

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It's the Lord's Day

We Americans like to do as we please. We love our liberties and we defy any effort to dictate where we should go, or what we should do, or how we should spend our time. As Christians, however, we acknowledge Christ as Lord of our lives and realize He has a perfect right to rule us. He could claim all our time if He so desired, but He merely asks for one day out of seven. If we love Him we will give Him what He asks.

Let us dedicate Sunday to the Lord. It is *His* day; therefore we should spend it in those ways that will please Him.

It is a day of rest. When God finished His work of creation He rested from His labors. Thereby He hallowed the principle of resting from our regular work for one day each week and of devoting that day to spiritual pursuits. It is not a day to be wasted in idleness or pleasure-seeking. It is the Lord's Day. Spend it with Him and for Him. It is a good time to replenish those spiritual resources that you expend during the week.

It is a day of worship. At home and at church we should fix our hearts upon Christ. Fellowship with friends and fellow-Christians is a delightful by-product of this day of worship. Our main concern, however, should be to draw nearer to the Lord through prayer, Bible study, and conversation that edifies the spirit. Fellowship with others must not hinder us from enjoying sweet fellowship with Him.


It is a day of gladness. David said, "I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord" (Psalm 122:1). Jesus found joy in going to God's house. It was His regular custom to go to the synagogue on the Sabbath (Luke 4:16). The Sabbath is meant to be a delight (Isaiah 58:13).

It is a day of benefit. It was given to benefit man physically, mentally, and spiritually. Christ permitted His disciples, in an emergency, to pluck grain on the Sabbath to satisfy their hunger. When the overly-strict Jewish leaders found fault with this He said, "The sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath" (Mark 2:27). In other words, the Sabbath principle was meant to bring blessing, not bondage.

It is a day of good works. Jesus healed the lame on the Sabbath, and when the religious leaders objected He informed them it was proper to do good on this day (Luke 6:9). There are many ways in which we can do good on the Lord's Day. We can visit shut-ins, pray for the sick, write letters, teach classes, dress the children, and take them to God's house. Between our personal worship and the many possibilities of ministry, the day is all too short.

The Lord's Day, then, is a day that is different, because it is dedicated to God. We should refrain from Sunday labor as far as possible. We should avoid all unnecessary visits to restaurants, service stations, and shops of all kinds so that the employees of these places may be free to attend church. If all church members would do this, these places of business would not find it profitable to remain open on the Lord's Day.

Pitfalls for Spiritual Leaders

CAN CHURCH PILLARS CRUMBLE? IS it possible for those who were once stalwart leaders in the local church to drift aimlessly and become useless misfits? Can revered and respected leaders suddenly become just casual attendants at only a few of the worship services?

The hurried answer to these questions would be in the negative. The careful observer, however, has seen just such things happen and is puzzled by them. What can bring about such a change in very stable, spiritual persons?

This is not a message for weaklings or for "ordinary" Christians. Rather, it is for spiritual giants who must be alerted against the snares which are particularly set for them. The wise leader will recognize danger and guide his footsteps accordingly.

To be forewarned is to be forearmed. An awareness of the possible dangers goes a long way toward bringing one through such periods victoriously. There are *three* crucial periods in the life of any spiritual leader.

1. When moving to a new community.

It is a critical time when any Christian is uprooted from his surroundings of many years and must search for a new church home. If there are several churches of the same faith in the city, he begins shopping around to find one to his liking. He does some sermon tasting and critically analyzes every aspect of each church: the pastor, the people, the location, the friendliness and many other factors. He is subconsciously looking for something he cannot find—a church just like the one back home. Because he doesn't find that he will not commit himself to any one church but continues to be just a visitor wherever he goes. If perchance he should affiliate with one church, he exercises a reserve about getting too deeply involved because there are some things about the church that he doesn't like. Before he realizes it, he is more lax about church attendance and his previously fixed habits than he dreamed he ever could be. The shock of moving to new surroundings has changed him from a leader in spiritual activities to a hanger-on at the very fringe of the congregation. What he is and what he used to be is so different that one conceives of almost two distinct per-

Cities which have had a great influx of population are filled with former deacons, trustees, choir members, head ushers, soloists, Sunday school superintendents, and teachers whose talents of leadership are now buried. They were caught in a whirlpool when forced to move and have deterioriated to fringe Christians—the same type of person of which they were formerly very critical. Another dangerous juncture occurs:

2. When giving up responsibilities.

Carrying heavy loads of volunteer work within the church is no easy task. A person often gets very tired and longs for a little period of rest. There comes a temptation to self-pity when he thinks of all he is doing, and he feels a desire to bow out of every office and responsibility for just a few months. It all sounds so plausible and logical.

When a person succumbs to that inner longing (upon the added insistence of his wife) he is laying himself open to subtle dangers. His brief period of rest becomes prolonged. When he no longer has that particular responsibility to be in church and Sunday school he can find so many excuses for not going at all. Of course, it is only to be now and then but, as time passes, it happens more now than it did then. The habits of laxity and unconcern are formed so quickly. Before long he is just what he despised in others—one who attends church activities only sporadically and cannot be depended upon for anything. Such a person has been snared by Satan in a critical period of his life. Had he but observed the failures of others he could have avoided that

Insurance statistics say the period immediately following the dropping of an insurance policy is critical because so often something happens then that previously would have been covered by the policy. The time immediately following the giving up responsibilities and duties in the church is likewise a period fraught with danger. A sensitive period comes for some:

3. When becoming a follower rather than a leader.

One of the most admirable traits of a leader is the ability to follow the leadership of others. He who must lead or not participate at all doesn't have the basic requirement for leadership.

There comes a time when a person must relinquish a position or a responsibility. Someone else may be elected or appointed to that position. That is the time to step down gracefully and show just as much interest in the program as when you were responsible for it.

Strewn along the pathway of life are the burned-out hulks of would-be leaders who were fired with enthusiasm as long as they were in control of the program, but faded from view when others were in charge.

A most crucial period in any person's life is when he must relinquish authority. Satan sets his snare at that spot in hope of ruining that man's future influence. Whether he continues as a useful servant of the Lord or is derelict and forgotten is determined by his attitude at this critical time.

The wise man is he who sees the pitfalls that have been the downfall of others and guides his footsteps around them.



The Other Thief

HE WAS A HANDSOME-LOOKING YOUNG man except for the plain evidences of debauchery. He sat in the very front row, far to the left side of the auditorium. I watched the expression on his face from time to time, for the message was a burning one.

through my mind. Maybe the thief had never had an opportunity before. Suddenly an angle that I had never before considered came to my mind.

"Which thief on the cross?" I asked him. "Remember, there were two of them. One was saved. But you remember that the other blasphemed and railed on the Lord Christ. There was no spirit of repentance in him. He went out to meet God without being saved, although he hung on a cross scarcely more than an arm's length from the Son of God who was being crucified to save him as well as you and me."

"Do you think I might—do you think I might be like that—other thief?" he gasped. "I never thought of that other one."

He found God that night and is preaching today.

I have always thanked God for the story of the repentant thief on the cross. It is always a warning against despair. While there is life, there is always hope. But I thank God also for the lesson of the other thief, unrepentant and damned before his heart stopped beating. He is a powerful warning against presumption upon the mercies of a loving heavenly Father.

His Train Filled the Temple

IT WAS WHEN YOUNG ISAIAH WAS TAKING A PLACE of utmost lowliness before the Lord that he heard the winnowing of angel wings, and heard them cry one to another, "Holy, holy, holy!"

It was then that the posts of the door moved at the sound, and the house was filled with a smoky cloud of divine glory. Isaiah says, "His train filled the temple."

And while Isaiah was crying out to God of his own unworthiness—his own lips were unclean, his people were unclean—his eyes were permitted to see the King, the Lord of hosts.


Do we today retain such a deep sense of our own unworthiness? Do we hold steadfastly the vision glorious of a "throne, high and lifted up," and recognize that His train (margin, *skirt*) fills the temple?

At no time am I more conscious of the rustle of His skirts—of His "train filling the temple"—than when some hungering and thirsting soul is being filled with the Holy Spirit. What a hush this brings before the holiness of the Lord! And what a swelling, bursting joy follows! It is then the heart melts, and the shining tears emerge. Oh, may we so cherish this precious occurrence that it shall not depart from our tents, leaving us desolate!

"That we might receive the promise of the Spirit through faith" are the wonderful words of Galatians 3:14. We need to ponder them well. It is easy to make some remark that kills faith and that requires no faith to make. Anyone can make a statement to the effect that the power of God is not in evidence as it used to be—but does saying this require any exercise of faith? And did you ever know of such a remark and such an attitude bringing about a fresh moving of the Holy Spirit? Remember "the promise of the Spirit" is received through faith!

If we would see the Spirit move afresh today we must teach our lips to utter words of faith. We must set a guard upon our lips that they utter no words of unbelief and discouragement. Let us keep the humble place that the youthful Isaiah took when the glory was revealed to him.

For while the details of his confession were being



wrung from the depths of his heart, the house was being filled with glory—reminding us of what happened in the upper room in Acts 2. And the posts of the door were moved, reminding us of the place that was shaken in Acts 4:31.

If there has been no recent moving of the posts, no shaking of the place, no filling of the house, making negative statements will not bring it about. But there is a pattern that we can follow that will! That pattern shows a going down, utterly and honestly, before the Lord—as deeply as did Isaiah on that transforming day.

If we do not go down humbly before our God so that His glory can stay with us, God will find a people who will. May "Ichabod" never be written over our doors!

When the dead child of the Shunamite was laid upon the bed in the chamber of the prophet, there were two men involved in the story, and they faced the situation very differently.

The first man was Gehazi who went through the prescribed procedure, and fulfilled the correct routine. He carried out instructions to the letter, placing the prophet's staff upon the face of the child. "But there was neither voice nor hearing"—a fact which Gehazi was quite ready to accept and to seize upon.

As far as he was concerned it was all over. He was quite ready to make the statement that was both negative and discouraging, "The child is not awaked." According to Gehazi that was the end. He would go on about other business, suffering no pain in regard to "this thing that cannot be helped." This is the Gehazi pattern.

Not so with Elisha who had something Gehazi lacked. Elisha had a broken heart with which to face this "dead" situation. We can imagine his saying words like these, "The Lord God will help me; therefore shall I not be confounded: therefore have I set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be ashamed" (Isaiah 50:7).

It takes no effort, no faith, no spiritual wrestlings to say, "The child is not awaked," or "the situation is dead." But it was Elisha's hot breathing, his walking to and fro silently before God, his uplifted faith that brought a living answer.

It is with reverence that I observe the Spirit's moving beyond our immediate borders, remembering the Word says the Spirit will be poured out upon "all flesh." A recent issue of *Glad Tidings*, district paper for the Assemblies of God in Northern California, quoted an interview with some dear Episcopalians of Turlock who were recently filled with the Spirit. This happened a year ago under the ministry of Brother Dennis Bennett when he visited Turlock and spoke at the rally in the high school there as well as at Bethel Temple.

We quote Mr. Harold Lindblom, who has the leading department store in downtown Turlock. When asked details concerning his receiving the baptism of the Holy Spirit he said, "After the service at Bethel Temple, Brother Bennett, his wife, and I rejoined the others at our minister's home. While we had been gone to Bethel Temple, the group which remained had been studying the Bible and raising questions. They were waiting for Brother Bennett almost with bated breath.

"We were aware of a feeling of great anticipation and eagerness among us as Brother Bennett satisfied our questions. Even under the astute questioning of our minister, his sound answers assured us that the baptism of the Holy Spirit with speaking in tongues was a gift

that every sincere follower of Christ should and could receive.

"He did not press us to receive this gift, nor did he even ask if we wanted it. He left it entirely to us to initiate the request. That we did so shows that the Spirit was already at work, giving us a hunger.

"Brother Bennett first laid hands on my wife, Virginia. She spoke a few words hesitatingly in tongues, and Brother Bennett prayed in other tongues and encouraged her. He next came to me. Both he and Virginia laid their hands on my head. I was fighting the Holy Spirit.

"He moved on to our minister, and there was a complete breakthrough. What an experience! Here was our venerated and respected minister speaking in a full, oriental-sounding language. It was surprising, and we burst forth laughing, a joyous laugh in which were mingled amazement, fellowship, jubilation, and thanksgiving. We experienced together a completeness of loving fellowship that I had never before experienced. It was wonderful!

"Brother Bennett returned to me and again laid his hands on me. I spoke a few words and experienced a great swelling within my whole body—an infilling that made me feel as if my heart would break. It was a terrific feeling. It made me feel so full that I couldn't hold it anymore, and it bubbled forth in laughter, joy and love."

Mrs. Lindblom relates: "When Brother Bennett prayed for me, I spoke a few words in an unknown tongue.

He encouraged me and seemed pleased, but I felt it was something that I was doing. However, as we went on and prayed for other people, I realized that something was happening to me. Joy and love were welling up within me. A language was definitely forming at a subverbal level and I could hear it pounding in my ears although I wasn't yet speaking it out loud. Later I did let it out and received interpretations too.

"Each member of our group received the Holy Spirit and spoke in tongues, some in fluent, highly developed languages right from the start. Wherever we met people with whom we could share the experience, we told them about it. Within three weeks forty-four people had prayed for and received the baptism of the Holy Spirit. There have been more since."

It was my privilege to be in services with Pastor Robert Carrington in Bethel Temple, Turlock, California, not long ago. I found that there is a definite stir among the various denominations, and numbers are enquiring about the baptism of the Holy Spirit. We were concentrating along this line of ministry, and it was surprising to note how many denominations were represented among seekers and enquirers.

I was invited into the homes of various Episcopalian friends. The Lindbloms took me to a prayer meeting in a home within their own group. There were fourteen of us present, and the way those friends reached out to the Lord sets a challenge to us.

Our host on this occasion was an Episcopalian vestryman who had suffered a mangled spine from an auto accident. Near the close of the meeting, he set a chair in the middle of the room for those who wanted prayer for healing. His own deliverance and healing had been wonderful, and this man prayed with great authority for others, casting out the works of the evil one and commanding their destruction. I noted with joy how they repeatedly honored the precious blood of Christ as the basis of their faith. It melted my heart to see one dear lady, in great anguish over the serious condition of her husband in the hospital, go forward to have hands laid on her in his behalf.

Do these occurrences seem strange? They don't to me! I remember when I was very young such events took place in my parents' living room in Winnipeg—with seekers gathered around and the fire of God falling in the home.

God visiting Episcopalians? In Winnipeg in the early days God found and filled them too! Among those who accepted this message then were Professor Baker from St. John's College and Archdeacon Phair. A little later Dr. J. Eustace Purdie, under whom hundreds of Canadian Bible students have studied and graduated, came into the Pentecostal fullness.

Right along with them were the very humble seekers—Indians from a reservation north of the city. These would tarry until midnight, and when told it was time to go home would reply in hurt astonishment, "What? Go? No! We came from the reservation to be filled with the Holy Spirit and we are not filled yet!" This is the kind of hunger God is looking for in hearts today.

The Word says "Upon all flesh"—let us not deviate from this but expect to see its fulfillment when with great glory His train fills the temple.

An Unforgettable Experience

I DREAMED I DROVE ON A LONELY road, still and straight and empty. On either side were groves of orange trees, so that as I turned to look at them from time to time, line after line of trees stretched back endlessly from the road—their boughs heavy with round yellow fruit. This was harvest time.

My wonder grew as the miles slipped by. How could the harvest be gathered? I realized that for all the hours I had driven (and this was how I knew I must be dreaming) I had seen no other person. The groves were empty of people. No other car had passed me. No houses were to be seen beside the highway. I was alone in a forest of orange trees.

But at last I saw some orange pickers. Far from the highway, almost on the horizon, lost in the vast wilderness of unpicked fruit, I could discern a tiny group of them working steadily. And many miles later I saw another group. I could not be sure, but I suspected that the earth beneath me was shaking with silent laughter at the hopelessness of their task. Yet the pickers went on picking.

The sun had long passed its zenith and the shadows were lengthening when, and without any warning, I turned a corner of the road to see a notice "Leaving Neglected County—Entering Home County." The contrast was so startling that I scarcely had time to take in the notice. I had

to slow down, for all at once the traffic was heavy. People by the thousands swarmed the road and crowded the sidewalks. Even more startling was the transformation in the orange groves. Orange groves were still there, and orange trees in abundance, but now, far from being silent and empty, they were filled with the laughter and singing of multitudes of people. In-

deed it was the people we noticed rather than the trees. People—and houses.

I parked the car at the roadside

and mingled with the crowd. Smart gowns, neat shoes, showy hats, expensive suits and starched shirts made me a little conscious of my work The Parable of the Orange Tree

clothes. Everyone seemed so fresh, and poised, and gay.

"Is it a holiday?" I asked a well-dressed woman with whom I fell in step.

She looked a little startled for a moment, and then her face relaxed with a smile of gracious condescension.

"You're a stranger, aren't you?" she said, and before I could reply, "This is Orange Day."

She must have seen a puzzled look on my face, for she went on, "It is so good to turn aside from one's labors and pick oranges one day of the week."

"But don't you pick oranges every day?" I asked her.

"One may pick oranges at any time," she said. "We should always be ready to pick oranges, but Orange Day is the day that we devote especially to orange picking."

I left her and made my way farther into the trees. Most of the people were carrying a book. Bound beautifully in leather, and edged and lettered in gold, I was able to discern on the edge of one of them the words, "Orange Picker's Manual."

By and by I noticed around one of the orange trees seats had been arranged, rising upward in tiers from the ground. The seats were almost full —but, as I approached the group, a smiling well-dressed gentleman shook my hand and conducted me to a seat.

There, around the foot of the orange tree, I could see a number of people. One of them was addressing all the people on the seats and, just as I got to my seat, everyone stood and began to sing. The man next to me shared with me his songbook. It was called, "Songs of the Orange Groves."

They sang for some time, and the song leader waved his arms with a strange and frenzied abandon, exhorting the people in the intervals between the songs to sing more loudly.

I grew steadily more puzzled.

"When do we start to pick oranges?" I asked the man who had loaned me his book.

"It's not long now," he told me.

"We like to get everyone warmed up first. Besides, we want to make the oranges feel at home." I thought he was joking—but his face was serious.

After a while a rather fat man took over from the song leader and, after reading two sentences from his well-thumbed copy of the Orange Picker's Manual, began to make a speech. I wasn't sure whether he was addressing the people or the oranges.

I glanced behind me and saw a number of groups of people similar to our own group gathered around other trees here and there, being addressed by other fat men. Some of the trees had no one around them.

"Which trees do we pick from?" I asked the man beside me. He did not seem to understand, so I pointed to the trees round about.

"This is our tree," he said, pointing to the one we were gathered around.

"But there are too many of us to pick from just one tree," I protested. "Why, there are more people than oranges!"

"But we don't pick oranges," the man explained. "We haven't been called. That's the Pastor Orange Picker's job. We're here to support him. Besides, we haven't been to college. You need to know how an orange thinks before you can pick it successfully—orange psychology, you know. Most of these folk here," he went on, pointing to the congregation, "have never been to Manual School."

"Manual School," I whispered. "What's that?"

"It's where they go to study the Orange Picker's Manual," my informant went on. "It's very hard to understand. You need years of study before it makes sense."

"I see," I murmured. "I had no idea that picking oranges was so difficult."

The fat man at the front was still making his speech. His face was red, and he appeared to be indignant about something. So far as I could see there was rivalry with some of the other "orange-picking" groups. But a moment later a glow came on his face.

"But we are not forsaken," he said.
"We have much to be thankful for.
Last week we saw three oranges
Brought into our baskets, and we
are now completely debt-free from
the money we owed on the new cushion
covers that grace the seats you now
sit on."

"Isn't it wonderful?" the man next to me murmured. I made no reply. I felt that something must be profoundly wrong somewhere. All this seemed to be a very round-about way of picking oranges.

The fat man was reaching a climax in his speech. The atmosphere seemed tense. Then with a very dramatic gesture he reached two of the oranges, plucked them from the branch, and placed them in the basket at his feet. The applause was deafening.

"Do we start on the picking now?" I asked my informant.

"What in the world do you think we're doing?" he hissed. "What do you suppose this tremendous effort has been made for? There's more orange-picking talent in this group than in the rest of Home County. Thousands of dollars have been spent on the tree you're looking at."

I apologized quickly. "I wasn't being critical," I said. "And I'm sure the fat man must be a very good orange picker—but surely the rest of us could try. After all, there are so many oranges that need picking. We've all got a pair of hands, and we could read the Manual."

"When you've been in the business as long as I have, you'll realize that it's not as simple as that," he replied. "There isn't time, for one thing. We have our work to do, our families to care for, and our homes to look after. We..."

But I wasn't listening. Light was beginning to break on me. Whatever these people were, they were not orange pickers. Orange picking was just a form of entertainment for their week-ends.

I tried one or two more of the groups around the trees. Not all of them had such high academic standards for orange pickers. Some held classes on orange picking. I tried to tell them of the trees I had seen in Neglected County but they seemed to have little interest.

"We haven't picked the oranges here yet," was their usual reply.

The sun was almost setting in my dream and, growing tired of the noise and activity all around me, I got in the car and began to drive back along the road by which I had come. Soon all around me again were the vast and empty orange groves.

But there were changes. Something had happened in my absence. Everywhere the ground was littered with fallen fruit. And as I watched it seemed that before my eyes the trees began to rain oranges. Many of them lay rotting on the ground.

I felt there was something so strange about it all, and my bewilderment grew as I thought of all the people in Home County.

Then, booming through the trees, there came a voice which said, "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers..."

And I awakened—for it was only a dream!

Real Cause of Alcoholism

Vincent Tracy, writing in Scottish Women's Temperance News, said, "Those who say that alcoholism is a disease confuse the effects of alcohol with its causes. Of course the heavy drinker is sick. The point is, however, the alcoholic doesn't drink because he is sick; he is sick because he drinks."

Mr. Tracy adds, "The disease theory of alcoholism is not sufficient, because man is morally responsible for his deeds. No one can take a drink without his own permission. The real cause of alcoholism lies in a man's will."

Alcoholism Is Expensive

Here are a few sobering facts which the social drinker or teetotaler should remember: Twenty million dollars is spent by agencies every year to help families of problem drinkers; estimates are that the total loss due to alcoholism is one billion dollars; the problem drinker himself loses an estimated twenty-two days work every year because of alcoholism, and two days more than average because of illness.

He has twice as many accidents, according to studies made by Yale University; and he dies twelve years sooner than he would if he didn't drink.

Science

Plastic Heart No Substitute for Real Thing

A five-man team of medical researchers at the Cleveland (Ohio) Clinic Foundation has successfully replaced a living heart on a dog with one made of plastic and driven by compressed air.

The first plastic heart experiment with a dog, performed in 1958, was termed a success. The most recent experiment, earlier this year, permitted a dog to remain alive for more than a day. The dog was able to perform all normal functions—barking, drinking water, and response to petting—when the artificial heart was used. The dogs all died, however. They died because a blood clot formed somewhere on the plastic heart, or on an artificial valve.

Surgeons have made big strides in helping ailing hearts, by both medication and surgery; but to make a mechanical heart that will work is something else. Only God possesses that creative "secret."

"An Apple a Day" Found to Be Good Advice Still

The old adage, "An apple a day keeps the doctor away," has been confirmed by more than 1,300 volunteer students at Michigan State University, East Lansing. A three-year study showed fewer calls to the University's Health Center were made by the appleating students than by other students. One-third fewer calls were made for upper-respiratory infection, and tension-caused illness and general sickness were also less.

The investigators said the Vitamin C in the apples might have accounted for the benefit. They suggested that some naturally occurring tranquilizer in the apple might have accounted for lessening the tension-pressure.

Chaplain (Lieutenant Commander) Stanford E. Linzey, Assemblies of God minister, has been selected to attend postgraduate school at Harvard University in September. He was one of ten Navy chaplains out of 850 who applied.

When asked if he intended to take his large family back East by bus, Chaplain Linzey quipped, "Well, I've purchased a station wagon with a rear seat that faces aft (to the rear), and my kids will sit back there as 'rear gunners' and watch for the highway patrol."



largest North American audience of his ministry.

The largest crowd ever to attend a Graham rally was 140,000 in 1959 in Melbourne, Australia. A Sydney service that same year drew 125,000 people. The largest previous U. S. audience was more than 100,000 at Yankee Stadium in 1957.

A Graham aide said the Chicago crusade drew a total of 703,000 persons. Some 17,000 persons made "decisions for Christ" during the crusade. The crusade choir, 2,000-strong during the first eighteen sessions of the crusade held indoors at the McCormick Place, was doubled to 4,000 for the final rally.

Simplified New Testament for Children Ready

The Children's Simplified New Testament by Olaf M. Norlie, noted Lutheran scholar, author and historian, has been published and is now available from the Gospel Publishing House at Springfield, Mo.

This new translation from the original Greek is designed to make the language of the New Testament more interesting and intelligible, especially for today's boys and girls who are not familiar with many of the terms used in older versions.

Florida Court Upholds Bible Reading in Schools

The Florida Supreme Court has upheld the right of Florida public schools to have daily Bible reading and recitation of the Lord's Prayer.

In a strongly worded unanimous decision, the court said that a state law requiring Bible readings did not violate constitutional provisions for separation of church and state. The decision is expected to come before the U. S. Supreme Court after it reconvenes in October.

A Miami group had challenged the practice of holding daily Bible readings, with provision for excusing children whose parents object.

YOUR QUESTIONS

*Was the Gospel of Matthew written originally in Hebrew?

We do not have the original manuscript but, according to *The Dictionary of Religious Knowledge*, Early Church fathers asserted this Gospel was written originally in Hebrew.

₩ What did Jesus mean when He spoke of salt losing its savor? Luke 14:34.

Salt that has lost its savor—or saltness, as it is called in Mark 9:50—is of no value. So it is with us: if our Christian experience fades, losing its distinctive character, we become worthless as Christians.

Salt seasons and preserves. We are to be salty, exerting a preserving influence through our lives.

*There is a teaching going around here that fornication is all right if it is followed by marriage. What do you believe Paul meant in 1 Corinthians 7:35, 36?

In the days of Paul young people did not carry on courtships as they do now. Espousals and marriages were arranged by parents.

Because of "the present distress" (1 Corinthians 7:26) through which the church then was passing, Paul preferred that young people remain single-although he said there was no sin in marrying. He therefore advised parents to withhold their daughters from marriage. But he said that if parents preferred to give their daughters in marriage, there was no sin in doing so. This explanation is clarified further in verse 38 of this chapter: "So then he that giveth her in marriage doeth well; but he that giveth her not in marriage doeth better." Paul is writing of parents, because suitors do not give brides in marriage; they receive them.

Weymouth's translation in verse 36 is helpful too: "If, however, any one

thinks he is acting unbecomingly towards his unmarried daughter if she be past the bloom of her youth, and so it must be, let him do what she desires; he commits no sin; she and her suitor should be allowed to marry." Paul says here that a father does no sin by allowing his daughter to get married.

Under no circumstances is it right to commit fornication.


* Is it true, because of the Palestinian and Davidic covenants, that all Jews who have died in sin and rebellion against God will be raised in the resurrection of the just and enjoy the blessings of the kingdom age, since these are unconditional covenants?

The Palestinian covenant assures that Israel as a nation will inherit the promised land, and the Davidic covenant promises that One will reign from David's throne. I believe this One will be the Lord Jesus, David's heir, the Messiah of Israel. But not all Jews will share these blessings.

If all Jews, no matter how they lived, were to enjoy the first resurrection and kingdom blessings, of what value would certain warnings be to them? For example: "The soul that sinneth, it shall die" (Ezekiel 18:4). "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God" (Psalm 9:17).

The Bible says that "though the number of the children of Israel be as the sand of the sea [only] a remnant shall be saved" (Romans 9:27). The nation has the promise of restoration, but individual Jews must assume responsibility for their own soul.

THE IMPATIENT KING Sunday School Lesson for August 12, 1962 1 Samuel 13:7-14; Psalm 19:9-14

Saul, faced by a huge Philistine army ready to attack and surrounded by Israelites who were beginning to flee in panic, disregarded the directions which God had given through Samuel. Thinking to persuade God to intervene in his behalf, he presumptuously took matters into his own hands and authorized a burnt offering. No sooner had the offering been made than Samuel appeared.

SAUL'S EXCUSES

- 1. The Pressure of Circumstances. Saul tried to justify his wrongdoing by saying that it was necessary in the light of the difficult circumstances which he faced. "Because I saw that the people were scattered from me," he said. Here is a lesson on the folly of sacrificing principle for expediency—something people are doing every day! Men sometimes endeavor to justify dishonesty or thievery in business by saying, "A man has to live." But the fact is, a man does not have to live! It is better to die than to violate one's conscience and disobey God in order to preserve one's body!
- 2. The Failure of Samuel. Saul made the accusation, "Thou camest not within the days appointed." He blamed Samuel for his failure. But Samuel was not to blame. The seven days of waiting were not fully expired. Samuel did appear within the limit of the time appointed. Two lessons suggest themselves:
- (1) To blame others for our failures is an innate tendency. Adam began the habit in the garden by blaming his sin on his wife. Aaron blamed the golden calf on the fire (Exodus 32:24). Yet the Word of God again and again points out the blessedness of blaming ourselves! (See 1 Corinthians 11:28, 31, 32.)
- (2) Patience is essential to spiritual growth and accomplishment. Saul's impatience was tragic! He had waited a long time, but not quite long enough. Had he waited another hour he would have been blessed of God. It is hard on the flesh to wait, yet it always means victory to wait until God comes forth! The one hundred and twenty at Pentecost waited until the day "was fully come" and received the enduement! Whether in our private lives, or in dealing with others, or in our services of worship, it will prove a blessed thing to wait on the Lord in patience instead of impatiently proceeding in human strength and energy!
- 3. The Importance of Ceremonial Observances. He explained, "I have not made supplication to the Lord." This was a high-sounding excuse and a very religious one! Saul seems to have thought that religious motions could substitute for righteous actions, and that sacrifices would take the place of obedience. How many today are similarly deceived by Satan!


Saul's motive in making a forbidden offering was the

hope of *quickly* getting out of a difficult situation. In order to do so he was ready to disobey God. The appeal of the immediate advantage plagues us all. What a price one pays for seeking present and temporary gain at the loss of permanent glory!

SAUL'S GUILT

"What hast thou done?" was Samuel's searching question. Then he pointed out Saul's real guilt, saying, "Thou hast not kept the commandment of the Lord thy God, which he commanded thee." This deliberate disobedience to divine decree was demonstrated in:

THE SACRIFICE SAUL REALLY MADE



1. Unbelief. Saul disobeyed God because he did not believe God. He did not trust God's love, power, and faithfulness. Unbelief is the root of all sin. To believe God is to obey Him; to obey Him is to believe Him!

- 2. Hypocritical Worship. Saul's sin was the sin of a religious man. He would not proceed without worshiping. He desired God's blessing. But he wanted God's blessing at his own terms. Unwilling to pay the price of true righteousness, he sought to ease his conscience with a religious act. It cannot be done. Tithe paying, hymn singing, and church attending will not bribe God into overlooking one's secret sins!
- 3. Self-will, Pride, and Presumption. In disobeying God Saul set up his own will as paramount. The man in whose heart Christ is really king proves it by recognizing the King's will as supreme!

Samuel concluded the interview by declaring with divine authority Saul's punishment, "Thy kingdom shall not continue." What a solemn warning to each of us!

"The Wee Wesley"

THE JOURNAL OF JOHN WES-LEY, by John Wesley. \$1.29, paperback. Order number, 3 RV 1841.

You've heard about John Wesley. But have you ever read him?

For more than fifty years the circuit-riding founder of Methodism kept a journal. In it you find courage and curiosity, adventure and advice, horror and humor. Above all, you find John Wesley—the man. And in his own words.

Now you can get the *Journal* in a lowcost paperback edition. It is a prize-winning classic in the field of devotional literature.

Try the next ten of your reading minutes on the following extracts. You have here what may be called "the wee Wesley." If you like it, try the larger one!

ATLANTIC STORM

Jan. 23, 1736.—In the evening another storm began. In the morning it increased so that they were forced to let the ship drive. I could not but say to myself, "How is it that thou hast no faith?" being still unwilling to die. About one in the afternoon, almost as soon as I had stepped out of the great cabin-door, the sea did not break as usual, but came with a full, smooth tide over the side of the ship. I was vaulted over with water in a moment, and so stunned that I scarcely expected to lift up my head again till the sea should give up her dead. But thanks be to God, I received no hurt at all.

"RESOLUTIONS"

Feb. 28, 1738.—With regard to my own behavior, I now renewed and wrote down my former resolutions. (1) To use absolute openness and un-

reserve with all I should converse with. (2) To labor after continual seriousness, not willingly indulging myself in any of the least levity of behavior, or in laughter; no, not for a moment. (3) To speak no word which does not tend to the glory of God; in particular not to talk of worldly things. Others may, nay, must. But, "What is that to thee?"

ALDERSGATE

May 24, 1738.—In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.

I began to pray with all my might for those who had in a more special manner despitefully used me and persecuted me. I then testified openly to all there what I now first felt in my heart. But it was not long before the enemy suggested, "This cannot be faith; for where is thy joy?" Then was I taught that peace and victory over sin are essential to faith in the Captain of our salvation; but that, as to the transports of joy that usually attend the beginning of it, especially in those who have mourned deeply, God sometimes giveth, sometimes withholdeth, them according to the counsels of His own will.

"OUTWARD SIGNS"

July 7, 1739.—I had an opportunity to talk with him [George Whitefield] of those outward signs which had so often accompanied the inward work of God. I found his objections were chiefly grounded on gross misinter-

pretations of matter of fact. But the next day he had an opportunity of informing himself better: for no sooner had he begun (in the application of his sermon) to invite all sinners to believe in Christ, than four persons sank down close to him, almost in the same moment. One of them lay without either sense or motion. A second trembled exceedingly. The third had strong convulsions all over his body, but made no noise unless by groans. The fourth, equally convulsed, called upon God with strong cries and tears. From this time, I trust, we shall all suffer God to carry on His own work in the way that pleaseth Him.

COCKFIGHTING

Jan. 23, 1743.—I met a gentleman in the streets cursing and swearing in so dreadful a manner that I could not but stop him. He soon grew calmer; told me he must treat me with a glass of wine; and that he would come and hear me, only he was afraid I should say something against fighting of cocks.

PHYSICIANS

May 17, 1759.—Why then do not all physicians consider how far bodily disorders are caused or influenced by the mind, and in those cases, which are utterly out of their sphere, call in the assistance of a minister; as ministers, when they find the mind disordered by the body, call in the assistance of a physician? But why are these cases out of their sphere? Because they know not God. It follows, no man can be a thorough physician without being an experienced Christian.

OLD AGE

June 28, 1789.—This day I enter on my eighty-sixth year. I now find I grow old: (1) my sight is decayed so that I cannot read a small print unless in a strong light; (2) my strength is decayed so that I walk much slower than I did some years since; (3) my memory of names, whether of persons or places, is decayed till I stop a little to recollect them. What I should be afraid of is, if I took thought for the morrow, that my body should weigh down my mind and create either stubbornness, by the decrease of my understanding, or peevishness, by the increase of bodily infirmities; but Thou shalt answer for me, O Lord my God.

Prominent Colorado Pastor Volunteers for Breakthrough

One of the rocky mountain district's leading pastors, Milton Newman, has accepted the challenge to pioneer the new national Breakthrough church in Tooele, Utah.

The Newmans have served as pastors of Colorado assemblies in Denver, Durango, Paonia, Longmont, and Colorado Springs. They now leave the First Assembly of God in Colorado Springs, where they have ministered for eleven years, to help launch a pioneer church in a strategically located area.

Brother Newman served as Rocky Mountain District Christ's Ambassadors president for three years and has also been a district presbyter for the past three years. He is a graduate of Southwestern Assemblies of God College. The Newmans are musically talented and have had a successful radio ministry. First Assembly in Colorado Springs has helped start three churches in the Pikes Peak region while the Newmans have been pastors.

Brother Newman says: "Tooele is one of the many great challenges facing the national 'Breakthrough' program. The estimated growth to 50,000 population in the next ten years insures an opportunity unexcelled for the gospel. Our goal is to have an indigenous church in one year. We highly esteem the prayers of the constituency for this effort."

The Newmans have four children and two grand-children. Nolan is an Air Traffic Controller at Buckley Air Field in Denver. He and his wife direct the music for the First Assembly in Aurora where they live. Another son, J. Randall Newman, is a second-year student at Evangel College. Gary is a sophomore in high school and Bonnie Jean is in second-year junior high.

Tooele Valley was originally named "Tule," the Indian name for a waterflag which grew in considerable quantities near the shores of Great Salt Lake. Tooele is in a fertile plateau near the mountains.

The city has been chosen as the site of the national Breakthrough project in the Rocky Mountain District for several reasons. Tooele County, Utah's second largest with a land area of 6,849 square miles, has been termed the "Crossroads of the West." It occupies part of a vast region in western Utah and eastern Nevada known as the Great Basin. The "Basin," as it is called locally, has no outlet to the sea and this is the reason, in large







part, for the formation of the Great Salt Lake and other salty or semi-salty lakes in the region.

The huge Army installation comprises one-sixth of the total land area in Tooele County and important experiments are conducted there.

The chief industries are agriculture, smelting and mining operations, besides the defense activities of the government: Tooele Ordinance Depot, two miles south of the city—Utah's second largest employer; Dugway Proving Grounds, five miles from Tooele; and Deseret Chemical Depot.

There are seven hundred new homes under construction and fifteen hundred more families are moving in by September 1, 1962. Some are already arriving. Then fifteen hundred more families are to come in each year for a three-year period (through 1964), which will total forty-five hundred families. The population should reach at least 50,000.

The church property is in a nice location, at the edge of a new building area, across from the city park and golf links. There are some \$40,000 homes nearby. Plans for the future include a large shopping area.

Besides the Morman and Catholic churches there are only three other congregations—Lutheran, Baptist, and Community Methodist, which is the main Protestant church there. Some of the Morman leaders have cooperated in helping our Assemblies of God men to find a location.

Tooele is a good field for vocational volunteers who may be interested in helping the new church to get on

its feet. Individuals can obtain government office jobs through Civil service. Letters of inquiry should be addressed to the Secretary, Chamber of Commerce, Tooele, Utah. The secretary has her own radio program on which she has offered to give our church spot announcements free of charge. The manager of the radio station in Tooele has also offered air time.

Detroit Suburban Church Sponsors New Assembly

THE "MOTHER CHURCH" VISION IS CATCHING FIRE IN the Detroit suburbs. The Ferndale Assembly of God, a

suburban church, is "mothering" the new First Assembly of God in the nearby suburb of Southfield. The Michigan District will assist the Ferndale Assembly in supporting the new enterprise.

The Southfield project is the direct result of Home Missions vision exhibited by District Superintendent Everett D. Cooley and E. Glenn Snook, pastor of the Ferndale Assembly.

Norman W. Muhling, a 1962 graduate of Central Bible Institute, is pastor of the new Assem-

bly. During the summer of 1961, Pastor Muhling served as manager and speaker of the Envoys Gospel Team which traveled nearly twelve thousand miles under the auspices of Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Mo. Brother Muhling was converted through the ministry of the Ferndale Assembly which he has attended since an early age.

Opening service at the First Assembly of God was Sunday afternoon, July 15. The facilities of the local Masonic Temple have been rented as a temporary church home. Since the opening service, First Assembly conducts services on Sunday mornings.

The city of Southfield has a very bright future. In 1950 the population was 15,099. By 1960 the city had more than doubled, with a population of 31,501. Statisticians predict that by 1970 the city will have reached the seventy thousand mark. Ultimately ninety to one hundred thousand is predicted.



Young New Jersey Assembly Completes New Building

The New Assembly of GOD IN WOODBURY, N. J., WAS started in 1956. The little congregation worshiped in the basement until the fall of 1960. The superstructure was completed last October.

The church was built to conform to the colonial architecture predominant in the surrounding community. Measuring 42 by 82 feet, it has a seating capacity of three hundred in the main sanctuary. The building is valued at \$110,000 and has a remaining indebtedness of \$25,000.

The interior carries out the colonial design with white and mahogany pulpit furniture and pews. The walls are also white and mahogany. Floors overlaid with tile and red carpeting present a pleasing contrast. The pews have foam-rubber cushions.

Since the dedication of the church on October 8, 1961, new families have been attending and a spirit of revival prevails in every service. Harry J. Knisell is pastor.



THREE YEARS LATER

A Report on Global Conquest's Thrilling Accomplishments

Taking christ to our generation: that is the task to which the Foreign Missions Department is dedicated. Realizing that crisis days require emergency actions, Global Conquest was conceived as the answer of the Assemblies of God to the challenge of world evangelism in our generation.

After careful and prayerful planning Global Conquest was presented to the constituency at the 1959 General Council meeting in San Antonio, Tex. Overwhelming acceptance was given to the three phases of Global Conquest: literature, training, and evangelism. Subsequent events have proved that the anointing of the Holy Spirit is upon the Global Conquest program. Since the beginning of the program three years ago, \$282,119.88 has been channeled into Global Con-

quest projects around the world.

The Seoul Evangelistic Center in the capital of Korea was one of the first major targets of the program. Since the dedication of the Center, continuous revival has been reported, and there seems to be no let up in the spiritual impact the Center is having upon the entire nation.


Nyasaland, in the interior of East Africa, was the scene of an early Global Conquest emphasis. Thirty-three churches were established as a result of Global Conquest revivals conducted by a national evangelist.

The Spanish Literature Division, with its nine publications being used by sixty-three denominations in the Spanish-speaking world, has been strengthened by Global Conquest, as have literature ministries sponsored by

nineteen print shops around the world.

Realizing that the strength of the Pentecostal church is the trained national worker, Global Conquest has sponsored advances in many of our seventy-four overseas Bible schools. New buildings in Central America, Africa, Europe, and the Orient stand as monuments to the sacrifice of Global Conquest donors in the United States.

These random illustrations of the many vital Global Conquest ministries testify to the permanent results of strategic planning to meet the emergencies of our age. Anticipating these needs and channeling available funds to areas of special need is a main function of the Foreign Missions Committee. In their almost daily sessions the Committee prayerfully and care-



Planning for this revival center was the initial pilot project of Global Conquest. Seating 1,500 people, the center is regularly filled as revival continues in the capital city of Korea.

Tons of gospel literature, prepared in 19 print shops around the world, are distributed by Spirit-filled national workers. These young men leave the book store in El Salvador to take the printed Word into the urban and rural areas of Central America.

Seventy-four overseas Bible schools of the Assemblies of God are training 2,727 national workers for the full gospel ministry. Young people such as these in Nigeria are becoming effective pastors and evangelists among their own people. Their training is made possible through Global Conquest.





Light for the Lost's IN LATIN AMERICA

A sense of urgency gripped me as I discussed the planned Light for the Lost "Operation Saturation" program in Mexico City with Missionary Ray Morelock. This was to be a well-planned program of house-to-house evangelism and literature saturation. There would be need for much prayer and work if it were to be a success! The importance of the project was impressed upon me by Brother Morelock's statement, "As goes Mexico—so goes Latin America!"

Today there is still a need for urgency in Mexico City but there is also reason to rejoice as the Light for the Lost "Operation Saturation" is in full swing! Missionary Arthur Lindvall, on loan from El Salvador, has spent weeks in Mexico City teaching techniques in personal soul winning and house-to-house evangelism. Already reports tell of substantial in-

creases in church attendance and thrilling testimonies of conversions in the homes visited throughout the city!

Light for the Lost is a unique ministry of distributing the gospel of Christ with a personal testimony in the homes of thousands who have never received the message of salvation. It is a unique program in that 100 per cent of all funds contributed go for gospel literature. Operating expenses are paid by interested laymen of the Assemblies of God Men's Fellowship.

If we work, pray, give, or go, some day there will be tears in our eyes, but they will be tears of joy as we look on the fruit of our labors.

There were tears in the eyes of missionary Sterling Stewart. I had just finished speaking to the delegates attending the annual convention of the Assemblies of God in Santa Ana, El Salvador, and was seated on the platform. In front of me stood the candidates for ordination, and to my right was Sterling Stewart.

There were tears in his eyes, but they were tears of joy as he looked upon the fruit of his labor.

The following day, missionary Arthur Lindvall told me of the house-to-house literature evangelism program which had been adopted in El Salvador three years earlier. He showed me samples of the thousands of Gospel portions which had been provided by Light for the Lost and distributed during this period. I was amazed to learn that the converts had increased from 11,000 to 34,000 in three years!

While visiting the towns and villages of El Salvador I was privileged to distribute hundreds of *Light for the Lost* Gospel portions and thousands of tracts. What a thrill to place





Joey Healed of Brain Injury

Our little eight-year-old Joey received a head injury in a playground accident at school on May 1, 1961. At first the school authorities did not realize how badly he was injured so they did not send him home at once.

When Joey became *very* ill his teacher brought him home. She knocked on the door and as I opened it I knew something must be wrong so I started praying in my heart.

The teacher said, "Mrs. Coates, do not get alarmed, but Joey has been hurt at school." She went on to say that he was in her car, that he had had a head injury, and was very ill.

I asked, "In what part of his head?" She replied, "In his temple. What do you want to do?"

I answered, "Let's get him to the hospital as fast as we can." How I thank God for that teacher's kindness.

I sat in the back seat of the car with my child in my arms and prayed. Joey was as white as a sheet and his eyes were rolled back into his head. He was unconscious and his breath was coming in jerky gasps. Feeling that I should give him "mouth-to-mouth" respiration, I did so. We secured a police escort and arrived at the hospital just as my son seemed to be gasping his last breath.

They took Joey from me, gave him oxygen, began to pump off fluid which had collected in his lungs, and called a brain specialist.

I went to my knees in prayer. A nurse tried to lift me up—she thought

I was fainting—but I prayed out loud and she let me alone. I had to pray, "Not my will but Thine be done." They called my pastor. He came to the hospital after calling all the prayer warriors in our church. My husband came from work and he was praying too.

After three hours they brought Joey out with tubes in his arms and nose. He was still having convulsions. The doctor said, "We don't know, but we think he has a 50-50 chance. If he comes out of it, we may have to operate. I'll see you in the morning about it."

Praise God, during the early hours of the morning Joey began to wake up. He knew all of us and his mind was as clear as a bell. About eight o'clock the doctor came in. He was surprised to see Joey talking and acting normally. He ordered the tubes removed and let him have a drink of water.

But he still said, "I cannot tell you anything yet. I do not know if I shall have to operate. He could have a blood clot." But we continued to pray. Joey improved so rapidly that he went home after only three days in the hospital.

Now after one year I want to report that Joey did not need an operation or doctor's treatment after one check-up. He never took any medicine, and the brain specialists released him as being normal in every way. He never had even a headache. He has made excellent grades in school. (I had prayed so earnestly that the accident would not affect his mind.)

God is the One who healed him and Joey is learning to read God's Word quite well. Bless His Name!— Mrs. Walter Coates, Little Rock, Ark.

Complications Averted After Aspirin Overdose

Our little daughter might have died last January had the Lord not intervened in answer to our prayers. She had swallowed ninety aspirin tablets!

It happened on Saturday evening, January 20. As soon as I knew what she had done I rushed her to the hospital to have her stomach pumped.

Even after pumping her stomach the doctor feared for her life. He said that since Lisa Ann was only three years old there was danger that enough aspirin may have entered her intestines to kill her. He said she probably would need an artificial kidney to cleanse her blood.

The doctor kept her in the hospital and said he would take a blood sample the next morning. Meanwhile I had called our pastor, Brother Handt. He and his grandmother added their prayers to ours. The congregation of Christian Assembly also prayed unitedly in the Sunday morning service asking God to heal our little girl.

The church was praying at just about the time the blood sample was being taken. Much to our doctor's surprise and joy, he found it was completely free of any trace of aspirin.

We do praise the Lord. He came to my child's rescue when everything seemed to be against her.—Mrs. Dale F. Heishman, Stoughton, Wis.
