On to the Summit!

In the fover of one of our Bible Schools there used to hang an Honor List of graduates who had become missionaries. Over the list in large gold letters was this excellent motto: "Anywhere Only Onward."

Where could we find a better motto for our own personal lives? It expresses the spirit of the apostle Paul, who said, "I press toward the mark for the prize." Christ Jesus is the Prize. Intimate fellowship with Him is the summit of all Christian experience. For that blessed reward Paul was willing to go anywhere, do anything, be anything-or nothing. He was willing to toil against any odds, willing to endure any hardships, if only he could know that each day and each experience was carrying him onward and upward toward that glorious goal.

The sacrifices men will make for earthly glory often put us Christians to shame. Have you read the account of the conquest of Mount Everest? For thirty-two years that rocky bastion astride the border of Tibet and Nepal defied the world's best mountaineers. Strong men collapsed before they could reach its 29,002-foot summit. One expedition after another pressed the attack on Everest to the uttermost limits of human endurance, only to fall back defeated. At least sixteen men lost their lives on the forbidding slopes.

Finally a British expedition led by Brigadier John Hunt made the attempt. They spent months in preparation. They climbed the Alps for practice. They assembled the ablest men, the finest equipment, the best supplies. At length they began the ascent which Hunt called "the epitome of adventure and high endeavor." They faced the biting cold which at such altitudes puts a terrific strain on the parched lungs and respiratory passages. They braved the threat of frostbite, the hazard of avalanches, the danger of falling into chasms hidden by snow, as day by day they pressed toward the peak. Like men of iron they laughed at discomfort, joked about fatigue, ignored the piercing winds that chill to the bone. Higher and higher they climbed by day, and camped by night, until finally two weary men, Hillary and Tenzing, scaled the peak itself. The Australian beekeeper and the Nepalese-born Sherpa stood triumphant on top of the world, and threw their arms around each other in speechless joy as they realized they had done what no man had ever done before.

At the peak of Everest, Hillary planted a little cross and Tenzing buried some little gifts to his heathen gods. Later, after the victorious descent, a British Pentecostal missionary living near Tenzing's house told him of the greater ascent that is possible to those who follow the Lord Jesus Christ. The missionary gave the famous Sherpa a Bible and, since he cannot read, urged him to let his children read it to him.

"Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in His holy place? He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully. He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation" (Psalm 24:3-5). It takes courage and character to climb the spiritual heights. Only those with clean hands and a pure heart are strong enough to overcome all obstacles and reach the shining summit. There is hardness to be endured; there are sacrifices to be made; but if men will endure hardness for worldly fame -if Robert Peary would risk his life to discover the North Pole, if Richard Byrd would pay the price to explore the South Pole, if Charles Lindbergh would risk his all to conquer the Atlantic airlanes-how much more should we be willing to toil and suffer, that we might win Christ!

On the grave of a Swiss guide was this eloquent epitaph: "He died climbing." Let us be spiritual climbers.

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1956 and Our Responsibilities

NE NEED NOT BE GIFTED WITH UNusual prophetic insight to know that right now this world is standing on the threshold of one of the most momentous years in history. Notwithstanding the economic boom that has reached record levels, the fact remains that beneath all the glitter and tinsel lies a restless and weary world. Material benefits have not erased the shadow of war, the fear of future hardships, and the gross moral inequities that fill the lives of multitudes. It is still an age that reeks with hypocrisy, degeneration, insincerity, and moral shame. The greatest Prophet of all spoke truly when He said that this age would parallel Noah's day.

In a very strong sense, we Pentecostal people are not a party to the world's chaos. But if we are careless, we shall find ourselves victims of the crosscurrents which characterize our times. Consequently, at this season when retrospect and resolution are the vogue, we shall do well to remind ourselves of the purpose of our existence in God's plan, and to take the necessary steps to conform to God's will. God proposes to work out His purposes in this day through those who are filled with His Spirit. The Pentecostal revival is God's instrument to convey supernaturally to this age a revelation of His mercy and power. The supernatural element is fundamental, not incidental; it is elementary, not supplementary. Little or nothing can be accomplished apart from the divine enduement, for we know assuredly that it is "not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts."

It is obvious that we must have a message that is supernatural. Christ alone must be advocated as the answer to the sinner's need. Preachers and laymen alike are charged with the responsibility of exalting Him as the only answer to men's sin. Human nature is prone to gloat over its capabilities. Men would justify themselves by adding their good works to God's remedy for sin. But the remedy is provided through Christ on the Cross. It is not the Cross plus our good works, nor the Cross plus our moral excellencies, nor the Cross plus our pious ceremonies; it is the Cross and the Cross alone by which we are justified in God's sight. God forbid that we should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.

This age, therefore, must have another glimpse of the thorn-crowned Lamb of God. No encouragement whatsoever can be given to the idea that corrupt human nature can supplement the blood of Christ and assist God in salvaging the wreckage of our lives. The blood of Christ provides the only method of salvation-the need for this message should drive us to our knees in quest for power from God to proclaim it adequately. Witnessing to this gospel in the power of the Holy Spirit will help us fulfill our obligation to this age. Only thus can we please God, honor the Blood, and save those that hear us. To proclaim the message of salvation in the power of the Spirit-surely this is a prime reason for our existence.

In view of the message for which we are responsible, we will do well to consider our consecration. Here again the power of our spiritual experience is shown. To be truly dedicated to God is impossible apart from the moving of God's Spirit in our lives. Real consecration is not formal and ceremonious. The truly consecrated person gives God a "mortgage" on all his attitudes, inclinations, motives, purposes, and will. He no longer belongs to himself, for God's

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heir trespasses, neither will your Father torgive your trespasses" (Matthew 6:15).

The Essence of Rightness

In the stinging philippic which Christ hurled at the Pharisees toward the close of His ministry, there shines a particularly beautiful nugget of truth. In the serenity of the storm of His wrath (only Christ can be serene in a storm) He gave us a summary of truth-relative truth-not found elsewhere in comparable form (except when he answered the question, "Which is the greatest commandment?"). Here He roundly denounced the "scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites," saying, "Ye pay tithes of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone" (Matthew 23:23). Luke records it: "But woe unto you, Pharisees! for ye tithe mint and rue and all manner of herbs, and pass over judgment and the love of God: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone" (Luke 11:42).

Here is the essence of rightness before God: Judgment, mercy, faith, the love of God, and the paying of tithes. The Lord said that the first four of these were the weightier matters of the law. (The fact that they were found in the Old Testament law, to me, is significant and intriguing.) Christ set them forth for all time as the most important matters of God's law. The fact, too, that the devil had allowed the Pharisees to pay tithes of all manner of things (not just cash, notice) but had inveigled them into omitting these "weightier" matters is further evidence of the relative importance of these qualities and deeds.

Both Matthew and Luke listed "judgment" as the first of these all-important things. The reason is not that it is based on Old Testament teaching. Judgment is clustered with faith, mercy and the love of God. God is eternally a God of judgment. "But if ye forgive not men

"Speak not evil one of another, breth-(James 4:11) and "Let none of ren" you imagine evil in your hearts against his neighbour" (Zechariah 8:17). These are GOD'S commandments. "He that hath my commandments and keepeth them, he it is that loveth me," Jesus said. (John 14:21). There are over 400 commandments in the New Testament, for the breaking of which there is judgment! Only Christ's blood covers sin, and only when that sin is confessed and His blood's covering is requested is sin forgiven. The judgment seat of Christ before which we all must stand is indeed, as Paul says, a terrible thought (2 Corinthians 5:10, 11). It ranks high in Christ's estimation.

From the mount of Sinai let us pass rapidly to the mount of Calvary. Both mounts are in the plan of God. So heavy is this last mountain with blessing that it takes three words for even Christ to summarize it: the love of God, mercy and faith. These qualities are indeed mountain high, and rival each other in their splendor. Yet, rather, they partake of each other's splendor. God loves men as much as He hates sin. If we will but disassociate ourselves from sin, and take His forgiveness and His cleansing-which are proffered lavishly and freely-we will become the objects of a love such as this world has never seen. "If ve being evil know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask Him" (Matthew 7:11). "Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear him" (Psalm 103:13).

God is stupendous in His generosity, His power, and His faithfulness. Too many stars in the heavens? Too much sand on the seashore? Too many trees on the mountains? Too much grass on the prairie? Or too much water in the sea? Possibly so, but not enough to illustrate the abundant, lavish love and mercy of our God. The love of God, His mercy and His faith (His faith given to be within us the means by which we receive a heaven full of blessings in our lives) are as a mighty ocean. Does one

incoming wave push you over? Look out, here comes another one! And another, and another. You will just have to surrender to God or get out of His way. He will flow over you forever with His love and mercy!

How puny and limited is man's love for his loved ones. Man is utterly helpless in the face of danger, sickness and death. Our desire to help is great but our ability to help is so small. But not so with Him! The winds and the waves stand still at His command. Armies freeze with fear and fall in their tracks! Lions fail to bite or tear when He so orders, and even death gives up its prey when He calls. All this power He uses on behalf of His loved ones. "My God shall supply all your need, according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19). He is "able to do exceeding abundantly above all we ask or think" (Ephesians 3:20). "No good thing will He withhold from them that walk uprightly" (Psalm 84:11).

And does He tire of loving? Does He forget us? "Can a woman forget her sucking child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee," the Lord says (Isaiah 49:15). "If ye can break my covenant of the day, and my covenant of the night, and that there should not be day and night in their season; then may also my covenant be broken with David my servant" (Jer. 33:20, 21). He will keep His covenant with all of His children. "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness" (Lamentations 3:22, 23). As the ceaseless tide of the oceans, the endless flowing of the rivers, and the eternal ritual of the seasons, so are the faithful attentions of our God to HIs children.

What about the tithes? Yes, they ought to be paid. Do not leave them undone. What about tobacco or cosmetics? We certainly must be careful not to be identified with the world by using things like these. But let them not be empty shibboleths or mere tribal taboos. They ought to be accompanied with the weightier matters of our faith: real heart conversion, the practice of miraculous divine healing in all our churches and our homes, the mighty baptism in the Holy Spirit as experienced on the day of Pentecost, the clear shining personal hope of the soon coming of our Lord and Master. And don't forget the weightier matters: Judgment, the love of God, mercy and faith. All these ve ought to do and not to leave the other undone.

TIME IN THE HANDS OF MAN

A New Year Message by BARTLETT PETERSON,

N A WORLD OF CHALLENGES DARE WE fumble the greatest? Among the greatest challenges issued by Christ is the necessity of putting first things first. "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matt. 6:33).

Our text is an exhortation to concern ourselves but little with temporal things, followed by a command to put eternal things first.

Whether one debated about paying tribute to Caesar, occupied himself mending nets, tarried to bury the dead, or came to draw water at Jacob's well, Jesus in His own inimitable way urged him to put first things first.

The priceless commodity called TIME is of essence in all that we do and demands priority in our every consideration!

THE CHALLENGE OF THE RIGHT USAGE OF TIME

Frequent admonitions in the Scriptures deal with the importance of right usage

of time. "See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil" (Eph. 5:15, 16). "I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day; the night cometh, when no man can work" (John 9:14). "Now is the accepted time" (2 Cor. 6:2).

We do well to redeem the time by applying it first to the most important duties. To put it plainly in the negative: don't do needless and useless things, when needful and useful things can be done. All Christians should decide quickly which are the most important things, and do them with all their might.

Over the most priceless commodity which God made, He has set man as steward. To be a steward of time is a more honorable and meticulous task than to be a steward of earthly wealth.

We do not have the privilege of rationing out "threescore and ten" years at once, for only a moment at a time is given to us! Even the act of rightly dividing our time is done with borrowed breath.

Neglect is the sin most easily committed. Neglect of time is opportunity lost, and opportunity lost is a regretable and irreparable tragedy. The seriousness of neglect is evidenced by the question in Hebrews 2:3, "How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?" This is the more serious when it is noted that this indicting question was addressed to Christians.

Over the three doors of the Cathedral of Milan have been placed appropriate inscriptions. Arranged amid sculptured roses over one door is, "All that which pleases us is but for a moment." Around a sculptured cross over another door is, "All that which troubles us is but for a moment." Over the central door is the statement of cold, logical fact, "That only is important which is eternal."

"Time" is but a short word compared

to "Eternity;" but each "jot and tittle" is invaluable, for the last letter of time becomes the first letter of eternity!

THE CHALLENGE OF FIRST CLAIM ON OUR TIME

There can be no prior claim! Our personal devotion to God must have first claim. Ample commentary on this truth is the experience of Jesus in the home of Mary and Martha. All who are wise will also choose "that good part which shall not be taken away." As busy Christians we need to pray that God will save us from becoming more occupied with the Lord's work than with the Lord Himself.

Beautifully illustrative of the import of time for worship is the story of Simeon, recorded in Luke 2: "And, behold, there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon; and the same man was just and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel: and the Holy Ghost was upon him. And it was revealed unto

> him by the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death, before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And he came by the spirit into the temple: and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him after the custom of the law, then took he him up in his arms, and blessed God, and said, Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word: for mine eyes have seen thy salvation."

> For the purpose of seeing this one supremely sublime moment he had focused a lifetime. He had waited "for the consolation of Israel," and as a reward it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit "that he should not see death, before he had seen the Lord's Christ." He was present in the Lord's house when the Lord's Christ was brought in! The satisfaction of his one consuming desire was revealed in words of thanksgiving. If the privilege of seeing the Son of God in

infant form for a moment was worth a lifetime of faithful waiting, how shall we measure the worth of reigning with the glorified King eternally?

THE CHALLENGE OF FIRST PLACE FOR GOD'S WORK

In consideration of the great amount of work to be done, and the comparative brevity of time, Jesus said, "I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: for the night cometh when no man can work."

It has been wisely suggested that we should "plan our work and work our plan." In these busy days it is imperative that we plan well. We must be certain that God's work has first place over our own interests. Having planned well, let us be willing to go the "second mile" in service for our Lord. Let us emulate the example of Paul and Silas while in prison. At the end of a long and arduous day, though mistreated and imprisoned, they welcomed the opportunity of conducting an additional service.

If it is constantly kept in mind that we are His witnesses, we will eagerly plan and look for every opportunity to discharge our supreme duty. Time is limited. There is time to do only what really needs to be done. Deathbed regrets can be prevented by putting first things first.

Becoming collectors of souvenirs and various items is a popular fad. Would it not be more profitable to become collectors of priceless, passing moments? Joining those straying, single jewels on a chain of purpose would make one more than wealthy! Search diligently, O child of God, lest any fragment of your time be lost, for these determine your eternal destiny. The question is not what we intend to do with years, or with a lifetime, but what are we doing now with these present moments? What we do with these will determine what we do with our lifetime.

The right use of rescued fragments of time between his many duties as a schoolmaster enabled Salmon P. Chase to become Chief Justice. Redeemed moments otherwise going to waste between shoe repair jobs paved the way for Henry Wilson to become Vice-President of the United States. James A. Garfield collected fragments of idle time between canal boats and became President.

In the days before time-pieces, it is said that King Alfred used three candles with which to measure a day. Each candle lasted eight hours, so that when the third had burned down the entire day was spent. The King's candles were wax; ours are opportunities!

When Alexander the Great laid siege to a city, it was his custom to surround the walls and build a fire at the gate. A message was sent to warn the inhabitants that they could surrender as long as the light of the fire shone. When the fire had burned down, and the light had gone out, it would be too late, and destruction and death would result.

Flickering candles still glow, and embers still burn. Every moment an opportunity passes which can never be recalled. Let us not become laggards who some day hope to quicken our pace. Upon this present moment hinge all our valuable opportunities.

Let conscience become the faithful gleaner which follows rushing, busy hours to gather precious moments which fall in waste unnoticed.

Appoint your awakened, consecrated conscience now as your timekeeper. At the beginning of another year let us solemnly vow, by God's grace, to "seek ...first the kingdom of God and His righteousness."

"We were so glad when we saw your light tonight," I told him.

"Yes, and that is another strange thing," he said. "I haven't been out to my barn at night for seven years, but tonight it came to me with great force that I must go out to my barn.

"God must have sent me out in the

storm to save your lives," he said in an awed voice. Our hearts were filled with praise for His loving care and protection.

They made us comfortable for the night, and when morning came we found that the farmer's little son had an incurable disease, or so the doctors had told them. We prayed that God would graciously recompense this kind farmer by healing his little boy, and the child was completely healed.

The next day we found our way back to the main road from which we had strayed. Our hearts were filled with gratitude to God for the light on the hill that saved our lives. Let us keep our light shining brightly for Christ. Who knows at what hour it may be seen by someone groping in spiritual darkness, who may eternally thank God for the light that saved his soul!

The Middle East is a spot marked at present by political tension. Pray that a special blessing may rest upon our missionaries and national workers there, so that God's work shall continue unhindered.

Missionary replacements are needed in Upper Volta. A number of Bible Schools in Africa need additional buildings. Pray that funds will be received to meet both of these needs.

Pray that the government of India may act favorably regarding various visa applications now pending. Pray also for the success of an extended evangelistic campaign in Bombay. The purpose of this effort is to establish a church there.

Pray for an increased circulation of all our publications so that we may reach an ever-widening circle with our Pentecostal message. There is a need for qualified writers to be raised up among our people. Pray that many young people will hear God's call to this important ministry.

The editor and staff of THE PENTE-COSTAL EVANGEL request a special interest in your prayers as we take an important step of faith. We are enlarging the magazine and trusting God to make it a mightier "voice" for the Full Gospel than ever.

HELLO, 1956!

THERE IS A TERRIBLE INEXORABLENESS about the way the past is left behind us, never to be recovered. "If only I had my life to live over again," is a common lament—but this never materializes. The past is gone forever—lost opportunities will never come again, and regrets are futile. A record has been made that nothing can erase.

As each day slips away into the past, the curtain of finality falls; and nothing is "off the record." The Bible declares that "every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment" (Matthew 12:36). Though the past can never be lived again, we will be faced with its record in the judgment. Even the things we have hidden from others will be revealed then, for "in that day God shall judge the SECRETS of men by Jesus Christ" (Romans 2:16).

What has your record been for the year just passed? How will it stand in the day of judgment? Will the year of 1955 when weighed in the scales, find you wanting? And will 1956 bear the same fruit? Will your life, year by year, but add to the totality of your condemnation, so that you will stand before God weighted down by a mountain of guilt?

Are you even now a lost soul, and will all your succeeding years but intensify the hopelessness of your condition? Only Christ can save you. Only He is able to obliterate your guilt and present you faultless before God, for that is the work of Christ. He poured out His precious blood that the vilest sinner may be clean.

Yes, "the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). Notice, it cleanses from all sin. Believe it. Confess it. Plead the Blood now before God, as an offering for your sin, and you shall be saved. The blood of Jesus has power to blot out sin and make you whiter than snow.

What can the new year bring to you but further evidence that you are a sinner? What can it do but emphasize your



need of a way of escape from condemnation?

I believe that in the wild hilarity of New Year's Eve celebrations men are expressing a deep psychological impulse stemming from the belief that a new year represents a new start. Their gaiety reflects the relief they feel because they have been given a new chance. But each clean page of the year seems destined to have those unsightly and unpremeditated blots and corrections that arise front mistakes. The end of each year represents a psychological cycle—depression as we contemplate our failures of the past, and renewal of hope as we regard new opportunities.

Man's greatest need, in the monotonous cycle of time with its failure and hope, hope and failure, is the consolation of having peace with God. Nothing can alter the fact that we are sinners and are predisposed to a sinful, shameful record—that is, nothing or no one but God. He Himself has provided a cure for a sinful heart, oppressed by sin and longing for righteousness. God has provided a gift of righteousness through His Son, Jesus Christ.

If there is one thing that this world wants more than any other, it is peace. Christ has made peace for us "through the blood of his cross" (Colossians 1:20). Not Geneva, nor New York, but Calvary is the place where peace was made. Let men make their peace with God, and peace will reign in their midst. I am dogmatic about this. Hope for the new year lies only in the Lord Jesus Christ. He threw Himself across the great gulf that separated sinful men from a sinless God and thus became a Bridge from time to eternity. OUR HEARTS WERE STIRRED AS WE READ reports of the Boys' Industrial School at Shencottah, Travancore, India, where our missionary, Robert W. Edwards, labors for the Lord. The future results of this work among Indian boys cannot be estimated, but it will be well worth all the labor that is being put into the School now.

The boys of the Industrial School wanted to help in a missionary offering given by the young people and the Sunday School of the Kanakkapillai Valasai Assembly. This was the first missionary offering for these young people. The purpose was to help some needy missionary in Korea, particularly someone looking after orphans whose fathers were killed for their testimony during the war.

So they gave sacrifically. One meat meal a week is all the boys of the School receive—it is the Sunday noon meal. But so exercised were they about the missionary need that they missed the meal entirely, in order to have a missionary offering. In this way they were able to have a substantial part in the offering of \$13.00 given by the young people of the Assembly.

The Young People's Society did their part in sacrificial giving as well. They had been saving their money for six months in order to have an outing together, but they gave all of these savings. Even the little children from the village gave the quarter annas they sometimes get for treats. Such sacrificial giving undoubtedly pleases our Lord who looks so tenderly upon the little ones, and we know the hearts of these youngsters must have been gladdened because of what they had done for Jesus.

To get back to the Industrial School, it is gratifying to note the favor it is receiving. Not long ago the Director of Education for Madras Presidency visited the School. As he stood on the train steps, covered with garlands, he shouted to the hundreds of people who had come to see him off, "I have read of boys building their own schools in America, but never thought to see one in India. Edwards [our missionary] has put it in India. You should go and see the School that the boys have built and are building."

This speech promoted good favor among the people, some of whom had formerly shunned the work. And the School has been the means of opening doors and hearts in many villages where there was no access before.

The lives of the boys are changed as they come under the influence of the gospel. Take, for instance, one of the boys who lived near the School. He had completed what education he could get, and in order to continue would have had to walk five miles to another school. This was too much for him and he refused to attend. He became a companion of the wicked men of the village, and was a problem to himself and everyone around him. Then he came to the Industrial School. What a change! Now he is trustworthy and able to work well at masonry, blacksmithing, carpentry or gardening. Best of all, he has accepted Christ and loves his Saviour. His name means "Good Character" and he promises to be a strong pillar in the church.

Most of the work of Robert Edwards has been in the villages among the poor and needy where he felt the Lord would have him labor. But a thriving work is now being conducted by an Indian pastor in one of the largest cities in his section. It is hoped this work will soon be self-supporting. Because the rent of the premises, in which the services are held, is high, it is hoped that property can be purchased. In about a year a suitable building can be bought for about \$2,000. A plan has been set up whereby those interested can buy "shares" in the project for \$50 each. The church promises to be a substantial, responsible work for God. Many fine, educated men attended the meetings held there by Brother Edwards, the missionary, and said they were seeking reality. In turn they are now taking the gospel to the surrounding villages.

And so the missionary work goes on and the name of Jesus Christ is exalted among the heathen. Souls are won and they are then trained to further the work of the Lord by their testimonies and preaching. Our hearts are lifted in praise to God for calling out and equipping men and women who are willing to sacrifice in order that the Light of the World may shine in the habitations of darkness.

to the consternation of us all, he fell on his back. I rushed to his side; felt his wrist quickly—no pulse! I put my cheek to his nose and mouth—no breath!

I called for the Mossé elders to come quickly and asked the entire audience to kneel in prayer. What a volume of concentrated prayer arose! The elders and I gathered about the prostrate form. I could feel the cold, clammy death sweat on Saaga's head but we all travailed in prayer together before Him who said, "I am the resurrection and the life."

I do not remember how long we were in prayer, but suddenly a shudder ran through Saaga's body. He spoke. "My hands! My feet!" I felt his pulse and the throb was there. What a shout of *Hallelujahs* rose from that electrified audience as Saaga sat up! Tears of joy! Shouts of triumph! How can one be composed in such a time when the Almighty God manifests His great love and power? Saaga sat up and wanted to go back to his preaching. He continued to preach and teach throughout the days of the Bible institute.

Younger Mossé men entering the Lord's work in the Ouahigouya district come under the steady, wholesome influence of Saaga in the fellowship meetings. Through association with him they are adopting long-range policies which are going to stand the test of time. In collaboration with the National leaders, Filip Ouedraogo, Yabyiri Ouedraogo, Daogo Bologo, and twelve other preachers, the work in Ouahigouya goes on in the absence of missionaries. These preachers are not dependent upon us to send them funds nor upon obtaining com-mercial products for trading to make money. They farm, do leather work, weave cloth or have other part-time occupations to supplement the agricultural tithes of converts until they can be fully supported. Christians are taught tithing and they experience the compensation of God's blessing on their lives and their occupations.

We give glory to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ who is calling out such men as Saaga to lead the Mossé church—a man with whom we delight to fellowship in prayer and in the reading of Scripture.

"Growing Pains" in Tokyo

THE ENROLLMENT IN TOKYO'S CEN-tral Bible Institute has increased. As necessity demanded, the Japanese executives and missionaries prayerfully considered the need and the finances. As a result, the Lord has given us some of the needed personnel to work in the headquarters, Bible School, Sunday School, and literature offices. These four are all located in a cramped space on the second floor of the Bible School administration building. Even though the radio mailing office has been moved to the broadcasting studio, the present space still is not adequate for shipping, storage, and editing of our publications. It is our earnest desire to expand enough to serve Japan's growing Pentecostal fellowship properly.

The present girls' dormitory at the Bible School is too small to house the students. After getting a general estimate for this and making comparisons, we find that for a very little more we can build a new two-story dormitory and release the present one-story building for the Sunday School and literature departments. We want to move the present building to a more suitable location. There is enough room on the Bible School compound for it. We feel very fortunate in this, as here in Tokyo the present cost of building lots is at least as much as the cost of the building itself, if not much higher.

While we are grateful to the Lord for the great progress in our gospel literature ministry, we do not have enough qualified translators and editors who have time to work. Only capable scholars can produce literature suitable for a highly literate and critical people like the Japanese, and such people are in demand elsewhere. The inherent difficulties in the Japanese language make it necessary to proofread at least seven times to eliminate typographical errors, to say nothing of writing style. We pledge ourselves to strive continually to produce literature with no offense, save the offense of the Cross! Our over-worked pastors and executives are doing their best to serve as translators. A unified publications department, housed under one roof, with a place to store books on the first floor, is the desire of our entire Japan constituency.

A BASIC ELEMENT OF REVIVAL

Y OU KNOW WHERE AND HOW REvival begins. For you, revival is the gracious moving of the Holy Ghost, in lifegiving power, in your heart!

Preparing the way for that heavenborn, spiritual move is the attitude of which the Psalmist speaks when he cries, "My soul, wait thou only upon God; for my expectation is from Him" (Psalm 62:5).

Here is one of the basic elements of revival—it lies in turning from everything and everyone else, and coming in trusting expectancy to God alone.

Just recently, J. Raymond Ton conducted a children's crusade in our church. Morning after morning several hundred children waited impatiently for the doors to open and the meeting to begin. Several times circumstances kept us from starting the meeting on time. The children pounded on the doors and begged us to begin! When we opened the doors, they rushed past us to find favorite seats at the front.

After one of these stampedes Brother Ton asked me, "Is your congregation that eager to hear you?" And then he went on to say that this eagerness on the part of the children makes preaching to adults seem tame!

I wonder if Christ had this sense of eager anticipation in mind when He said, "Except ye become as little children...."

Guileless, open-eyed, open-minded expectation! Coming to God with the absolute certainty that He will meet with you, and that joy, and peace, and blessing will flow in His presence!

When you contrast this simplicity in attitude with the blasé spirit of our times, and the mixed motives with which men come to church, then you understand how basic the spirit of expectation really is! The spirit of expectation is simply a strong, overpowering desire to meet with God, knowing that He alone can satisfy your heart's longing.

The Lord Jesus said, "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled." In the Old Testament, one of the most graphic expressions of spiritual thirst is voiced by David, "As the hart panteth after the water brooks, so panteth my soul after Thee, O God. My soul thirsteth for God, the living God!"

Jesus said that the man is blessed who has a keen, gripping, spiritual desire for God!

David Brainerd says in his Journal: "I prayed from the sun half-hour high to sundown. My clothes were wet with perspiration; but my Lord did sweat drops of blood for me. I prayed for more compassion."

How do you explain such fervor in prayer? Soul thirst! Eager expectation of meeting with God!

It is said that the saintly Fletcher actually stained the wall with his breath where he hourly waited on God.

One might go on for hours relating the accounts of those who have sought God in prayer. Their prayer lives were but outward manifestations of the deep, consuming hunger of their hearts.

In saying, "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst," Christ placed His finger on this basic element of revival. Revival grows out of wanting God. Wanting God so intensely that the physical pangs of hunger and thirst are the only ways to adequately describe this spiritual desire.

Do you know what it means to be hungry? Have you ever felt the gnawing, aching pangs of unsatisfied appetite?

Perhaps you have heard Glenn Horst tell of the Chinese who came to the mission station begging for food. The man's plea was so pitiful that they agreed to feed him in exchange for some labor. Brother Horst said that feeding that Chinese was like trying to fill the bottomless pit! The man said that in all of his life, up to this time, he had never had his appetite satisfied!

It is not difficult to feed hungry people! Everything tastes good to them. They have no time to waste on beautiful menus or luxurious surroundings. Good wholesome food, in plentiful supply, is all they desire.

The most difficult people to serve are those who are not hungry. Nothing tastes good to them. They fancy themselves as authoritative gourmets, and become sharply critical of all that is served. Job said, "I have esteemed the words

Job said, "I have esteemed the words of His mouth more than my necessary food!" He esteemed God's Word, God's presence, and God's blessing as more important, more desirable than necessary food! Oh, how much New Testament saints could learn from this tested Old Testament saint!

the gripping account of the outpouring of God's Spirit in New York. The people had not received, nor had they seen others receive the Baptism in the Holy Ghost. Great spiritual hunger possessed them so that whole nights were spent seeking God. It was in the midst of this earnest thirsting after God that the flame of Pentecost was kindled.

Revival is born in the hearts of those who are possessed with the spirit of expectation, those who hunger and thirst after God!

This spirit of expectation, of longing for God, is a very real part of worship. "The Father seeketh such as will worship Him in Spirit and in truth."

God is drawn in response to the eager seeking of one who worships HIM. The Greek word translated "worship" simply means "to kiss toward." It is an act of affection, an act of devotion.

Full satisfying love cannot be one-sided. Nor can it be affection manifested from a sense of duty! Full, satisfying love is the meeting of two hearts on fire with the flame of love.

True worship is filled with the fire of love. Worship is the spiritual act of affection and devotion offered to God.

Just as perfunctory responses are unacceptable to us, so dutiful responses are unsatisfactory to God. Drawing nigh to God with your lips, when your heart is doting on others, is revolting to God!

Did you know that in an electric storm there is an invisible tracer, or rising of electricity from the earth, which corresponds to a similar tracer from the skies? These tracers actually create the path down which the bolt of electricity flashes. A split second before the bolt of lightning, these tracers have opened the path for the flashing electricity.

The rising of true spiritual devotion in worship always finds the seeking tracers of God's love in response, and the resultant bolt of lightning is God's revival with light and power in the individual soul!

It is the devil's wish to lull God's people into apathy, into indifference. The devil knows that when the warmth of devotion is present in worship, the fire of God's answer quickly follows. He will do his best to keep you from uttering the words of affection and love for God. He fears such words lest, through true worship, revival and spiritual power come to your soul.

Christian, it makes a transforming difference when you begin to be fervent and ardent in your worship.

Return to the words of the Psalmist: "My soul, wait thou only upon God; for my expectation is from Him." God is pleased when men come to Him, trusting in Him alone to meet their heart's desire. Not men; not gifts; not

Hyman Appelman once said that, as a young preacher, he was anxious to be a blessing, and to glorify Christ. In company with other preachers, he had attended a meeting where the Lord stirred his soul. At the conclusion of the meeting, they all went to prayer, and on his knees Hyman Appelman sobbed brokenly before the Lord. He prayed that revival might burn in his soul, and that he might be used to lead men to Christ. While he was praying, he felt an arm around his shoulders, and he looked up into the face of a minister whom he greatly respected in the Lord. That's revival, friends! When we come to God with deep desire, with burning love, and with all of our expectation centered in Him, we have revival!

REVIVAL IS BELIEVING

PROBABLY NO WORD IN AN EVANCELIcal's vocabulary is more misunderstood and yet more cherished than revival. Throughout this century, more intensely in the past decade, no subject has caused more comment and concern than revival.

"Where's that revival?" church folk are now asking. But revival is not something like a streamliner scheduled to pull into the station at 7:32. There is no timetable for revival. It comes when man's heart is ready to receive the Holy Spirit's power working through the life. It comes when man wants it.

"Revival is just around the corner," comes the dubious reply. But it is not like a thief lurking in the shadows of a city building. Revival will not pounce on unsuspecting Christians. Rather, it comes to a prepared people. God has established the conditions; it is man's opportunity to fulfill them.

"Revival is breaking; see all the signs," say the optimists. But revival doesn't come like a thunderstorm on a summer night. Its course cannot be charted like a winter cold wave. Because a spirit of revival strikes the Hebrides, shakes the Congo, pervades the missionaries of Japan and touches certain Christian workers of India is no indication that it will reach us tomorrow. God works through individuals, not geographic locations. Climatic conditions have nothing to do with it, but the fervor of the heart does.

"Another revival will never come; God doesn't work that way anymore," say the pessimists. But revival isn't like a worn-out pair of shoes or a broken bat. It hasn't outlived its usefulness. Even as the frightened disciples after Christ's ascension needed Pentecost, so do Christians today need a spiritual revival.

No, revival is not an easy thing. It is more than a spiritual awakening. A spiritual awakening causes the regeneration of the unsaved, but revival works in the hearts of Christians.

Revival means more than humility, repentance, and sorrow for sin. All these are necessary before a person can establish contact with God. God ignores the desires of the proud and sinful. He may also ignore the desires of the humble, upright Christian who lacks the faith to claim the promises of Scripture. God wants possessing belief. "Without faith it is impossible to please him" (Heb. 11:6). "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth" (Mark 9:23).

It is not enough for us to be like clay; revival is not passive. God wants Joshuas who will conquer in the name of the Lord. One writer has said, "Limpness in the hand of God is not prayer. Utmost prayer is to unyieldingly refuse a denial and most ardently insist and persist on having our rights in Christ."

"Effectual fervent prayer... availeth much" (James 5:16), and that kind of prayer will engender revival. But effectual prayer means faith—faith that God will answer as He promised in His Word. All these things we have known, of course, for years, but we've never fully acted upon them.

Maybe that's why we haven't seen revival yet.

JESUS THE LAMB OF GOD-John 1:29-41

Every Israelite hearing the words of John, "Behold the Lamb of God," must have remembered the prophetic utterance of Abraham as together with Isaac he trudged up the mountain carrying the wood and fire for a sacrifice. In response to his son's question Abraham replied, "God will provide himself a lamb."

Christianity is unique among all the religions of the world. Every other religion requires man to provide his own sacrifice. Man must attract the attention, earn the favor, and merit the blessing of a reluctant deity.

How different the scene at Calvary! The cross was God's altar. Jesus was God's sacrifice. For we read, "God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself."

No longer need we grope blindly after God. We need only come to Calvary, for there God is seeking us. No longer need we search for an acceptable sacrifice, for Christ was "once offered to bear the sins of many." God has provided Himself a Lamb.

THE PASSOVER LAMB-Exodus 12:3-13

NEWS BRIEFS FROM THE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVE

Gallup Polls on Religion

Dr. George Gallup, director of the American Institute of Public Opinion, says that the most interesting polls taken by his organization have been on religious questions. He says that his interviewers run into resistance when they ask individuals how they voted in the last election, but never when they ask about religious preferences or church affiliation.

The Gallup polls show that the number of atheists in the U. S. is no more than one to two per cent, he says.

He reports that, according to his polls, "the most religious people are the happiest; and the most irreligious people are the most unhappy."

Healing Services to Be Held in Episcopal Church

The Protestant Episcopal Cathedral Church of the Nativity at Bethlehem, Pa., plans to inaugurate a monthly service of healing. It will consist of prayer and meditation, and an invitation to all who are sick to come forward for the laying on of hands by the minister, the Very Reverend Benjamin Minifie

The dean said that while prayer is not to be considered a substitute for medical treatment, he hopes the healing services will "demonstrate God's concern for the bodies of men as well as their souls.... God's healing power often comes where there is faith and trust instead of fear and guilt."

"Handwriting on the Wall"

The appearance of a new provisional government in Argentina under Major General Pedro E. Aramburu is not expected to change the new cordial relations between the Roman Catholic Church and the Government. President Aramburu gave the people this assurance in his inaugural address.

Evangelicals are deeply concerned over the new situation. The Confederation of Evangelicals of the River Platte addressed the Government saying: "We are disturbed at the reintroduction of the Catholic teaching into the schools, and at the (proposed) Concordat with the Vatican." They asked that the "Register of Cults" (which is used to police faiths other than Roman Catholic) be abolished. They asked the Government to remember the contributions of the Evangelicals in the various areas of national life. As Newsweek puts it, they do not like "the handwriting on the wall."

Conquering a Jungle for Christ

Robert J. LeTourneau, designer of heavy earth-moving equipment, is making good progress with his Peruvian project. He has a contract with the government of Peru whereby he builds roads, cuts down trees, and turns a large jungle area into productive farmland.

A visitor was amazed at what is being accomplished. "Even more amazing than the great machines," he said, "are the men who operate them. They don't swear or drink. Meals are begun with prayer and there are Bibles in the bunkhouses. Frequently these workers spend their Sundays sharing their faith with Indians in the surrounding countryside. Nothing like it, I was told, has ever been seen in the camps of big American outfits."

The reason, of course, is that the wealthy LeTourneau family is more concerned with the spiritual results of the project than with the social or economic factors. The LeTourneaus are introducing the Peruvians not only to a better way of living but also to the Christian Way of Life.

Smoking on the Increase

Government reports show that smoking is on the increase again. It is estimated that one and a half million Americans who were smoking cigarettes have quit within the past eighteen months. Medical reports as to the harmful influence of tobacco helped many of these to make the right decision. But thousands of others have joined the ranks of smokers in their place. The Government says that cigarette smoking jumped 4 per cent by the end of 1955, reversing a two-year decline. Americans smoked about 383 billion cigarettes in 1955, some 15 billion more than the previous year and only 11 billion short of the all-time peak in 1952.

World at the Crossroads

"The western world is standing at the crossroads," says Billy Graham. "Never was the picture darker. Never was the need of divine intervention so desperate. We are facing a political crisis. You can see it in every country. Many of us are going along just as we have in the past. Christian, this is a different age! I believe God is giving the nations an opportunity to repent. If they fail they will be destroyed. The answer for the nations is an old-fashioned Holy Ghost revival in which God can speak once again as by fire."

Runner Enters Spiritual Race

Roger Bannister, British track star, has entered the spiritual race to win an incorruptible crown. The big blond Briton who ran history's first four-minute mile last year was one of the 400 converts who came to Christ during the Billy Graham meetings at Oxford and Cambridge a few weeks ago.

"How Big Is Your God?"

According to the Washington Post, the Princeton astronomer, Henry Norris Russell, had concluded a lecture on the Milky Way and was asked by a woman, "If our world is so little, and the universe is so great, can we really believe that God pays any attention to us?"

"That, madam," replied Dr. Russell, "depends entirely on how big a God you believe in."

Sentenced to Attend Church

Because of liquor law violations, tavern operator Sam Zolph of Waldo, Wis. will have to go to church every Sunday for a year. Zolph was charged with selling liquor and beer to minors. Circuit Judge F. H. Schlichting placed the tavern owner on probation, ordered his license revoked, and said that if he fails to attend church as prescribed he will have to spend his probationary period in jail.

Witch Doctors Confer

In Pretoria, South Africa, a hundred witch doctors met recently for a conference. Most of them were well dressed in European clothes. They agreed on a five-year apprenticeship for trainees and discussed the possibility of founding a university to help get rid of "quacks" in their "profession."

Paul Pictured on Bank Note

A new 500,000-drachma bank note has been issued by the Greek Treasury which bears a picture of the apostle Paul preaching to the Athenians from Mars Hill. The note is worth about \$16.60 in U.S. funds at present.

Intolerance in Greece

The Berean Jews of Paul's day were immortalized in Holy Scripture because "they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily" (Acts 17:11). But there are Bereans today who are much less open to the gospel truth. The pastor of a gospel church in Berea was recently summoned to appear before the criminal court. He was charged with the crime of preaching Christ to the barber when having his hair cut! As it happened, an official was in the barber shop. Upon hearing the pastor's conversation with the barber he immediately lodged a complaint on the ground that the pastor was proselytingtaking advantage of the poor barber's ignorance! The law against proselyting is a great boon to the state church.

Fortune Goes to the Dogs

According to The Rocky Mountain News, the probate of the will of a prominent Denver educator revealed that he left an estate of \$110,000 and that most of it will go "for better care, protection and general welfare of dogs."

With millions of people in foreign lands, especially children, suffering hunger and in need of the barest essentials for survival, it is a pity that such a large amount of money should be spent on dogs. We recall that Jesus said, "It is not meet to take the children's bread and to cast it to dogs" (Matthew 15: 26).

"Oil of Joy" in Israel

The finding of oil in Israel has caused great joy among the Jews. Some are calling the land Isra-oil. President Ben-Zvi put on a ten-gallon hat when he visited Heletz (the oil field) and some of the people began speaking Hebrew with a southern accent, as in Texas.

"Shalom, you all," became a common expression in Beersheba.

Eager Jews from all parts of Israel visited the site, and some brought bottles

in which to take home a bit of the precious black fluid. It was reported that the driver of a car, who had brought many visitors to the oil field, grew a bit weary of all the excitement. When some of his passengers returned to the car full of enthusiasm and showed him their halffilled bottles, the driver's patience ran out.

"What are you so excited about?" he said. "In Texas, instead of one miserable derrick, there are a thousand."

One white-bearded man laughed and said, "You simpleton! Heletz is in Israel. Texas isn't."

Canada's Supreme Court Rules Quebec Closing Law Invalid

A Montreal bylaw requiring stores to remain closed on six Roman Catholic holy days, and the provincial statute on which it was based, were ruled invalid by the Supreme Court of Canada at Ottawa last Fall. The holy days involved are Christmas, New Year's, Epiphany, Ascension, All Saints' Day, and the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.

Many Montreal stores had consistently defied the law by remaining open on the holy days. They paid fines of \$40 each time.

Charges Against Pastor Dropped

Judge Cecil Curry dismissed charges of zoning law violation which were brought in City Court at Miami, Florida, against the pastor of an Assemblies of God church that was organized recently in a rented store building. The charge had been brought against Pastor James V. Blanco by neighbors who complained that his services were too noisy. It was brought out in the trial that the complaints made no mention of the noise coming from the dancehall and bar that are located in the same building as the new church!

The Judge ruled that while the city zoning board has the power to forbid the erection of church buildings in certain residential areas, it cannot ban the holding of religious services in a building that already stands.

Taxpayer Clears His Conscience

A "forgetful" Chicago taxpayer cleared his conscience by sending a note to the Collector of Internal Revenue reading: "Kindly accept \$800 owing—enclosed." An official said the money will be placed in the tax bureau's conscience fund.



ANCIENT NEW TESTAMENT (YONAN CODEX) GOES ON NATION-WIDE TOUR

The Yonan Codex, one of the oldest copies of the New Testament known to scholars, recently left Washington on a tour of the 48 states by bus. Vice-President Richard M. Nixon gave it an official send-off in ceremonies in front of the capitol.

Since April the rare volume has been on display at the Library of Congress. Previously it had been carefully stored in a bank vault. The photo (above, left) shows the box containing the precious manuscript being carried from the vault by Norman Yonan, a member of the family which preserved it through the centuries. The men accompanying him are officials of the Aramaic Bible Foundation.

The Codex, shown in photo (above, right), is believed to

be the oldest complete manuscript of the New Testament in Aramaic Syriac, the language spoken by Jesus. It was copied by hand around A. D. 400 and preserved by the Yonan family in the mountains of Iran for hundreds of years. It disappeared during disturbances there in 1918. Eventually it turned up in the United States and came into the hands of Norman Yonan, a retired Washington rug dealer and realestate man.

The Disabled American Veterans are sponsoring the tour. The organization hopes to raise \$300,000 to purchase the Codex from Mr. Yonan and present it permanently to the Library of Congress.

SUNDAY'S LESSON



JESUS THE LAMB OF GOD Sunday School Lesson for January 8

John 1:29-41

In this lesson we find Jesus walking by the River Jordan, where John was baptizing. John looked up and saw Jesus coming toward him, and he said, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world."

1. A DIVINE REVELATION (VV. 29-34).

"Behold the Lamb of God." Behold His gentleness! As the Lamb He will not be quick to reprove and condemn, but eager to forgive and restore. He walks among us, not to quench the smoking flax or break the bruised reed, but "to preach good tidings unto the meek; ... to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound."

Behold also the purity of the Lamb of God! He is the "lamb without blemish and without spot." Other sheep are spotted, deformed, tainted by sin. Nothing but a perfect sacrifice could atone for sin; so no ordinary man, were he to give his life as a sacrifice, could merit forgiveness or hope to win favor before God. But Christ was born without original sin, and He never once committed an act of sin. He alone was able to take upon Him the sins of man and become God's Lamb. "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all."

"Behold the Lamb of God." Yes, behold the efficacy of His sacrifice for He "taketh away the sin of the world." All other sacrifices merely postponed the judgment of God, but the blood of this Lamb took away sin, removing it as far as the east is from the west.

He is "a man which is preferred." He did not sit in the glories of heaven and expect man to redeem himself by his own sacrifices. Instead He took upon Himself the form of man and paid the debt for our sins. See Him as the One who baptizes with the Holy Ghost, anointing His people for special service. Behold Him as the Son of God, the only begotten of the Father.

For centuries men had been looking for the Lamb. All Israel was hoping for the coming of a Redeemer. But when He arrived, they did not recognize Him. Even John said twice, "I knew him not." How then did the Baptist come to know his second cousin as the Lamb of God? By revelation of the Spirit of God.

Never has a man came to a knowledge of Christ by depending upon his own wisdom. To know Christ we must become childlike in our dependence upon divine revelation. It is the ministry of the Holy Spirit to reveal Christ. Only by the Spirit can men say that Jesus is Lord (1 Cor. 12:3).

2. A PROPER DECISION (VV. 35-39).

While John the Baptist was calling attention to the Lamb of God, "two of his disciples heard him speak, and they followed Jesus." Thank God, the revelation of the Son is not only for preachers like John, but for all who are willing to follow Him.

John was not jealous that these men were no longer his

followers, for the purpose of his ministry was to point men away from himself and to the Lord. "He must increase, but I must decrease," he declared. Faithfulness in witnessing may not add to our following or contribute to our popularity, but if it causes men to fall in love with Christ we have succeeded.

How important that we be "instant in season, out of season" with our testimony! John could not have known that his simple testimony that day would turn two of his friends to the Lord.

A Christian friend of mine made a business trip with one of his young associates. He had been seeking to win the young man to the Lord, but without success. They shared a hotel room together, and during the night my friend was awakened by the voice of the Lord calling, "Get up and speak to Jim. Ask him if he is satisified." In obedience he went to Jim's bedside and awakened him.

"Is something wrong?" asked Jim.

"Yes," answered the Christian businessman, "Are you satisfied without Jesus?"

"No," he said. "I am not." And he began to weep. That night Jim gave his heart to the Lord.

In our lesson the two disciples of John made the right decision, and they never turned back. They continued to follow Jesus throughout all of His ministry. They were with Him when He taught the people and when He fed the multitudes. They followed Him to the judgment and saw Him crucified. They became witnesses of His resurrection and watched Him ascend into heaven. They went back to Jerusalem to receive the power of the Holy Spirit and became bold in their witness for Christ. They followed Jesus even to martyrdom. It could be said of them, "These are they which follow the Lamb whithersoever he goeth" (Rev. 14:4).

3. A CHAIN REACTION (VV. 40-45).

Salvation is contagious. If we have a good dose of it ourselves it will spread to others. No sooner had Andrew begun to follow the Lord than he thought of his brother Simon, and brought him to Jesus. After Philip became a disciple of Jesus, he too began to seek out the lost. "Philip findeth Nathanael, and saith unto him, "We have found him, of whom Moses in the law, and the prophets, did write, Jesus of Nazareth." Chain reaction like this caused the enemies of Jesus to say, "Behold, the world is gone after him."

A man who worked in a flour mill, one day elbowed his way through a crowd. Everyone he touched was left with a trace of flour. We too leave our influence upon those with whom we associate. Let us be so saturated with the gospel that our lives shall be a powerful testimony for Christ. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

If the gospel had been left to be proclaimed by just twelve men, it would have perished with them. But the secret of spreading the gospel is to produce reproducers. Paul wrote to Timothy, "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." We must seek not only to win souls, but to win soul-winners. Peter became a great pillar in the Church, but we probably would never have heard of him if it had not been for his brother who brought him to Jesus. We need to fellowship with the converts we bring to the Lord, to strengthen them so that they may become established in the Lord and be able to strengthen others.

If we would be faithful servants of the Lord Jesus, we must "behold the Lamb of God." We need more than a glimpse of Jesus. We need to turn our gaze upon Him, and look into His glorious face, that our lives may radiate the glory of His presence and attract sinners to Him.

A Review of Outstanding Events in the Religious World During the Past Year

A MERICAN RELIGIOUS LIFE IN 1955 DISclosed a weird, ambiguous face. Increases both in church membership and crime, the mounting tempo side by side of religionism and of secularism, the rising anti-totalitarian enthusiasm for democracy alongside a nebulous conception of spiritual priorities, and a common emphasis on religious advance by diverse evangelical, liberal, Roman Catholic, Jewish and cult groups, all contribute to this national photomontage. From the whole came news that the year had gotten underway with a record 97,482,611 church members, a gain of more than 2,600,000 over the previous year, and that 60.3% of the nation had already come into church membership.

NATIONAL OUTLOOK

On almost every religious front, 1956 loomed as a strategic year for the life of the nation. In some big cities, where corrupt political machines had been defeated, enthusiasm was sparked for a national "Christian party." In several quarters there was new talk of a great Christian university. Elsewhere, widening theological disunity within liberalism suggested that 1956 would supply the peak opportunity for large-scale evangelical enterprises, especially in the wake of Billy Graham's larger impact upon the western hemisphere. Graham's 1956 schedule listed campaigns in New York City and San Francisco, and a visit to oriental Christians in India. Plans for Roman Catholic advance continued, keyed to Samuel Cardinal Stritch's statement to Venezuelans that the United States is no longer "a Protestant country."

Behind this year-end temper stood conflicting indexes to the national outlook. President Eisenhower's emphasis on the inseparability of faith in democracy and faith in God gained popular echoes. Bargaining with atheists for the world's unity, the President had asked the nation to pray, and then knelt in church for divine guidance just before the Geneva summit conference. The Gallup poll showed 96% of the citizenry "believes in God," although the reasons given were various. Another poll reported that four-fifths of the citizens believe the Bible to be "the revealed word of God." A third indicated that 53% could not supply the name of even one of the

four Gospels. While the nation gasped, a Bible-versed grandmother won a \$32,-000 television award.

EVANGELISTIC RESPONSE

Beneath the surface of religious life, evidences of concern began to rise. The externalism of American religion called for deeper analysis. Not only churchmen poised on the periphery of the evangelistic movement, but Evangelist Billy Graham himself warned that America had not yet been shaken by national revival, and that the status quo needs serious challenge. Graham won the nation's top Freedoms Foundation award for the year. Still well below 40, he packed Madison Square Garden to its 22,000 capacity, then moved on to Glasgow, London, Paris and Germany for remarkable campaigns, before a series in Toronto, and finally the Cambridge University mission which precipitated lively newspaper debate of the evangelical view of the Bible. More than 670,000 Scotsmen attended, with 16,236 responses; in Paris, 42,000 came in five days, with 2,254 decisions; in Toronto, 362,000, with 7,348 decisions. Meanwhile Oral Roberts, heard by more than two million in healing campaigns in the United States and South Africa, projected a visit to the Philippines and Australia.

DENOMINATIONAL MERGERS

Ecumenical forces began rallying behind Graham's evangelistic thrust. The nine-denomination Conference on Christian Union worked against odds towards its goal of organic union under the proposed United Church of Christ, with co-operative ordination. The drive for merger showed gains and defeats. Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical Reformed Church, with more than two million members jointly, voted to merge in June, 1957, to become the nation's sixth largest Protestant denomination. The Presbyterian Church in the U.S., with 760,000 members in the South, defeated a projected merger with the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and the United Persbyterian Church of North America. The Free Methodist and Wesleyan Methodist Churches, after years of negotiation, finally tabled indefinitely their proposed merger plans.

The relation of America's 56 million

Protestants to the ecumenical movement was still not without its hesitancies and doubts. Southern Baptists (eight million) and Missouri Lutherans (two million) were among the 15 million outside the National Council of Churches. The cooperative evangelical effort scored some gains, sustained some setbacks. The National Association of Evangelicals, registering some numerical advances, worked away at its debt, ventured to begin its convention with an address on Christianity and the social crisis, and re-elected Dr. H. H. Savage of Pontiac, Michigan, as president. The American Council of Churches faced inner tensions, with a revolt against its titular leader, Dr. Carl McIntyre, spearheaded by Bible Presbyterians.

DOCTRINAL DISPUTES

Secondary doctrinal disputes distressed some groups. Conservative Baptist forces saw a faculty exodus at Western Baptist Theological Seminary in Portland, where belief in the pre-tribulation rapture of the saints was made obligatory. Dispensationalism was being asserted with new vigor in several fundamentalist camps as the only consistent antithesis to liberalism.

But doctrinal disputes were not confined to the smaller movements. The United Lutheran Church in America, in the first heresy trial in its 60-year-old Northwest Synod, found George Crist, Jr. of Durham, Wis., guilty of heresy for open denial of the virgin birth and other doctrinal departures. And Princeton Seminary's President John A. Mackay contradicted Vice-President Nixon's tribute to the Roman Catholic Church as "one of the major bulwarks against Communism and totalitarian ideas."

EXPANSION EFFORTS

Comprehensive denominational programs were set in motion. Southern Baptists, now in 30 states, announced a radio-TV expansion effort to reach the unchurched, including color programs and a \$200,000 station in Forth Worth. The American Baptist Convention, its past decade marked by losses both on the conservative right and liberal left, reported a building boom among its 6,000 affiliated churches representing 1,600,000 members. More than 1,000 Methodist churches participated in a year-long prayer marathon-once around the clock in each church-for world peace, and 300 Methodist secretaries of evangelism mapped the denomination's plans for a nationwide January-to-Easter attendance campaign.

Criticism mounted over Dr. Norman Vincent Peale's conception of "positive

GOD SETS THE BOUNDARIES

HAVE YOU EVER STOOD ON THE SEAshore and watched the tide come in? Have you seen the huge waves dash high into the air? Have you heard the loud roar of the waves, as they roll and churn, as they make their way to the shore?

The Lord reminded me of this wonderful display when I was going through a severe spiritual trial. I had been think-



thinking" and over Dr. Frank Buchman's Moral Re-Armament (successor to the Oxford Group). Religious cults were beginning to show remarkable strength. Jehovah's Witnesses frequently made headlines with huge assemblies. And rumors prevailed of an attempted rapprochement between Seventh Day Adventists and evangelical forces.

Controversy over the harmony of science and the Bible flared anew with the appearance of attempts to halt the dissolving effects of scientific philosophy upon the Biblical view. The Evangelical Book Club, which in its very first year garnered 10,000 members and rivaled the long-established clubs in outreach, cir-culated Bernard Ramm's The Christian View of Science, a title whose propriety some questioned. The American Scientific Affiliation launched plans for a cooperative volume in defense of theism, to be released in 1959 on the anniversary of Darwin's Origin of Species. Baker Book House issued the Twentieth Century Encyclopedia, two-volume supplement to the Schaff-Herzog set, carrying ing about the things the enemy presented to me, watching the picture as he painted it with remorse, discouragement, and doubt. Then the Spirit spoke these words, "This far and no farther." He brought to my mind this verse in Jeremiah: "Fear ye not me? saith the Lord: will ye not tremble at my presence, which have placed the sand for the bound of the sea by a perpetual decree, that it cannot pass it: and though the waves thereof toss themselves, yet can they not prevail; though they roar, yet can they not pass over it?" Even though the sea roar and the waves dash high, they can go no farther than God permits.

Isn't this just like the help Jesus brings to us? When our trial has gone far enough, He brings encouragement and lifts the load, that He might keep His Word given to us in 1 Corinthians 10:13, "God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it."

If we will put our lives completely in His hands, He will control the waves so that they will not overwhelm us. Even as He controls the boundary of the seas, so His mighty hand holds back from us the trials of life which would be too much for us. Praise His worthy name! —Esther Rupp.

forward the diversity of Protestant theology in this century. Lutherans readied the translation of the Reformer's complete writings. Eerdmans announced plans for a more popular commentary series, alongside its well-received 17-volume International Evangelical Commentary.

SUMMARY

The tide of religious interest was high; how deep it was, remained uncertain. Giving was on the increase, church membership and attendance likewise. But so was crime, and spending for the sordid things of life. America was still the land of spiritual opportunity and decision. But it remained for 1956 to justify the conviction that the greatest spiritual awakening in many centuries is actually underway.

HE PHRASE WHICH RECURS MOST OFten in the letters and reports of our home missionaries to the national Home Missions Department office is "Pray for us." Although they are faced with desperate financial needs, building problems and other dilemmas concerning their work, the missionaries feel the need of prayer backing in the realm of spiritual conflict most keenly of all. For it is in this area that they will either succeed or fail in their mission. The battle they are in is not carnal. "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."

Recognizing this, one of our home missionaries wrote recently that while the Sunday School attendance had increased, they had been able to get roofing for the church, and their personal needs had been met, still " ... the deeper work of salvation of souls, baptism in the Spirit for believers, is greatly lagging. We must have souls! While some children have been healed, drunkards are still in the chains of habit. Satan doesn't care what our Sunday School average is so long as he can destroy these souls in hell! He is not particular whether they go to perdition from the church or the bar-room. MAY THE HOLY SPIRIT AFFLICT YOUR SOUL WITH A COMPASSIONATE BURDEN FOR THESE PEOPLE!"

If the battle on the home mission field were a carnal one with flesh and blood pitted against flesh and blood, the victory would simply go to the strongest and we at home could do nothing to turn the tide. But the battle is not carnal, and "the weapons of our warfare are not carnal." And there is no way in which we may plead exemption from our share in the battle being waged by our home missionaries in these last days before Christ returns.

Moses once challenged the children of Gad and of Reuben, saying, "Shall your brethren go to war and shall ye sit here?" The implied answer was a resounding "No!" Today when evil forces are arrayed against the saints of God, and Satanic strategy employed against those on the front lines, shall you and I be held guiltless if we "sit here" and neglect to take any part in the conflict? Is it nothing to us?

Prayer warriors are needed to back the work of our home missionaries if they are to march on to victory in this very real battle against "spiritual wickedness." The ministry of prayer, too often, has been minimized by those who feel that actually going to the mission field would be so much more important. Some folk have even been heard to say apologetically, "I cannot go to the mission field,

and I cannot give much. Seems all I can do is to pray."

If you are one of these, then you have at your command as effective a weapon as any home or foreign missionary in the world. Take it up—this effective weapon that is "mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds." There is a vital work for you to do! Prayer is a mighty ministry!

There are strongholds of Satan in our work among the North American Indians that can be battered down by prayer alone. Some have already yielded, but our workers feel the need for greater and more complete victories.

In Alaska our workers face problems peculiar to a frontier territory, and need our prayers for victory over the evil forces in the lives of those whom they seek to win for Christ.

Our workers among the Deaf plead for prayer-helpers in their endeavor to make Christ known to the Deaf. Among the Jews our workers are finding some hearts opening to Christ, but there are hindrances in this area which God alone is able to overcome. Behind prison bars the Word is being studied and read by prisoners contacted by our workers. Prayer-help in this realm can work miracles of deliverance to those long bound by Satan.

This year our MISSION U. S. A. theme is EVERY CHURCH HELP START ANOTHER CHURCH. Hundreds of rallies emphasizing this theme will be held throughout the nation on February 6. Many Assemblies will accept the challenge to branch out and share their Pentecostal testimony with neighboring communities.

But new Pentecostal churches are neither started nor perpetuated by visible efforts alone. If they are to be born in the fires of Pentecost, someone somewhere must wrestle in prayer against the powers of darkness to see this accomplished.

Our Home Missions leaders are more concerned over the Pentecostal quality of the new Assemblies than over the number of churches that will be started. And they believe that as established churches pray for a renewed Pentecost, many new churches will be started and will catch the Pentecostal spirit of the helping church.

There have been great victories already in the home mission field, but we are asking God that 1956 shall be a year of even greater victories. Our home missionaries and pioneer workers will feel a new surge of power and strength as we join them in the battle through prayer.

will is the center of his entire life. To be thus "mortgaged" implies, according to the meaning of the word, to be pledged even to death to satisfy the lien we have given to God on our lives.

Human nature, even in those who are saved, cannot consent to such wholesale capitulation to God's purposes-apart from the help of the Spirit. Here is a direct application of Paul's statement in Romans 8:26: "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities." In this matter how infirm we are! Reluctance to accede to His will betrays our shallow consecration. All of us should examine ourselves and pray for His assistance. The baneful habit of haggling with God over the price is a sure sign of shallow consecration. Trying to maneuver God into accepting less than our best is a pastime unworthy of God's people. We may need a new surge of determination to fulfill God's will, and a new glimpse of the Man of Calvary!

In view of all this we are driven to consider our separation in the light of what we have received from God. This places some people in a delicate position, since fellowship with the world seems to be so fashionable. The old-time "holiness or hell" separation is not considered feasible in this modern day. One is termed "antique" for advocating that to Christians "old things are passed away" and "all things are become new." But, antiquated or not, we are sternly en-joined in the Scriptures to "have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness." We are told to "follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord" (Heb. 12: 14).

Have you mirrored Christ in your life in 1955? Has His reflection been marred by worldliness and compromise? For fear of ridicule have you failed to be different?
