"Sick Benefits"

Have the insurance salesmen been talking to you about "sick benefits" lately? There's a passage in the Bible that outlines some very attractive benefits, and they are available to you. It is Psalm 103, verses 1 to 5.

The Psalmist sings about these marvelous benefits, saying, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me; bless His holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits." Then he enumerates five

great benefits which only God can offer:

1. FORGIVENESS-He says the Lord "forgiveth all thine iniquities." This is the first step toward getting well. A clear conscience goes a long way toward restoring one's health. Guilty feelings have been diagnosed as the basic cause of some illnesses, and a guilty conscience will slow down the healing process in anyone. God will forgive all your sins if you will confess them to Him. You may

apply for this gracious benefit today.

- 2. HEALING—The Lord "healeth all thy diseases." No disease is too difficult; no case is too complex. You are sure to enjoy this benefit if you will give up your sins and pray to the Lord in childlike faith. A certain Christian man had a large cancerous growth on his leg. It kept spreading until the flesh was eaten away and the bone was visible. The doctors said his case was incurable, but he and his wife knew that the Lord was able and willing to heal all their diseases. One day he went to a church conference and asked the elders to anoint him with oil, and to pray for him according to the instructions in James 5:14, 15. They did so, and he went home singing and praising God for healing him. The next morning his wife helped him to remove the dressing. They found that a thin milky flesh had formed over the bone-and at the end of two weeks that leg which had been afflicted with an "incurable" cancer for nine months was as normal as the other. "All thy diseases."
- 3. FULL REDEMPTION—The Lord "redeemeth thy life from destruction," David said. In other words, He not only makes you well; He also keeps you well. After all, we need more than Divine Healing; we need Divine Health -new strength for each day, to withstand all the disease germs and other hazards to which we are exposed. This deliverance from destruction is one of the "benefits," and it carries no time limit.
- 4. A SPIRITUAL BONUS—He "crowneth thee with loving-kindness and tender mercies." On top of all the other benefits of forgiveness, healing, and full redemption the Lord adds this crowning bonus of extra kindnesses and tender care. He makes you the special object of His love. You enter a holy intimacy with your Healer.
- 5. LONG LIFE-The Lord "satisfieth thy mouth with good things, so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's." The eagle is blessed with long life due to its peculiar ability to become rejuvenated. The Bible says that they who wait upon the Lord will have a similar experience. You can find a fulness of strength that will enable you to run and not be weary, and to walk and not faint.

These benefits are both physical and spiritual. You can claim every one of them if you will.

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A Great Faith

T WICE DURING HIS EARTHLY MINIStry Christ used the expression, "Great is thy faith," and in both instances He said it to Gentiles.

On one of these occasions Christ had gone into "the coasts of Tyre and Sidon" (Matthew 15:21-28), a region which is today a part of the nation of Lebanon. A woman, because of her faith, overcame great obstacles to obtain help from the Lord. The Gospel of Mark says she was a Greek (Gentile), a Syrophoenician by nation.

Why did Jesus make this long journey over difficult terrain from Galilee? There is no record that He preached any sermon here, or did any great work, except in the case of this woman—even though there was a great population in this area. Is it possible that her great faith brought Jesus here? Did He want to use her faith as an example to Israel and to all who would read the story down to our generation?

The faith of this woman was tested to the limit by the Lord. She overcame four great obstacles before she had the answer to her prayer. When we seek the Lord we may have to press through some of these same obstacles.

1. COLD AND SELFISH DISCIPLES

As the Syrophoenician woman came seeking the Lord, the disciples were disturbed by her crying and begged the Lord, "Send her away; for she crieth after us." They gave her a cold reception and showed no compassion for her.

Too often, followers of the Lord destroy the faith in those who seek help from the Lord. So many professing disciples hinder rather than help the needy. We know of many who are outside the church today because of the un-Christian attitude of professed followers of Christ. A true Christian should show genuine interest in others and help bear their burdens.

If you are praying about some need and you find no encouragement from other Christians, press by them and get to the Lord, for He will help you. That is what blind Bartimaeus did in Jericho. Those who followed Jesus told him not to cry out so loudly, but "he cried so much the more," until Jesus stopped and restored his sight. If this blind man had not continued to cry out to the Lord in spite of the discouragement from the followers of Jesus, he would have remained blind. Let us take our eyes off men and fix them on Jesus.

2. SEEMING DISINTEREST OF JESUS '

The woman cried to Him most pitifully, saying, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, thou son of David; my daughter is grievously vexed with a devil," and yet "He answered her not a word." Was Jesus callous? No, it was sympathy that made Him silent. He was delaying telling her He could not help her.

Have you ever cried out to the Lord and found the heavens to be as brass—no answer forthcoming? At these times we are tempted to say, like Isaiah, "Verily thou art a God that hidest thyself" (45:15). Mark says that Jesus "entered into an house, and would have no man know it: but He could not be hid." Earnest seeking will bring us into the Lord's presence.

His silence and seeming disinterest is a test of our faith. It makes us humble and strengthens our desire for help. His delays are not always denials. Luke tells us that "God [will] avenge his own elect, which cry day and night unto him, though he bear long with them" (Luke 18:7). Let us not be discouraged when He bears long with us, but, like this woman, keep our faith firmly in the Lord until we find divine help.

3. THINKING GOD'S HELP IS NOT FOR US

The silence of Jesus was discouraging to her, but when He did speak it was even more discouraging. He as much as told her that divine help was not for her. Listen to His words: "I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel." As she was a woman of Syrophoenicia, a people who worshiped Baal and Astarte, she was not included in the blessings of Israel.

Many cease seeking the Lord because they are told the gifts and blessings of God are not for them. When Pentecostal ministers preach on Divine Healing or the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, other preachers are sure to tell the people that these experiences were only for the apostolic age. Books are written, and sermons preached, telling us what God will not do for us! In spite of these preachers of doubt, however, we can press in and claim these blessings for ourselves.

It is faith that obtains the blessings of the Lord. Christ could not escape from the faith of this woman. He allows men and women of faith to conquer Him. Though Jesus spoke discouragingly to this woman, yet her faith was not weakened. "She came and worshipped him, saying, Lord, help me."

4. FEELING OF UNWORTHINESS

Her next obstacle came when Jesus compared her to a dog, instead of a child of God. As a dog she was not worthy of divine help. Many fail to receive help from the Lord because they feel they are not worthy. No one is worthy except through the mercies of our Saviour Jesus Christ.

Jesus was referring to a popular religious view among the Jews, who considered Gentiles to be dogs. This was a test of her humility as well as her faith. Pride would have sent her away in indignation, but her faith found encouragement in these words of Jesus. The Greek word used here for dogs is the diminutive form and means "puppies that are kept for pets." She saw that there was provision for her, even if it was as a puppy under the table,





Baby Healed of Spinal Meningitis

On Wednesday morning the baby started having spasms. She would try to draw backward. We took her back to the doctor. He gave her some more medicine and told us to take her home.

On our way back home she began having another spasm. We took her back to the hospital, where she was supposed to remain for a few days.

The doctors began to make all kinds of tests. On Wednesday evening the doctor told us it was spinal meningitis. The next day the doctor said he had done all he could for her, and that we should take her to a larger hospital.

We had called some of the church folk and asked them to pray. The Assemblies both in Levelland and in Little-field were praying. One lady had spent Wednesday night in prayer. About 7:30 p.m. Thursday the baby began to play with me. I truly thank God for His wonderful healing power.

We took Rita home from the hospital the following Monday. On Tuesday we took her back for a checkup. The doctor could not find anything wrong with her.

Our girl has never been bothered with this sickness since that wonderful day. She is now ten months old and is learning and growing like a normal child. We praise the Lord for His healing touch.—Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Young, Rt. 1, Levelland, Texas.

Dying on Friday – Back in School on Monday

I am a student at Northwest Bible College in Seattle, Washington. On the evening of Friday, September 21, 1956, I was driving to my home at East Stanwood, Washington, for the weekend. As I was approaching Everett I saw the headlights of another car coming toward me at a rapid speed and I realized it was in my lane.

I wrenched at the wheel and swerved my car to avoid a head-on collision, but the vehicles collided at an angle. There was a grinding crash—and I remembered no more until some time later when I roused slightly in the ambulance for a moment or so.

Later I learned that a businessman in Seattle had witnessed the accident. He told me that he and the patrolman had thought surely I was dying when the ambulance took me away.

The driver of the other car gave a signed statement to the effect that he had fallen asleep at the wheel and remembered nothing of the accident.

My car was utterly demolished except for the place where I had been sitting behind the wheel. The glass in the left door had not been broken, while the glove compartment on the other side of the car was so smashed in that the metal door had to be pried off in order to take my belongings out. Surely God's protecting hand had been upon me.

I finally regained consciousness in the Everett General Hospital about an hour and a quarter after the accident. I was examined by a doctor but he could find no broken bones. I was then put to bed until X rays could be taken to determine if there were any internal injuries.

In the meantime I called my wife on the phone to tell her what had happened, and asked for prayer. She called other Christian people who also went to prayer in my behalf.

That evening I was in considerable pain in my head, neck, right side, shoulder and arm. I called upon the Lord for relief from this pain and went to sleep almost at once. When I awoke the next morning I was able to get out of bed and to sit in a wheel chair in order to undergo X rays.

Shortly before noon, my wife and some friends came to visit me. I was able to dress myself and to go home with them. The X rays showed that my right lung was crushed and was leaking, and that my second rib was cracked. However, the doctor agreed to release me and let me go home if I promised to take due precautions.

God continued His healing work in my body after we returned home, and on Sunday evening I drove to Seattle alone. I was back in classes at Northwest Bible College on Monday morning. In spite of my serious accident, I had not missed a day of school!

The businessman who witnessed the accident was shocked when he learned that I was back in school on Monday morning. He could hardly believe that I had recovered so quickly. I told him that it was a direct answer to prayer. He agreed that a miracle had taken place.

I thank God for His grace and power. Christ's body was broken that ours might be made whole.—Charles Bloxham, East Stanwood, Wash.

Lesus Christ Os LORD and MASTER

W HAT HUMILIATION THE LORD OF Glory suffered when He came down to earth! Instead of the glories of heaven, He chose poverty. He willingly clothed Himself with humanity in order to die on the cross to purchase our salvation. In spite of His divinity, however, He was "despised and rejected of men." They would not obey Him nor believe that He was the Son of God. But always the forces of nature and the evil spirits knew that He was the Lord of Glory. Their consistent obedience to His commands proves that He is the Lord and Master in every situation.

Lord Over Material Elements

One evening, tired from the day's toil, Jesus and His disciples entered a boat and pushed off for the eastern shore of Galilee. Jesus lay down in the stern and was soon sound asleep.

A great storm began to arise. Galilee is liable to such sudden squalls. I saw when I visited Galilee that the Sea lies in a deep depression, six hundred feet below the level of the adjacent land. The surrounding hills, worn by watercourses, act like funnels through which the wind pours down upon the lake. Water level temperatures are almost tropical, whereas those above are many degrees lower. This aggravates the violence of storms. This storm was of unusual severity.

The disciples, usually at home on these waters because they had been fishermen, became greatly frightened, for the boat was fast filling with water. Their only hope, they felt, lay in the supernatural intervention of Jesus. So they awoke Him and asked, "Master, carest thou not that we perish?" And seeing the wild fury with which the wind lashed the waves, as though it were some terrible monster whose roar needed to be silenced, He said, "Peace, be still!"

These waves acknowledged His voice as the voice of their Creator and rightful Lord, and they obeyed Him. The wind dropped at once! Under ordinary circumstances there would have been considerable swelling of waves even after the wind had ceased. But this time it was different! The waves at once became restful. This miracle cannot be explained on the basis of natural causes. Jesus was exercising His authority over the elements of nature; they dared not disobey!

Lord Over Evil Spirits

Landing on the other side of the sea, Jesus and His disciples were met by a demoniac, a demon-possessed man who wore no clothes. This man was driven by a suicidal mania to cut himself. Every effort to bind him had proved futile, for he was endowed by the demons with superhuman strength. In the community where he had lived he had been a constant source of terror.

As soon as this man met Jesus the devils in him knew that they were doomed, that they had met their Master. "Send us into the swine," they besought Him. This could have been a designing plot of vengeance. If only the devils could be the means of annihilating the pigs, the owners would inevitably rise up against the Nazarene, and would not tolerate Him in their midst. The demon-possessed pigs fell

into a panic. They rushed down the almost perpendicular cliffs and all two thousand of them drowned in the sea.

When the owners of the herds learned what had happened, they came to Jesus. They saw the one whom they had formerly feared—now "clothed, and in his right mind." But instead of falling down at Jesus' feet in gratitude, they thought only of their hogs, and lest other losses should befall them they "began to pray him to depart out of their coasts." That prayer was granted.

"And when he was come into the ship, he that had been possessed with the devil prayed him that he might be with him." This prayer was denied. The Lord needed His servant to remain with the Gadarenes: He will not leave Himself without a witness. This man, who had formerly been a signal illustration of the working of Satan, would henceforth be a living monument of the transforming power of the Lord of Glory!

Lord Over Physical Infirmities

Some time later a deaf and dumb man was brought to Christ. We are not told why our Lord took this patient "aside from the multitude," but it may have been to secure the man's complete attention. Perhaps He felt that if the man were removed from public gaze He could more effectively help him. Jesus may have had the same motive for making use of manual acts—putting His fingers into the man's ears, and touching his tongue. These manual acts may have been a sort of sign language to stimulate faith.

While I was in Kobe, Japan, a group of deaf and dumb persons were brought to me. I hesitated to pray for them, for I knew they had not heard the Word, as others had; yet my heart went out in compassion in their behalf. I ministered to one, but without result! To another, another, and another-yet no results! The situation was having a damaging effect upon the faith of the congregation. Deep down in my heart I whispered a prayer, asking for guidance. Immediately their teacher, guided by the Holy Spirit, came forward and offered her assistance. Then I spoke to them while she interpreted in sign language. A changed look came over their faces as they drank in God's Word. Again I began to minister to them, but now one after another were made to hear and repeat what I spoke in their ears. Defeat gave way to vic-

shore. Presently Jairus, "one of the rulers of the synagogue," brought his problem to Jesus. Throwing himself down at Jesus' feet, he said, "My little daughter lieth at the point of death: I pray thee, come and lay thy hands on her, that she may be healed; and she shall live." Jesus went along.

Meanwhile, messengers came to inform the father, "The daughter is dead: why troublest thou the Master any further?" Perhaps the father's friends had discouraged the journey in the first place, feeling it was futile. And now that the child was dead, they felt it useless for the Healer to come. Their arrival was timed to coincide with the cure of the woman who pressed through the crowd to touch Jesus. Had they arrived sooner, Jairus might have lost heart and abandoned his petition. Iesus said. "Be not afraid, only believe." The act of healing and this word of assurance swept away all lingering doubts.

When the party reached the house, they were confronted with every sign and token of death; hired mourners were filling the air with shrieks and wailing! "Why make ye this ado, and weep?" Jesus asked. "The damsel is not dead, but sleepeth." When He is near, death is but sleep. Taking the twelve-year-old child by the hand, He said, "Talitha cumi!" And her dead form obeyed the word of Omnipotence! She sat up and looked at them! Yes, Jesus is the Lord and Master over death.

* * *

Finally the sad day arrived for the disciples—Jesus laid down His life, the Lord of Glory was crucified! They were stunned, dispersed, desolate! Jesus' body was placed in a tomb. But after three days He arose, and for forty days He often conversed with His own.

Then one day Jesus ascended to His Father from the Mount of Olives, while the disciples watched. The irreversible law of gravitation yielded to the Lord of Glory. Heaven and earth paid homage to their Creator and rightful Lord. The heavens bowed low to robe the Saviour with white clouds, fit for His enthronement. Welcomed back in heaven, He was given highest honors—a place at His Father's right hand.

Christ has given us the right to use His name in His absence. "Whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do," He has told us (John 14: 13). And that name today represents all that it did while He was here on the earth in human form, for He is still the Lord and Master of all heaven and earth

Christ has equipped us with His character as well as His name, and has given us the privilege of winning others to Him. Oh, that all men would accept Him as Lord! All creation has owned Him as Master, but still He is rejected of men.

Some day He will come back to the earth in great power and glory. All men will be compelled to bow before Him and acknowledge Him as Lord. Then the earth, which has been cursed because of man's disobedience, will enjoy a long and peaceful reign of the Son of God. All creation will rejoice that "He is Lord of all" (Acts 10:36). You, too, will bow before Him eventuallywhy not now? You must accept Christ as your personal Saviour and Lord in this life, in order to be saved. Blessed are they who bow before Him voluntarily and who willingly obey Him as their Master.

YOU MUST BELIEVE

Jesus told the disciples, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:16).


He told Nicodemus, "He that believeth on Him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God" (John 3:18).

Paul and Silas told the jailer, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

If you will do these things Christ will forgive your sins, for He has promised, "Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out" (John 6:37). And Isaiah 1:18 promises, "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow."

"After That - Miracles

THE UNVARNISHED STORY OF THE NEW TESTAMENT READS LIKE A REFRESHING GUST OF FRESH AIR THAT NOT ONLY BLOWS AWAY THE STUFFINESS OF OUR UNBELIEF, BUT ALSO COOLS THE FEVER OF OUR FANATICISM.



There has been a constant swing of the pendulum-first towards, then away from, emphasis upon miracles in the Pentecostal Movement. By its very nature the revival is a protest against deadness in the churches. Therefore when it first broke out in power over fifty years ago, and wherever it still breaks out anew anywhere in the world, there is particular emphasis upon the miraculous. This is as it should be, but invariably it produces extremes and extremists. They in turn provoke others to a corrective swing away from emphasis upon miracles towards stress upon that which is orderly and conservative. It has been interesting to watch the pendulum swing.

There is a strong central body of believers, constituting the very heart of the Pentecostal churches, who do not want extremes either way. They are turning with rightful abhorrence from the fantastic overemphasis upon miracles that is marking the efforts of certain evangelists at the present time. They feel that this emphasis is not according to truth, and they recognize that it can cause grievous harm to the testimony.

On the other hand, this solid body

of Spirit-filled believers fear equally the intrusive corrections that may quench the Spirit and make our testimony scarcely recognizable as "Pentecostal." What we ask for is leadership based on the Word of God. We want to go forward, but we refuse to be stampeded into sham revivals. We also refuse to be herded back into a formalism from which we, as well as our fathers, joyfully escaped.

In 1 Corinthians 12:28 we read, "And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles."

God has set *miracles* in the Church. Just what does the word mean? The popular idea of a miracle is "a marvelous event due to some supernatural agency" (Oxford Dictionary). Good enough! We can accept that definition, recognizing, however, that the nature of the "supernatural agency" is left an open question. It can be good, or it can be evil.

In the Greek of the New Testament there are two words translated "miracle." One is dunamis—an act of power. The other is semeion—a sign. In evangelistic and apostolic ministry both have a place. Both words occur in connection with Philip (Acts 8:13) and Paul (Acts 19:11; Romans 15:19). Our Lord confirmed the preaching of the Word "with signs following." God bore them witness "both with signs and wonders, and with divers miracles, and gifts of the Holy Ghost, according to His own will" (Hebrews 2:4)—in this verse both words are used.

The Pentecostal revival is a witness

that similarly miraculous ministry can have an important place today in evangelistic and missionary (apostolic) work. There is no scriptural authority for stating that it should have ceased. Its value is being proved afresh in the ministry of the gospel. But the Scriptures also teach us how to keep miracles in a right place in our regard.

Even in New Testament days there were some miracles that were unusual, as in Acts 19:11, where "God wrought special [literally, not the ordinary] miracles by the hands of Paul." The remarkable outbursts of miraculous power through Stephen, Philip, Peter, Paul, and others were obviously outstanding. We approach the norm for the miraculous in the early churches in 1 Corinthians 12, where the "working of miracles" is included in lists containing other less spectacular ministries. What is remarkable is the place that "miracles" occupy in those lists. They are placed in the middle both in 1 Corinthians 12:3-10 and in verses 28, 29. Priority is given to words of wisdom and knowledge among the gifts of the Spirit, and to apostles, prophets, and teachers among the ministries set by God in the Church. Nevertheless, it is a noteworthy thing that "miracles" occur in the lists at all, and were recognized as a normal part of the local church's enjoyment of the Holy Spirit's power and presence.

In three places in First Corinthians 12 where miracles are referred to, the word is "dunamis," not "semeion." Young's literal translation of verse 28 is "afterwards powers." "Wielders of

spiritual power" is J. B. Phillips' rendering, while A. A. Way puts it "marvel workers." The thought is the expression of tremendous energy. It does not appear that these miracles were healings, for "gifts of healings" are listed as distinct and separate. If we can seek examples in the ministry of apostles they included the casting out of demons (Acts 16:18), acts of judgment (Acts 5:5; 13:11), and similar marvels. An interesting reference to Jannes and Jambres in 2 Timothy 3:8 suggests that as Moses victoriously met the magicians of Egypt by a greater display of the supernatural power of God, so miracles in the Church can supply evidence that the power of Christ is mightier than that of demonic inspiration.

One of the most impressive things about the New Testament records of miracles in the lives of the early Christians is the way they continued to lead quite normal careers in spite of knowing so much of the supernatural as a commonplace in their assemblies. For instance, Paul knew hunger and thirst, danger and perils of travel, weariness and painfulness, cold and nakedness (2 Corinthians 11:25-27). In the story of his shipwreck (Acts 27) the sailors had to be kept in the ship so that all could be saved (verse 31); and until the gifts of healing operated in the island, only in the incident of the viper did a miracle emerge (28:5).

As far as we know, Dorcas and Eutychus were the only believers raised from the dead by miraculous power. That most of the early believers died in the course of nature is clear from such passages as 1 Thessalonians 4:14. It was not miracles, but the word of promise, that assuaged the pangs of bereavement.

The unvarnished story of the New Testament reads like a refreshing gust of fresh air that not only blows away the stuffiness of our unbelief, but also cools the fever of our fanaticism. A course of balanced Bible-reading is recommended as a healthy corrective against the neurotic efforts of some modern journals devoted solely to propaganda for the miraculous. Let us come back to balance and truth. "Thy word is truth." We can trust the Holy Spirit

to use the Word to set our hearts on fire with a holy longing to see His energy manifestly at work among us, even while it calms the fever of misguided enthusiasts who have temporarily lost their sense of proportion in holy things.

A shrewd old friend of mine wrote to me recently, as he was completing an extensive journey, and said: "The many individuals - seemingly gifted with influence, personality, and organization-who work outside the framework of the Church and under authority to none, form a bewildering problem. I never ascertained how these brethren would like to be compared with the apostle Paul, who, though so endowed with gifts, personality, vision, and divine authority, used his calling and position not only to establish the Church, but further to set down the divine order for maintenance of the body of Christ by that which every joint supplieth, in unity, in deference to the Head . . . but these seem to work outside the authority of the body, being subject

That penetrating judgment is weighty. Failure to recognize the truth of the "body" of Christ (1 Corinthians 12) is a besetting weakness of all those gifted with great power. The Bible makes it clear that "workers of miracles" were only one category among several others, and that they were not even regarded as of supreme importance. In any case, they had nothing unless it

was given them by the Holy Spirit. His manifestations are "divided to every man severally as He will" (1 Corinthians 12:11). That divine will decrees that not all are to be workers of miracles (verse 29). Straining and striving to supply some assumed manifestation of divine power is far removed from the ease with which true gifts of the Spirit operate in divine love.

We admire the faith and courage of evangelists who seek to supply practical evidence of the supernatural in the power of the gospel, even to the working of miracles as God wills. Moreover it is only to be expected that huge crowds will flock to any place where they are led to expect miracles to happen. That kind of thing occurred even in the earthly ministry of our Lord. But He who knew all men knew how little it signified of repentance and change of heart toward God. To boast that huge crowds of miracle-seekers constitute a new revival is to betray sheer ignorance of the basic facts of the gospel. They do nothing of the sort.

God wants all men to be saved, but that means far more than handraising among a mass of people whipped into excitement by studied methods of suggestion. The Holy Spirit's appeal is to the conscience and the will. Miracles arouse and attract, but only in exceptional cases do they do anything more. It is a divine perfection of wisdom that lists other greater ministries first and then says, "... after that miracles."

Healing in Christ

"Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows . . . and with his stripes we are healed" (Isa. 53:4, 5). This 53rd chapter of Isaiah is the great evangelical's vision, the Gospel of the Old Testament, the very mirror of the coming Redeemer. And here in the front of it, prefaced by a great Amen—the only "surely" in the chapter—is the promise of healing, the very strongest possible statement of complete redemption from pain and sickness by His life and death

Here we have the very words which the evangelist afterward quotes, under the inspired guidance of the Holy Ghost (Matt. 8:17), as the explanation of His universal sealing. The translation in Matthew 8:17 is much better: "Himself took our infirmities, and bare our sicknesses." The literal translation would be: "Surely He hath borne away our sicknesses, and carried away our pains."

Any person who will refer to such a familiar commentary as that of Albert Barnes on Isaiah, or any other Hebrew authority, will see that the two words here used denote respectively sickness and pain, and that the words for "bear" and "carry" denote not mere sympathy, but actual substitution and the removal utterly of the thing borne. Therefore, as He has borne our sins, Jesus Christ has also borne away and carried off our sicknesses; yea, and even our pains. By abiding in Him, we may be fully delivered from both sickness and pain. Blessed and glorious gospel! Blessed and glorious burden Bearer!

Churches Spared Damage in San Francisco Quake

The earthquake which struck San Francisco on March 22 apparently did no major damage to churches, a survey indicated.

Brethren to Mark Anniversary in 1958

The Church of the Brethren will celebrate the 250th anniversary of its founding in 1958. Special observances for the entire year have been planned.

Persecution of Jews Continuing in Poland

Anti-Semitism is continuing in Poland, resulting in the dismissal of many Jews from their jobs and the refusal of many employers to hire Jews. Mainly because of persecution, a mass exodus of Jews to Israel is underway.

Bible Portions Now in 1109 Languages

Some part of the Bible has been published in 1,109 languages and dialects as of December 31, 1956, according to a statement by the American Bible Society. Seventeen new languages have been added to the list in the past year.

ABS Prepares Filmstrip for Church Distribution

The spiritual needs of people suddenly uprooted and thrust upon the international scene as refugees is vividly portrayed in a new color filmstrip, "Flight to Freedom," produced by the American Bible Society. The filmstrip is expected to draw large church audiences because of its extremely high news interest. It will be made available free of charge to churches on request to the American Bible Society, 540 Park Avenue, New York 22, New York, or from any of the Society's eleven district offices in this country.

Washington to Renegotiate Haitian Treaty

The State Department "will not press Congress to consider at this session the draft treaty of friendship, commerce, and navigation with Haiti." The treaty had been opposed by a number of church groups because it omitted the customary guarantees of religious freedom to nationals of both countries.

The National Association of Evangelicals and the POAU were both instrumental in blocking approval of the treaty which has been before the Senate for two years.

Catholics Urge Government Study of Family Allowances

The National Catholic Conference on Family Life has urged the government to take what amounts to another step in the direction of a socialized state. The group, at its convention in Milwaukee, issued a plea that the government study the feasibility of providing "family allowances" to aid low-income parents in rearing their children. The resolution noted that more than eight million American families have incomes of less than \$2,000 a year and that the majority of these have more children than the higher income families.

Catholic leaders have always been advocates of large families. Growth of the Catholic church is largely through normal population increase.

Urge Protestant, Catholic Talks on Persecutions

Top-level conversations between Protestant leaders and Vatican officials on the "persecution of Protestants in Spain and South America" were urged by the North America Area Council of the World Presbyterian Alliance at its annual meeting in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Senator Morse Tells of Protestant Woes in Colombia

Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon took the floor of the Senate last month in order to draw attention to the "difficulties which many United States Protestant missionaries have experienced, and regrettably are still experiencing, in Colombia." Senator Morse is chairman of the Sub-Committee on South American Affairs of the Senate. Senate interest in the matter has been stirred by thousands of letters from American evangelicals who are desirous of seeing religious pressures and persecution in Colombia stopped.

Senator Morse stated that he would maintain a "close and constant interest in the matter," and if necessary his committee would meet later in the year to "discuss the question of our relationship with Colombia." His speech was the first public recognition of the Colombian problem in the U. S. Senate.

Protestant Rally in Indonesia Draws Record Crowd

Approximately 100,000 people thronged about the open-air rally that ushered in the Eastern Asia Christian Conference in Indonesia on March 20. It was the largest crowd ever to attend a Protestant meeting in the predominantly Moslem country. The rally was held in Liberty Square in the city of Pematang Siantar, Sumatra.

President Sukarno, a Moslem, welcomed the delegates from 24 countries, saying that the Christian churches of Asia, "following the teachings of Jesus, would contribute to freedom, justice, and peace among men."

Another speaker was Hadji Iljas, Minister of Religious Affairs. Also a Moslem, he affirmed the freedom of religion in Indonesia. He said that although a majority of the people are Moslems, "Christianity cannot be considered a foreign importation. Christianity was born in Asia," he declared, "and it has its rightful place in Asian national life."

Ninety per cent of Indonesia's 82 million people are Moslems. Three million are Protestants and one million Roman Catholics.

The rally was held a few miles from the spot where, in 1834, two American missionaries—Henry Lyman and Samuel Munson—were slain by the then savage Batak tribes. Today more than half of the 1,200,000 Bataks of Sumatra are Protestant Christians. During the rally a specially recruited choir of 500 Batak young men and women, whose ancestors practiced cannibalism until less than a century ago, sang the Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's "The Messiah" in their own language.

Vote Down Gambling Bills in Two States

A Baptist pastor in Little Rock says that an alert Civic Morality Committee of the Arkansas Baptist Convention can be credited with defeating efforts in the Arkansas legislature to legalize gambling and turn the state into another "Reno."

In Kansas, a bill to legalize pari-mutuel betting in that state was killed by a vote in the House.

No Liquor for Drinking Drivers

When a person is convicted of drunken driving in Green Lake County, Wisconsin, he is served a formal "Notice Forbidding Sale of Intoxicating Liquors or Fermented Beverages." The notice makes it illegal for anyone to sell or give that person intoxicants for a period of one year. The sheriff also adds that person's name to a list posted conspicuously in each of Green Lake County's 60 saloons.

The idea is a step in the right direction, but why not ban the sale of liquor before the individual gets arrested? It would save the public a great deal of money, and end many heartaches and headaches.

Takes Survey of Evangelicals in Japan

Kenny Joseph, editor of *Japan Harvest*, has made a survey of evangelical strength in Japan and tabulated these statistics: In Japan among evangelicals there are 107,073 baptized church members, 178,848 adherents, 1,302 ordained pastor-evangelists, and 688 unordained full-time workers. These evangelicals meet in 1,619 organized churches and 1,249 other meeting places.

Mr. Joseph contacted some 69 Japanese groups and 90 missionary organizations (including the Assemblies of God) in making the survey.

Commercial Radio Station for Israel?

Possibilities of commercial radio making its appearance in Israel are being given favorable consideration by the Prime Minister's office, according to *Israel Digest*. At present all radio broadcasting is under government control.

A group of American businessmen has offered to invest a million dollars in a station which would broadcast to the Mediterranean area. Languages used would be Arabic, Turkish, Greek, English, French, and Hebrew.

A commercial radio station possibly would open the way for paid gospel broadcasting in the Middle East. Such broadcasts are severely curtailed or banned on governmentcontrolled stations.

Church Asks Hearing on Radio Station's License

First Methodist Church of Los Angeles, California, has asked the Federal Communications Commission to order a public hearing to determine whether Radio Station KFAC, Los Angeles, meets its obligations as a broadcast licensee. Dr. J. Richard Sneed, pastor of the 104-year-old church, said the action was taken after the station notified the church it could no longer purchase time to broadcast its Sunday morning services, as it had been continuously since 1923. The pastor said the owner explained that they are "gradually eliminating all religious programs and replacing them with musical programs."

Dr. Sneed rightly contends that in a "basically religiousminded country" it is in the public interest that all religious denominations "which wish to bring to the radio public religious services should be permitted a fair and representative amount of broadcast time."

Perhaps Dr. Sneed is feeling the pinch of a policy advocated by the National Council of Churches, of which his denomination is a member. The NCC has outspokenly advocated that time for religious broadcasts be on a sustaining basis only, and that no broadcast time be sold for such purposes. Such a policy would bar most evangelical programs from the air waves.

Canadian Newspapers, Radio, to Be Prosecuted

The Sunday Telegram, Ontario's first Sunday newspaper, appeared at Toronto despite protests by Protestant church leaders. The Attorney General promptly announced that the newspaper would be prosecuted for Sunday work under the Lord's Day Act of Canada. Also to be prosecuted, he said, would be two other Toronto newspapers, a radio station, and the government-owned Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. He said the prosecutions would be "in the public interest," to determine whether the Lord's Day Act will permit the gathering and distribution of news on Sunday via the press, radio, and television.

No Change in West Virginia Constitution

West Virginia is still the only state in the union that fails to make a reference to God in its constitution. A joint resolution to amend the preamble to the constitution to include mention of God died in the Senate Judiciary Committee as the legislature adjourned. Previously it had been unanimously approved by the House. Senate committee members gave no explanation for their failure to act on the resolution.

Personal Evangelism in Greece

A BURDEN FOR SOUL-WINNING AND the training of personal workers has gripped my heart, and since arriving in Greece we have been busily engaged in this type of labor.

We felt directed by the Lord to the church in Athens, Greece, where Mary Metaxatos is ministering, and have been assisting in the work there. It was decided that a Personal Work Class be formed where believers could be trained in soul-winning and effective witnessing.

The first class drew about thirtyfive and the average attendance since has been thirty. Not only are the students learning methods, but they are putting them into practice right along and becoming experts in the art of soul-winning.

My wife and I have tried to set an example by going into homes with the message of salvation. The law forbids the holding of street meetings or the distributing of tracts. Personal visitation is the only way. The young people have been obtaining names of unsaved loved ones of members of the church and have been calling on them. There is a growing spiritual enthusiasm among the young people as there is

evidence of fruit in the personal evangelism.

Our first practical work was in a hospital, where we divided our number into two groups. One precious soul was won to the Lord. I can still visualize the smiling face of this young lady as she waved farewell to us from the hospital porch.

The young folk are finding it a joy to witness at their places of employment, at school, and among their friends. A few find it difficult to witness, because of shyness, but we are praying that God will grant them boldness.

In the classes we have had the students mark their Bibles, indicating verses on such topics as sin, hell, salvation, and other essential themes.

Our main difficulty has been our place of worship. This has been on the third floor of an old building and consists of one room, without proper facilities for Sunday School. Adults and young people have had to group together; and all the children have had to be in one class, meeting behind the pulpit and organ in an attempt to deflect the sound and not disturb the others. In spite of such cramped and inconvenient quarters the Lord has blessed, and the church has been full both on Sundays and on Thursdays at the midweek service. Many have

stood at the rear because of lack of seating space.

The floor has shown signs of weakness. When folk walked down the aisle, one could actually see and feel the floor move. Most of the congregation have made real sacrifices to help toward a larger church.

We praise God for a new property in Salonika provided by the brethren of the Greek Branch of the Assemblies of God in America. However, funds are needed to purchase seats for this building so that the services can be started. Your help will be a great blessing to the believers in Greece. Harold Rich visited Central Bible Institute of Springfield, Missouri during 1950 and was greatly impressed with the tremendous work being done for the Lord in that institution. A desire came to him to have a Bible school in Denmark, but because of difficult circumstances it seemed impossible.

Part of the ministry of God's children is to encourage one another, and V. G. Greisen, a Dane himself, who has had a very successful ministry in the U.S.A., was used to encourage Brother Rich to persist in his endeavor. They had faith to believe that God would grant them the needed school in Denmark.

The Lord rewarded faith in a marvelous way. The City of Mariager gave twenty-five acres to be used for the construction of the school, and the Danish government granted 600,000 crowns with an additional annual gift of 70,000 crowns for the operation of the school.

The Bible doctrines are taught in

Pentecostal fashion, and perfect freedom is given to teach a number of Bible school subjects; but because it is a government recognized school, other subjects such as geography, language, mathematics, history, and literature must also be taught. In a year's time, permission will be granted for an additional department to give full Bible courses for ministers.

There are forty-three fine young men and women attending the school. Prayer meetings continuing long into the night are common—the students love to pray. All of them are consecrated, pre-

Missions in Northern Alaska

Few people travel to Alaska's largest Eskimo village, Barrow. It is located at the extreme northern tip of Alaska, several hundreds of miles north of the Arctic Circle. However, in 1954 A. E. Capener, E. H. Anderson, and C. Lewis Welker went to Barrow for the purpose of building an Assemblies of God church. They built the first story of the church and also living quarters for the Capeners.

Mrs. Capener joined her husband later, and under their capable leadership the work has prospered. Last fall Brother Capener built the second story of the structure, assisted by E. H. Anderson, Clarence Maloney, and Eugene La Brie. These brethren traveled

from the east coast of the United States to Barrow in order to assist in this building program.

Today there is a well-built church with living quarters at Barrow. Souls have been saved and filled with the Spirit. The Eskimo congregation is growing, and the Sunday School averages around 170.

Few people can comprehend the problems that face the missionary in the Arctic. The cold and darkness, in addition to the spiritual battles and inconveniences peculiar to the Arctic, take much from the worker. These missionaries should be upheld in prayer.

Both Brother Capener and Brother Anderson have had the opportunity of ministering to the servicemen at the various sites along the D.E.W. line. There are other villages to be reached along the Arctic Coast, but for this work one must be especially prepared physically, financially, and spiritually to cope with many problems.

NOME

Sister Harriet Brown has ministered at Nome on the Bering Sea for a number of years. God has honored her ministry among the Eskimo people, though much opposition has been experienced. The work at Nome would be a challenge to any man, yet Sister Brown has carried it on successfully under the leadership of the Holy Spirit. Some real "gems" have been won to the Lord in this work. Sister Brown and the saints at Nome need our prayers.

FORT YUKON

On the banks of the Yukon River, just above the Arctic Circle, lies the village of Fort Yukon. Although most of the people are native Indians, there are some white people in the village. A military establishment nearby adds to the opportunity for ministry here.

The Indian people have been bound by a formal religion which has blinded their eyes to the true gospel. This has

made the older people especially hard to reach, but there has been an encouraging revival among the children. Several have been saved and some filled with the Holy Spirit. Brother and Sister John Covlasky are our missionaries here, assisted by the Kenneth Garrisons, who have been working in Fort Yukon.

BEAVER

As we travel down the river from Fort Yukon we come to the Eskimo village of Beaver. For the past year, Brother and Sister Paul E. Bills have been ministering to the people of this village. It has been a year of hard work, spiritual battles, discouragements, and financial problems, but the Billses have left a clear testimony and God has honored their labors. They have been asked to take the work at North Pole and have now moved there.

STEVENS VILLAGE

A little farther down the Yukon River we come to Stevens Village. Although missionaries have gone to Stevens Village occasionally for some time, a definite mission station was not established here until last fall. Brother and Sister Don Nelson have had a most fruitful and encouraging ministry in this place. It has been a difficult work in a wicked village, where people have not only been blinded by the formal religion but have actually been encouraged in their sin. But souls have been saved, and in January we had a wonderful water baptismal service in this village. The Christians are doing well but suffer much opposition. Pray earnestly that they may be filled with the Holy Spirit.

MINTO

Minto is on the Tanana River about fifty miles west of Fairbanks. Here God has honored the labors of Brother and Sister Gordon Olson. Several have been saved. The real need of the village is for the believers to receive the Holy Spirit. Here again the bondage of formal religion is felt, and it seems difficult to break away from it.

Brother and Sister Olson have built a comfortable log parsonage. A boat is expected to be put into use this summer after the ice goes out in May. This will help so much in getting wood for fuel and in other ways. These faithful workers and the native Christians need to be upheld in intercessory prayer that God will undertake in giving them an outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

NORTH POLE

Brother and Sister Richard J. Teeter started the work in North Pole, a settlement on the Richardson Highway about fifteen miles from Fairbanks. They were able to establish a Sunday School and a small congregation. They built a very nice log church which was sufficiently finished to be used for services. For reasons of health it was necessary for the Teeters to make a change.

In January the congregation voted to become an Assembly of God and was set in order. Paul E. Bills was chosen as pastor. Souls have been saved, the attendance is increasing, and the outlook is encouraging.

FAIRBANKS

The city of Fairbanks is the hub of the interior of Alaska. As the various missionaries come from the interior to do business here, it is sometimes our privilege to entertain them. We often find that they need fellowship and encouragement. It is also my privilege from time to time to visit some of these mission stations with my plane and try to be of some help and encouragement.

The Fairbanks Assembly is made up largely of military personnel. Because of the military rotation system, there is quite a turnover. This has many disadvantages, but we do have the advantage of touching many different lives for the Master.

The Fairbanks Assembly has proved through the years to be a blessing and a "church home away from home" to many Assemblies of God soldiers and airmen, as well as to those who have come to know Christ here.

McGRATH

Brother and Sister Clifford Geedy are laboring faithfully for the Lord in the village of McGrath on the Kuskokwim River. McGrath is quite isolated, and is accessible only by air and by small boat part of the year. It is necessary for these missionaries to labor with their hands in order to pay the excessive living costs.



ANIAK

Farther down the Kuskokwim River is the village of Aniak. Much labor has gone into this place. A children's home was established here in 1949, but it has since been closed. The church is now under the leadership of our missionaries, Brother and Sister James File. Brother File not only has ministered to the native population in Aniak, but he has traveled some distances by dog team to reach as many as possible for the Lord.

Russian Orthodox influence has been quite pronounced in the Kuskokwim River areas.

TAKOTNA AND BETTLES

Sister Mildred James is teaching school in the village of Takotna. She holds services and conducts a Sunday School as well.

Roberta Hill is teaching in Bettles. As they have opportunity these young women are witnessing for the Lord in these villages.

It is expensive to do gospel work in Alaska, much more so than in most places. It costs more to reach one soul in Alaska than in most mission fields. There are many discouragements to overcome. The powers of darkness offer great opposition. The natural cold and darkness have their effect on the bodies and minds of the missionaries. But shall we draw back because of these obstacles?

Jesus said, "Go ye into ALL the world." These souls are precious! Let us give so that the work in Alaska may advance! Let us intercede in prayer that a mighty spiritual awakening will be experienced all through Alaska. Only by the power of the Holy Spirit can this great work be accomplished.

Point out (1) the memorial they set up, vv. 4-6; (2) why they set up this memorial, vv. 6. 7; (3) why we need to remember what God has done for usnot to live in the past, but to encourage cur faith to believe Him to do even greater things in the future.

Question Time: What was the memorial that Joshua and Israel set up? (vv. 5, 6) Why did they set up a memorial? (vv. 20-24) Should we remember past blessings?

Tuesday, April 30

Read: Joshua 5:13 to 6:27

Learn: "The Lord wrought a great victory" (2 Sam. 23:12).

For the Parent: Point out that (1) even though Israel's strategy in surrounding Jericho was unusual, they were obeying the command of God; (2) because they obeyed, God gave them a great victory; (3) Israel had a part in the battle after God caused the walls to fall down; see verses 20-25.

Question Time: Who gave Joshua his battle plan? (6:2) What was the battle plan? (6:2-5) What happened to the walls of the city? (6:20) Why were Rahab and her family saved by Israel? (6:25)

Wednesday, May 1

Read: Joshua 7

Learn: "Be sure your sin will find you out" (Num. 32:23).

For the Parent: Review the victory at Jericho which came because Israel obeyed God. Point out how God had also commanded that no one was to take anything from Jericho, and that Achan disobeyed. Also show how his sin resulted in defeat for Israel, and finally in death for Achan and his family. God does not look lightly upon any sin.

Question Time: Why was Israel defeated when she tried to conquer Ai? (v. 11) Whose sin was responsible for the defeat? What happened to Achan because of sin? (vv. 24-26)

Thursday, May 2

Read: Acts 8:5-8, 26-40

Learn: "Then Philip opened his mouth, and began at the same scripture, and preached unto him Jesus" (Acts 8:35).

For the Parent: (Additional material on "Philip, the Evangelist" will be found on Sunday's Lesson page.) Philip was one of the first deacons; see Acts 6:5. Point out (1) his successful evangelistic meeting in Samaria; (2) his call to leave this meeting to preach to one person. Stress God's value of one individual.

Question Time: What position did Philip hold in the early Church? (see above) What does this lesson teach about the worth of one soul?

Friday, May 3

Read: Luke 10:25-37 (Sunday's Lesson for

Learn: "The Lord hath been mindful of us: he will bless us" (Psa. 115:12).

For the Parent: Review the parable of the good Samaritan, including the situation that caused Jesus to relate it. Point out (1) Jesus is the Good Samaritan who will be a Friend to us at all times; (2) we should be "good Samaritans," ready to befriend and help everyone we can.

Question Time: Why did Jesus give the parable of the good Samaritan? (vv. 25-29) What was the normal relationship of the Jews and Samaritans (John 4:9) How can we be "good Samaritans"? (See above)


Saturday, May 4

Read: Exodus 16 (Sunday's Lesson for Primaries)

Learn: "Give us this day our daily bread" (Matt. 6:11).

For the Parent: Point out how God miraculously provided food for the children of Israel in the wilderness. He is also able to supply all our physical, material and spiritual needs if we trust Him.

Question Time: What did the children of Israel do when they found there was no food? (vv. 2, 3) What did God do for them? (v. 4) What did they call this bread from heaven? (v. 15) How long did God supply manna for them (v. 35) What need has God met for you?



PHILIP, THE EVANGELIST

Sunday School Lesson for May 5, 1957 Acts 8:1-8, 29-40

A FAITHFUL DEACON (vv. 1-8)

The Nature of His Ministry. Philip was not an apostle, but one of the six deacons chosen in Acts 6 to serve the Church. "They that have used the office of a deacon well purchase to themselves a good degree" (1 Timothy 3:13). Philip was faithful as a deacon and God gave him a wider ministry as an evangelist.

The Theme of His Ministry. CHRIST was the substance of Philip's preaching! What is the theme of our testimony? Are we exalting Christ, or self? Do we make much of His death, His resurrection, His glorious person, His present ministry on our behalf?

The Results of His Ministry. God confirmed the Word preached by Philip and granted miracles of deliverance. To say that miracles are not instrumental in turning people to God is simply a feeble effort to justify their absence; it is to close one's eyes to what is very clearly revealed in the Book of Acts. But miracles cannot be manufactured. They will occur only where there is genuine consecration, Christ-centered faith, and Holy Ghost prayer!

A FAITHFUL PERSONAL WORKER (vv. 26-40)

A Strange Command. "Arise, and go toward the south unto the way that goeth down from Jerusalem unto Gaza, which is desert." Philip was in the midst of a great revival. He was doing an extensive work for God. Why cease doing a "big" work to go off on a wild goose chase down a lonely desert road? Surely God would not send a successful evangelist into the desert when so many were clamoring for his ministry in the city! Thus Philip might have reasoned. God's commands often seem foolish to the natural mind, yet to obey them always means victory and blessing!

Unquestioning Obedience. "And he arose and went." Blessed be those who, like Philip, have faith, grace, and wisdom enough to obey the voice of the Lord. How little did Philip realize the far-reaching spiritual influence and blessing which would attend his implicit obedience to God!

A Timely Contact (vv. 27, 28). When God leads, He goes before. He always works on both ends of the line. As Philip walked the desert road, along came the "Minister of Finance" to the Queen of Ethiopia in northern Africa! And as this dignitary rode along he was reading from the fifty-third chapter of Isaiah.

A Second Command. "Then the Spirit said unto Philip, Go near, and join thyself to this chariot." The chariot did not come to Philip; Philip was to go to the chariot. We would like sinners to come to church—and some of them do. But if they will not come to us for the gospel, we must go to them with the gospel (Luke 14:16-23).

"And Philip ran thither to him." Unless it is prompt,

obedience is often useless! The chariot was passing, and in it was Philip's great opportunity—a hungry soul! Therefore Philip RAN to obey.

A Pointed Question. "Understandest thou what thou readest?" Observe: (1) Philip's question applies to our own personal Bible reading. How much we understand is more important than how much we read. The Bible should be read daily, prayerfully, meditatively, in dependence upon the Spirit for illumination, with the resolve to translate into action what we read. (2) While Philip was accustomed to working among poor and ordinary folk, he did not hesitate to approach this lordly statesman. Is there not a danger of our neglecting to testify to those who are above us in rank, education, wealth, and position? And does not such reluctance spring from a form of pride of which we ought to rid ourselves?

A Significant Answer. "How can I, except some man should guide me?" The Ethiopian's answer (1) reveals a beautiful spirit of teachableness. Meekness is a prerequisite to receiving spiritual guidance and enlightenment (2) It shows the fact of human responsibility in the salvation of souls. It is through men and not angels that God has ordained that men should be saved. God could save souls without human co-operation, but He will not! Are we fulfilling our solemn obligation and enjoying the wonderful privilege which must fill the angels with longing?

An Outstanding Conversion. It is reasonable to believe that the conversion of this influential man was God's way of getting the gospel into the continent of Africa, as tradition says. If this is so then this personal contact was probably Philip's "biggest" revival campaign!—J. Bashford Bishop

A Leper Is Cleansed

A cross the table from us missionaries in the crude bamboo hut sat Rodreggus beaming with joy, as his wife prepared tortillas and frijoles on the open earthen stove. True, the room was filled with smoke from the open fire; but to us the atmosphere was precious, because this man was a living testimony of the saving and healing power of Christ.

For twenty years this man had suffered with the loathsome disease called leprosy. Several of the joints of his fingers and toes had been eaten completely off. His nose had been eaten down almost even with his face. During these many years the disease had spread

constantly worse until he was a miserable bedfast victim.

Every doctor and medicine man for many miles around had exhausted their resources for years trying to bring relief and stop the leprosy. Friends and relatives shunned him because he was unclean.

Then one day a Bible fell into his hands, and Rodreggus began to learn of One who had healed people in his condition in the past. He read of the ten lepers whom Christ had healed, and he felt that if he could only be made clean he would be as grateful as the one who returned to give thanks. God helped him to have faith.

Eventually, an evangelical missionary passed through this little native village. Rodreggus tried to persuade someone to help him to one of the services. At first he was unsuccessful. "You are unclean," they told him. "You are a leper. We are afraid of you and your disease."

"Please, please," pleaded the leper, "carry me only one time so that I can hear of the One who can heal." And someone helped him.

At a distance the leper heard the message of Christ who had the same power to heal all kinds of diseases that He had when He was on earth. As he lay on the ground on his straw mat at a distance from the crowd, he heard his first invitation, and did not need a second. He did exactly what the missionary said to do, and accepted Christ as his Saviour. At that same moment he put his faith in Christ for healing, and God healed his leprosy instantly. It wasn't necessary for his friends to carry him back to his hut! He leaped with joy, rolled up his mat, and praised the One who had made him

Shortly after his healing Rodreggus searched the village for other natives who had felt the power of God as he had. Finally, five natives gathered together in a prayer meeting, and for five years they prayed that a revival would come to the village.

That was seven years ago. Today the skin and flesh of this former leper is quite normal; he is a well man because of God's healing power. Two years ago a revival swept the countryside around the village. Because of the faith of a former leper, there stands today a large Assemblies of God mission, which is the largest Protestant mission for many, many miles. Rodreggus claps the parts of his hands that the leprosy did not eat off, and rejoices in the Lord.

When I was in your office in June we talked about the possibility Greetings in His name! when I was in your office in June we taked about the possibility of having Revivaltime released from some Rio de Janeiro station. 

Church Leadership School—A.C.T.S.— To Open June 3

SPRINGFIELD, MO. — Another session of the Church Leadership School known as "A.C.T.S." will open June 3 on the campus of Central Bible Institute in Springfield. The five-day course of training will be sponsored by the National Sunday School Department of the Assemblies of God.

The Advanced Christian Training School (A.C.T.S.), as it is called, is designed for the benefit of pastors, Sunday School superintendents, workers' training instructors, Christian education directors, district Sunday School directors, sectional Sunday School representatives, and others interested in Christian education.

The annual sessions, which began four years ago, have grown in attendance each year and this year's course is expected to draw a record enrollment. There will be a choice of 29 subjects, taught by 23 able Pentecostal instructors. The 1957 faculty includes the following teachers: J. R. Ashcroft, C. C. Burnett, Edith Denton, C. W. Denton Atwood Foster, Ralph Harris, Philip Hogan, D. V. Hurst, Donald Johns, L. B. Keener, Klaude Kendrick, Zella Lindsey, Vernon McLellan, Maxine Mitchell, Nicholas Nikoloff, Norman Bartlett Peterson. Schumitsch, Richard Strahan, Victor Trimmer, Philip Wannenmacher, Bert Webb and T. F. Zimmerman.

Some of the classes to be included at A.C.T.S. are: Attendance Building, Boys and Girls Camps, Building Planning Fund Raising, Lesson Planning, Music in Christian Education, New Schools, Visual Aid, Storytelling, and Pupil Psychology. There will be a number of new subjects taught for those who have attended previous sessions of A.C.T.S.

The schedule will include six classes each day. Special features in the afternoons will be a Crafts Class where an individual project will be made by each student, and a TV workshop for

those interested in using this medium of communication in their church work.

Each evening there will be a special lecture on Leadership and Personal Relations, conducted by Klaude Kendrick, president of Evangel College.

Registration will begin on Monday, June 3, at 1 p.m. A kickoff banquet will be held that evening. The Commencement service will be conducted Friday afternoon, June 7.

The cost of the school is the same as last year—just \$21.00 for room, board and tuition for the entire school. Tuition alone will be \$6.75.

A person completing the course may

apply to the Training Division of the National Sunday School Department and have his credits transferred to two Workers' Training Certificates.

BINGHAMTON CHURCH GETS NEW NAME AND NEW HOME

Faith Tabernacle, Binghamton, New York, has purchased Kalurah Temple, formerly the Shrine Mosque, for their new quarters. This building, which carries an insurance appraisal of \$425,000, was purchased by the group for \$112,500. The building has 37,500 square feet of floor space and seats 1,650 in the main auditorium. Included in the purchase was a \$35,000 pipe organ and all furnishings.

The building, leased by the Broome Country Technical Institute for the past five years, is in excellent condition, according to R. D. E. Smith, pastor of the church. It is located

in the very center of the city.

Pastor Smith, who is also the Assistant Superintendent of the New York District, announces that the new building will be opened with a dedication service next Sunday, May 5. Also, at that time, the name of the church will be changed to First Assembly of God. Dedication speakers will be Bert Webb, Assistant General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, Springfield, Missouri, and Joseph R. Flower, Superintendent of the New York District.

A dedication revival will begin on May 7 with C. M. Ward, speaker for Revivaltime, world-wide radio voice of the Assemblies of God. Brother Ward's week in Binghamton will conclude with the origination of the network broadcast of Revivaltime from Binghamton on May 12. Evangelist William Kautz, Montreal, Canada, will continue in revival meetings from that date.

Faith Tabernacle was founded in 1916 by John Kellner. The present Pastor, R. D. E. Smith, came to the church in 1950. Under his ministry the work prospered and plans were laid to construct a new building at a cost of \$330,000 A building site had already been secured and paid for, but when the opportunity arose to purchase an even more commodious building, plans were changed to occupy the Kalurah Temple instead. All readers within traveling distance are invited to attend the dedication service next Sunday and the revival meetings which will follow.



Your Questions

ANSWERED BY ERNEST S. WILLIAMS

Does a person have to continue to talk in other tongues to be assured that he is still filled with the Spirit?

No. We are to judge our experience (if in doubt) by our devotion to Christ and by the manner of our conduct. We ought to seek always to do those things which we believe the Lord wants us to do, and then trust in the merit of what Jesus has done for us in His death on the cross. There is great blessing, however, in speaking in tongues during times of private prayer, if the Spirit of God so moves upon us; and if the Lord wants us to give a message in tongues during a public service we ought to yield to Him and obey.

Will the Holy Spirit continue to dwell in a person who gets angry? Will He remain in one who lives a sinful, filthy life?

You have asked me two questions, but perhaps I can treat both with one answer.

We must remember that we are human even when we have been filled with the Spirit. Paul said, "The flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh." Then he enumerated a number of things which he described as "works of the flesh" (Galatians 5: 17-21). Since this is so, a person might yield to the flesh and become angry after he has been filled with the Spirit.

But this is not the standard he should set for himself, and if he were to give way to anger habitually I believe he would grieve the Spirit away. The Holy Spirit has come to "help our infirmities" and to enable us to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-24). We are exhorted to "put...on the Lord Jesus Christ [the Christ-life], and make no provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts [desires] thereof" (Romans 13:14).

At the same time, we must ever see that we have in Christ a righteous standing which is His perfection. We are saved through Christ and not by any merit of our own goodness. Should we be overtaken by anger, or some

other fault, we should "confess our sins," knowing that if we do so, He is "faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). This means that God is faithful to honor Christ's atonement and to forgive us, and He is just to His own holiness and government in so doing.

While any Christian might at some time miss the mark and commit a sin, no Christian makes it a practice to sin, for "he that [practiceth] sin is of the devil"; and "whosoever is born of God doth not [practice] sin" (1 John 3:8, 9).

Did Jesus mean we should be as pure and holy as God when He said, "Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect" (Matthew 5:48)?

When Jesus said this I hardly believe He had in mind absolute perfection, for when He spoke to the rich young ruler He said, "There is none good but one, that is, God." In Matthew 5:48 Jesus showed us what His Spirit within us would do if He had full operation in our lives. This therefore is an admonition to seek to follow the spirit or attitude which God would have were He in our place.

Where does the Bible say that Satan dragged down a third of the angels when he fell?


The scripture which some have assumed to mean this is Revelation 8:12, but I believe this verse has no connection with the fall of Satan. The Bible does teach a fall of angels, though, who "left their own habitation" (Jude 6). No account is given us as to their number. See 2 Peter 2:4.


The smallest touch from the Lord (even a crumb) can work wonders in your behalf. Do not defeat yourself in prayer by feeling that you are not worthy. Humble yourself before the Lord, confess your unworthiness, and let your faith be strengthened.

Jesus marvelled at her perseverance and faith. He said, "O woman, great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt." He did not tell her that her daughter would be made well. Her faith knew that it would be so, for "her daughter was made whole from that very hour."

See what great help this woman received from the Lord, and He had not even invited her to come to Him. Will the Lord not do as much and more for us? We have been invited to come—"Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need" (Hebrews 4:16).

THE DOCTOR CAME TO ME AND TOLD ME WHAT I HAD. It was pneumonia, both lungs, and spreading rapidly. The

day was an awful battle.

The night came on, and the heart beat was terrific. Breathing seemed a horror. I heard the missionaries come up from supper. My wife would not leave my side, but sat holding my hand.

My throat was dry, but the pain in swallowing grew more intense. My leg could not find a comfortable position, and a creeping clutch was on my lungs, growing as the moments passed. I could almost figure how long it would last.

The house became quiet. Everyone retired. I felt that I could fight no longer. The struggle of faith discouraged rather than comforted me. All the long, long weary days I had struggled against these monsters reaching for my life. I had been calling my struggle faith; but it was not faith, as I was soon to learn.

About half-past ten I became unconscious. I could hear my wife's voice grow fainter in my ear. Suddenly I was back again in my teens. The boss was calling out his orders. I threw off my coat, grabbed my ax, and made my way up the very steep and winding path to cut down a pine tree, according to his order. It was to be eighteen inches across the butt and sixteen feet long.

• There was my tree. I struggled into the swinging of the ax. The tree fell with a loud swish. The fresh, rancid smell of the pine was delightful to my nostril. Soon every limb was off, and the bark laid aside. I buried the ax in its soft fiber, then went to the big end and, getting it on my shoulder, started down the very crooked path, only to be hindered as the long pole caught, when I twisted between the pine trees. I would back, twist, change my path, and start again, only to be caught by another combination of trees, through which I could not get a straight line of sixteen feet.
