CONSIDER THE VALUE OF MEEKNESS. JESUS SAID, "BLESSED are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth" (Matthew 5:5). There is nothing more inspiring in Christian character than a meek spirit. It is regarded as very precious in the sight of God (1 Peter 3:4).

In this modern era when church membership bears a civic stamp of approval, one should take care to distinguish that true spiritual meekness with which our Lord was endowed from other types which are merely human in source. Meekness is more than a humble look or a broken voice. Some voices may break very easily, but meekness is not revealed in a life until the spirit is broken, too. True humility proceeds not from one's posture or emotional expression. It is a condition of the heart when Christ is in unquestioned control.

Our Lord was meek and lowly "in heart," and the significance of this characteristic may be observed throughout His earthly ministry. His example disproves the notion that a meek Christian is one who can readily adjust his convictions for reasons of diplomacy, or who remains tactfully silent when his friends jeopardize truth. There is nothing in the ministry of Christ to suggest such an attitude. He could be infinitely tender with repentant publicans and harlots, but He could also be stern and uncompromising with those whose hypocritical wickedness obstructed the work of God.

In this respect Moses was similar to Christ. According to the Old Testament, Moses was the meekest man of his time (Numbers 12:3). When he was reproached by Aaron and Miriam, he made no attempt to justify himself; but when the principles of his faith were in question, he could boldly declare the will of God in the face of the greatest opposition. Meekness is not weakness. It takes real strength of character to be truly humble in heart. The Christian who weakly refrains from dealing with a cancerous sin lest he offend others is neither true to the gospel nor true to his own conscience. Silence at times may be an easy way of avoiding an unpleasant conflict, but when such silence casts improper reflections on divine truth it is a Christian's duty to declare himself with a "thus saith the Lord."

It is stated in Galatians 5:23 that meekness is included in the fruit of the Spirit; hence, it is not produced by self-effort, but by a thorough committal of the life to God. This committal, of course, does not mean that a Christian should assume a passive state of inaction. There must be a good deal of human cooperation on his part with the divine processes that are at work within him, otherwise he will never attain his objective. For example, it is very clear that he who would tread the path of humility must set aside exalted opinions of himself (Romans 12:3). This is not always easy to do, for occasionally his friends will load him with flattering words of commendation when they are pleased with his efforts. It will be necessary for him to keep the sobering thought in mind that no matter how successful a servant of God may be, the glory is not his. Scripture plainly declares that the Lord has graciously worked through him for the extension of the kingdom, and, therefore, all the praise belongs to God (Philippians 2:13).

Intimate communion with Christ is also necessary for the cultivation of a meek spirit. Sometimes Christians are provoked by unkind treatment to the point where self-control is apt to break down and angry thoughts arise. But while self-control has its limitations, there is no doubt that Christ-control can meet any emergency. The believer who continually communes with the Lord in his heart will not have to exercise a tremendous effort

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to be meek. The presence of Christ will preserve him in this attitude.

A further requirement in the attainment of meekness is that the mind must be kept free from prejudice and caustic criticism. These mental attitudes create resentment toward persons or principles and humility quickly perishes in such an atmosphere. Where there is difference of opinion, a Christian should voice his spiritual convictions frankly and kindly. But when a matter has been decided by the majority, even if the decision is opposed to his point of view, he should cooperate as much as he believes Scripture will permit him, and, of course, his fellowship with his colleagues should be unbroken.

In every aspect of evangelism, meekness plays an important part. The meek Christian realizes that it is useless to engage in heated arguments with the unsaved to convince them of their need. Refraining from argument is a safe rule in personal work. Most of the people who visit churches prefer to draw their own conclusions from what they see rather than from theological discussions which may be pressed upon them. Such a statement does not imply that hearing the Word of God is unimportant, but it takes more than the physical utterance of truth to bring people to their knees. The kingdom of God is not in word but in power (1 Corinthians 4:20). The power of a holy life with a pre-eminent characteristic of meekness will have a far greater effect on the lost than a fluent patter of religious precepts.

When the Christian is concerned with the restoration of a backslider, there is a great need for meekness. According to Galatians 6:1, the best way to restore a wandering member of the Lord's flock is to do so in the spirit of meekness. It must be noted, of course, that no backslider can be reclaimed unless he is repentant and willing to confess his sin, for without this attitude the ministration of Christian friends in his behalf would be useless. But the Biblical emphasis here, undoubtedly, is that the backslider should not be regarded with contempt. The Christian who desires to restore him should remember that only the grace of God preserves the soul in Christ, and that he himself stands redeemed solely by that grace. Due consideration of this fact will certainly promote true humility.

Perhaps one of the most important lessons to be learned by Christians is that meekness is the essential attitude in which the declaration of the Word of God is to be received. The apostle James earnestly exhorts all believers to receive the engrafted Word with meekness (James 1:21). No matter how ably and spiritually the Word is preached, it is the Christian's attitude that determines how much blessing he will receive. It often happens that Christians are convicted of shortcomings by sermons, but if they reject the messages and become annoyed with the preachers, they are simply resisting the grace of God.

A Christian who is never convicted never grows. If one adopts an attitude of Christly humility when listening to the preaching of God's Word, he will be an apt pupil of the Holy Spirit and will grow rapidly in grace.

It should be remembered, however, that divine and human methods differ in the removal of man's weaknesses. When God employs the surgery of the Spirit, He

New Church in New England

An example of the progress being made by the Assemblies of God in New England is the church pictured on this week's cover.

Danbury, Connecticut, is a city of 43,000 with an estimated population of 90,000 within a twelve-mile radius. The nearest Assemblies of God church is at Norwalk, twenty miles away, where Pastor Harvey Meppelink is spearheading a national *Breakthrough* effort.

The vision for the work at its present site was received by Godfrey Berggren who founded and faithfully pastored the Assembly for 15 years. After his decease the work expanded under eight years of ministry with Enoch Olsen. In 1958 God laid the Danbury community on the heart of John W. Thompson while pastoring in Maine. When called to the pastorate he was determined to "put in the sickle" and reap souls for Christ.

The congregation was worshiping in an old brick mansion. In 1959 Pastor Thompson and the men of the church rolled up their sleeves and remodeled this building at a cost of \$11,000.

Concerted efforts to build up the Sunday school and congregation resulted in steady growth, and it was not long until the church felt led to take another step to start work on a new and larger building alongside the old one.

It was a big step for the little flock and it required much faith. To save expense, the pastor served as the general contractor. He bought the building materials and supervised the entire construction project. The new church with its furnishings cost \$77,000. It is 48 by 86 feet in size with a basement containing 12 classrooms, three assembly areas, kitchen, and rest rooms. The main floor has a large foyer, baby nursery, two choir rooms, and a choir area seating 25. The sanctuary with balcony will seat 400.

The remodeled building next door now houses five classrooms, C. A. chapel, pastor's office, and has a six-room parsonage on the second floor. Total appraised value of both buildings is \$175,000.

"Since moving into the new building we have had dozens of visitors," Brother Thompson says. "A number of these have been saved and filled with the Spirit in our services. Our Sunday school now averages 185 and our church attendance averages between 160 and 170. We praise the Lord for this."

Attendance has doubled in the past four years but the congregation of First Assembly in Danbury is not content. A number of members have joined with Pastor and Mrs. Thompson in canvassing the area for new members and in follow-up visitation.

The entire Sunday morning service is broadcast over the local radio station every fifth Sunday. Various methods of publicity are used. Now that the church has fine new facilities First Assembly wants to see it filled. Attendance of over 400 people at the dedication service to hear Assistant General Superintendent Bert Webb deliver the dedicatory sermon has been taken as a foretaste of the growth that lies ahead.

"God has been so good to us," the pastor says. "We have a wonderful group of people with whom to work; otherwise this church building could not have materialized."

Moment of Decision

To each of us there comes a moment of decision such as the Jewish nation faced so long ago. We are confronted with the Crucifixion. We face that solemn scene on Calvary and on the middle cross we see a sign which says, "This is Jesus, King of the Jews." It is our moment of decision.

In that moment we decide whom we will serve. Will it be Christ, the Lord of heaven, or Satan, the god of this world?

In that moment we decide whether our lives will be ruled by the divine law of love or the carnal law of selfishness. We choose between truth and expediency, between righteousness and sin, between submission to God and rebellion against His authority. Our whole future, for time and eternity, depends on our decision.

Many people today, like the Jews of Christ's day, refuse to give up their old paths. Defiantly they declare, "We will not have this Man to rule over us."

Only a few men and women will kneel at the Cross, or at the open tomb, or in the upper room, or on the road to Damascus, and crown Him as King of their lives.

Yet there is no salvation apart from an acknowledgment of the Lordship of Christ. If any think they may receive Him as Saviour in order to have a passport to heaven, and yet continue to live in their sins, they need to be warned. The Bible clearly says that in order to be saved we must confess Jesus as Lord (Romans 10:9). We are not "born again" unless we give evidence of that new birth by turning our back on all sin and surrendering our will, our affections, our ambitions fully to Christ.

Mere lip service will not do. The Saviour looks beyond our words and examines our hearts and lives. To many He will have to say, "Why call ye me Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say? Depart from me, ye workers of iniquity."

C. H. Spurgeon said to the students in his ministerial college: "If the professed convert distinctly and deliberately declares that he knows the Lord's will but does not mean to attend to it, you are not to pamper his presumption, but it is your duty to assure him that he is not saved. Do you imagine that the gospel is magnified or God glorified by going to the worldlings and telling them that they may be saved at this moment by simply accepting Christ as their Saviour, while they are wedded to their idols and their hearts are still in love with sin? If I do so, I tell them a lie, pervert the gospel, insult Christ, and turn the grace of God into lasciviousness."

If we allow the blessed Holy Spirit to do His work in our lives He will soften our hearts and reveal to us the Saviour's love. When the gospel comes to us it exposes our sin and shows us that we need a Saviour. A conflict then begins in our hearts: shall we cling to our sins, or cling to the Saviour? We cannot do both. The Spirit helps us to make the right decision. He enables us to bow our hearts before Christ in deep repentance. He gives us grace to cast away our sins and plead for mercy. Then He gives us faith to claim the cleansing and pardon that the Bible promises to each repentant sinner.

What joy springs up in our hearts the moment we surrender all to Christ! With the poet, John Newton, we can say:

"Lord, Thou hast won, at length I yield: my heart, by mighty grace compelled, surrenders all to Thee. Against Thy terrors long I strove, but who can stand against Thy love? Love conquers even me.

"Now, Lord, I would be thine alone; come, take possession of Thine own, for Thou hast set me free. Released from Satan's hard command, see all my powers waiting stand to be employed by Thee." -R.C.C

ONE REASON FOR PETER'S SECOND LETTER WAS HIS DESIRE to encourage Christians to keep a firm hold on their faith. He wrote, "Beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own stedfastness" (2 Peter 3:17).

From his own personal experience Peter realized the value of steadfastness in the faith. His own life, for a time, had been a study in instability. Called to become a fisher of men (Mark 1:17), he had become discouraged and returned to fishing. Found fishing by Christ, Peter recognized that he had fallen from steadfastness and confessed his sin. "Depart from me," he said, "for I am a sinful man, O Lord" (Luke 5:8). He was shaken in faith when Jesus revealed that He must die (Matthew 16:22, 23).

On the mount of transfiguration, his faith was again shaken when he heard Moses, Elijah, and Jesus talking about Christ's approaching death at Jerusalem (Luke 9: 30-33). Believing that he had forsaken all to follow Christ, his next words were, "What shall we have therefore?" (Matthew 19:27). Willing in the spirit not to deny Christ-"If I should die with thee, I will not deny thee" (Mark 14:31)-he was weak in the flesh. "He began to curse and to swear, saying, I know not this man of whom ye speak" (Mark 14:71). Yet "when he thought thereon, he wept" (Mark 14:72).

Although he rejoiced in the Resurrection (Luke 24: 12), he again hurried back to the security of fishing (John 21:2). His ministry restored to him by Jesus, he

immediately became jealous of John (John 21:21). Showed by God that he should not call any man common or unclean (Acts 10:28), he ate with the Gentiles at Antioch, yet later separated himself from them (Galatians 2:12). This was Peter, by nature unstable, who knew from experience the heartache that results from such instability.

An analysis of the third chapter of Peter's second letter reveals four principles which, if followed, will enable Christians to be steadfast, retaining a firm hold in the faith.

1. Cu 'ivate Christian consciousness.

Christian consciousness is cultivated by exposure to the Scripture. Peter was aware of this fact. He wrote, "I stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance: that ye may be mindful of the words which were spoken before by the holy prophets, and of the commandments of us the apostles of the Lord and Saviour" (2 Peter 3:1,2).

Psychologists recognize the role of a person's image of himself in the formation of character and in the governing of behavior. Horney speaks of "the idealized selfimage" in relation to mental therapy. Allport recognizes that a self-image may function as "an insightful cognitive map" which defines a person's aspirations and ambitions for himself.

Each person has his own self-image, but a Christian needs a Christian self-image. He needs to see himself as God sees him, and he can do this by exposing his consciousness to the Scripture. He can thus become "renewed in knowledge after the image of him that created

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him" (Colossians 3:10) and perceive Christ as his idealized self-image. Christ becomes his "insightful cognitive map," and he aspires to be like Christ. A Christian consciousness is important to stability because it defines the goal of Christian experience as Christlikeness. What is the ambition and aspiration of the Christian? To be like Christ! How does the Christian know what Christ is like? From the Scripture! Therefore, cultivate a Christian consciousness by studying the Scripture.

2. Cultivate Christian character.

Christian consciousness is not an end in itself; it is a means to the end of Christian character. Peter asks the question, "What manner of persons ought ye to be?" (2 Peter 3:11). This question might be paraphrased, "What manner of persons ought you to be in terms of your permanent, existential character?" This question, of course, must be answered by reference to the content of the Christian consciousness. Our character is to be patterned after that of Christ. Christians have been predestined "to be conformed to the image of his Son" (Romans 8:29). Christ is the idealized self-image of the Christian. Knowing from the Scripture what Christ is like, the Christian models his character after Christ. 3. Cultivate Christian conduct.

Peter views Christian character as manifested in "all holy conversation and godliness" (2 Peter 3:11). A twofold manifestation is evident here. "Godliness" is a vertical man-to-God relationship which manifests Christian character. "Holy conversation," or "holy conduct," is a horizontal relationship in which man manifests his character by his manner of life. Christian character manifests itself both horizontally and vertically, in man-to-God relationships and in man-to-man relationships.

Christian conduct proceeds from a Christian conscious-

ness and a Christian character. It contributes to Christian stability by reinforcing the Christian consciousness and character, by integrating the total perspective, thus minimizing the conflict which arises when morality does not measure up to conscious ideals.

4. Cultivate Christian concern.

Christian concern falls into two categories, objective and subjective. Peter, in this chapter, recognizes both.

The objective concern of the Christian should be the return of Christ to the earth. Through Christian consciousness, Christian character, and Christian conduct, the believer is "looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God" (2 Peter 3:12). The Christian realizes that the coming of Christ is an objective fact of future history, although the world in derision may ask, "Where is the promise of his coming?" (2 Peter 3:4).

The subjective concern of the Christian should be personal readiness for the coming of Christ. "Wherefore, beloved, seeing that ye look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot, and blameless" (2 Peter 3:14). The desire to be ready when Christ returns contributes to Christian stability by providing the motivating force for realizing or actualizing the content of the Christian consciousness in character and conduct.

All four principles are important. Christian consciousness is an awareness of what Christ is like; Christian character is a structuring of personality in the likeness of Christ; Christian conduct reinforces Christian character; and Christian concern provides the motivation for achieving a higher awareness, a better likeness, and better behavior. Accept the challenge. Put the principles into practice and achieve Christian stability.

Evangelistic Center Proposed for Santiago, Chile

LAND HAS BEEN PURCHASED ON WHICH TO BUILD THE Santiago Evangelistic Center—a choice property in the heart of metropolitan Santiago, Chile. This expanding city of more than 2,000,000 souls (where one-third of all the people of Chile reside) has doubled its population in fifteen years. From its majestic position at the head of the great Central Valley, Santiago commands the respect of the entire Chilean populace. It represents a mecca for people seeking refuge from the earthquakedevastated south and from the desert-parched north. Every train into the city unloads a cargo of human beings seeking relief in the capital. This swells the city's already massive population.

Chileans have always been responsive to the gospel. Perhaps their lack of material possessions has made them receptive to spiritual things. In the past decade, Santiago has been the scene of some of the largest mass revivals of the hemisphere. Some converts have found their way into neighborhood churches of the capital, but most of them have been absorbed again into the city's masses. After the revivals, they are like sheep without a shelter because of the lack of ample building facilities to care for them.

The need of a central evangelistic center for Santiago has been impressed upon the hearts of missionaries and national pastors in Chile for several years. At each revival meeting, fellowship service, or local conference, this need has become urgent, because people are turned away for lack of standing room. At a recent C. A. rally, the city's largest Assemblies of God chapel, which seats nearly 500, was packed to capacity, while many others were unable to enter. Chilean Christians have united in prayer to believe God for the provision of a building which will adequately house the spiritually hungry.

At first, the evangelistic center was but a dream and a need. But the response of God's people at home and in Chile turned the dream into a distinct possibility. Land for the proposed center was bought in October. This coveted location, quoted at \$35,000 at the beginning of the year, was secured at less than half its list price.

Ninety-five per cent of the people of Santiago depend on the city bus system for transportation. The center is ideally located near the hub of the city bus lines, making it easily accessible to the entire city and its suburbs.

An architect is finishing the plans for the superstructure which will seat 2,000 people.

In the future, as evangelists, missionaries, and teachers work in this city heralding the gospel, the converts and unsaved will have a place to hear and be taught. In the evangelistic center, gospel services will be held every night of the week.

* The center will have other outreach ministries, as well. It will house the Speed-the-Light printing presses turning out literature to combat communism and atheism, and to proclaim the news of salvation. A Christian bookstore and literature depot is also planned as part of the facilities of the center. Several of our missionaries and nationals who have had experience in radio ministry will broadcast the gospel from the center.

Lay workers will be trained for Christian service at the center. As Bible students and consecrated workers take part in the services, they will feel the impact of the fervor of the evangelistic spirit, and will be inspired to "go forth" with the same message. The center has been designated by members of the Foreign Missions Department as an ideal place for night Bible classes for the training of lay workers.

We must not let another Chilean summer pass without opening the doors of the Santiago Evangelistic Center! October 1963 (which is the spring of the year in the Southern Hemisphere) has been set as the date for the first service in the new center. The resources and talents of missionaries and nationals alike will be pressed into service to meet this challenge.

Educational facilities will be built later. Immediate attention is focused upon the steel superstructure, re-inforced to resist the oft-recurring earthquakes. Building as economically as possible, \$20,000 is still needed to get the rough structure and the furnishings ready for occupancy. Believe with us and pray that the rest of this dream will become reality and that the spiritual needs of the people of Chile will be met.

HS PRESENT WORLD

Government President Says America Must Rely on Religious Faith

President Kennedy, addressing the annual Presidential Prayer Breakfast at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D.C. last month said that in a time of national crisis "the limit of mere human endeavor becomes more apparent than ever," and that if America is to survive it must rely on religious faith.

Mr. Kennedy joined Evangelist Billy Graham and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson in addressing more than 700 of the nation's leaders, including many members of the House and Senate, and high officials of the executive and judicial branches of the government. The session was sponsored by International Christian Leadership, an organization which sponsors weekly prayer breakfasts and luncheons in major cities throughout the world.

Prayer breakfasts in 44 state capitals, sponsored by the governors, and in 230 other cities, sponsored by mayors and municipal leaders, received the program from Washington by television.

Billy Graham called upon fellowcitizens to return "to the God of our fathers, and trust Him for our deliverance and our salvation. . . . If we will put our trust and faith and hope in Him, we need not have fear that any enemy, however strong, can overwhelm us." But he warned that we face crises of such gravity that they may make the recent Cuban affair pale into insignificance. He predicted that "the moral and spiritual toughness of this nation" is going to be tested "as it has not been tested since the civil war."

Lyndon Johnson emphasized that, while church and state are separate in America, "the conscience of our nation does not call for separation between men of state and faith in the Supreme Being."

More than 1,500 participated in the four-day convention of International Christian Leadership. They elected as their president Lt. Gen. M. H. Silver-

thorn, who was second in command of the U.S. Marine Corps when he retired from military service a decade ago. He succeeds Judge Boyd Leedom.

Chaplain's Prayer Stirs New Mexico Legislators

The chaplain of the New Mexico State Legislature opened a recent session with a prayer that caused considerable comment among legislators. In his prayer, Pastor William Crews of St. Bede's Episcopal Church, Santa Fe, said:

"Almighty God, we who spend \$10,000 for a bus so our children will not have to walk, and then budget \$100,000 for a gym so they can get exercise, do now seek Your guidance in all matters, that Your creation might be used with wisdom for the welfare of Your people."

Temperance

India's President Hails Women's Role in Promoting Temperance

President Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan of India—addressing the triennial meeting of the World Woman's Christian Temperance Union, held at New Delhi—hailed the role of mothers in promoting temperance. "If many of us have not touched liquor," he said, "it is not due to legislation or educational propaganda but to the habits taught to us in our homes by our mothers," he told some 150 delegates from 24 countries.

Dr. Radhakrishnan, a Hindu, declared that the great religions of the world "hold drinking to be a vice, but few of us are able to follow the maxims and principles. We can do so only if we seriously follow what is laid down in the scriptures and not if we pretend to follow some religion."

The President expressed the hope that the World WCTU's first meeting in Asia would help strengthen the prohibition movement in India. According to Article 47 of India's constitution, states "shall endeavor to bring about prohibition of the consumption of intoxicating drinks and of drugs which are injurious to health, except for medicinal purposes." About 110 of the country's 343 districts are now dry.

The delegates, representing a world membership in 70 countries, elected Mrs. T. Roy Jarrett of Richmond, Virginia, to be World WCTU president. She succeeds Miss Isabel Mc-Corkindale of Australia in the office.

Evangelism

Billy Graham Pavilion to Be Built at World's Fair

The Billy Graham Evangelistic Association plans to carry on a gospel ministry among the multitudes who are expected to attend the 1964 New York World's Fair. A pavilion seating 600 will be built and the gospel will be presented through pictures. Trained counselors will be on hand to give personal attention to those seeking spiritual help.

Lutherans Open Powerful Radio Station in Ethiopia

Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia was featured speaker at the inauguration February 26 of the Lutheran World Federation's new radio station at Addis Ababa. The new Lutheran "Voice of the Gospel," Station ETLF, has been built at a cost of about \$1,500,000. It will beam live and recorded programs of religious, educational, cultural, and entertainment nature to twenty countries in Africa, the Near East, and southern Asia using about two dozen different languages.

Judaism

World Jewish Population Increased to 12,915,000

There are nearly thirteen million people of the Jewish faith in 122 countries, according to a new survey made by the World Jewish Congress. It found the three countries having the most Jews are the U.S. with 5,-500,000; Russia with about 2,300,000; and Israel with 2,200,000.

With the emigration of many Jews from Algeria and other parts of North Africa, France now has the fourth largest Jewish community with 500,-000. The survey showed that no basic changes occurred in 1962 in the geographic distribution of Jews, except for the migration from North Africa to France.



What does Paul mean when he says, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28)?

Paul relates that after salvation all justified believers are alike in the family of God, regardless of their nationality, sex, or station in life—whether they be slaves or free men. There is no respect of persons in Him.

How can a person resist the devil, causing him to flee?

One resists the devil by refusing to do anything that the devil may suggest. This resisting power comes by trusting in Jesus, for human nature lacks the needed strength. "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world, but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God?" (1 John 5:4, 5).

Where does the Bible say a church building must be built of stone; otherwise God will reject it?

The Bible does not dictate as to the material used to build a place of worship. It speaks of the children of God as "lively stones" (1 Peter 2:5), or living stones, which has spiritual rather than material meaning. There is a reference to altars made of stone (Exodus 20:25) but this was for Israel, not for the Church.

Does Romans 7:4 mean that when Christ was crucified the five books of Moses, spoken of as the law, were fulfilled?

We are now under "a better covenant, which was established upon better promises" (Hebrews 8:6). This new covenant was established at Calvary. It is a covenant based on our faith rather than our works. However, it would be well for all believers to make a careful study of the practical lessons found in the statutes and judgments of the law. Such would prove helpful in all departments of our lives.

Are there degrees of punishment in the life to come?

The Bible indicates this to be true. "And that servant, which knew his lord's will, and prepared not himself, neither did according to his will, shall be beaten with many stripes. But he that knew not, and did commit things worthy of stripes, shall be beaten with few stripes" (Luke 12:47,48). God will reward every man according as his work shall be. As believers are laying up for themselves treasures in heaven, the ungodly are treasuring up unto themselves wrath against the day of wrath and revelation of the righteous judgment of God (Romans 2:5).

People say King Saul was lost. However, Samuel, when brought up at the home of the witch, said to Saul, "Tomorrow shalt thou and thy sons be with me" (1 Samuel 28:19). Was not Samuel in heaven?

Samuel meant that Saul and his sons would be with him in the place of death, not in heaven. The Jews believed that all who died went to sheel which consisted of two parts—one for the righteous and the other for the unrighteous. This sheel was the place of death. In the New Testament this place is called hades. Those in hades will be delivered up at the final judgment at which time the ungodly will be cast into the lake of fire (Revelation 20:13-15).

FROM THE STANDPOINT OF THE executives of the Minnesota District, the new Assemblies of God church in Crystal, Minn., is the number one Breakthrough project in the metropolitan areas. The district brethren wish to express their appreciation to the Brainerd Assemblies of God Tabernacle, its pastor, Melford Olson, its fine board of deacons, and the membership for their help in providing a new church building where souls can find Christ and believers can be nurtured in the truths of our doctrine.

The Brainerd Assembly is the church home of Loren Holman, pastor of the new Crystal Assembly, and also happens to be the church where I pastored for ten years prior to being elected district superintendent in April 1961.

Here is the story of developments in God's leading which brought the Crystal church into existence.

In the fall of 1960, the Minnesota District appointed Loren Holman to become the pioneer pastor of a work in the Robbinsdale-Crystal areas. For a number of years various workers had pursued the project of establishing a church in Robbinsdale. Pastor Holman came to this section in the city of Minneapolis with one purpose and one great desire: to build an established church.

He rented an auditorium in the William Cavanah School in Crystal

which was used by this small congregation until property was obtained for the building program. In April, 1961, lots 290 by 270, with a house to be used as a parsonage, were purchased for \$32,500. A temporary auditorium was arranged in the basement of the home and in this setting the work progressed to a Sunday school averaging close to 70.

A. V. Gustafson, an architect and a member of the National Church Building and Planning Commission, was employed to draw up the plan for a two-unit church edifice. The 40 by 90 educational unit was to be built first at a cost of \$55,000. (It actually cost \$52,000.) This included a two-story structure with a walk-out basement. The first floor was to include a large auditorium with colored windows on the north side, a nursery with bathroom facilities, and the church office. The basement plan called for a modern kitchen, rest rooms, and five Sunday school rooms, as well as a central auditorium. The basement was to be accessible from the parking lot. The entrance of the church was to be all glass.

Next, the Minnesota District officials, with Pastor Holman, were able to borrow \$30,000 at a local Savings and Loan in Minneapolis. But still the prospects for beginning the work soon were not too promising. Late in

The first unit of the new Assembly of God in Crystal, Minn. was dedicated last November. There are five Sunday school rooms and auditorium in the basement and a large auditorium on the first floor.

May 1962, Pastor Holman and I met with Melford Olson and the board of the Assemblies of God Tabernacle at Brainerd, and presented the need in order to break through with the project at Crystal. The Brainerd church board voted unanimously to have the district superintendent come to a church meeting late in June and present the matter of mortgaging the Brainerd church property as security for this \$30,000 loan. The church voted to follow through on the recommendation of the board.

The Brainerd church borrowed \$30,-000 on its property to be reloaned to the Crystal project. This completed the financial arrangement. Pastor Holman proceeded to employ a general contractor, R. W. Ellison, who gave assurance that the building would be completed for occupancy soon after Thanksgiving in 1962. The work advanced rapidly and smoothly. Under the direction of Pastor Holman and the general contractor, the church was completed on schedule for dedicatory services on November 25 and 26.

R. L. Brandt, national Home Missions secretary, was invited to be the guest speaker at the Sunday services and to bring the dedicatory message Monday, November 26. I was requested to officiate at the dedicatory service. A large, enthusiastic crowd was present for the services of the afternoon and evening, and everyone agreed that the Crystal project was a miracle of operation and accomplishment.

Much credit goes to the efforts of Pastor Holman and his family who have labored so faithfully and who have been able, in the short time that they have been in the Minneapolis area, to establish a work with great potential and to provide a building that surely will be an asset in the work of our Assemblies of God. Many commented that this was the type of pioneer church effort that would attract the interest of people in any of the suburban areas of this locality to cooperation, sincerity and service under the program of our church. The Sunday school is averaging 80 at the present time. The church property, including parsonage and lots, is appraised at \$100,000.

We hope this story will be an inspiration to others to get under the burden of need for new church works in our District and over the nation. Here is more proof that God blesses a cheerful giver — whether it be an individual or a church

Assembly Plans Second Revivaltime Broadcast Release

"First Assembly is enlarging its *Revivaltime* outreach," writes Vernon Boyer, pastor of the Brookville, Pa., church. "We desire to place the *Revivaltime* broadcast on a second radio station in our area AT ONCE."

Celebrating its tenth anniversary in 1962, First Assembly has pioneered with *Revivaltime*. Since the church's doors were opened in 1952, it has sup-

The Brookville Assembly of God was started with an attendance of just two persons plus the pastor's family on the third floor of an I. O. O. F. Hall. From his previous training in the business field, Brother Boyer felt that "*Revivaltime* would be the key to establishing a 'beachhead' in the **area**." Brookville is a town with more than 4,000 population and eleven established congregations.

Through the sacrifice of Sister Joan Boyer, who for a number of years worked to pay the monthly airtime cost, *Revivaltime* was placed on WP ME. Realizing the necessity of tying in the international broadcast with the local Assembly of God, Brother Boyer placed the *Revivaltime* sign on the front of the church building, which they acquired in 1955; affixed the *Revivaltime* stamp to all mailings; and stuffed church bills with radio logs.

"REVIVALTIME HAS HELPED US TRE-MENDOUSLY," writes Brother Boyer. "We now have an active enrollment of 200." The anniversary year of 1962 saw the appointment of Mike Roush as full-time assistant pastor; the placing in operation of Sunday school buses numbers two and three; and the rise of the church bulletin circulation to 1,500.

Brother Boyer reports that the *Re-vivaltime* office has forwarded to him many names of those from his area writing in for the first time. 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CHRIST BEFORE THE COUNCIL

The Humility of Jesus

In Christ we find the example of perfect humility. Men act proudly because pride is in their hearts, but Christ is different. Humility belongs to Him as definitely as love belongs to Him.

ANOTHER CHRISTMAS SEASON IS BEhind us, and I am ashamed. I am constrained to contrast our manner of celebrating Christ's birth with the simplicity and humility that characterized Christ Himself. We have commercialized the holiday and made it a lavish celebration that is entirely out of character with the birth, life, and death of the humble Jesus.

The prophet said: "He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows:... He was oppressed, and afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth:... He was taken from prison and from judgment:... because he hath done no violence, neither was any deceit in his mouth" (Isaiah 53: 3-9). Men sought to humiliate Christ, but He had already humbled Himself. He had done this when He laid aside His glory, and "made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: and being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross" (Philippians 2:7, 8). There was no selfjustification or self-pleasing. He said, "I come to do thy will, O God," and in His submission His humility was perfect and complete.

This perfect humility attended Him through all His earthly life. In what humble circumstances the earthly life of our Saviour began! Think of His conception, the stigma of it! To a skeptical world this stigma remains to this day. And His birth: there was not even the convenience of a home in which to be born! The rustic stable gave refuge to the strong frantic man and the gentle woman with the birthpangs upon her.

Those shepherds who came that night to see Him smelled of the flocks and herds. They were poor, rough men and the only gift they brought Him was fervent worship from a heart of faith. Yes, He was humbly born!

Read the Levitical law of cleansing: "When the days of her purifying are fulfilled, for a son, or for a daughter, she shall bring a lamb.... And if she be not able to bring a lamb, then she shall bring two turtles [doves]; the one for the burnt offering, and the other for a sin-offering" (Leviticus 12:6-8). Now notice the words of Luke 2:22-24. Only the turtledoves and young pigeons are mentioned. Joseph and Mary were too poor to bring a lamb.

The great of the earth came to give worthy gifts and to pay homage to a King, but under cover of night the holy family was forced to flee like common criminals. Yet this tiny One was the Creator of the universe—oh, the completeness of His humility!

What of His home and family? Did His brothers make it difficult for Him? He did no wrong and needed no correction. But these brothers did they place blame upon Him? Although He was different, they did not believe Him to be the One of whom the prophets wrote.

Carpentry — His trade — involved

hard labor, rough hands, callouses. It is not listed among the finer arts such as lawyer, doctor, poet, or sculptor.

His baptism was an act of humility. He went down into the water and was baptized like any common sinner. His only word was, "Suffer it to be so now."

Consider His temptation. For forty days He was tempted as no other man has ever been. What humility—the man Christ Jesus submitting to torturing pressure by one whose power was far less than His.

Notice His ministry. The simplest of the simple—John the Baptist, an uncouth desert man with peculiar ways, was His only *advance* agent. Today, from a distance, Jesus' ministry is sublime and wonderful; but what would we have thought if we had watched Him as He touched the unclean bodies of lepers, mixed clay and put it on blinded eyes, and wrote in the dust as the rabble clamored for justice to an adulterous woman?

What would we have thought had we passed by the well at noontime and seen Him in earnest conversation with the outcast woman? Only a heart searching for truth would have rightly interpreted His service of love and humility!

What of His message? He openly confessed to having no property and no possessions. Though He claimed to be setting up a kingdom, He was the poorest of the poor. "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." What kind of inducement was this? Man does not want a cross, he wants a crown.

The Law and the Prophets bore Him testimony, but the scribes, the Pharisees, the Sadducees, priests, and leaders of the people mocked and threatened Him. His life was one of continual humiliation, yet He bore it with calmness, gentleness, and kindness.

Outwardly, there was no exaltation in His death—just humility! Neither Jews nor Romans would own Him. He was a stranger from another world and had no citizenship in this. There was no trial, no lawyer to plead His cause. False witnesses testified against Him. Wearily He was rushed from one tribunal to another. After endless walking and standing throughout the long night there was no respite of a jail term to rest His tired body. The precious, humble Lamb of God stood silent and alone!

As they gave Him the cross that belonged to all of us, they extended strange tokens to Him. They gave Him *our* tomb; they gave Him *our* hands to place Him there; they gave Him *our* shroud to wind about His bloody, disjointed body!

But the Resurrection—that was His own! Yet it did not cause Him to lose His humility. He walked the dusty road to Emmaus. He sent a special message to conscience-stricken Peter. He invited Thomas to thrust his hand into His wounded side. Over an open fire, He prepared a simple breakfast for hungry fishermen!

Then the time came for Him to leave His followers. Was His departure accompanied with a splendid chariot and fiery horses? Were there throngs of welcoming angels, songs of triumph, and heavenly music? No, there was just a cloud—a vaporous thing—to receive Him and silently carry Him away.

Even now that He is away He has not lost His humility. It belongs



to Him as definitely as love belongs to Him. Only the HUMBLE can intercede in prayer for others.

A proud conqueror roughly pushes open a door, but Jesus stands at the door of men's hearts and knocks. Gently, He says, "If any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in!"

Think of it—a life like His coming into lives like ours. What humility on His part—and what humility it should work in our lives!

It is time to open wide the door for Jesus—for the gentle loving Jesus to live His life of perfect humility in and through us all!

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Christ Seeks and Saves Zaccheus

Sunday School Lesson for March 24, 1963 LUKE 19:1-10

A procession of tremendous importance was in progress —Jesus was en route to Jerusalem and to Calvary to fulfill the supreme purpose for which He had come into the world. Yet this procession was not so important that it hindered Jesus from stopping to save a soul!

THE CHARACTER OF ZACCHEUS

Any Jew who was a tax collector in the employ of Rome was bitterly hated by his countrymen and considered a traitor. The fact that Zaccheus was "the chief among the publicans" made it all the worse.

Furthermore, "he was rich," which means that he probably repaid the hatred of his countrymen by cheating them and had obtained his wealth at their expense.

THE CURIOSITY OF ZACCHEUS

1. *His Desire*. "And he sought to see Jesus who he was." What made him, of all people, desire to see Jesus? Was it only curiosity? Was it the long-working of conscience? Was it a yearning, deep hidden in his heart, to live a better life? Or was it that indefinable, deep



inward drawing of the Holy Spirit which has brought millions to Christ?

2. His Handicap. Zaccheus' desire was commendable but there were obstacles in the way of its fulfillment. "Because he was little of stature" he could neither press through the crowd to a point of vantage, nor peer over the heads of those in front of him. Since he was a despised publican, no one would make room for him.

3. *His Action.* "He ran before, and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him." There is much we can learn from the little man:

(a) There are many ways in which Satan seeks to hinder men from getting through to God, but all the powers of hell cannot stop the man who is wholehearted (Jeremiah 29:13; Matthew 5:6).

(b) Our lives may count for God in spite of natural limitations. Are we keenly conscious of our own weakness and lack of ability? Are we fretting because of limitations past and present? "My strength is made perfect in weakness," is God's answer. "Let the weak say, I am strong," is His command! Let us say, "Amen. I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me!"

THE CALLING OF ZACCHEUS

"And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up, and saw him." Of all the persons in the crowd, perhaps the least noted, the most handicapped, and yet the most concerned was Zaccheus.

"And said unto him, Zaccheus, make haste, and come down." Likewise, every sinner who would receive the Saviour and every Christian who needs divine help must come down from pride, self-esteem, and self-sufficiency and bow humbly at the feet of Jesus.

"For today I must abide at thy house." The King of kings invited Himself to the home of a sinful publican! Yet how typical of the amazing grace of God!" Whatever we may say about Zaccheus seeking Christ, the fact is that Christ was seeking Zaccheus! So again is seen the grace of God. God seeks us (John 4:23), the Holy Spirit woos us (Revelation 22:17), and Christ stands at the door of our hearts (Revelation 3:20).

THE CONVERSION OF ZACCHEUS

When, exactly, did the conversion take place? And what are the evidences of his conversion? Zaccheus was evidently guilty of dishonesty against his fellow men. Christ did not command him to make restitution, but his intention was the natural and spontaneous expression of a heart moved and melted by Christ's redeeming love. Restitution is a serious thing. F. B. Meyer, on the first night of one of the great Keswick conventions, said to the people, "Remember, you will get no blessing here, as long as 'bills are not paid at home." We are told there was not a single postal money order left in Keswick the next day!

THE COMMENDATION OF ZACCHEUS

The Pharisees criticized Christ for honoring one whom they considered beneath them. Christ met their objection by saying, in effect, "Zaccheus *was* a sinner; but now salvation is come to his house." Yes, Zaccheus was a sinner indeed, but this was his salvation, "for the Son of Man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." These lovely Bibles are perfect for every special occasion. Any one of them will make a splendid gift to be treasured forever, as a priceless remembrance.

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NEARLY A HUNDRED YEARS AGO Elizabeth Akers Allen wrote nostalgically,

Backward, turn backward, O Time, in your flight; Make me a child again just for tonight.

If you could turn time back and be a child again, what would you desire? If I were a child, I would desire to be brought up in a thoroughly Christian home, for to be nurtured in such a home is of value beyond the price of rubies.

Expressions of Appreciation

In our times so many confused, unsteady, parents are passing on their own confusion and unsteadiness to their children! Many parents are long on teaching but short on example. They are long on theory but short on practice.

In a home that is truly Christian, children are loved, not resented or just "put up with." This is of greatest importance to a healthy personality development.

In one of his Aunt Het cartoons, Robert Quillen quips, "A pup that knows a lot of tricks ain't smarter than others; it just had somebody spend time on it." And again he said, "There's one advantage in usin' love instead of a stick to control young-uns. Your control doesn't stop when you get arthritis."

Martha Rabe is of the same opinion as she writes in *American Home* magazine, "Scold your children, if necessary...paddle them if you must...

but don't fail to show them that you appreciate them. They grow best facing the sun."

Loving, Steady Authority

Second, if I were a child, I would want to be controlled by a loving but steady authority. Horses are of little value until they have been "broken in" and disciplined. To a child, comfort may be far less important than loving control.

Child psychologists say that a lack of kindly authority leaves a child feeling insecure. Angry or cruel efforts to control a child are another thing, for they build up deep resentments and ill will.

Some parents do a great deal of criticizing but little constructive teaching. Someone has said that if you spend all your time digging weeds out of a child's life you are very apt to destroy sprouting flowers which lie just under the surface.

As physical comforts have increased, there has come about a decrease in kindly discipline and emotional balance. Heavy-handed authority without affection and love will always be resented.

The deep resentment of authority to be found in almost all phases of American life has filtered down into our homes. The workman who resents authority at his job is likely to bring up children who resent his authority. On the other hand, the parent whose own father was too stern and harsh may tend to let his own child go unchecked.

Respect for Parents

One tendency these days is for a father and son to become "palsywalsy" to the point where the father hasn't the courage to discipline his son when the occasion calls for discipline.

True, understanding between parents and child is a necessity, and there is no substitute for a father's and son's fishing together, hunting together, or spending time at other activities.

But a boy needs a loving father more than he needs for his father to be a pal. To be a pal with your son on his own level will inevitably cause the strength of your parental authority to fade out.

Constance Foster, writing in *This Week* magazine, says: "I can still give my child the discipline of work. True, there are no longer rails to split or woodboxes to keep full. But the regular responsibility of watering flowers, weeding the garden, mowing the lawn, feeding the pup, or shining the family's shoes is a fair substitute. Shoveling a path through a tall snowdrift can teach modern young fry all the virtues of pioneering which strengthened our forefathers and helped mold their firm character."

Disciplines of Work

Walter Pitkin makes this interesting observation:

"If I were a dictator, I'd compel the children of every neighborhood to help the street sweepers and garbage collectors and the policemen in some simple routine tasks. If a rich man tried to exempt his darlings from such work, I'd soak the scoundrel with thirty days of hard labor.

"What's more to the point, I'd make every youngster know exactly what he was doing and why. I'd have the neighborhood policemen and the grade schoolteacher explain the difficulties in keeping streets clean and preserving the peace. Then I'd see to it that boys and girls experienced these truths directly. No book lore helps here... but picking up a banana peel which some (undisciplined) person has tossed into the gutter in front of your house would have a powerful educational influence."

Sacredness of Holy Things

Third, if I were a child, I would ask that my life be saturated with reverence and with an understanding of holy and sacred things. A lack of reverence is directly responsible for much of our juvenile and domestic distress these days. The best children, come from reverent homes.

Socially speaking, reverence begins with the attitude of parents toward each other. When there is no longer a feeling of reverence in relationships between husband and wife, their marriage and home are deteriorating. Reverence and respect are closely related.

Sometimes it is difficult to maintain a feeling of reverence toward a growing, blundering child; but this is extremely important. A sense of reverence on the part of the parent will keep him constantly aware of his responsibility toward his child.

Some time ago, in conversation with a friend, a father said, "We lost our first child." Shocked, the other replied, "I didn't know she was dead!" "Oh, she isn't dead," the father said. Then he added sadly, "I was just too busy!"

A Sense of Reverence

Parents with a sense of reverence become the best teachers of their children and the best guardians of their future.

A small daughter skipping along behind her mother suddenly made a shining discovery—a stone, flecked with glittering bits of mica. "Look, Mother," she called, "the stone has stars!"

Impatiently the mother exclaimed, "Oh, for heaven's sake, come on! I can't be dragging along with you all day!" Just think what a reverent, patient mother could have done with that potentially marvelous teaching situation!

Give to your child a sense of reverence—reverence toward God, people, work, things, money. These children of ours need a sense of reverence to make sure that boy-girl relationships will be maintained on a Christian level —to insure the sanctity of their marriage and of the home they will establish some day.

An Intelligent Love

Love your child with the very love of God, and love him intelligently.

Writing in Ladies Home Journal, Marcelene Cox said, "A child being raised without love looks drawn together like a closed umbrella."

Yes, if I were a child, I'd want to be warmly loved. When God's love floods our own hearts, some of it will get through to our children. There is a wisdom in love which educates them —and us—in a heavenly approved way.

What is more important? Someone wrote in the *Pasadena School Review*: "In slack times, a manufacturer builds up backlogs of orders, but you can't build up a backlog of needs for children. They are not made of steel and plastic and plywood.... You can't stack them in a corner to await your good time to put together the parts that make their lives. While they are waiting, they are growing and needing things. There is a deadline. A day too late in ministering to our child's needs is just as hopeless as a lost minute when you have missed a train."

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DO YOU BELIEVE IN INSURANCE?

Most of us would not consider being without an insurance policy which guarantees a measure of financial security for our family in the event they are left without a bread winner. We also consider the emotional security and make arrangements which will place our children in the care of people who will love them. These insurances are so important that without them we have no peace of mind.

The youngsters who are given to the custody of Hillcrest Children's Home have no plans made for their future—they are indeed neglected and unloved even though they have living parents. Until they arrived at Hillcrest, they existed in a vacuum never knowing where they would live next and with whom. Many of them have been mistreated in one foster home after another and have come to mistrust the motives of all adults.

On the Brink of Disaster

AN ABOUT-TO-CRASH BOMBER JETTISONED ITS TWENTYfour-megaton bomb over North Carolina. When the warhead was examined, experts found five of the six interlocking safety devices triggered by the fall. In his new book, *Kill and Overkill*, Ralph E. Lapp reports that there have been about twelve such "near misses" of nuclear catastrophies in the United States.

Americans last fall were subjected to unprecedented intensities of fear. As troops and missiles bristled Key West into a military bivouac and the banshee screech of jet fighters blitzed a sonic trail, telephone calls swamped Civil Defense offices reflecting the near panic of Americans who had no idea of what they should do in an emergency.

Authorities long had warned of the need to prepare. They cautioned citizens to stock cupboards with at least a two weeks' supply of food and water. They circulated millions of copies of informative literature. Yet Ameri-



cans continued their complacent way of living with little active regard to peril.

So it has been spiritually. Faithfully God's Church and God's Bible stand like sentinels warning men to prepare to meet their Maker. They continually remind people that they stand on the brink of eternal disaster. Yet the majority tragically ignore their spiritual danger.

As the Cuban crisis mounted, grocery stores felt the impact of a food rush. Some people even began to hoard. One grocer closed to restock after a woman purchased food worth \$1,200. A Utah woman visiting California flew home with \$400 worth of canned goods, and a Texas woman spent \$600 on her supply. Gun merchants had noticeable business gains as many armed to guard their supplies against unprepared neighbors.

But how many prepared to meet God? *Now* more than ever Americans need to prepare themselves spiritually as well as physically.

U.S. News & World Report (November 3, 1962) quoted military officials as saying "If Khrushchev had been allowed to have another three weeks to complete his missile network, with equipment on hand, he would have been in a position to kill between twenty-five and fifty million Americans with a single order."

Americans shudder at the thought of nuclear annihilation. But do they consider how much worse it will be to be "cast into the lake of fire" to be "tormented day and night for ever and ever" (Revelation 20:10,15)?

What did Christ say about our times? He prophesied wars and rumors of wars. He foretold that nation would rise up against nation. And He also gave this solemn warning: "Fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Matthew 10:28).

For Christians there is the promise of peace: "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty." David said, "He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust" (Psalm 91:1, 2). Martin Luther echoed the thought in his great hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

David's heart soared into the spiritual eagle sphere as he continued, "He shall cover thee with his feathers, and under his wings shalt thou trust. . . . Thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night; nor for the arrow that flieth by day... nor for the destruction that wasteth at noonday" (Psalm 91:4-6).

A young soldier carried a little Bible in a pocket over his heart. One day a bullet pierced his uniform and traveled part way through the Scriptures. It stopped precisely at the seventh verse of this marvelous 91st Psalm: "A thousand shall fall at thy side, and ten thousand at thy right hand; but it shall not come nigh thee."

With such hope Christians can dwell in peace, even in a world that totters on the brink of disaster. Physical death holds less terror to those who have spiritual life in Christ—for this life will never end. Of all who trust in Him, the Saviour says: "I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish..." (John 10:28). Have you come to Christ, confessing and forsaking your sins, and asked Him for this life?

THE PENTECOSTAL EVANGEL
