On October 19, 1939 Sister Kritz received ordination to the ministry from the Latin American District. Later her papers were transferred to her home district. She received missionary appointment on May 17, 1939.

To say that Sister Kritz was a faithful missionary would be an underestimation. It often was reported that she went beyond requirements even to her own hurt. She will be missed.



# JOSIAH FINDS THE LAW Lesson for June 1

2 Kings 22:11-20

Since Josiah began his reign at the age of eight, it seems a miracle that he was so spiritually minded, even from his early childhood, and preserved from the corruption that might easily plague a royal court. This is especially true when we learn that his father, who reigned before him, "served the idols that his father served, and worshipped them" (ch. 21:21). In contrast with his father, Josiah "walked in all the way of David his father, and turned not aside to the right hand or to the left" (ch. 22:2).

Lest some be confused in the use of the term "father" in the above paragraph, we explain that in chapter 21:21 the father of Josiah, Amon, served the idols that his father, Manasseh, served. In chapter 22:2, David is called his father but in reality he was his forefather, the first of the divinely approved kings in Israel.

### 1. The Revelation of the Law

In connection with the repairing of the house of God, the high priest Hilkiah found "the book of the law in the house of the Lord" (v. 8). What we are interested in is the fact that the book was "the law of the Lord." It might be well to mention, however, that there are those who believe the copy found was a copy written in Moses' own handwriting, a copy made when Moses renewed the covenant of the Lord with Israel not long before his death-"And it came to pass, when Moses had made an end of writing the words of this law in a book, until they were finished, that Moses commanded, . . . Take this book of the law, and put it in the side of the ark of the covenant of the Lord your God, that it may be there for a witness against thee" Deut. 32:24-26. In Deuteronomy 27 to 32 Moses gave serious warnings to Israel, telling them of the sufferings which should be theirs for disobedience. These sufferings the Jews have endured to the full.

In chapter 33, inspired by the Spirit of God, he prophesied the blessings which should eventually be their portion, closing his record of blessing with words like this, "The eternal God is thy refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms: and He shall thrust out the enemy from before thee: and shall say, Destroy them. . . . Happy art thou, O Israel: who is like unto thee, O people saved by the Lord?" (ch. 33:27, 29). We do not as yet see the entire fulfillment of this prediction, but may we not be seeing a beginning in the renewal of Jewish national life in the new state of Israel? If so, then "the coming of the Lord draweth nigh."

### 2. The Prophecy Concerning Judah

Having found the copy of the law, Josiah humbled himself and sent messengers to "Huldah the prophetess . . . and they communed with her" (v. 14). Attention has been called to the fact that at that time Jeremiah was a prophet in the land. Why then did the king send to the prophetess? Some modern teachers would denounce such action. We wish to face the sacred Word with reverence. We acknowledge that God has put headship in the man. (1 Cor. 11:3), and the woman should recognize this as God's order and refrain from usurping authority or seeking dominion over the man (1 Tim. 2:12). But we cannot feel that women should be deprived of spiritual ministry. When women begin to devise or promote doctrines contrary to those taught by the church, it is then that they are out of divine order. It is this form of teaching that is forbidden them. Also the term "didaskalos" (teacher) used here carried with it not only the idea of instruction, but rulership and authority. We see no reason why women should be denied the blessing of spreading the established doctrines of the church in the power of the Spirit of God. God's use of Huldah is one of several Bible instances where godly women stand forth with special distinction.

Huldah brought no new doctrine. She reverenced the law that had been found. She was led by the Lord to point out to Judah that the curses spoken of in the law would be visited on the people. We understand that when Israel spoke of "the law," they meant all of the writings of Moses, and not only the ten commandments. See how close Huldah adhered to the Scriptures—"Thus saith the Lord God of Israel, . . . Thou hast humbled thyself . . . when thou heard-

est what I spake against this place and against the inhabitants thereof, that they should become a desolation." She made no claim to something new. Her message was a confirmation of that which God had spoken long before, through His servant Moses.

### 3. The Prophecy Concerning Josiah

As Huldah's prophecy concerning Judah was in keeping with "that which is written," so was her prophecy concerning Josiah. Moses had said, "Set your hearts unto all the words which I testify among you this day... for it is not a vain thing for you; because it is your life: and through this thing ye shall prolong your days in the land, whither ye go over Jordan to possess it" (Deut. 32:46, 47).

God had promised blessing and security for obedience to His law. Josiah showed himself eager to fulfill such obedience. The prophetess recognized this and said, "Because thine heart was tender, and thou hast humbled thyself before the Lord . . . I also have heard thee." Then the Lord promised that, although the curses pronounced should fall on disobedient Judah, it would not take place in his day. He would be gathered to his fathers in peace.

Are not the nations of today in much the same state as was Judah? Is the law of God not spurned and rejected by the many? No nation can escape judgment that turns itself from God. A revival of "pure and undefiled religion before God the Father" would do more for this world than armies and bullets. When people repent, God works for them. When they do not, His restraint is lifted and the god of this world has free rein with his means of destruction. May we labor and pray that in wrath God will remember mercy.

For comment on King Josiah's zeal for the Lord, study chapter 23. The law was read, idolatry removed, the workers with familiar spirits were put away. God and His Word were given pre-eminence—"And like unto him was there no king before him, that turned to the Lord with all his heart, and with all his soul, and with all his might, according to all the law of Moses" (ch. 33:25).





spectacular than yours, but there is no greater ministry under heaven than the ministry of prayer, the ministry of interceding for lost souls, and crying out to God to preserve His missionaries and anoint them with the Holy Ghost. It may require a great sacrifice of your physical strength to pray until you know that you have prayed through for whatever burden God has placed upon your heart, but eternity will reveal the importance of this ministry. There are no curtains, iron or bamboo, that can resist the power of prayer and prevent God from working.

I was deeply impressed recently with the story of a missionary who made his way across the burning sands of Northwest India. He camped by an oasis for the night. He sent his boys around to the great number of tents and temporary shelters that can be found around an oasis. They left the message, "My master want to speak to you tonight."

This missionary said that when his meal was finished and the bright tropical moon had arisen, he stepped out of his tent to see a multitude of brown-skinned people sitting cross-legged upon the ground. Their long, white robes were draped about them or thrown aside. He began to tell them the old story of Christ, of His sweat in Gethsemane, of His suffering on Golgotha, and of His sacrificial atonement at Calvary. They listened open-mouthed. The message fell upon receptive ears.

Afterwards a tall, slender, white-robed old man with a flowing beard came to the missionary and gravely said, "Missionary, you are a young man. Where did you learn such words as you have spoken to us tonight?"

The missionary answered, "I found this in a book."

He asked, "Missionary, you spoke to us in our own language. Do you have that book in our language?"

Without fear or hesitancy he pointed a long, bony finger at him and said, "Get me that book."

The missionary said he felt impelled by an inner force. He turned, ran into the tent, grabbed up a couple of Bibles in this language, came back out, and handed one to the old man and one to another near by.

The old man said to him, "How long have you known what is in this book?"

"I have known this for many years."

"Did your father know what was in this book?"

"Yes."

"Did his father?"

"Yes, he knew about it."

"Have your people known this for a very long time?"

"Yes, for many hundreds of years this book has been in our land."


The old man looked at the missionary and said, "My father died and he didn't know anything about this. My mother died and she didn't know anything about this. So many of my friends have died and they didn't know anything about this. Yet you say you have had this for hundreds of years. Why haven't you brought it to us sooner?"

That is an unanswerable question, my friends. We can do nothing about past failures; we cannot reach those who have already died, but we can take the gospel to those that yet remain. We will have to answer to God if we don't. I bring you the cry of millions of lost men and women, boys and girls. I challenge you, in the name of the Son of God who loves all men everywhere, to close your ears for a moment to the sounds around you and ask God to let you hear the cries of the heathen that go down into darkness without ever having a chance to hear the name of Jesus. God will let you see the outstretched hands, hear the voices pleading for the message—the only message that can bring into the hearts of men what God intended them to have.

When a man finds this treasure, the Master said, he goes and sells all that he has, and buys it. I don't know what God is going to ask you to sell. It may mean you will be

separated from people you love. It may mean you will have to sacrifice some cherished ambition. It may mean that instead of taking an intended trip, you will give the money for missions so that some soul in a foreign land may take a trip to the altar of Jesus Christ and be saved by His blood. Open your heart and say, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"



### IT'S STREET MEETING TIME!

A group of enthusiastic, consecrated young people stood on the street corner in a Nebras-ka town, singing and witnessing, praying in their hearts that someone would be saved because of their efforts. It was their desire to build a work for God in this town, so an evangelist had been secured and a building rented for services.

Down the street came several young people from the state Teacher's college. Just as they passed by, announcements were being made concerning the time and place of the revival services being held. Among the students was a young woman who had previously visited every church in the town, and been disappointed because they were "dead and unfriendly." She made a mental note of the announcement and determined to visit the new church. A short time later she saw a poster in a store window announcing that the revival was still in progress. This clinched it. Instead of going to a movie as was her

usual custom on Sunday nights, she went to the little church.

After several months' regular attendance she was saved and eventually entered the ministry. "If they hadn't had street services, I never would have become interested," she declares. And an Assembly was established in the town.

This is only one instance where street services in a new town attracted a hungry heart and helped build the work of God. The story of Billy Sunday's conversion also begins with his interest in a street service.

In a northern Iowa town, Pentecostal young people began holding short street meetings in a neighboring community on Saturday nights. The effort was backed by much prayer, and interest grew until permission was obtained to conduct evangelistic services nightly for several weeks. Policemen were assigned to the area each night to help with the crowds. Souls were saved, both on the street and in cottage prayer meetings which were begun about the same time. So another church was built through street services.

Is your church placing street services on its calendar of summer activities? Have you thought of the possibilities in the town next to you?

It's street meeting time again, and a wellorganized corps of workers from your church, backed by the prayerful interest of the whole church, can do something for God this summer in a home missionary effort.

It would be good if every one of our Assemblies would pray, plan, and definitely prepare to invade some unreached community with the gospel through street services this year. This would be sure to result in a narvest of souls, and new Assemblies of God churches would be formed. It can be done! Let's do it for God's glory!

Where one goes hereafter depends largely upon what one goes after here.



This pair of shoes

is but one of many which walked dusty roads, stood behind pulpits, on street corners, and at gravesides. They belonged to a minister whose habit it was to leave his shoes at night near his bedside so he could quickly slip them on to answer a midnight call. He is aged now, and walks only to the mail-

box, and around the house. The feet which carried him on errands of mercy and comfort, and on soul-winning missions, are tired now —so very tired.

Yet these shoes speak to us. They speak of the action which must clothe faith. As James the apostle puts it, "If a brother or a sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?"

On the Sunday before Memorial Day, our churches will be receiving an offering to assist our aged ministers and missionaries. Let our faith be shod with generosity!
