Prevention Cheaper Than Cure

Bible-Reading Bill Defeated

Legislation to permit Bible reading in California public schools has gone down to defeat again. The measure was killed on a voice vote by the Senate committee on education, after a jam-packed hearing with spectators standing in the aisles.

No Law to Protect Gamblers!

There are plenty of Nevada laws to to keep the gamblers from cheating the public, but the gamblers complain that they need a law to keep the public from cheating them. Two men were caught using Mexican coins in Nevada's legal slot machines, and no law could be found on which to prosecute them! Pity the poor gamblers!

Prayer at the Capitol

For the first time in 167 years of Congressional history, there is now a chapel at the Capitol. It is a small room about 17 feet square, just off the Rotunda, half way between the House and the Senate. The public cannot use it. No meetings or conferences will be held in it. The room is for Congressmen only —a quiet place where they can go for a few minutes of Bible reading, meditation, and prayer, in the midst of their busy schedule. Let us pray that the chapel may be well used.

It is good to know that many leaders in our national government are recognizing their need of divine help. Probably President Eisenhower set the trend when, on the day of his inauguration, he asked the great assemblage to bow their heads while he offered his own personal impromptu prayer. It is reported that all cabinet meetings at the White House are opened with silent prayer. Henry J. Dubester, chief of the General Reference and Bibliography Division of the Library of Congress, says that "if the materials were available to examine the cabinet meetings of the different administrations it is very doubtful whether any record of the use of prayer would be found previous to this administration."

When national leaders pray and sincerely endeavor to do God's will, the ship of state will sail the roughest seas in safety and America will be a blessing in the earth. For it is written, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord."

Swedish Bishop Asks Revival of "High Church" Practices

Revival of "High Church" practices such as making the sign of the cross and more widespread practite of confession in the State (Lutheran) Church of Sweden was urged by the new Bishop of Stockholm, the Rev. Helge Ljungberg, in his first pastoral letter.

Streets Paved With Gold

Christians in the rest of the world will have to wait until they get to heaven to walk on streets paved with gold, but people in Quito, Ecuador, are already having that privilege. Jaime Serrano reports that he struck gold six years ago on his land in the suburbs of the city. To help finance his exploration of the mine, he sold gold-bearing sand to the city for paving purposes.

Praying for Prosperity

Laymen of Sanford, Maine, recently conducted a one-hour prayer period in all churches of the city for a return of prosperity.

Hard hit by the sale of the Goodall-Sanford textile company, the men of this industrial city decided to "make a move toward God" and pray for divine assistance. All church bells were rung for five minutes at noon and the men came to the churches for an hour of prayer.

Planes Safer Than Trains

W. K. Andrews, director of the Civil Aeronautics Board's Bureau of Safety Investigations, has stated that the nation's scheduled air carriers achieved a "remarkable" record in 1954 with a passenger fatality rate of .08 per 100 million passenger miles. The airlines carried an estimated thirty-five million passengers for twenty-one billion miles with only sixteen deaths, which was "lower than the rate achieved by the railroads in a number of years."

Will the "Iron Curtain" Rise?

The U. S. State Department has told the Soviet Union that if Russian churchmen are to be permitted to visit the United States, American churchmen should be allowed to visit Russia. At present visa applications are pending for three Russian prelates who would like to reside in this country to serve certain Russian Orthodox Churches in America. The applications are not likely to be granted unless Soviet authorities permit American preachers to visit their fellow-Christians behind the "Iron Curtain."

"Ever Learning . . . "

Since World War II, the American people have spent about twice as much for research as in all the previous years of our history, according to James R. Killian, President of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. "It is a startling fact that our national level of research expenditure—approximately three billion dollars—is as much as our total budget a little more than a quarter of a century ago."

We are making remarkable discoveries in science, but how much are we learning about the more vital issues of love and hate, good and evil, life and death, heaven and hell? We are reminded of a statement made by the late Charles Steinmetz, one of the world's great scientists. He was asked along what lines of research, in his opinion, would the greatest ultimate development be seen. He replied: "The greatest discoveries will be made along spiritual lines. Some day people will learn that material things do not bring happiness and are of little use in making men and women creative and powerful. Then the scientists of the world will turn their laboratories to the study of God and prayer. When that day comes, the world will see more advancement in one generation than it has in the last four."

Until then, we shall be "ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth" (2 Timothy 3:7).

Modern Views on Stealing

The seriousness of transgressing the laws of God and of man seems lost to many of the younger generation. Senator Hendrickson of New Jersey recently reported that many young people consider it "antisocial" to steal and rob, but no great crime.

Hendrickson's disclosures were the result of a questionnaire study made by Farleigh Dickinson College of 2,500 highschool and 1,000 college students in New Jersey. He reported some of the students said stealing is all right "if no serious damage is done" or "if you can get away with it."

Baptists Invited to Moscow

Three U. S. Baptist leaders have been invited to preach in Moscow. If they accept, it will mark the first time since before World War I that U. S. Baptist clergymen have filled Russian pulpits. The invitation came from the All-Soviet Council of Evangelical Christians, a body that is predominantly Baptist.

To Print Bibles in Russia

It is reported that the Seventh-Day Adventists in the Soviet Union (now numbering about 100,000) have obtained permission to publish Bibles and religious literature in Russia for the first time in twenty-eight years. A Word of Warning from Donald Gee

Sanctifying Ourselves

Sanctification is a serious matter. The Bible says that without holiness no man shall see the Lord—so it is imperative that we "cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God."

ONE MORNING NEARLY TWENTY-FIVE years ago I stood with a group of young men at the Glad Tidings Bible Institute in San Francisco waiting for the doors to open for breakfast. While we waited we sang a chorus popular at that time, "I know the Lord laid His hand on me." It's grand to feel like that, and especially if one is a student in a Bible school. But we do not always sufficiently realize the stern necessity of keeping our own hands upon ourselves. The Bible calls it "sanctifying ourselves." The priests failed in this in the revival under Hezekiah, and were temporarily excluded from their privileges (2 Chron. 29:34). As I recall that morning in 1930, I

As I recall that morning in 1930, I wonder where all that fine group of brethren are today. Many, I am sure, are filling a useful place in the ministry. (They may even read these lines and remember the occasion.) Some, perhaps, may have failed—not because the Lord had not called them, but because somehow they lost out in personal consecration. They failed to sanctify themselves.

Timothy was a young preacher with an exceptionally helpful family background of Christian training in the home. Besides that, he possessed a gift for the work of the gospel, divinely bestowed through the laying on of hands. Nevertheless Paul deemed it necessary to urge Timothy to "purge himself" and to "flee also youthful lusts" if he wished to be sanctified enough to be fit for the Master's use (2 Tim. 2:21, 22).

ter's use (2 Tim. 2:21, 22). In my experience I have sometimes found that exhortation to self-discipline is regarded as an indication of lacking Pentecostal "fire." I have been told that what is needed is zeal for soul-winning, and fervent preaching and praying. I am all for plenty of zeal and fervency—I wish we might have more of it—but I have lived long enough to remember tragic moral and spiritual shipwreck among numerous Christians who possessed abundance of gifts but little stability of character. The moderately gifted man will accomplish more in a lifetime if he has learned to sanctify himself than will his brilliant, but unsanctified, brother.

Timothy's father in the faith, Paul,

is very outspoken about how he sanctified himself lest, after preaching to others, he should become a castaway and be rejected by the Lord. "I run the race then with determination. I am no shadowboxer, I really fight! I am my body's sternest master, for fear that when I have preached to others I should myself be disgualified" (1 Cor. 9:26, 27, Phillips). The words indicate strenuous personal effort and care. They remind us of our Lord's words about sometimes having figuratively to cut off a hand or pluck out an eye (Mark 9:43-48)-so stern is this business. In Paul's case it was not enough to feel a deep conviction that God had called him from his mother's womb. He recognized the possibility of failure to achieve that for which Christ had so remarkably laid hold upon him, unless he gave a personal response by "reaching forth". and "pressing towards" (Phil. 3:12-14). In all our sanctification we have to co-operate with God.

Even Christ sanctified Himself (John 17:19). It is to be carefully understood that for Him the word means literally and exclusively that He consecrated Himself. With our Saviour there was no thought of self-cleansing. He was without sin. But there was the sublime act of His perfect response to His Father's good pleasure. The Father had sanctified and sent Him into the world (John 10:36), but the fulfillment of the Divine plan came to pass through the willing co-operation of the Son. In that sense our Lord deliberately sanctified Himself for our sake.

For us, too, the sanctifying of ourselves means complete consecration. It is the presenting of ourselves as a "living sacrifice" (Rom. 12:1). But in our case more is necessary than consecration as an act of devotion, however intense. We are



called to separate ourselves from all known sin and all recognized hindrances. We have to "lay aside every weight," and by an act of our own wills we have to "cleanse ourselves" from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God (2 Cor. 7:1).

The Blessed Hope of our Lord's coming, and the fact that one day we shall be like Him (1 John 3:2, 3), is not ground for an easy complacency that hulls us into the idea that although we fail to sanctify ourselves now it will be all right somehow in that day. Rather, this Blessed Hope of believers is the very reason for us to purify ourselves, even as He is pure. Our Master certainly taught the same sanctifying truth in His parables (Matt. 25:1-30).

Long experience in teaching holiness among Pentecostal people all over the world has convinced me that this side of the doctrine is the most neglected and misunderstood. Far be it from me to minimize the glorious truth of sanctification by faith, the truth that Christ Jesus is made sanctification unto us (1 Cor. 1:30). We know the tremendous spiritual exhilaration, to say nothing of the mental and emotional relief, when we first grasp by faith the possibility of a victorious life through an indwelling Saviour and see something better than the long, weary struggle in our own strength. This, truly, is our sanctification through the Spirit. Great and fruitful religious movements have embodied this testimony as a vital part of the gospel, and the power that so often has accompanied it has even been confused with the baptism in the Holy Spirit. We know better. We understand that the baptism in the Spirit is not a sanctifying crisis but rather an enduement with power for service. But for that very reason we need a continuous and ever-deepening sanctification to accompany our Pentecostal gifts. And perhaps, most of all, we need to sanctify ourselves.

I have said that this is misunderstood in the first enthusiasm of grasping sanctification by faith. It seems to me that some of our sweetest and richest hymns on holiness have perpetuated the doctrinal confusion. Before me as I write are exquisite lines by none less than Frances Ridley Havergal—

"Holiness by faith in Jesus; Not by efforts of thine own."

If that means that we are dependent upon Divine grace to provoke our efforts, I agree. But if it means that our own willing effort has no part in our holiness then I am compelled to disagree entirely. We so easily confuse "faith" with inaction on our part, and talk about "leaving it with the Lord" when He most certainly waits for us to co-operate with Him. I am inclined to believe that with all of us the weakest part in really entering into true holiness is what the old Puritans called the "practick part." It lies in this essential effort of sanctifying ourselves. The scriptures quoted above are sufficient evidence that it is an important aspect of the truth. No doctrine of our salvation is complete that fails to do justice to the will of God and the will of man working together to fulfill the eternal purpose through Christ Jesus our Lord.

Fanny Crosby's Secret

WHEN FRANCES JANE CROSBY WAS SIX weeks old, a blundering doctor used the wrong poultices to reduce inflammation in her eyes, and ruined her eyesight. The vague sense of light and color that remained, faded away in the course of years. Through most of the nineteenth century and on into the twentieth, she spent her years in total darkness until she died in 1915 at the age of 95.

And yet, far from blaming the doctor, she used to insist with the utmost sincerity, "If perfect earthly sight were offered me tomorrow, I would not accept it!" She was noted for her unfailing cheerfulness.

How did Fanny Crosby achieve such inner triumph?

Certainly not by avoiding trouble, for loss of vision was only one of many grievous disappointments that came to her. A girl of boundless ambition, she grew up feeling stranded and helpless because her widowed mother so long delayed sending her to a school for the blind. She became so blue at times that she would go off by herself to ask God if He had no place for her in the world. In her small New York village there was little understanding of her problem. For years her intense thirst for knowledge went unslaked. Night after night she cried herself to sleep.

Physical and emotional upsets continued for some time, even after she entered the Institution for the Blind in New York City at the age of fifteen. The first poems from her pen were of little worth. At first the school authorities suppressed her urge to write. Although she became a teacher and had some success with secular songs, still she hadn't found herself. Her marriage to Alexander Van Alstyne, a blind musician, didn't help. "He had his faults," she explained with characteristic mildness after his death. She was saddened, too, by the death of her only child.

Beset by a variety of frustrations, Fanny didn't begin her career as a hymn writer until she was 44.

As a matter of fact, it was the very difficulties in her life that opened the door to Fanny's victory over herself. A remark she made at the age of 90 gives us the key: "Many sorrows which have been heart-rending have crossed my path, but out of my Gethsemane I have reached Olivet...."

How did her Olivet become a reality? Through her simple, unwavering faith in God. She learned to take every experience in life as a gift from a loving Hand. She came to accept even her blindness as a mercy. It gave her imagination free rein. It brought friends to her by the score—famed musicians like Ira D. Sankey and P. P. Bliss, evangelists like D. L. Moody, political leaders like Cleveland and Polk. Above all, it sheltered her from the distractions that would have interfered with her writing.

Her faith manifested itself in a remarkable prayer life. Even as a little girl fleeing to her Lord for comfort, she would rise from her knees with the assurance that He would not disappoint her. Intense, continuous supplication for intellectual light seemed long unanswered —but presently she found herself in the Institution for the Blind. Then came the years of seeking for wider usefulness. On into middle life she prayed. Then, one memorable day, she met W. B. Bradbury. He said he had long wanted to see her. Would she write a hymn that he might set to music?

The question fanned her waiting talent into flame. In three days she returned with the song that begins:

"We are going, we are going,

To a home beyond the skies,

Where the fields are robed in beauty, And the sunlight never dies."

Mr. Bradbury supplied the music and had the composition published. It was her first real hymn. Her prayers were answered. "I had found my mission," she later exulted, "and was the happiest creature in all the land." Thus she learned the secret of patient waiting on the Lord. When the urge to write came over her, she would sit quietly and pray. The result was an outpouring of hymns that have been sung around the world. The first to win acclaim on both sides of the Atlantic was "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour." There followed such simple but heart-warming gems as "Rescue the Perishing," "Blessed Assurance," "Close to Thee," and "Saviour, More Than Life to Me." They seem destined to live on and on.

Her trustful spirit found its anchorage in the Word of God. At this point her grandmother played an essential part. When Fanny was a child, that good woman would take the little girl on her knee and read long passages of Scripture aloud. "It was Grandma who brought the Bible to me, and me to the Bible," she remarked in after years. She learned by heart several Old Testament Books and most of the New Testament. Down through the years God spoke to her as friend to friend through those sacred Scriptures.

Such is the secret of Fanny Crosby's radiant life. Her unquestioning faith, perfected by suffering, turned her night into day. Of her well-known song, "Never Give Up," she once said: "There is a great and wonderful truth embodied in these words. The whole victory of life is in them—"Trust in the Lord and take heart.' That means the exercise of courage, the consciousness of being linked to One mightier than ourselves...."

We may be small when we emerge from the furnace of God, but we shall be as pure gold.

"That ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ" (Phil. 1:10).

THE TERM "SINCERE" IN THIS PASSAGE is compounded of two Greek words, heile, meaning sunlight, and krino, to judge, try, distinguish. So this verse means "that ye may be found pure when unfolded and examined by the sun's light." Certainly every believer should be pure in heart; he should have no hidden motives, no impure lusts, no selfish purposes. He should be free from all taint of envy, pride, and self-seeking. We may not all be brilliant and possess a scintillating personality-in fact, we may have but few gifts, either natural or imparted. But we can and must be pure, for only the pure in heart shall see God.

The rays of the earthly sun will reveal blemishes and impurities in a great many things which, in an indoor light, appear to be flawless. I passed a place where the manufacturers of a nationally known brand of paint were testing their product. Out under the open sky were a number of long racks, upon which were hung hundreds of thin, wooden slats that had been painted every hue in the color scheme. They were hung there to be tested by the elements for durability and fastness of color. We Christians are like those pieces of painted wood. We, too, are exposed to the rays of the Sun of Righteousness, whose eyes are a flame of fire.

Many believers are content with the status quo, spiritually speaking—they want things to remain just as they are. They fear that more light would require them to deepen their consecration. They would have to assume more responsibility for the light given, and this they do not want. But there simply is no way to be a saint without paying the price; the furnace and the cross are a part of that price. God's people shall be "purified, and made white, and tried."

The fires of God are exceedingly hot, but they purify; there is no dross left in the overcomer. No artificial product ever comes out of His furnace. We may be small when we emerge, but we shall be as pure gold.

Christians who live in the shadows of the world and shun the revealing rays of the celestial Sun have not submitted to the Lord's refining process. They "compare themselves among themselves" and the Bible says that in so doing they are not wise. Don't be satisfied with having the approval of men. God's standard for you may be higher. Let your daily prayer be: "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psa. 139:23).

A minister, calling on one of his members, found her hanging out the family wash. He remarked how white and clean the garments looked. During his visit, however, it began snowing, covering everything with a blanket of white. When the pastor was leaving, the woman said, "My wash does not seem so white now, with the snow all around."

"Ah, no white can stand against God Almighty's white!" the minister replied. Job did not know how unclean he really was until he saw the Lord. Then he abhorred himself, and repented in dust and ashes. Isaiah had an awe-inspiring vision of Jehovah on His throne, high and lifted up. Immediately he fell on his face and cried, "I am a man of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts." Oh, to come into the light of His glorious presence! There is nothing like a vision of Christ's purity and love to bring us to our knees and lay our hearts bare. There is no substitute for the Great Refiner's fire, or the Heavenly Father's chastening, to make us pure enough to reflect the Sun of Righteousness.

The saint whose life is pure will not live in the shadows. His soul will love the light and welcome its revealing rays. Gladly he will bare his bosom to the divine X ray. "For every one that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds should be reproved. But he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrought in God" (John 3:20, 21).

Every day I see a palm tree that is overshadowed by a large oak. That palm has grown tired of its shadowy existence, and has curved upward and outward to the light. Its trunk is bent, but its branches are in the sunshine. So it is with the consecrated saint. He is no spiritual cave-dweller, who must be

EVANGELIZING IN FRENCH WEST AFRICA

THE LORD HAS DONE SO MANY WONderful things for us at Bassari, French Togo, that our hearts are overflowing with joy. Recently several of our Bible School students were sent to the surrounding villages to preach the gospel. (Each student is responsible for three or four villages in his particular area.) All of them came back with wonderful reports of God's blessing. In all we are reaching thirty-seven villages currently with a group of twelve workers.

Nassam, one of the young men who was saved at the church some time ago, visited his home village to spread the good news to the people there. Some time later, it was our privilege to visit that village. To our surprise, as soon as we arrived the people began bringing their fetishes and jujus for us to burn. There in a village where white men had never been, several of the people already had been saved through the testimony of young Nassam! The chief of the village was very interested in the gospel and begged that we hold regular services there.

Recently we had two baptismal services in which twenty-six believers were immersed, among whom was a chief from a nearby village. Before he was saved, this man had been a witch doctor—a great fetish man, as the people called him.

Now, through the power and grace of God, he is a loyal Christian and has nothing to do with jujus and fetishes. His village church is always packed, making it necessary to build a larger building soon.

Recently we had a harvest festival here in Bassari. The people brought a tithe of their harvest. Those who were not farmers brought other things: fowls, dresses, money, or whatever they had. These goods were sold in the market so that the money could be used to help start new churches in the neighboring towns. Thank God for the vision of these new Christians.

Three months ago we started a Sunday School here; the enthusiasm has been wonderful. The attendance has grown from about 130 to 233. All the people are enjoying the Bible study classes; it gives them opportunity to ask questions and discuss the lessons. On Saturdays we have special classes for the teachers to review the lessons.

A few Sundays ago a heathen man was saved in the morning service. That same night he burned a large bag of jujus; the next evening he brought his wives to prayer meeting that they might be saved also.

We know you will rejoice with us over what God is doing in Bassari. Please con-

tinue to pray with us; we believe greater results are ahead. Pray for the Christians here who by faith are beginning the erection of a larger building. The present church building is packed at practically every service, especially on Sundays.

New Evangelistic Center Planned

The Colombo Gospel Tabernacle celebrated its twenty-ninth anniversary recently with some wonderful services.

The Tabernacle now has a thriving membership. The Sunday School enrollment is 240, not counting four other branch Sunday Schools located in Colombo and environs. These total an additional 175 in attendance.

The first pastor of the work was Brother Clifford, now in charge of the Oriental Relief Agency in Tacoma, Washington. Through the years, a succession of missionaries pastored the work; the writer assumed the pastorate in 1952 after having been co-pastor with Derrick Hillary for the previous year.

In that same year (1952) David Smith was installed as assistant pastor, the church taking on his full support. We believe that was its first major step toward functioning indigenously.

We are now planning to build an Evangelistic Center in Colombo. The work is in need of a much larger building to draw in the outsiders. The local members have raised nearly \$5,000 (U.S. currency) among themselves, but they need a larger amount before building.

We are praying that God will open hearts at home to send the funds we need. Our present building is too small to accommodate the crowds; and we have had to give up our newspaper advertising because we cannot accommodate the crowds that come to the church. Pray that God will meet this need right away. We could reach far more with the gospel in a larger building.

Word From Behind the Bamboo Curtain

JUST BEFORE OUR TRANSFER TO FORmosa, while we were still in Hong Kong, we received two letters by ordinary mail from a worker in China. They were written in the fall of 1954. Needless to say, it rejoiced our hearts to hear from these dear people; it was one year since we had last heard from them.

The letters state that after prayer and fasting, an appointed group of nine Christians went before the authorities and received back their church building for public worship on Christmas week of 1953. Since then they have had no trouble with the authorities. This truly was a miracle of the Lord! The church building had been in the hands of government officials ever since we left that city in February of 1952.

Fortunately the believers had accumulated a small amount of money from their weekly offerings, sufficient to make the necessary repairs on the building. Now they are rejoicing because again they are permitted to worship on Sundays as well as weekdays.

The letters tell of revivals in the assemblies of that District. God has been using some of the elderly women to bring revival to the churches. To quote from the letter, "There are always some who turn to the Lord, and no one can stop them."

The writer of these letters, besides the elders and pastors in that area, are not free to travel; therefore, they sent out letters of exhortation and comfort to the various churches. These circular letters proved to be such a great blessing to the believers that the sending of such letters to the churches became a regular custom.

The letter further states that many Tibetan priests have been attending our preaching place to hear the gospel.

Although this worker's report is for the most part very good, he tells of some believers who have become lukewarm toward the Lord and he asks prayer for them. Generally speaking, compul-

Pacific St., Springfield 1, Mo. sory labor leaves little time for many of the people to attend church throughout China; and confiscation of church buildings makes the situation all the more difficult. Then there is the government policy of amalgamating and supervising all churches, Bible Institutes and religious gatherings. This tends to curtail the free preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

In the area where we ourselves labored the Christians have not been able to gather together for their Annual District Conference since 1951. The reason for this is the difficulty in getting permission from the government and Church Control Committee for such a gathering. There is also the problem of obtaining food for such a large gathering. In the large cities like Peking, Shanghai, Tientsin and Hankow, the religious situation is somewhat better; there the churches have more liberty than in the smaller areas where controls are tighter.

The same source reports concerning W. M. Thank God the church in China still has such faithful men preaching the Word and having a certain amount of liberty to do so. But the battle between right and wrong continues; living to please God rather than men always brings tribulation. However, in all the tests God gives more grace, and He will surely perfect His plan for the church in China.

We share the contents of these letters with you in the hope that you will continue to pray for the Christians and the church in Red China. Pray that they may fulfill God's purpose while living under that strained economy. These faithful friends write that they are able to make a living but not as easily as before the change. They acknowledge now that before the change they did not witness for the Lord as well as they might have. They were greatly discouraged when the missionaries left them. But now they are determined to use every opportunity to preach the gospel faithfully. May God grant our faithful Chinese Christians a double portion of His Spirit to this end, and may salvation come to many precious souls behind the bamboo curtain.

We have all eternity to celebrate the victories but only a few hours before sunset to win them.—Amy Carmichael.

SAMUEL THE JUDGE-1 Samuel 7:5-15

When, after many years of spiritual drifting, Israel once again lamented after the Lord, He did not cast them aside. In infinite grace He sent Samuel to direct them in their restoration. Men may be unfaithful, but not God.

The steps which Israel took to obtain revival are the steps needed for revival today. The Israelites were instructed to put away all strange gods and serve God only. They were gathered together at Mizpeh to give expression to their united desire for restoration. The sins which had caused the people to forsake God were confessed and judged before the Lord.

Just as the enemy came against the people of God after their revival, so the enemy today opposes true spiritual restoration. But when the people gathered about the altar of burnt offering in unreserved consecration, the Lord fought against the enemies of Israel and gave His people a great victory.

The result of the revival was twofold: Israel did not suffer at the hand of their enemy, all the days of Samuel, and the people recognized that divine help had come to them. God had intervened, not because of their worthiness, but because of His grace. "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us," was the significance of their memorial stone.

SAMUEL'S CALL TO ISRAEL-1 Samuel 7:1-4, 15-17

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them to conquer the main part of it. 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How "Pentecost" Came to Us

A Personal Testimony by Marianne Paden Brown

On the evening of January 22, 1955, I received the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. I had heard of this experience, but I had never seen anyone whom I knew receive it. All through the past year there had been an ever-deepening realization that I needed more of the Holy Spirit Himself to make my teaching in two Bible classes effective. I saw that no matter with how much prayer preparation or authority I taught the Word of God, something was lacking to move my hearers. The more of the Spirit I received in preparation for my teaching, the more I sensed a need for the fullness of the Spirit.

Then one Wednesday night a stranger visited one of our prayer groups and invited us to some large meetings in Philadelphia sponsored by the Assemblies of God. Several of us attended one of them, but we felt more like spectators than participants. I liked the singing, though, and felt drawn to go again. Each time I went I felt an inner happiness and uplift for several days, and after four visits I found that I learned to praise God for the first time. It made me feel very free and joyous. I wished that others of our own prayer groups could experience this feeling!

Soon after this a couple whom we had not seen for years returned home and visited our Saturday evening prayer group. About seven of us met regularly in a home to pray for the Sunday services of our rural Presbyterian Church. With the advent of these friends in our prayer group, there came a note of praise, in which I joined heartily.

On the second Saturday evening that these folk met with us, they suggested that the meeting could easily become a "tarrying meeting" if anyone were hungry for the fullness of the Spirit. None of us had ever been in such a meeting. My husband took the suggestion lightly, remarking that there would probably be many future meetings in which we could "tarry" if we so desired.

At that moment I felt an overwhelming urge to get to prayer. Immediately we got to our knees, and I began to cry out to God in praise and thanksgiving for blessings of the past week. I was so overcome by a rush of joy and praise that I stretched out full length on the rug of the friend's home where we met, not minding what anyone might think.

Floods and waves of unutterable joy and laughter swept over me, and bolts of Divine electricity shook me from head to foot. I never dreamed there could be such bliss and ecstasy this side of heaven.

The two Pentecostal friends were at my side instantly, praying and exhorting me to let go my tongue and praise the Lord in whatever sounds came. At first it seemed difficult to let the Lord have my tongue, but before long I was rejoicing and uttering praises in another language. I was amazed upon reaching home to discover that it was already one o'clock in the morning. I had no sense of the passing of time, though I was fully conscious through the whole wonderful experience.

The other friends in the prayer group had heard of the Baptism, but I'm sure they never expected to see someone receive the experience. They rejoiced at my happiness and liberty in the Lord. but had no notion that such an experience might be for them. However, before another Saturday evening meeting arrived, two of them, including my husband, had received the Baptism in a similar manner. By the next week-end two more had received. Now we know that the Holy Spirit may be received by every sincere believer, as in apostolic days, and we expect that many more will receive as we wait upon God. Only two of us have been filled with the Spirit in church meetings. The others have been filled in homes where three or four had gathered to pray for them.

We do not know what God has in store for us in these last days, but we know that there must be a tremendous moving of the Holy Spirit since we, who had not more than heard of the Baptism, have been so blessed.

Summer School to Be Offered at Central Bible Institute

It will be possible for a person to take up to ten hours of class work in the ten-week period. The following courses will be offered:

There will be a registration fee of \$7.50 whether the student enrolls for one session or both. The charge for tuition will be \$10.00 per semester hour. Meals

will be available in the Student Center and dormitory rooms will be provided at regular rates.

dragged out into the light of truth. He comes out voluntarily; he reaches out for God's light.

The Church that Christ will take to Himself is a glorious church, radiant in her bridal robes-no spots, no blemishes, no wrinkles. What a picture of chastity, purity, and holiness! Spots, wrinkles, and blemishes are evidences of worldliness, lukewarmness, and spiritual adultery. Wherever you find dirty garments, you will find the devil close by, laying claim to the wearer. In Zechariah 3:1, when Joshua the high priest stood before the angel of the Lord, Satan stood there too, to resist or accuse him, because his priestly robes were filthy. So must the bride of Christ be spotless. "Thou art all fair, my love; there is no spot in thee.'

As we submit to the Lord's refining process, our lives shall become so pure that His image shall be seen in us. Moses went up into the mount to receive the commandments.
