Social Security for Ministers

The new Social Security law makes it possible for clergymen to participate in Social Security if they as individuals wish to do so. Foreign missionaries are eligible on the same basis as ministers residing in the U. S.

Bad "Comics" Banned

Newsstand operators in Houston, Texas, were given until September 25 to get rid of all crime, horror and sex "comics." The city council passed an ordinance which bans all publications which "prominently feature" illustrations of acts of violence. Penalties for violation include fines up to \$200 for each day an objectionable book is on display after the deadline date.

Plan National Conference on Moral, Spiritual Recovery

Protestant, Roman Catholic, and Jewish clergy and lay leaders will be invited to a National Conference on Moral and Spiritual Recovery at Washington, D. C., November 8—10. The meeting will be sponsored by the Foundation for Religious Action, formed last November by President Eisenhower's pastor, Dr. Edward L. R. Elson, of the National Presbyterian church.

The New Testament in Stamps

The story of the New Testament, told pictorially in stamps, has been presented to the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D. C. It is part of the collection of a Brooklyn insurance broker, Philip H. Platzker, who completed over nineteen volumes of the Holy Bible on Stamps in thirteen years. The collection is valued at \$50,000.

Platzker matches Bible verses with appropriate pictures on stamps. Increasing numbers of people have been inspired to reread the Bible because of his project.

Locusts Threaten Middle East

The locust menace in the Middle East assumed a serious scale this year. A conference was held in Cairo a few weeks ago, attended by representatives of all the Arab countries, Persia, Turkey, India, Pakistan, and other lands to deal with the problem. An Arab League expert reported that the desert locust was breeding in alarming numbers in Saudi Arabia, Iraq, and Jordan. The Egyptian Ministry of Agriculture said swarms of locusts were plaguing Upper Egypt, particularly in the Assiut and Guirga areas, reminding us of the plague in the days of the Jewish exodus.

Heretical Footnote Deleted

The American Bible Society made the mistake of publishing an edition of the Gospel of Matthew in the Revised Standard Version which contained the following footnote:

"Other ancient authorities read Joseph, to whom was betrothed the virgin Mary, was the father of Jesus who is called Christ."

The Bible Society received a volume of protest. As a result, all of the Gospels containing this footnote have been recalled from all parts of the world and have been converted into pulp for the making of paper for the printing of the Scriptures without this unfortunate footnote to Matthew 1:16.

An official of the Bible Society writes: "No future issue of the Gospel of Matthew in this version printed by the American Bible Society will bear this footnote, and I am informed that the publishers of the Revised Standard Version have also withdrawn this footnote and it will no longer appear in their Bibles and New Testaments."

Protestant Nuns in Sweden?

Disclosure of a movement aimed at establishing a Protestant order of nuns in Sweden has aroused leaders of the Swedish State Lutheran Church and stirred widespread comment among the general public. Although there are seven Roman Catholic convents in Sweden, there has not been a Protestant convent or cloistered sisterhood for more than three hundred years.

Fifty Priests Converted

"...and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith" (Acts 6:7). History repeated itself when fifty Roman Catholic priests in Germany left the Church of their ordination last year. At a Protestant convention in Bensheim all fifty ex-priests were enthusiastically received as they expressed their desire to preach salvation through the merits of Christ alone.

Persecution in Latvia

From Latvia come stories of great trials of the Christians there. Refugees from the area tell of indescribable horrors inflicted upon believers. "Christ has died—long live Judas Iscariot," is one of the rallying cries of the Communists in that terrorized land, according to Latvin Vards, a newspaper printed in Sweden.

Jews in Algiers to Emigrate

More than 1,500 Jews living in seven villages in Algiers have applied for entrance into Israel. A physician from Israel's Ministry of Health has gone to conduct the required medical examinations. Prospective emigrants are under 45 years of age.

Religion in Israel

The people of Israel are very religious, compared to forty years ago. For instance, when the city of Tel Aviv was laid out, no provision was made for a synagogue site, presumably because so few of the early settlers were interested in religion. Today there are 400 synagogues in Tel Aviv alone and 2,000 in Israel, of all types.

Pig-Raising Banned in Israel

Since July 10, it has been illegal to raise pigs in Israel without a special permit. The government will issue permits only in areas such as Nazareth, where many of the inhabitants are not Jews. The ruling is a victory for Orthodox Jews who wish to impose the Mosaic Law throughout the State of Israel.

The Jordan Valley Plan

The quarterly magazine "Land Reborn" gives a detailed report on progress in Israel. Eric C. Johnston, President Eisenhower's special ambassador to the Near East, tells of a plan which includes handling the riparian rights in the Jordan valley so as to decrease tension among the four nations involved—Lebanon, Syria, Israel, and Jordan.

The plan provides for storage dams in Lebanon and Jordan which would supply electric power and water for irrigation purposes in Israel, Jordan, and Syria. The cost of the project would be paid with United Nations funds (mostly Ameri-

can)

The object of the plan is to solve the Arab refugee problem and give to several hundred thousand people some land of their own, homes, a means of livelihood and, most of all, a "stake and status"

in society.

None of the four lands involved has agreed to the plan, as yet. Each government thinks it is entitled to a greater volume of water than its share would be; but Mr. Johnston is optimistic, and it is possible that such a plan may be one means by which God will fulfill His ancient promise, "Israel shall blossom and bud, and fill the face of the world with fruit" (Isaiah 27:6).



"Like a Mighty Army ... "

A FEW SUNDAYS AGO I TALKED WITH a young soldier who had been assigned to Supply School at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. He was to be stationed at the fort for eight weeks of intensive study to learn how to keep a company of soldiers supplied with food, clothing, ammunition, and other personal needs and materials for warfare. This soldier was training to be a steward for the United States Government—to dispatch materials according to the need of the soldiers.

In Luke 16:2 we read of another steward—"There was a certain rich man, who had a steward, and he called him, and said unto him, . . . Give account of thy stewardship."

Christ has made every Christian a steward to dispatch His properties for the advancement and propagation of His gospel. Nearly every man and woman today has been given material things as well as spiritual and mental gifts. God holds us responsible for the way we spend our lives—our time and energy. In the same manner He holds us accountable for what we do with our physical properties—our money and tangible assets.

The Assemblies of God in the U. S. A. have a Christian army, over 6,900 churches strong. God says to every member in every church, "Give account of thy stewardship." It does not matter how large or how small is the warehouse of God's supplies that a man controls. What is

important is whether or not the supplies are being dispatched.

According to the latest statistics a little more than thirty-five per cent of Assemblies of God churches support world missions regularly. I have noted that from the pioneer churches opened during 1953, forty-nine per cent now support home and foreign missions. It would appear that there are two ways of getting immediate supplies to perpetuate the spreading of the Pentecostal testimony through the Assemblies of God—by building more new churches that will give to home and foreign missions, and by awakening the stewards in assemblies already established.

Is it possible that Christian stewards can limit the work of God? Romans 10:14 and 15 reads, "How shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?"

Once a church is opened or a missionary sent to the field, Christian stewards must continue to support the work, week after week, sometimes year after year.

The soldier from Fort Leonard Wood was disappointed because his duties were to be sending supplies to his company. He wanted to go to a foreign land and, perhaps, fight for his country. For every one of our 738 foreign missionaries we have about 541 Assemblies of God church members—stewards who are faithfully providing material supplies for the spreading of the salvation message. The apostle Paul asked in First Corinthians what

soldier ever serves at his own expense. God only knows who should be commended for all the faithful support.

Tithes given to the church or offerings given to missions may seem insignificant. They are more important than gifts to any charitable work of man. They are sent to supply the world with the Pentecostal testimony.

These words from pastors in pioneer churches bear witness to the faithful ministry of Christian stewards today:

"The supplying of the finances, for both personal and church needs, was and is completely a work of faith. We have only God's promise to back us, but that promise is sufficient!" (Thank God for the stewards who have helped these workers.)

"From the very beginning this work has been altogether self-supporting. I have been completely supported and have been able to give my whole time to the ministry." (This young pioneer wrote that his congregation supported him financially from the first service conducted in the tent in that city.)

I do not believe that every person who prayed or gave of his material blessings to help these two pioneer workers received a special heavenly vision. It may have been that the faithful support was inspired by the scripture in 1 Corinthians 4:2, "Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

This year more pioneer workers than ever before have entered new fields. Mission fields around the world are rapidly closing, making us realize that what we are going to do on the foreign fields we must do quickly. The work of the Assemblies of God is constantly reaching out to more people. New stewards are being added to the ranks of God's faithful servants.

Do you pay your tithe into the storehouse of your church? Is your church among the thirty-five per cent who are giving regularly to home and foreign missions? The Lord will say to you, "Give account of thy stewardship."

Delays Are not Denials!

GOD ALWAYS ANSWERS PRAYER-IN His way, in His time, He does answer. "It came to pass in process of time, that the king of Egypt died: and the children of Israel sighed by reason of the bondage, and they cried, and their cry came up unto God by reason of the bondage. And God heard their groaning, and God remembered his covenant with Abraham, with Isaac, and with Jacob. And God looked upon the children of Israel, and God had respect unto them" (Ex. 2:23-25).

Life is not all mountain peaks of glory and blessing. Some of God's choicest saints have been permitted to pass through deep waters of trial and fiery furnaces of tribulation. Here in Exodus we see God's chosen people sighing and crying and groaning because of the bondage, oppression, and cruelty to which they were subjected. But God heard them, and He remembered His covenant!

God is still hearing the cries of His children, and He is still remembering His covenant—His promises are forever settled in heaven. "The righeous cry, and the Lord heareth, and delivereth them out of all their troubles" (Psa. 34:17).

Although God heard their cries and groans, and remembered His covenant, deliverance did not come to Israel immediately. But God set the process of deliverance in operation. The machinery of heaven was moving in the direction of complete deliverance!

God called Moses to be the channel through whom He would work, to answer the prayers of a heart-broken race. "I have surely seen the affliction of my people, ... and have heard their cry, ... know their sorrows, and I am come down to deliver them, ... and to bring them up out of that land unto a good land and a large, unto a land flowing with milk and honey" (Ex. 3:7, 8). What wonderful assurance!

Moses yielded to the call of God, and at length he gathered together all the elders of the children of Israel. And Aaron spoke the words which the Lord had spoken to Moses. "And the people BE-LIEVED: when they heard that the Lord had visited the children of Israel, and that he had looked upon their affliction, then they bowed their heads and wor-SHIPED" (Ex. 4:31). They followed the formula which even today must be followed in receiving answers from heaven! They BELIEVED and WORSHIPED! But deliverance was still delayed!

"Thus saith the Lord God of Israel, Let my people go." With boldness and confidence Moses and Aaron delivered this ultimatum to Pharaoh. No doubt they expected immediate co-operation. But the reaction of Pharaoh was just the opposite. Additional burdens and hardships were placed upon Israel. And yet, God was working! He had the whole situation under His control!

Then Israel turned against Moses. They were bitter, rebellious, resentful people who saw only utter defeat and tragedy. "May the Eternal look on what you have done," they said indignantly to Moses and Aaron, "and punish you! You have brought us into bad odour with Pharaoh and his officers, putting a weapon in their hands to kill us!" (Ex. 5:21, Moffatt). Their faith and victory had disappeared; but God continued to work! "His ways [are] past finding out" (Rom.

"And Moses . . . said, Lord, wherefore hast thou so evil entreated this people? why is it that thou hast sent me? For since I came to Pharaoh to speak in thy name, he hath done evil to this people; neither hast thou delivered thy people at all" (Ex. 5:22, 23). No longer was Moses filled with belief, boldness, and confidence; instead, he cried in despair and despondency, "Why? Why? Why? But God continued to move toward the promised deliverance! He is sovereign!

How true to life! Often today, after prayer, our hearts are filled with expectancy and faith; we feel that deliverance and victory MUST be just around the corner! But many times the answer is delayed: the situation seems to grow worse instead of better. Our Father would teach us lessons of patience and implicit trust which is not based upon circumstances or feelings but upon His written Word! God's delays are not denials! "Ye greatly rejoice, ... that the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 1:6, 7).

When Moses finished crying his woes to God, enumerating his troubles, and describing how black everything seemed, God spoke! "I am the Lord, ... " He said. "I have also heard the groaning of the children of Israel, . . . I have remembered my covenant. Wherefore say unto the children of Israel, I am the Lord, and I will bring you out from under

the burdens of the Egyptians, and I will rid you of their bondage, and I will redeem you.... I will take you to me for a people, and I will be to you a God.... I will bring you unto the land, ... I will give it you for an heritage." Seven powerful "I wills"! When God promises, "I will," HE WILL! Every one of these promises was completely fulfilled!

He did bring them out from under their burdens. He did rid them of their bondage. He did redeem them and take them to Himself for a people. He was their God. He did bring them to the . promised land and give it to them for a

In the early days of America there was a Judge who lived near the Indians. His widowed daughter lived with him, and her little son was the joy of the family. As leader of his few white friends, the Judge was very eager to maintain good relations with the Indians; for when provoked they often set fire to the settler's houses and murdered their helpless victims.

The Judge had succeeded in gaining the confidence of some of the tribes, but there was one old, influential Chief who

still remained skeptical.

At last the Judge sent him a message. In response, the Chief called at the Judge's house, and was received courteously. The Chief listened to the white man's plea for friendship and peace; then he answered: "You ask much, and you promise much. What pledge can you give? White man's word is empty breath to the Indian. If you will trust the Indian, the Indian will trust you. Let your grandson go with me to the camp. After three days I will bring him back with my answer."

A sword could not have sent a sharper pain through the mother's heart as she listened to this conversation. She clasped the boy in her arms, and was about to rush from the room with him when the Judge called her to stay. "The boy is as dear to me as he is to you," he told her with quivering lips. "But he must go. God will watch over him."

With intense agony, the mother prepared the little lad for the journey; then she kissed him good-by and buried her face in her hands. Without a word, the Chief led the bewildered child away to

his camp.

The days and nights passed. They seemed like years to the mother. At night she tossed sleeplessly; in the day she watched anxiously. The morning of the third day came, but the Chief had not returned. Finally, the sun set behind the forest. The distressed mother feared that harm had befallen her child.

The troubled Judge paced from room to room.

Finally, in the waning twilight, the Chief came in sight—he was leading the little lad back home. The boy was dressed like a chief—eagle feathers in his hair; beaver skin about his shoulders; moccasins on his feet. Proud and happy in this strange dress, the little fellow marched toward the house. "Could be not watch with Me one hour?" These words were spoken by the Master to Peter, and through Peter to the rest of the apostles who were in the Garden. They were words of surprise, of utter amazement that His followers had failed Him in this crucial hour. "WHAT, can it really be? Even after my admonition to watch and pray, I find you sleeping? Could ye not watch with me for one brief hour?"

This was a time of desperate need. The Master was facing one of His greatest conflicts—dark Gethsemane. And as the powers of darkness hurled their forces upon His tired and weary body, beads of perspiration stood upon His brow—perspiration, not of water, but of blood. He sweat "as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground."

Jesus' entire life had been given to standing by and praying for those in sorrow, but now at the time of His own dire need there was not one to comfort and help. 

This Is YOUR Home!

One of the tracedies of American society is the broken home. Perhaps you have seen a family next door to you separate, or maybe the tragedy has come even closer as among your own relatives, parents could not, or would not, make a home for their families. When this has happened, you have seen the little ones dragged around from pillar to post until their lives were almost wrecked. They have been forced to bear burdens that children should not bear. Their characters have been warped and twisted because they have lost confidence in mankind.

How your heart has ached as you have seen children made homeless by death, sickness, poverty, or the divorce court—all circumstances for which they were not to blame. While unsympathetic relatives and friends shrugged their shoulders, you wanted to help, but there seemed to be no way. So the State, County, or some welfare organization was called upon to provide for the children. But few of these can do more than provide the bare necessities of life. The spiritual welfare of the child is often neglected or overlooked entirely.

Because nobody cared enough, you have seen a teen-ager grow up to become a blemish on society. You have probably thought, "If that child had only had a chance! How I wish I could have taken him in my home!"

You can have a hand in bringing up these small victims of adversity! You have a home where care and Christian training are provided for homeless children—the National Children's Home at Hot Springs, Arkansas. This Home has taken in 212 such boys and girls during its ten years of operation. Of these, 143 have been released—eighteen for adoption, others to parents or relatives or to a guardian. Some of them are now grown and have homes of their own. It has been thrilling to hear good reports from them and to see what God can do when He is given room in lives at on early age.

Your National Children's Home is situated on one of the rolling hills two miles south of Hot Springs, and affords a wonderful view of the surrounding Ouichita Mountains. There is a "homey" look about the three buff brick buildings and the big white barn—like a comfortable farm home. But it takes more than oak-shaded buildings to make a home. And it takes more than furniture, rugs, pictures, and bric-a-brac, too.

Any home without love is an insti-

tution, but practical love makes this institution a real home for scores of youngsters. Love is seen first in the sacrificial service of the Superintendents, Mr. and Mrs. Ole Kvistad. When the welfare of a child is in question there is no limit to their sacrifice of time and strength to bring the best possible solution to a problem. Each child comes to feel that in "Mother" and "Daddy" Kvistad he has a true ally against any foe—be it the memory of an unhappy past life, or some problem of adjustment, or an undesirable trait of character.

"Mother" Kvistad says, "I encourage the children to tell me their troubles. No matter what they have on their hearts, I listen." Heart-shattering sorrows are not kept buried; but, like shadows, they disappear when brought to light. This sympathetic hearing gives the child a feeling of security and confidence. And then there is always a word of encouragement or advice for the immediate problems, too.

Discipline is needed in any home, but it must be ingrained, not flaunted before cringing culprits. Children appreciate law and order, and when they step out of line they expect to be set straight again. No child at the Home is made to feel that his personal freedom is unduly restricted. "This is their home" is the attitude which forms the basis for all the rules and regulations. "Daddy" Kvistad puts it like this: "We will go the second mile with any child as long as he is on our side, but we insist upon the respect and obedience of every child."

"Mother" Kvistad knows her children and deals with each one in the light of his background, temperament, and aptitudes. An expression, a word, or an unconscious movement may indicate to her that one of the children is in need of special attention. Thus many problems are met before they become serious.

The deans are more like a big brother and big sisters to the boys and girls. Betty Lou Harmon and Betty Lou Husher are the two young ladies who care for the daily needs of our thirty girls. Whether dispensing counsel or toothpaste, these Christian house mothers add that magical potion of love that banishes the unexplainable fear caused by insecurity and lack of affection.

On the other side of the dormitory Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Conrad are "Brother" and "Sister" to thirty normal, energetic boys ranging in age from 3½ to 15. They listen to problems, supervise wardrobes, plaster skinned elbows, tie shoelaces, and supervise the work and play of their big family.

Every evening the children are led in devotions. At seven the Primaries in each wing gather for gospel choruses, personal testimonies, prayer and a Bible story. At eight the Junior groups enter a similar time of devotion, and at nine the Inter-

As the Speed-the-Light station wagon drew into the town of El Socorro, Venezuela, some of the Pentecostal Christians were there to greet us. We sat down to a delicious native meal, and soon the conversation centered around a certain

Roman Catholic priest who had been friendly with the Christians.

Knowing the strong opposition from the priests throughout Venezuela, it seemed strange that we could talk of this man with joy rather than with

resentment. Could it be true that in this town on the plains there was a priest who was indeed a friend of the much despised "Evangelicos"? We all knew that the priests tried constantly to hinder the opening of new Protestant churches. But this priest seemed different; he made it quite clear he wanted to help us.

When the meal was finished, we went to see him. The question was, "Would he really receive us into his house?" We finally arrived at his home and knocked on the door.

Soon the door opened and before our eyes stood a tall, slender Spaniard dressed in a long, white robe. We addressed him as Padre. He called us "hermanos" (brethren) and welcomed us in with a gracious smile. A few minutes later he led us out of the house and along the street to a large lot just one block from the Catholic temple on the town's plaza. This was a most beautiful spot, covered with shade trees and in the very heart of the city. Our friend, the priest, made it clear to us that this lot belonged to him and he wanted to give it to the Assemblies of God for the erection of a new church building. This was a most unusual and amazing thing to us-almost unbelievable.

While questioning this most unusual happening—a Catholic priest showing intimate friendship with Protestants—he said that he had told non-Protestants that the Protestants teach a much higher moral standard than the Catholics. If that be the case, he had said, why then should he not help them?

Please pray that Padre — shall come into the full light of salvation through the grace of God; and that soon we shall be able to build a church on the lot given so freely by this good Catholic friend.

REVIVAL IN DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

A recent letter from our missionary, Verne Warner, states:

"Adele Flower and Ida Sutherland are here in Sunday School and C. A. rallies. We just closed the first one in the capital section; it was greatly blessed of the Lord, and very well attended. Our sisters are now in the town of Baní in their second rally. Revival fires continue to burn in these places.

"Recently I went to Baní personally expecting to find an ordinary service in progress. Instead I found 3,000 people in the ball park listening to the Word of God. And a letter from our pastor in El Seybo tells of a meeting he recently closed in his town where 3,000 turned out nightly, including officials, and witnessed many marvelous healings.

"Towns are opening to the gospel here as never before. One local pastor is going to baptize fifty new converts the last Sunday of this month; and many other pastors are preparing for baptismal services at later dates.

"The city of La Romana has just closed a revival similar to those in the above-mentioned towns. People of God, now is the time of God's visitation in the land commonly known as "The land of tomorrow." Please continue to pray for your brothers and sisters in the Dominican Republic."

FUND TURNED RED

Come into my office, friend, and have a chair. It is a little cooler in here, although I notice that the thermometer reads 91 degrees.

Yes, we have been facing a difficult time with a serious lack of funds. With the increasing opportunities for ministry on our mission fields it is hard to keep saying "no" when our missionaries write for financial help.

Our general missions fund turned red toward the end of 1953, and it is still red. Now we are trying desperately to find a way to bring it into the black again.

Your heart would be touched to learn of the sacrifices many of our dear missionaries are making to help meet this general crisis. One missionary family from South America has asked us to take \$25.00 per month from their quite meager budget and apply it to the deficit. This missionary stated, "I do not have to use my car so much, and therefore will be able to give that amount." Other missionaries have actually asked us to reduce their monthly allowances.

At the spring seminar held in Springfield, the missionaries on furlough stated that they would spend one month soliciting funds from the churches, the entire proceeds of their work to go toward bringing the general fund back to normal.

You know, it is remarkable how facts get twisted when we do not have an opportunity to speak face to face. For instance, a dear woman (who is a faithful contributor to missions) wrote us recently, stating it had been reported that we were taking foreign missions money and using it for REVIVALTIME. Now it did not take us long to write a letter informing the dear sister that there was no truth in this. Quite possibly someone heard that offerings sent in designated for REVIVALTIME receive missionary credit and this gave rise to the misunderstanding. Then perhaps there are offerings that formerly would have been given direct to foreign missions but now are being diverted to REVIVALTIME by the donors.

Now we are 100 per cent in favor of our splendid Revivaltime program that God has given us. Through the voice of

REGIONAL BIBLE SCHOOL IN LIMA

During the summer we held a two-week regional Bible school in Lima for the training of lay workers. While we have had several of these schools in the provinces of Peru, this is the first time we have held one in the capital city. We anticipated only about fifty students but to our surprise 163 came the first night and from then on we averaged 200 each night.

The classes were held from 7:30 until 10:00 each night except Sunday; and the interest ran high. Many believers who worked in factories and stores came directly from their work; some ran all the way in order to get to school on time. Many students made sacrifices in order to receive the teaching that would make them more profitable workers in God's vineyard.

It is needless to say that we were thrilled at the good attendance; God greatly blessed our efforts. Our plan is to hold a two-week institute at least once each year in this great city of Lima where opportunities for Christian workers are unlimited. On the closing day of school we gave certificates to 169 students.

Pray that God will use these lay workers for the salvation of many souls in Peru.

FIRST ANNUAL S. S. CONFERENCE HELD IN URUGUAY

The first annual Sunday School Conference to be held in Uruguay took place in the city of Paysandu, where Paul Pugh is the missionary pastor. Having little time for preparation we felt a measure of uncertainty at the prospect, but God was with us throughout. Some of our church people traveled as far as 400 kilometers (300 miles) on a truck, so eager were they to attend the conference.

Four main speakers took part in the sessions: Lindolfo Calvino, Raymond De-Vito, Helen Dunbar, and Neva Pugh.

After the messages there was a display of materials that Mrs. Pugh had prepared for the workers. The enthusiasm shown by the congregation was greatly appreciated by the leaders. So successful was this event that we are already making plans for next year's conference to include a Sunday School business session.

SUNDAY'S LESSON

A PREVIEW OF NEXT WEEK'S LESSON BY E. S. WILLIAMS

THE BIBLE WHICH JESUS USED Lesson for October 3

Luke 4:14-22

During the present Sunday School quarter, special emphasis is given to the Scriptures as the inspired Word of God. In this lesson Jesus is presented as the living Word and the Scriptures as the spoken Word. Someone has said, "The fact that Jesus accepted and believed the Old Testament is strong proof of its divine inspiration. Christ believed the Old Testament, honored it in His ministry, and fulfilled its prophecies in His life and redemptive work.

Jesus and the apostles quoted largely from what is called the Septuagint Version. This was a translation of the Old Testament into Greek, made especially so that the Jews who lived where the Greek language was spoken might have the Scriptures. Many of them had lost the use of the Hebrew language. It is partly because the New Testament writers quote from the Septuagint that we have the difference that is apparent when Old Testament Scriptures are quoted in the New Testament.

1. THE SON OF GOD

a. Growth of the Son. Luke tells us, "And the child grew, and waxed strong in spirit, filled with wisdom: and the grace of God was upon him" (ch. 2:40). By means of the Spirit and through the experiences of life Jesus developed from infancy to maturity, physically, mentally, and spiritually (Luke 2:52). "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered" (Heb. 5:8). With each new earthly experience, Jesus' humanity developed further; and because of His constant communion with the Father, new unfoldings of His divine nature appeared.

b. Temptation of the Son. At the River Jordan Jesus was baptized. He there dedicated Himself to the ministry which lay before Him, and there He was endued with power from on high. But before He could begin His ministry He, as the last Adam (1 Cor. 15:45), must over-come the adversary by whom the first Adam had been defeated. Unless He could overcome for Himself, He could not overcome for others and thus become the Saviour and Deliverer of mankind. He must therefore be led of the Spirit into the wilderness, there to be tempted by the devil. Jesus was "in all points tempted like as we are" (Heb. 4:15)—that is, He was tempted through "the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life" (1 John 2:16). Jesus was subject to all kinds of human temptation, yet He was triumphant.

c. Triumph of the Son. Having been victorious over Satan in the temptation, Jesus returned to Galilee "in the power of the Spirit." He began His Galilean ministry in the synagogue at Nazareth, where He opened the Scripture and read, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me...."
And He announced to the people, "This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears" (Luke 4:21).

d. The Ministry of the Son. Not only did the Law make provision for a weekly Sabbath and a sabbatical year, but each fiftieth year was also set aside as a time of special blessing. In this "Jubilee" year all debts were remitted, land went back to its original owners, and all the slaves regained their freedom. Jesus seized upon this glorious occasion and likened Himself to one of the priests, who with trumpet of silver proclaims "the acceptable year of the Lord." This Jubilee was a type of the atonement which Christ came to provide for the souls of men. God the Father had anointed Him "to heal the broken-hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, ... to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

2. The Book of God

a. Jesus Fulfilled the Old Testament. Moses had said, "The Lord thy God will raise up unto thee a Prophet . . . like unto me; unto him ye shall hearken" (Deut. 18:15). Jesus fulfilled this prophecy of Moses (Acts 3:22; 7:37) for the

earthly ministry of Jesus was particularly that of a prophet. A prophet is one who has God's message. Because Jesus had God's message He could say, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away" (Matt. 24:35). "The word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last (John 12:48).

Jesus did not come to destroy either the Law or the Prophets, but to fulfill them (Matt. 5:17). After His resurrection, when He walked to Emmaus with two disciples, "beginning at Moses and all the prophets, he expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself" self" (Luke 24:27). He thus put His approval on all the Old Testament writings as the Word of God. At a later time, when all


the disciples were together. He again testified to the inspiration of the law of Moses, the prophets, and the Psalms, declaring that they spoke of Him (Luke 24:44).

b. Jesus Used the Old Testament. When Christ was tempted of the devil, He answered every suggestion of Satan with, "It is written..." (Luke 4:4, 8, 12). With the Scripture Jesus was able to defeat even the most cunning assaults of the tempter. This shows the value of having the Word hidden in our hearts. Often there is no time to search for a scripture to meet temptation —it is important then for the Christian to be fully armed, with the Sword in hand.

When faced by human accusers, Jesus' word to them was, "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of me" (John 5:39). At another time He declared, "The scripture cannot be broken" (John 10:35). The Word is a unit. It is a united whole. Although the Bible is the work of many authors, it is one Book because it is all inspired of God.

c. Early Believers Used the Old Testament. The apostle Paul put his approval on the inspiration of the Old Testament when he wrote, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God." So rich did he regard its content that he declared it "profitable for doctrine [teaching], for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." The Christian who is filled with the truths of the Bible and lives by those truths is "perfect, throughly furnished [prepared] unto all good works" (2 Tim.

3:16). When Paul wrote to Timothy he reminded him, "From a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation" (2 Tim. 3:15). Peter also approved the Old Testament as inspired: "The prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:21). The early Church preached Jesus from the Old Testament, showing that in Him its prophecies and promises were fulfilled (Acts 13:14-43).

mediates gather. These are times for sharing burdens, testimonies, and questions. Before breakfast each morning, family worship is held for all age groups together.

Twice on Sunday the whole family boards the Home's big yellow bus for Hot Springs' First Assembly. Many of the boys and girls had never been in Sunday School before coming to our Home and knew little or nothing about the Bible. Most of them testify now to a definite experience of salvation, and exhibit gratifying evidence that real Christian character is being built on a foundation of good Bible training.

Whether children are in the Home ten years or only a few weeks, they are influenced for good. Their hearts are directed toward God. Characters have been salvaged and reshaped because you cared enough—for this is your home.

At present our tiny dormitory rooms are filled to capacity. It is only possible for us to take in a child now and then, as we are able to release some now in our care. It is necessary to turn many children away every month because of lack of facilities. We feel that the time has come to enlarge our borders in order to make room for at least forty more homeless children. And since this is your home, we knew you would not want to miss this opportunity of ministering to

children in need. Thousands are looking for a home. We can have as many of these as we can provide for—we can have them to train in a Pentecostal home, not for just one hour a week, but for twenty-four hours a day—for months and even years.

A definition of the "Mother Church Plan" was given as follows: "Under this plan a local church assumes the entire initiative responsibility in establishing a new work. (1) The new church is promoted, financed and governed by the Mother Church and its officials as a vital, integral and dependent assembly until such time as it is financially and numerically able to maintain its own affairs. (2) The objective of all such churches should be to grow, develop, and become an independent sovereign assembly within two years, if possible.'

In one other plan, "The Adoption Plan," the initiative is taken by a group of local churches. "This is a plan in which a number of churches take the initiative and responsibility of opening a new work.' The Adoption Plan could be an adaptation of either the Mother Church Plan or the Big Brother Plan.

Four plans were presented in which the initiative for opening a new church comes from a source other than a local church. They are the Sectional, District, Inter-District and National Plans. The Section, District, and National office sponsor the opening of the new church in these plans. The Inter-District Plan is comparatively new, but is already functioning to the advantage of many less evangelized districts. According to this plan, "stronger districts co-operate by financing churches and workers in less evangelized districts."

Probably one of the best-known plans for opening new churches in the Assemblies of God is the "Pioneer Worker Plan." On this basis, "A pioneer worker who has a burden for a specific place, goes in on his own (with district approval) and with the help of God through much labor and sacrifice establishes a church."

Attention was called to the fact that we have no Rural Area Plan, in spite of the fact that 90%, or 113,273 towns, of the total 122,217 towns and cities in the United States are under 1,000 in population. The committee recommended that local church groups be encouraged to organize branch Sunday Schools and hold afternoon services in these areas until a definite plan can be developed.

At the close of two days of intensive conference there was a supper meeting in the Bethany Room at Central Bible Institute. At the supper the new Home Missions monthly periodical, "Mission U.S.A.," was presented to the group.

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OVER HALF MILLION DOLLARS GIVEN BY WOMEN'S MISSIONARY COUNCIL

The astounding figure of \$546,178 actual cash has been given this year for missionary projects by the Women's Missionary Council. This amount is in addition to their regular church missionary offerings, and was given for special equipment such as refrigerators, washers, bedding, dishes, new clothing, district campground equipment and local church improvement. No individual has been called upon for a large contribution toward any project, but as the needs have been presented to the women their hearts have been stirred, and love gifts of half a million dollars have been given through sacrifice to assist the missionaries and the various departments of the church in carrying forward the work of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The branches of our work which have benefited by the financial help are as follows:

> 36% Foreign Missions

31% Local assemblies and communities

151/2% National Home Missions

13% District work, pioneer churches, camp grounds, etc.

41/2% Benevolence homes for dependent children and elderly ministers

Far greater than the value of the tangible cash offerings are the hours of intercession for lost souls both abroad and at home, and the prayer for our missionaries, our pastors, our young people, and the sick and needy. Then there are the many hours spent by consecrated women in personal witnessing and church visitation, besides the tremendous help in relief work as they have rejuvenated tons of clothing for the poor.

Here are a few facts gleaned from the annual report of the Women's Mission-

1,506,322 Pieces of gospel literature distributed

1,164 Bibles and Testaments given 533,127 Prayer meetings and spiritual

services reported 59,138 Visits for the church reported 3,150 Hours donated as nurses' aids and practical nurses

1,320 Quilts made and given

40,000 Cans of food processed for missionary use

The membership of the Women's Missionary Council has grown to 38,340. There are 3,692 local organized groups. Forty-two district councils have organized WMC Departments.

The rapid growth of the Women's Missionary Council during the three years of national organization has brought a tremendous acceleration in activities in the national WMC department. It is necessary now to increase our office staff to handle the large amount of correspondence and various services offered by this office.

The WMC Department depends entirely upon offerings from our assemblies and WMC groups to finance this work. If each assembly will rally to revive our waning WMC treasury at this time, the good work of serving our missionaries will continue.
