NEWS BRIEFS FROM THE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE

#### Authorized Version Leading

In spite of the fact that the Revised Standard Version of the Bible is being widely advertised, only around three million copies of the "new Bible" have been sold in two years. The Authorized (King James) Version of the Bible is still far in the lead. Last year one commercial firm alone in the U.S.A. published and distributed 1,700,000 copies of the Bible in the King James Version, in addition to those published by the American Bible Society and other Bible publishers.

#### Converts Counted by Youth for Christ

The executives of Youth for Christ International, at their annual business meeting, counted up the converts reported by hundreds of local youth groups and found that 22,800 persons professed to take Christ as their personal Saviour at the youth rallies during 1954.

A total of 9,920 official rallies were conducted by chartered Youth for Christ groups, with an average attendance of about 300.

#### Wallpaper Forms Bible Map

A wallpaper manufacturer in New York (Wall Trends, Inc.) has introduced a map design in eight colors for use in Sunday Schools. It constitutes a pictorial map of Bible history. Five rolls of the wallpaper are required to complete the Old Testament section, and two rolls for the New Testament. When mounted on the classroom wall it provides the pupils with a scale mural of places and events in the whole Bible story, it is claimed.

#### "To Make America Catholic"

Broadminded Protestants who have been dreaming of a World Council of Churches that would embrace the Roman Catholic Church within its long soft arms must have been awakened with a jar last.month by the words of a Catholic leader.

Speaking at the Chair of Unity Octave observance in Washington, Auxiliary Bishop James J. Navagh said:

"Do we want America to be Catholic? The answer is, We want America to be Catholic just as we want the whole world to be Catholic, for such is the will of God....It is our duty to make America Catholic."

God is looking for Spirit-filled Christians who will be just as outspoken as that concerning our Pentecostal evangelical faith.

#### **Censoring Radio Songs**

Radio Station WDNC at Durham, N. C. has announced that it will broadcast no more "smutty songs." In a paid newspaper advertisement it announced:

"During the past few months, a disturbing trend has developed in the field of music. Bearing the tag of 'something new, something different,' undisguised smut has been creeping into the lyrics of the recorded tunes we are asked to introduce to you....

"As little as a year ago, these would have been classed as 'party' records, unfit for mixed company—much less on the air! Today they are being released daily by 'name' recording companies as well as 'off brand' labels... We do not think that you, our listeners, want the smutty lyrics heard daily in the home and family automobile. So, WDNC refuses to be a party to anything so poisonous to the mind and spiritual values of its listeners."

It is good to know that a number of other broadcasters across the country have also joined the crusade against the offcolor songs with the double meaning.

#### **Transportation in Israel**

The transportation industry in Israel is expanding all the time. Seven years ago there were only 62 miles of broad-gauge railroads. Today there are 220 miles; and in addition, the first stage of a 45-mile Negev railroad connecting Na'an and Beersheba is now being laid.

There are now 44,614 motor vehicles and approximately 1,250 miles of asphalt roads in Israel.

The nation has its own airline with eight large aircraft making regular flights between four continents: Asia, Europe, North America and Africa. The El-Al Israel Airlines have been in operation for nearly six years and have a perfect safety record. Last year they carried 32,639 passengers. In addition, a subsidiary airline operates within Israel, linking Tel Aviv, Haifa and Eilat.

As for her merchant fleet, Israel now has 34 vessels with a gross total of 137,-000 tons, making her the leading maritime nation in the Near East.



#### Israel's Seventh Anniversary

Israel celebrated the seventh anniversary of her Independence Day on April 27. Along with the speeches, religious ceremonies, military parades, and other festive events there was the opening of the Exhibition of Israel's Achievements at the Weizmann Memorial in Rehovot.

The nation has achieved a great deal since that day in 1948 when she declared her independence. At that time there were only 650,000 Jews in the land. At the end of 1954 there were over twice that many Jews (1,526,016) plus 191,818 non-Jews. Of the non-Jews (mainly Arabs) 131,500 are Moslems, 42,800 are Christians and 17,500 are Druzes.

Remarkable progress has been made in education, agriculture, industry, foreign trade, and every other line. Forty-eight new factories started production last year. Sixteen new countries became customers of Israel. Her exports finance 30% of her imports.

The Israelis now have 925,000 acres of land under cultivation and they are working constantly to reclaim more and more land by irrigation. A \$40,000,000 pipeline, sixty miles long, is nearly completed. It will carry water from the River Yarkon, north of Tel Aviv, southward to the parched wilderness of the Negev— 100,000,000 cubic meters of it annually —to cause more of Israel's desert to blossom as the rose.

Some 38,661 tourists visited the country last year. An even greater number of sight-seers are expected in the "Land of the Bible" this year.

#### **Herod's Palace Discovered**

The Department of Antiquities in the Government of Israel has announced the discovery of the ruins of the palace of King Herod the Great. The ruins of the 2,000-year-old palace are at Masada, near the Dead Sea.

The archaeologists found also the palace fortress, which has a mosaic flooring fronted by a large columned terrace. They found remains of pottery, pillars, inscriptions, food and trees in abundance; also four cisterns estimated to hold 40,000 cubic meters of water. The mosaics are believed to be the earliest yet found in Israel. A Roman soldier's vanity also came to light—his name was found inscribed in Greek on one of the columns on the palace terrace!

#### **Planting Trees in Arid Israel**

"The first tree Abraham put in the soil of Beersheba was a tamarisk," said Israel's outstanding authority on reforestation, Dr. Joseph Weitz. "Following his lead, four years ago we put out two million in the same area. Abraham was right. The tamarisk is one of the few trees we have found that thrives in the south where yearly rainfall is less than six inches."

# THE PENTECOSTAL MOVEMENT

Pentecostal Power Has Been Given To Keep Us Moving on With God.

Webster defines a movement as, "A connected and long continued series of acts and events tending toward some more or less definite end; an agitation in favor of some principle, policy, etc."

This, broadly speaking, may cover the meaning of the term, "The Pentecostal Movement," but we would prefer to paraphrase and define it more specifically as follows: "A divinely inaugurated system of co-operative fellowship and endeavor for the definite purpose of revitalizing Christianity and evangelizing the world; a concerted activity toward restoring and extending Apostolic teaching and experience to all men everywhere."

Does this seem to border on the presumptuous, or infer an over-ambitious universality of objective? Nevertheless we are convinced that this world-circling outpouring of the Holy Spirit "upon all flesh" is none other than the work of God, and that the divine promise is indeed to "you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off!" In making this statement, we are not suggesting that the Pentecostal churches have any "corner" on the grace of God. Neither are we referring to any organizational structure as such, although it is our firm conviction that some vehicle of service is vitally essential on the human level. But these innumerable believers upon whom Christ has so graciously breathed forth His Holy Spirit in baptizing, permeating reality, constitute merely the human factors of a mighty heaven-born visitation.

#### MOVED BY THE SPIRIT

There are other implications of this word movement, which may not come directly under the above definition, but which we feel beautifully suggest some very basic characteristics of this "spiritual wave" from the "infinite ocean."

The very Word of God upon which we build our faith and hope "came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were MOVED by the Holy Ghost" (2 Pet. 1:21).

Again we read in Judges 13:25, regarding Samson, "And the Spirit of the Lord began to MOVE him at times...."

It is the moving of the Spirit in Pentecostal meetings that makes them truly different from cold and formal ritualism. This moving is experienced by the preacher and is also sensed by individuals of the congregation. At times it takes the form of pungent conviction for sin, until there is fear and trembling and "strong crying" unto God for mercy. At other times it may manifest itself by weeping, in brokenness and humility—or, in "joy unspeakable and full of glory."

Pentecostal people have often been accused of being too emotional and "noisy." But the fact remains that the entire human race is equipped with an inherent capacity for experiencing and expressing emotions. Take note of the feelings that are so openly evidenced at sports events, political rallies, entertainments, etc. If such mundane things as a "touchdown" or a "candidate" can bring forth a pandemonium of excitement from "normal" people, what is to be expected in life's very greatest experiences when men and women come into the searching and stimulating presence of God!

To be sure, there may be a considerable margin between fleshly exhibitionism and spiritual manifestation. We subscribe to the scriptural injunction, "Let all things be done decently and in order" (1 Cor. 14:10). But who can honestly doubt that the "order" of the Spirit may often be far different from the stereotyped programming of men?

A congregation of spiritual people reminds us of a piano. Each key is "in tune" and ready for only the musician's touch to respond with its own particular quality of tone. And real music is a pleasing, harmonious variation of sounds. The repeated sounding of a single' key, or even a set of chords, becomes monotonous and nerve-wracking. Are we, as individuals, always ready and in touch with the Spirit during each service, so that we are prepared to function and contribute something to the beauty and blessing of the hour? Even a fervent "Amen" may contribute a substantial ad-

dition to the spirit of the meeting. A hearty nod of approval and assent will serve to stimulate the preacher in his earnest declaring of the truth. A wholesome eagerness to listen, coupled with a quiet inner prayer for the effectiveness of the "Sword of the Spirit," will help to create the "atmosphere" conducive to the salvation of sinners, the edification of believers, and the worship of God. Then there is a great variety of spiritual gifts and operations which may contribute much blessing as He directs.

Not that each Pentecostal service must be completely unplanned, and left to whatever winds of spontaneity may chance to blow. Does it seem reasonable that a God who planned the entire scheme of salvation "from the foundation of the world," would object to consulting together with His chosen lieutenants regarding the theme or objective of a particular service, ahead of time? With God-planned and Spirit-anointed services, freely entered into by all, what glorious and profitable times we may truly enjoy as we assemble ourselves together! May the Spirit continue to MOVE upon us and among us!

# "By My Spirit"

THERE IS A MESSAGE ON MY HEART; and I feel the urge to write it, preach it, meditate upon it. It was revealed long ago to the prophet Zechariah in these well-known words, "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord."

We have tremendous needs. We need food, clothing, healing, and shelter. God can supply all these things. There is also a need greater than our physical or our material needs. God can fill that need too.

Earthly things will pass away. This life is as a vapor which appeareth for just a little while. Time is so short, eternity so long, that we want to be sure we have an inheritance in the kingdom of God which shall never pass away. Therefore we want to be overcomers, yet we are often overcome. We strive and resolve, but often meet defeat. We want to see a revival with souls crying out, "What must I do to be saved?" Yet we talk and plan and work to no avail. Why? Because we do not claim the promise of Acts 1:8 as fully as we ought-"Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you."

Jesus taught His disciples, by word and example, how to live holy lives. He said, "Ye are my witnesses," and in almost His last words He gave them a great work to do. But He knew they would not be able of themselves to accomplish it. So He said, "Behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you; but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high." It is this wonderful power from on high that is the supply for all our need.

In that very first chapter of Genesis, we read that the earth was without form, and void, and darkness was upon the face of the deep; but the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters, and God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. He spoke and it was done. If today your life is dark and hopeless without a gleam anywhere, there is power in God to bring light out of darkness, and order out of chaos. We need the moving of the Spirit of God upon our lives, our circumstances, our churches, and upon our unsaved friends.

We read in 2 Chronicles 14 that King Asa went out against the adversary with a few mighty men equipped with spears,

and bows, and arrows, while the great Ethiopian host came with chariots. But Asa prayed and enlisted the power of God on his side. God answered Asa's prayer and smote the Ethiopians before him. I fear that too often we go out against the enemy with our own plans, with our own prowess, with the bows and arrows of fleshly energy, when there is power in God to put to flight the armies of the aliens and give us victory.

So the Word of God tells us to pray without ceasing. The disciples obeyed and prayed until they received power from on high. Then one man preached and three thousand were converted in a single day! God has not changed. Spiritual battles are not won by carnal weapons. "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts.'

Is there any improvement on the "By my Spirit" method? I'm sure D. L. Moody would say, "No, a thousand times, NO!" In that Congregational church in the north of London, Mr. Moody preached on Sunday morning with great difficulty. Dr. Torrey says that Mr. Moody afterward confided in him, saying, "I had no power, no liberty; it seemed like pulling a heavy train up a steep grade; and as I preached I said to myself, 'What a fool I was to consent to preach. I came here to hear others and here I am preaching.""

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Mr. Moody had consented to preach that evening, too. He tried to be released from the evening service, but could not.

Then something wonderful happened. That afternoon a bedridden saint of God, learning from her sister that Mr. Moody was preaching in London, gave herself to fasting and prayer. That night the Spirit of God moved upon hearts, and about five hundred confessed Christ. It was the beginning of a great revival. The difference was not in the man. Mr. Moody went to that service with a heavy heart, and could scarcely believe the response God gave as he invited those who wanted to accept Christ as their Saviour to rise to their feet. Ah, the eyes of the Lord had been watching, not so much for someone to preach as for someone to pray! There is power for our need; mighty, soul-saving, wonder-working power, but where are the men who will specialize in this one thing, and search and sacrifice and pray until the fire of God falls again? Is there not too much ease in Zion, and too little waiting upon God? Revivals come in one way: by prayer! Is God waiting for a man to stand in the gap before Him for the great need?

Let us look at the prayer of the prophet Habakkuk as he besought the Lord for a revival in the midst of the years. He seems to catch a vision of the trembling, smoking mountain when God came down on Sinai. He visualizes His glory as His brightness shines forth, and adds, "There was the hiding of his power." Power that would drive the pestilence from before Him, as burning coals went forth at His feet; power to drive asunder the nations; power to scatter the everlasting mountains and to bow down the perpetual hills. Then he remembers that God's ways are everlasting; with Him is no variableness, neither shadow of turning. Can we see something of that vision, and yet know also that there is the "hiding of his power"? We've not discovered it all. Something of His great eternal majesty and might is still a secret -hidden-beyond us.

Again we ponder the words, "Not by might, nor by power," and we think of earthly things: learning, eloquence, organizations, committees, ways and means, man's best plans and greatest strength; yet not in these things is our help, nor the solution to our deepest problems. Success comes "by my Spirit, saith the Lord"! Is this not the secret that is hidden from the wise and revealed to babes by means of the unseen channel of prayer? This power, appropriated by faith, is mighty through God to the pulling down of the strongholds of the enemy. Oh, that the eyes of our understanding may be enlightened to know what is the exceeding greatness of His power to us who believe; and that, having caught the vision, we might tarry in

THESE ARE DAYS OF AN OUTSTANDING visitation of God's power and fulfillment of His Word in the Dominican Republic. Evangelist David Garcia is the man God is using in this great open-air meeting. Nearly all of the Evangelical churches have united to insure the success of the campaign. Even one or two groups that are usually slow to co-operate with this type of open-air evangelism, have entered in wholeheartedly and are being greatly blessed as they witness the miracle-working power of God.

From the first night the crowds have numbered in the thousands and the people have been "drinking in" the Word of God. I was thrilled as I sat on the platform and saw people in the audience strangers to the Gospel before—now weeping and responding to the invitation. Thus far in the ten night services well over three thousand raised their hands accepting Christ as Saviour.

We have seen many sick bodies healed. The first night Brother Garcia asked those who were deaf in one ear to come to the platform. Seven came. He prayed for them individually and every one of them said he was healed. On succeeding nights many testified of tumors melting away and pains leaving their bodies. One man of 55, who had used crutches for thirty years due to paralysis, laid them down and walked. An elderly woman testified that God had removed cataracts from her eyes and restored her eyesight. A man in his sixties testified that 25 years ago he received a blow on his head leaving him deaf but that God has healed him instantly. These are just a few of the many remarkable healings that have taken place.

One of the most remarkable things about the meeting is the wide acceptance and approval by the majority of the people in the city. These people are not of the same religious background as we evangelicals and often have very strong prejudices. Yesterday I gave a young fellow a ride in my car and in the course of conversation I asked him what he thought of the revival meeting. He said, "I have been raised in a different religion than this but I think this meeting is the most wonderful thing that has ever come to this city. I have been a very wicked young man, but at the meeting the other night I repented of my sins and Christ has changed my life." Praise God! Here is a miracle of a transformed life!

#### DAVID ANOINTED KING-1 Samuel 16:1-13

"And the Lord said, Arise, anoint him: for this is he" (v. 12).

Two wonderful truths are highlighted in the story of the anointing of the boy David by the aged prophet Samuel.

God guides His servants. From a child, Samuel was accustomed to hear the voice of God and to obey it. He served Israel during a difficult period, yet through all the troublous events of those days Samuel never lost his spiritual sense of direction. Now he received divine instructions to anoint a new king. Seven of Jesse's sons passed before him one by one, but the spiritual monitor in Samuel's heart instructed him to reject them all. Finally David the shepherd lad was brought before him, and the unfailing guidance of God let the old prophet know, "This is he." God finds His man. David was with the sheep when God's

God finds His man. David was with the sheep when God's messenger came to his father's house. His father and brothers did not consider that he was of sufficient importance to meet the prophet. Men overlooked him, and unfavorable circumstances hid him among the brush of the hills. Yet God knew where His chosen vessel was. Neither untoward circumstances nor indifferent humanity could keep God from finding His man. David was brought forward, and God said, "This is he." Let us not be discouraged, even though difficulties have apparently blocked the way for us to carry out God's will. God knows where we are, and at the right moment His door of service will be opened to us.

DAVID AT SAUL'S COURT-1 Samuel 16:14-23

David was called to Saul's court to provide music for the king. We too have been called to the court of our King, to "enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise." #### IMPORTANCE OF THE INNER LIFE-Mark 7:14-23

#### KNOWN BY THE FRUITS-Matthew 7:15-23

## **Pentecostal Power**

### When Troubled With a Spiritual "Power Failure," It's Time to Start Looking for a "Short Circuit."

THAT MAN OF GOD AND LOVER OF souls, James Caughey, tells, in one of his books, how he was invited out to tea one evening; and though there was nothing harmful in the talk of the hour, yet when he went into the meeting that night, his soul was like a loosely strung bow. He couldn't shoot the King's arrows into the heart of the King's enemies, for he had no power. It had been lost at the tea table.

I knew a preacher once who let all his spiritual power leak out, until he was as dry as an old bone when he got into the meeting. It was in this way. We had to ride three miles in a street car to get to the meeting, and all the way he was talking about things that had no bearing upon the coming meeting. There was nothing wrong or trifling said, but it was not to the point; it turned his mind from God and the souls he was soon to face and plead with to be reconciled to Him; and the result was that, instead of going before the people clothed with power, he went stripped of power.

I remember the meeting well. His prayer was good, but there was no power in it. It was words, words, words! The Bible-reading and sermon were good. He said many true and excellent things, but there was no power in them. The Christians looked indifferent, the sinners looked careless and sleepy, and altogether the meeting was a dull affair.

Now, the preacher was not backslidden; he had a good experience. Nor was he dull and stupid; on the contrary, he was one of the brightest, keenest ministers I knew. The trouble was that, instead of keeping quiet and communing with God in his own heart on that street car until his soul was ablaze with faith, and hope, and love, and holy expectation, he had wasted his power in useless talk.

There are many ways of letting power leak away. I knew a Christian who came to church very early every evening, and instead of praying and getting his soul keyed up to a high pitch of faith and love, he spent the time playing soft, dreamy music on his violin; and though faithfully, lovingly warned, he continued that practice till he openly backslid.

I have known men whose power leaked out through a joke. They believed in having things go with a swing and so they told funny stories and played the clown to make things lively. And things were lively, but it was not with divine life. It was the liveliness of mere animal spirits, and not of the Holy Spirit. I do not mean by this that a man who is filled with the power of the Spirit will never make men laugh. He will. He may say very funny things. But he will not be doing it just to have a good time. It will come naturally; it will not be "dragged in on all fours." It will be done in the fear of God, and not in a spirit of lightness and jesting.

The man who wants power just when it is most needed, must walk with God. He must be a friend of God. He must keep the way always open between his heart and God. God will be the Friend of such a man, and will bless him and honor him. God will tell him His secrets; He will show him how to get at the hearts of men. Such a man must keep constant watch over his mouth and his heart. He who wants a meeting of life and power should remember that there is no substitute for the Holy Ghost, He is life. He is power. And if He is sought in earnest, faithful prayer, He will come; and when He comes, the little meeting will be mighty in its results.

Pentecostal power should be earnestly sought, in secret prayer. Jesus said: "When thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly." He will do it; bless His holy name!

I know of a man who, if possible, gets alone with God for an hour before every meeting; and when he speaks, it is with power and demonstration of the Spirit. "Delight thyself in the Lord," said

"Delight thyself in the Lord," said the Psalmist. Oh, how happy is that man who finds God to be his delight; who is never lonely, because he knows God, talks with God, delights in God; who feels how lovable God is, and gives himself up to loving, serving, trusting God with all his heart!

Brother, "Quench not the Spirit," and He will lead you to thus know and love God; and God will make you the instrument of His own power.

THE ALTAR, or the prayer room, at the close of the preaching. Critics have remarked, "I enjoy the singing and the preaching, but, oh, those altar services!" But if there is any one thing that has done more than others to make the Pentecostal Movement an aggressive tide of spiritual fervor, evangelistic zeal, and missionary vision, we believe it is the personal meeting with God which has taken place at these sacred altars of consecration. We admit that much good preaching is being done in other churches, but we fear that too often the good "sales talk" has not been followed with "taking the order." Many meetings that should end with the happy cries of newborn "babes in Christ" end instead with a "spiritual abortion" because the preacher pronounces the benediction and does not press for personal decisions.

Some preachers may say, "We discontinued our altar services because they had degenerated into a formal ritual." Perhaps the song service, special music, or preaching has degenerated, too, but those features of the meeting have not been discontinued. We seem to be quite well agreed that these are entirely acceptable forms of worship. Why discriminate against the altar services? While singing, preaching, and praying may all be done mechanically, it must be admitted that they may also become very effective steppingstones to true worship. So it becomes our sacred duty to preserve in our Pentecostal altar services the proven elements of sincerity, determination, consecration, victory and praise which they have had, and are intended to have. Brethren, let us KEEP MOV-ING TO THE ALTAR!

#### MOVED WITH COMPASSION

Genuinely Spirit-baptized people will manifest the spirit of Christ, of which they are made partakers. And we read of Him, that "when He saw the multitudes, He was MOVED WITH COM-PASSION on them...."

The apostle Paul declared, "For whether we be beside ourselves, it is to God: or whether we be sober, it is for your cause. For the love of Christ CON-STRAINETH us (2 Cor. 5:13-14). Doctor Saunders interprets the full content of this rich expression thus: "The love of Christ overmasters me, lifts me up, CROWDS ME ON."

It is quite unthinkable that one could be truly moved unto worship to God, and moved upon by the Spirit, without being moved toward lost men in pity, love and concern.

Moreover, this compassion is far more than a cheap, outward sympathy. It is a love which compels us to unselfishly pour out our time, talent, life, service, and substance. It has been well said, "You may give without loving; but you cannot love without giving!"

MOVING OUT WITH THE MESSAGE

A remarkable characteristic of the Pentecostal Movement is to be found in the unprecedented numbers of young people who are offering their lives for fulltime Christian service, at home and abroad. In an age when the world affords many lucrative opportunities, and other denominations find difficulty in filling their pulpits, the Pentecostal churches abound with volunteers for gospel work. It is interesting to note, too, how the Pentecostal workers are out in the front lines of evangelistic fervor and missionary zeal. For they earnestly believe they must MOVE OUT from their Jerusalem unto "the uttermost part of the earth," as well as MOVE ABOUT "from house to house" and to the hospitals, jails, and street corners of their local communities.

There is plenty of action (or movement) in witnessing, winning, and working in the Master's vineyard.

#### MOVING ON WITH GOD

The grand old hymn declares, "Like a mighty army, MOVES the church of God!" To be sure, the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a throbbing, marching, mobile unit, "going forth to war!" And one sturdy segment of it is the oftcriticized legion of the Pentecostal Movement, shouldering over-average responsibilities and often setting the pace.

In these days of crisis and conflict, battling demon forces of atheism, communism, false religion and formality, what a challenge we face to KEEP MOVING ON until our final victory is won! This is no time to slacken our pace, relinquish our goals, or relax our consecration. We cannot rest on the shining laurels of the past; nor can we indulge the subtle temptations of the present; and we will not fear the awful possibilities of the atomic future. Continually "looking unto Jesus," the great "Captain of our Salvation," we must MOVE ONWARD to the completion of our God-given assignment, and our eternal reward!

One and all, let us remember that, as individuals, churches, or groups, we are a part of the great world program of the Infinite God! "His truth is marching on!" And let us conscientiously beware lest we be sidetracked to any petty plans or ambitions of our own. Whenever we MOVE in this bustling age, may we be sure that we are MOVING ALONG WITH GOD!

#### OUR MIGHTY WEAPONS

What is the ammunition provided by God for our warfare? This is best answered by studying the work and methods of the Lord Jesus Himself. Watch Him in the secret place of prayer. Watch His knowledge of the Scripture. Watch His superb "gunnery" using the Word of God as His ammunition. At the very outset of His ministry He was found with the Word in His hand, "as His custom was," and this lifts the veil from those years of obscurity, showing that He was filling His heart with the Scripture. "For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds" (2 Cor. 10:4).—Anonymous.

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He was a man of distinction; for his name has gone down in history alongside that of the greatest of preachers—the apostle Paul.

Churches, pastors, and parents have a stake in our present-day "Silas." He is the Bible school graduate, ready and anxious to do service for the Lord. In our Assemblies of God ranks there are about five hundred ready for service as this school year comes to a close.

Look at a few sidelights on Silas, the apostle Paul's right-hand man! He prays, he sings, he preaches, and he is a faithful servant of Christ.

I

"... and Silas prayed" (Acts 16:25). To pray with Paul in the Philippian jail was a heroic privilege. Silas the apprentice learned to pray as he labored for the Lord. He discovered that prayer brings. power to those who are persecuted for the gospel's sake. No story in all the drama of Missions is more fascinating than this. The beating, the prison, the stocks yielding gloriously! A jailer is saved, and a church established as a result of this apostolic ministry! What modern missionary would hesitate to take a beating and a night in jail to establish a new church like the one at Philippi?

Silas prayed. He learned to pray from his tutor and co-worker, the apostle Paul. Who could better teach the principles and power of prayer than Paul, the pioneer preacher? He knew the rigors of "preaching where Christ is not named."

#### II

"... and Silas sang." He sang a duet with the apostle Paul. What song did they sing? No doubt it was a paean of praise for the privilege of serving the Lord. They rejoiced that they were counted worthy to suffer for His name.

A good song requires harmony. Pioneer workers above all others need the blessing of working together harmoniously. The apprentice and the apostle harmonized together and their song brought an earthquake! Jesus said, "If two...agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask ... it shall be done." What power there is in unity!

In song there is faith. Most people gripe when in trouble, but this young man was learning to rejoice when the way seemed hard. He was learning the Christian way to meet difficulty. What a school! Silas was in the school of suffering—a school of higher learning in Christ—and he was making top grades!

Christ—and he was making top grades! Let the modern "Silas" take note of the behavior of this assistant to the apostle Paul. He prayed and sang in tune with his superior. He submitted to Paul's leadership. He had that spirit of humility which is a prerequisite to all courses in the advanced school of Christian ministry!

#### III

"... and Silas preached" (2 Cor. 1:19). It is not far from Philippi to Corinth. At Philippi he sang—at Corinth he preached. When one has learned to pray, and to sing, it is but a step farther to the ministry of preaching. Silas may have wanted to preach earlier; but the record shows that he prayed, and sang —and then preached!

Apprenticeship implies temporary training. After the apprenticeship came an apostolic ministry. Silas preached the same gospel as his teacher, the apostle Paul. No doubt he used the same methods. It is only logical to conclude, therefore, that he had the same results. Paul never would have entrusted the care of the churches to a mere apprentice. The workers whom he took with him on his journeys had to prove themselves, by practical ministry under his training, before he entrusted them with such a noble task.

#### IV

"...and Silas was faithful" (1 Peter 5:12). A good apprentice must be faithful. Silas was so devoted to the work of the Lord that his faithfulness was recorded in sacred history. Perhaps he was a young man endowed from the beginning with a faithful spirit; or his faithfulness may have been inspired by the training and example of his beloved mentor—the apostle Paul.

Paul was rewarded for taking companions on his missionary tours. He rarely traveled alone in gospel ministry. Some-

times it was Silas, or John Mark, who went with him. At other times it was Barnabas, Luke, or Timothy. All of these had the distinction of laboring with the great apostle. Several purposes were achieved by this arrangement. The younger learned from the older. The apostle's ministry was multiplied. Is there any better way to learn the business of gospel pioneering than for the second generation to join forces with the first? Timothy, for example, probably had much theory, as do graduate students of theology today, but to be an apprentice adds another dimension to learning. It is learning at its best. Jesus likewise trained apprentices. "He went throughout every city and village preaching ... and the twelve were with Him."

Paul found it profitable to have an apprentice for a companion in his travels. Who knows what difficulty he may have been spared by having these young men to help him?

Furthermore, the churches derived benefit from this multiplying of preachers. Paul was able, after establishing a new church, to leave the apprentice behind to take charge of it while he himself went on to a new mission field. Thus the church enjoyed a continuation of the ministry and spirit of the apostle even after he had departed.

If the work of the church is to have all the growth the Lord intended, there must be a joining together of the hands of senior and junior Christian workers in evangelizing the unchurched masses of modern humanity.
