What great misconceptions there are concerning the Church. The world is largely unmoved by her presence, and many are prone to look upon the Christian community much as they would look upon a fraternal organization. By looking upon the outward appearance through our natural eyes we are quick to note the weaknesses, the frailties, and the struggles of the people of God. From this viewpoint one would guess that the Church is without power, without a plan or program, without initiative.

But looks are misleading if we only have the external view. Underneath the surface there are invisible forces at work—namely, the cleansing power of the blood of Jesus, the sanctifying and guiding power of the Holy Spirit, and the constant growing of the divine seed which is the Word of God. While a Christian may seem weak, poor, and of no account, he is being developed into a fit companion to live with the Lord of glory forever, a future king to govern this earth, and an inheriter of the entire created universe of God. In due time the earthen vessels which house this treasure will be changed to the beauty and splendor of the glorified body of our Lord.

When the Bible references are traced concerning the Church we see it as an army with banners, an army which the persecutions of the centuries have not been able to blot out—whose chief banner is Love—whose

victories are over the world, the flesh, and the devil—whose Captain is the Lord of hosts—and whose call is to eternal fellowship with God. Let this be the view of each individual Christian, and it will become a bulwark of strength through the wearisome toil of life's little day.

The individual Christian and the local church congregation both represent the Church as a whole. For the Christian this life is a *robing room*. The Word of God tells us what garments must be put off and what we must put on.

Ephesians 4:22—"Put off the old man which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts."

Colossians 3:8—"Put off anger, wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth."

Colossians 3:9—"Put off the old man with his deeds."

After we have been divested of the garments of this world, God gives us other garments to wear:

Romans 13:12—"Put on the armour of light."


Romans 13:14—"Put on the Lord Jesus Christ."

Ephesians 4:24—"Put on the new man which is created in righteousness."

Ephesians 6:11—"Put on the whole armour of God."

Colossians 3:12—"Put on mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering."

Colossians 3:14—"Put on love, which is the bond of perfectness."



A Christian does not wear the robes of the world and the robes of Christ at the same time, any more than a person would wear two suits of clothes at the same time. While many try to wear the garments of religion without taking off the garments of the world, it is mandatory in the true Church that the child of God wear the garments offered to him by God.

What a magnificent sight it will be when the mighty army of the Lord stands before the Throne, having overcome the world, dressed in the righteousness of Christ. We shall be glad in that day that we went through the *robing room*.

For the local church congregation God has a program also. There is a reason for gathering together each week in the local community. From the preacher's view on the platform a congregation may resemble a rest home or a convalescent camp. People often limp into the church service after being defeated by the devil during the previous six days and promptly go to sleep until the benediction. But God meant for the local church gatherings to be like arsenals where people get fresh ammunition and inspiration to go out and do further damage to the worldly principalities and powers. The local church is wrestling with mighty world rulers, tearing down demonic strongholds, influencing the morality of the community, and bringing others to a knowledge of Christ and His love. God grant that we do not just beat the air in our place of responsibility.

The Church cannot be ultimately defeated. The gates of hell are not capable of prevailing against this army. Christ's love for the Church is the same as God's love for Christ. "In all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. For I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Why should God's people hang their heads in shame? There is no need for it. Our light and temporary afflictions are working for us an eternal weight of glory. There will come our day of triumph. On that day the Lord of hosts, accompanied by His armies of angels, will lead the victorious Church into Glory. Biblical Christianity is not a weak-kneed affair. At present we are locked in battle with titanic forces, and in the future we shall see the fruits of the conquest. You may feel in the minority, but you are on the winning side.

Show me two men soundly converted, charged with the power of the Holy Ghost. One can chase a thousand and two can put ten thousand to flight. Show me a man sold out to God and to the program of God. Such a one can run through a troop and leap over a wall.

So the heavenly Solomon looks upon His beloved bride, the Church, and says she is "fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners." Let us not do anything which would cause Him to say anything else. Let us fight the good fight of faith. Let us stand fast in the Lord. Let us endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ, and completely disentangle ourselves from the affairs of this world, that we may please Him who has chosen us to be in the army of the Lord.

"Upon All Flesh"

The general feeling among the ministers, delegates, and visitors at the thirtieth General Council of the Assemblies of God, held in Memphis during August, was that it represented a high mark in the tide of Pentecostal blessing seldom if ever reached at a General Council. They were days of "visitation from on High" and we who were privileged to be present can never be the same again.

A new attendance record was set with 6,262 officially registered. It was estimated that more than 10,000 different persons attended the

Probably no one enjoyed those meetings more than J. Roswell Flower, who has attended every General Council from the beginning, "It was a far cry from the 1914 and 1915 Councils, when as few as two hundred people were present," said Brother Flower. "The spiritual tone of the 1963 Council was outstanding," he added. "I cannot remember when there was more unity of spirit and unanimity of mind than at Memphis. It was clearly evident that God was moving upon the great assembly of people by His Spirit, and the aggressive action toward doing a better job of evangelism seemed to strike a chord of response among all the delegates."

Although gains in the number of conversions, members, churches, contributions, etc., were reported for the biennium, the General Superintendent said the fellowship is not growing as rapidly as it should. He declared there is a serious decline in our evangelistic ministry and he

called for a quick reversal of the trend.

The delegates voted to place the evangelism thrust directly under the General Superintendent's supervision. They voted to dissolve the Department of Evangelism in its present form and authorized the General Superintendent to appoint an evangelism committee which will intensify the evangelistic ministry of all departments of the fellowship. The General Superintendent will coordinate the committee's activities. The result, it is hoped, will be a greater surge of soul winning on every front.

All the resident executive presbyters were reelected by an overwhelming vote on the nominating ballot, and all but one of the non-resident executive presbyters were reelected also. G. W. Hardcastle, Sr., nominated by delegates from the Gulf States, was chosen to succeed A. A.

Wilson who now resides in Springfield.

The sermons, presentations, and discussions all blended beautifully with the Pentecostal theme, "Upon All Flesh," which had been selected for this Council. Special attention was given to the outpourings of the Holy Spirit upon groups in various denominations. Great joy was expressed over these outpourings and consideration was given to the relationship the Assemblies of God should sustain toward these groups. A resolution adopted unanimously by the delegates expressed a desire to "meet with, pray with, and aid in any other way any denominational minister in reaching an understanding of the Pentecostal experience." Thus a hand of fellowship is extended to all who would participate in Pentecostal blessing, whatever their denominational affiliation may be.

Condensations of a number of the sermons preached during the General Council will be published in the Evangel, beginning with the October 6 issue, and a detailed report of the meetings will appear at the earliest possible date. We thank God for the meetings at Memphis. We met with Him, as well as with our brethren, and the fellowship was sweet. We heard Him say again, "Preach the gospel to every creature." Now we must obey.

THE GREAT STRUGGLE

GODLY AMBITION



THERE IS A CARRYING POWER IN THE WIND. PILOTS have discovered they can fly much faster with the wind than against it.

Charles A. Lindbergh found this out while flying one of the nation's first airmail planes. He learned to take

advantage of the storms.

On that memorable morning in May 1927 Lindbergh was waiting at the airfield with his little monoplane, Spirit of St. Louis, hoping to make the first solo flight across the Atlantic. Nearby was Admiral Byrd with his great tri-motored plane and expert assistants. Byrd waited for calm weather, but Lindbergh was waiting for the wind to move out across the Atlantic. He had been charting the storms and that morning he found there had been a miniature cyclone moving across the water. It was his moment of opportunity—he waited no longer. He began to move with the wind, and the monoplane went farther and faster on a limited supply of fuel than it ever could have gone without the help of the wind.

When David prayed for divine guidance as to when to go into battle against the Philistines, he learned the secret directly from the Lord. Without the wind he was not to go, but, "When thou hearest the sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees, that then thou shalt bestir thyself: for then shall the Lord go out before thee" (2 Samuel 5:23, 24). The new king could have made either of two mistakes and brought calamity: he could have gone before the wind was stirring, or he could have failed to listen and to take action when he heard the wind in the trees. As it was, he listened and moved with the wind, and the foe was smitten.

The wind is one of the types of the Holy Spirit and many of God's children have discovered the power of the divine Wind as they have waited, watched, and listened for His moving. The Lord Jesus Himself was always listening so that He could work along with the Father. He depended upon the moving of the Spirit.

Then there was that little group which followed Jesus to His last act on earth. He told them to wait for the promise of the Father—the coming of the Holy Spirit. The faithful band waited—and a few days later a Wind from heaven was breathed into that upper room. The disciples who could not witness in their own power went out on the wings of the heavenly Wind to do exploits for God.

Peter praying alone on the housetop in Joppa caught the message and was soon at the household of the centurion Cornelius. What he never would have done on his own he found strength and anointing to do as he moved with the Wind to bring the gospel to a Gentile household. And, "while Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell" (Acts 10:44).

Savonarola of Italy learned the power of the Wind as he lay prostrate before the altar in anguish of soul for the spiritual needs of his people. As a result, the city of Florence was moved from center to circumference. Moving in the current of the Wind, the people brought their dancing slippers, playing cards, and books of magic, and built a bonfire. There were cries of surrender and repentance before God. Only the Wind of the Spirit could have accomplished this.

Charles Finney and his associates knew the secret of the Wind and, in their generation, moved great cities. Moody knew it. Praying Hyde of South India discovered its truth and witnessed its operation more powerfully and directly than many more able ministers. The youthful Evan Roberts, though only a coal miner, yielded to it and shook Wales and the Christian world with his prayers.

Many of us have seen the Spirit of the Lord operate so marvelously that we stand in awe of what God will do through ordinary people who will wait, listen, and move with the Wind of His Spirit.

One summer I was asked to help in the after services in a certain camp meeting. At the close of a preliminary service on a Saturday afternoon, before the main opening that night, the altar was filled. Many stayed to seek the Lord and God met us. But when most of the people had gone, a little Oriental woman still knelt. She was utterly absorbed in the Spirit and entirely lost to her surroundings. Hours slipped by and we waited before God. (I felt that here the battle for the entire camp meeting might be won or lost. From many battles on the field I had observed that a strong gust of the Wind of the Spirit in a single service could accomplish more than all our human efforts in many services.)

Suddenly, the Wind of the Spirit filled that little woman's being. We were amazed and astonished in His presence. The lady's husband, a tall fair-haired American who had been watching quietly, now came up to seek a blessing also. (Later we learned he had done military service in Okinawa, and there had married this precious little island woman.)

They gave their testimony that night, and the spiritual tone of the entire camp was set. There were no empty altars or deserted prayer rooms—every service saw determined hearts pressing through to victory.

Today the Spirit of God is moving in the earth, and if we can learn what He is doing, we will be able to work with Him and accomplish much more than in our own strength alone. Paul gave the key to spiritual achievement in 2 Corinthians 6:1 when he said we are "workers together with him."

Even winds of adversity may play their part in the victory. Under persecution "they that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the word" (Acts 9:4). From a prison cell Paul wrote, "But I would ye should understand, brethren, that the things which happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the gospel" (Philippians 1:12). God is able to cause even the wrath of men to praise Him.

In her significant little volume, Listen! the Wind, Anne Lindbergh tells of being becalmed in an area of the Southern Seas and waiting until a wind finally sprang up. When we are spiritually becalmed the secret of success lies not in frantic self-effort, but in waiting patiently for and moving with the Wind. We need to seek out the will of God and work along with Him. Then our work will not be fruitless or in vain. By riding on the mighty rushing Wind of the Spirit we will be carried to victory.

Trial By Fire

FIRE! FIRE! THIS IS A WORD THAT CAN STRIKE TERROR to the heart. How great is the destructiveness of fire! Yet on the other hand how indispensible is its use to mankind for innumerable purposes!

The Bible tells us that there is to be trial by fire of the sinner, the Christian, and the Christian's work.

God's Word warns us of the judgment of God which will fall upon all who reject Christ and His great salvation. It is inescapable—as certain as death itself. "And this is the condemnation, that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil" (John 3:19). This judgment of a rejected God and Saviour is more to be feared than any atomic blast.

Thank God, there is a way of escape which God Himself has provided at immeasurable cost. He sent His own dearly loved Son, Jesus, to "change places" with us and take our punishment for us, dying on the cross in our stead. All who believe in Him—accepting Him into their hearts and lives—will not only escape the fearful wrath of God, but will receive peace and joy and help for this present life, as well as untold blessing in the everlasting life to come!

"Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you" (1 Peter 4:12). Yes, the very fact that you are beloved means that there must needs be such a trial. What father who truly loves his son would willingly allow him to grow up to be a rascal, an ignoramus, or an immature, overgrown baby? How much more

will our heavenly Father tenderly and persistently train us, putting us through test after test?

Let us remember ever to "glory in tribulations also: knowing that tribulation worketh patience; and patience, experience; and experience, hope; and hope maketh not ashamed; because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given us" (Romans 5:3-5).

"Every man's work shall be made manifest: for the day shall declare it, because it shall be revealed by fire; and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is" (1 Corinthians 3:13). This third chapter of 1 Corinthians speaks of believers as being "laborers together with God" working on a building whose foundation is Jesus Christ. It also warns every man to "take heed how he builds thereon" (v. 10).

It is not so much the quantity, but the SUBSTANCE of our work that is of consequence. In that day it will be revealed whether we are building with gold, silver, and precious stones—which will withstand the fiery test—or with wood, hay, and stubble—which will be consumed by the fire.

It behooves us to search our hearts diligently, under the searchlight of the Holy Spirit, to discern our work and recognize of what sort it is—whether what we are doing is done out of a pure motive to bring glory to God, or whether some of it may be for our own self-elevation and respect.

How about the work we are doing for the kingdom of God? Is it *pure gold* we are using, or is it mixed with the ore of self-love, pride, jealousy, suspicion, or giving way to anger or resentment?

'And the Child Grew

LUKE RECORDS BOTH OF JESUS AND OF JOHN THE Baptist that "the child grew, and waxed strong in spirit" (Luke 1:80; 2:40). Of the Lord Jesus he says further that He "increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man" (2:52). This is a fourfold growth.

All children grow, but the child whose parents guide his development mentally, physically, morally, and spiritually, will have a richer life than the one whose train-

ing is neglected.

MENTAL DEVELOPMENT

A lot of effort and expense goes into the mental development of our children. And it is right that we should provide the best in educational facilities for our children. But in addition to their formal education, the children must receive some training at home. Here the right attitudes toward God and country, and a healthy respect for authority and for the rights of others, must be developed.

"Don't worry," a college girl wrote home to her mother. "God has been a member of our family too long for

me to lose Him now."

A professor once said to his class of freshmen: "Some of your parents are disturbed about my teaching. Write home and tell them you will return with just about the depth of faith you brought here! That faith was pretty much determined during the first seven years of your life."

Solomon said virtually the same thing in Proverbs 22: 6 when he advised parents to "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Consciously or not, our children are educated at home as well as at school, and what they learn at home is based as much on what they see in us as on what we say.

On a rainy Sunday morning a family decided to stay home from Sunday school. Although on Monday morning the rain was still falling, there was no question about going to work or school. Everyone was expected to go regardless of the weather. By their example these parents said to their child that the things of time were more important than eternal values.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

In recent years the public schools have put on an extensive physical education program. Our boys and girls are encouraged to develop physical strength and endurance. But it is at home that children practice eating the right foods, learn good health habits, and how to take care of themselves generally. In the Christian home the child should also learn that his body is the temple of the



Holy Ghost, and as such it is not to be abused or neglected.

MORAL DEVELOPMENT

"We lost our first child," a father said to his pastor. "She is not dead physically, but morally and spiritually she is lost, and it was my fault."

"How did you lose her?" asked the pastor. "I was too busy," the father answered sadly.

Our sixteen-year-old son told me about a system he uses when he faces a choice between right and wrong. He draws an imaginary line between the two and asks himself on which side he belongs.

With the coming of television and other advances in communication the Christian home is not immune to undesirable influences. The sound and sight of low morality beat upon the home from every side. Consistent Christian living, along with prayer and Bible study in the home, form the strongest bulwark against this undermining of morals. Our children must be taught faith in the authority of the Word of God so that they will have something definite on which to base their decisions.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH

Even though a child has been raised in a Christian home he must have a born-again experience. His works and training cannot substitute for personal salvation. An experience borrowed from his parents will not meet his need when he is "on his own."

When I was in Bible school the girls in our dormitory set aside a prayer hour. One day as the blessing of the Lord was upon us in an unusual way a minister's daughter came to me and sobbed, "Pray for me; I'm a sinner."

Afterward she told us she had never been saved, even though she was brought up in the church.

It is the duty of Christian parents to work toward the development of their children mentally, physically, morally, and spiritually. We cannot begin too soon!

Recovery Called "A Miracle"

THE DOCTOR SAID IT WOULD BE A miracle if I lived, but it seemed the Lord spoke to me and assured me I was going to recover. The fact that I am well today, over three and one-half years later, indicates that God did perform a miracle.

On the morning of October 28, 1959, I had my lunch pail packed and was ready to go to work, when I had a terrible pain which was followed by many more. My pastor, Brother DeVasher, was called and after he prayed for me I felt some better. But in a short time severe pain returned and continued to grow worse.

Finally I consented to go to the hospital where I was rushed to surgery. There they found I had a ruptured pancreas and my "insides" were floating in liquid.

This was the beginning of many days of intravenous feedings and a loss of seventy-five pounds in weight in forty-five days. As the days moved on my strength left, leaving me weaker every day. No visitors were allowed except my wife and our minister who was faithful to visit me every day and to stand behind me in prayer. All my wonderful Christian friends were praying and Dr. Kiser, my family doctor realized only the Lord could provide what I needed.

On the forty-fourth day the doctor told my wife I had an obstruction of the stomach and bowels, which meant I would go to surgery at 7

the next morning. As the staff prepared me for surgery, Brother De-Vasher and my wife remained in the waiting room. He felt led to pray that God would not allow the surgery, and my wife asked that God would help her unbelief. When they finished prayer and the time had passed for surgery, they sought out the doctor who said they had called off the operation. I was sent home to die of cancer within forty-five to ninety days.

But the Lord told me to be in church the next Sunday. After much pleading by my wife, my son-in-law consented to take me. As I walked in, the church was stirred to touch

God in my behalf. I began to eat a few bites at a time.

Then I developed an abcess on my back and was returned to the hospital. The doctor said it was one of the largest he had ever observed and he did not see how I could live, so after removing the abcess he never sewed me up. But when after two weeks I was still improving, they came in and taped the incision shut.

I went home on February 28, 1960, with two open incisions which drained five months. My wonderful wife was very faithful to care for me.

I am now weighing over 200 pounds.

How a Methodist Minister Received the Pentecostal Baptism

When I first came into contact with Pentecostal people I considered them a group of emotional fanatics. The baptism in the Spirit was to me an unreal, unnecessary, and unwanted experience. But I did take time to study the subject, and here is what I found:

THE BIBLE TEACHES IT

First, I discovered this experience was in *prophecy*. "For with stammering lips and another tongue will he speak to this people. To whom he said, This is the rest wherewith ye may cause the weary to rest; and this is the refreshing: yet they would not hear" (Isaiah 28:11, 12). This is referred to in 1 Corinthians 14:21.

In Acts 2:16-18 Peter referred to this prophecy found in Joel: "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions: and also upon the servants and upon the handmaidens in those days will I pour out my spirit."

Second, I found that this experience was *preached*. John the Baptist, the forerunner of Christ, declared: "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance: but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire" (Matthew 3:11).

Third, I found that this experience was promised by Christ Himself. He promised: "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you" (John 14:26). Again He said "And, behold, I send

the promise of my Father upon you but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high" (Luke 24:49).

And finally, "Being assembled together with them [he] commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence" (Acts 1:4, 5).

Fourth, I discovered that the Holy

Ghost was *poured out* on believers according to the promise. "And when the Day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance" (Acts 2:1-4).

Then I read about the outpouring in the house of Cornelius, a Gentile to whom Peter was sent to preach.

"While Peter yet spake..., the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word. And they of the circumcision which believed were astonished, ... because that on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost. For they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God" (Acts 10:44-46).

I had been told that the only purpose for speaking in tongues was that some devout but unbelieving Jews could hear the gospel in their own language. But here we read about believers speaking in tongues in the household of Cornelius and no unbelieving Jews' were present.

Continuing to study the Bible, I read in Acts 19 of a third outpouring of the Holy Spirit in which believers spoke in tongues. Paul was on a missionary tour in Ephesus, "And finding certain disciples, he said unto them, Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed? And they said unto him, We have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost." After giving them some instruction, Paul laid his hands upon them, and "the Holy Ghost came on them; and they spake with tongues, and prophesied" (Acts 19:6).

In a further study of Paul's experience and teaching, I found that shortly after his conversion the Lord sent Ananias to pray for him. Here is what Ananias said: "Brother Saul, the Lord, even Jesus,...hath sent me, that thou mightest receive thy sight, and be filled with the Holy Ghost" (Acts 9:17). Next, I discovered that Paul spoke with tongues, for he says in 1 Corinthians 14:18, "I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all." Furthermore, he exhorted in verse 39, "For-

bid not to speak with tongues." First Corinthians 12 deals with the gifts of the Spirit that are manifested among believers who have received the baptism of the Spirit.

My study of the Bible brought me to three conclusions: (1) The Bible teaches that there is an experience called the baptism of the Holy Spirit. (2) The evidence of the experience is "speaking with tongues." (3) The experience comes after salvation as a second definite experience.

CHURCH HISTORY ENDORSES IT

Although I saw all this in the Bible, I could not help wondering, "If this experience is for all believers, why did God wait 1900 years after the first outpouring before beginning a Pentecostal movement?" I weighed the baptism of the Holy Ghost in the balances of church history and found to my amazement that some of the greatest men in the history of the Church had received and preached this experience.

Justin Martyr (108-168) stated in a letter to Trypho, a Jewish leader, "The church is speaking in tongues, prophesying, and praying for the sick, by the power of the Holy Ghost."

Irenaeus (130-180), another early writer, stated that the church was speaking in tongues and prophesying during its worship.

St. Augustine (345-430) wrote in his diary that he was laying hands on his converts and praying for them, and they were being filled with the Holy Ghost and were speaking in tongues.

In the revival during the Dark Ages which was led by the Waldenses there were both prophecy and tongues present.

Scharff's church history records the fact that the Methodists and Quakers were receiving the Holy Ghost and speaking in tongues in the early 1700's.

John Wesley (1703-1791) wrote, "The Holy Ghost enables men to speak in tongues, prophesy, and manifest other spiritual gifts."

Charles Finney (1792-1875), a great theologian and preacher, declared that in the year 1825, while praying, he spoke in a language he had never heard before.

Two of D. L. Moody's biographers, Boyd and Daniel, both state that on one occasion Moody broke out speaking in tongues while he was preaching.

This study convinced me that believers had been receiving the baptism of the Holy Ghost since the Day of Pentecost. I realized that if some of the greatest men in the history of the Church had received this experience it was not unreasonable for us today to believe that God still fills people with the Holy Spirit.

I HAVE PERSONALLY EXPERIENCED IT

Not only have I been convinced by the Bible and church history of the reality of the baptism of the Holy Spirit; but I have also received it. There is no better proof of the reality of the baptism of the Spirit than personal experience.


After finishing my training at Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth, Texas, I was sent to pastor a Methodist Church in the city of Lubbock, Texas. Here I became fully aware of my need for the baptism of the Holy Spirit. A Pentecostal minister friend pointed out to me that he who has light and does not walk in it will soon be walking in darkness. I began to pray about the matter.

About this time I went home to visit my parents for a few days. While there I received word that my girl friend, who is now my wife, and was a devout member of the Church of Christ, had received the baptism of the Holy Ghost. She encouraged me and I began to seek the Baptism in a Pentecostal revival that was in progress nearby.

The first night I went to the altar I was very conscious of my position as a Methodist minister. Kneeling very carefully on one knee I prayed something like this: "Here I am, Lord. If you want me to have this experience, give it to me." But I did not receive the Baptism that way. I soon realized I must forget about my position and simply desire the infilling of the Holy Spirit with all my heart. It took a few days of fasting and several hours of prayer to humble my stubborn, proud spirit.

Then one wonderful night I went to the altar wanting more than anything else for God to fill me with the Holy Spirit. I fell on my knees, raised my hands toward heaven, and began to tell Jesus of my love for Him. Soon I was lost in the presence of Christ. My soul was flooded with heavenly glory, peace, and power. My one desire was to love and praise the

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

He Who HESITATES...

HISTORY SPEAKS ELOQUENTLY OF THE tragedy of hesitation in the matter of deciding for Christ. And hell will ring with the testimonies of men and women who can vividly recall the moments when they were almost persuaded to become Christians—but hesitated, and were lost forever.

When the great German poet and philosopher, Goethe, was a university student he became desperately ill. A devout young Moravian nurse who attended him urged him to accept Christ as his Lord and Master. Under deep conviction he almost yielded, but he hesitated—then he rejected Christ's claims. His godless philosophy and writings were influential in shaping the Germany that led to the first world war.

A contemporary of Goethe, John Wesley, came under the influence of the same godly line of people at about the same time. He decided for Christ, and influenced countless others to follow Him also.

When Aaron Burr was in Yale University he attended a revival meeting conducted on campus. One night he responded to the invitation. As he walked toward the front, he heard someone say, "Look at Aaron Burr going to the inquiry room." Unwilling to bear the reproach Burr hesitated, then turned back saying, "I was only fooling." The result of his almost decision is written on the pages of American history for all to see. Having first betrayed himself he eventually found it possible to betray his country

One of the most pathetic persons in the funeral procession of David Livingstone in London was a shabbily dressed "bum" who fought his way through the crowd. When they would have hindered him he cried out, "I have a right to see David Livingstone. I knew him better than any of you. We were in Sunday school together. He decided for Christ; I decided against Him."

Jim Maples and Forest Ritter grew up in the same Kentucky hill community. They were often together and had equal opportunity to hear the gospel. Forest accepted Christ as a teenager and Jim rejected Him.

Years passed and the men parted ways. Forest became a preacher of the gospel, and Jim a moonshiner in the Kentucky hills.

The men were in their middle fifties when they met again—in a little mountain schoolhouse where Forest preached and the came to listen only out of respect for his old friend. Forest made the gospel message plain that night, then gave an appeal for decisions. No one moved, but all felt the presence of God's Spirit, still dealing with Jim after all those years.

Forest left the platform and walked to Jim, and their tears mingled as Forest pleaded for decision. Jim hesitated, but at last the two men walked together toward the platform. Then instead of kneeling to pray, Jim pulled out his billfold and laid a five-dollar bill on the preacher's open Bible on the altar.

No one heard what he said to Forest

as he turned and slowly walked away from the altar, his head still bowed. And no one knew the battle that went on in Jim's heart during the next two months. They could only guess when the news came that Jim had been killed and robbed while intoxicated—just a few miles from the place where he was almost saved, but lost.

The rich young ruler who came to Jesus was "not far from the kingdom," but he was lost because he hesitated over the price he would have

to pay

"Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2). He who hesitates to decide for Christ now may be lost eternally.

YOUR QUESTIONS

You have said Israel will not accept Christ until He returns to earth and you quote Zechariah 12:10 to 13:1. Does not Zechariah 13:6 refer to the Crucifixion?

Zechariah 13:6 refers to the crucified Christ rather than to the events of the cross. The glorified Christ, presently in heaven, bears the marks of His crucifixion (John 20:25; Revelation 5:6). The prophet foresees that when Christ returns it is by the "nailprints" that Israel as a nation will recognize and accept Him as their true Messiah.

Did Solomon marry the daughter of Pharoah before, or after, he was made king? Was it not wrong for him to marry her, and did she not, as well as others, turn his heart from the Lord?

Judging from 1 Kings 1 to 3, Solomon was king before marrying the daughter of Pharaoh. This marriage was evidently the outcome of a political alliance. Rehoboam, the heir to the throne, was not her son, and Solomon had some religious compunctions concerning her (2 Chronicles 8:11). Since it was after their marriage that the Lord entered into a convenant with Solomon (1 Kings 3:3-14), she does not seem to have influenced him, at least in the beginning, toward idolatry. However, God was not pleased with any of Solomon's heathen marriage alliances (1 Kings 11:1, 2; Ezra 9:1; Nehemiah 13:26).

Is it wrong for members in the congregation to sip coffee in the Sunday morning service while the pastor is preaching?

Common courtesy and respect for the house of God and Christian worship would condemn such things. Surely if we are "drinking in" the Word of God, we do not need to sip coffee. Such social activities should be carried on elsewhere. (See 1 Corinthians 11:34.)

Is it true that those baptized in the Holy Ghost will have a heavenly inheritance, and those saved, but not baptized, will be an earthly people?

There is no scriptural foundation for such an idea. According to 1 Peter 1:2-5, all born-again people have a *heavenly* inheritance. We enter into the things of God by faith (Romans 5:1, 2); the Baptism is a precious gift to those who are already in the kingdom (Acts 11:17). There is to be an earthly kingdom of Christ, which is often called the Millennium. In this kingdom God's redeemed people have the promise of reigning with Christ (Matthew 19:28; Revelation 3:21; 20:4).

Do you think a song leader at church should tell all the people to clap their hands? Should we not refrain from such expression unless moved by the Spirit to do this?

I suppose that if clapping of hands is a mere form, a meaningless habit, or a device for exciting the flesh, it is unprofitable. If all expression of worship were spontaneous and were motivated by the Spirit Himself, this would be most desirable. However, we sometimes have to force ourselves to give expression of our worship when in the natural we might not feel like doing so. David the Psalmist often prodded himself into praising the Lord. The important factor is whether we do these things for the glory of God. The people of God should be encouraged to exercise Christian liberty. At times clapping of hands expresses the joy a worshiper feels. At other times it may be the means of freeing the soul and cultivating a spirit of worship.


Daniel's God-given Wisdom

Sunday School Lesson for September 29, 1963 PROVERBS 9:10, 11; DANIEL 1:8-21

While only a boy of about eighteen, Daniel was taken into Babylonian captivity. With three friends he was stationed at the court of the king where he attained unto one of the highest ranks in the kingdom. Because of the blameless life he lived in the midst of the corruption and godlessness of a heathen court, he is one of three men who were mentioned by Ezekiel as being outstanding examples of godliness (Ezekiel 14:14, 20; 28:3).

Daniel's Test (Daniel 1:3-7). In his search for young men to serve in his court, Nebuchadnezzar wanted healthy, attractive men whose presence would grace the court. Consequently candidates were subjected to a three-year training period and at the end of this time they were inducted into the king's court. But complications developed! The king's bill of fare included certain foods which were forbidden to Jews by the Mosaic law. What would Daniel do?



Daniel's Decision (Daniel 1:8-16). "Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself." He would rather displease the king and lose his head than to displease God and lose his soul.

"He requested of the prince of eunuchs that he might not defile himself." But he did not go about a *right* thing in a *wrong* way! Showing respect for his overseer, Daniel suggested the test whereby he and his friends were placed on a simple diet for ten days and then at the end of that time compared with the others.

Daniel's Reward (Daniel 1:17-21). At the end of the testing period Daniel and his friends presented a far healthier appearance than those who fared on the king's diet. Not only so; the king selected them for higher positions than all others and "found them ten times better than all the magicians." This incident is full of lessons which are vital and relevant today:

- 1. "Be not conformed to this world" (Romans 12:2). To be "conformed" means to be "fashioned according to," or to be "patterned after." The desire to conform and to seek the approval of others is a strong natural tendency; yet it is perilous! The argument, "Everybody is doing it," has started many a young person to smoking, drinking, petting, and a host of other questionable practices. Again and again the Bible illustrates the truth that the majority is more often wrong than right! We must be governed in our actions, not by popular opinion, but by the eternal principles of God's Word!
- 2. The Refusals of Faith. In Hebrews 11 we read an impressive list of the names of heroes of faith and the things they accomplished because of faith. But our lesson illustrates the fact that it often takes as much faith to say, "No," as it does to say, "Yes"! By faith Moses refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter. By faith Joseph refused to yield to the seductive influence of Potiphar's wife. By faith Daniel's three friends refused to bow down to Nebuchadnezzar's image. May God give us the faith to say, "No"!
- '3. Purpose of Heart. This is a prerequisite to victorious living. Daniel made a decision without reservation that he would be loyal to God. Many a Christian is defeated because he has mental reservations in connection with his conduct and service for the Lord. "I shall serve the Lord and be true to my convictions if it is convenient" represents the real heart attitude of some. Daniel would be true if it cost him his life.
- 4. The Way to Spiritual Insight. Had Daniel compromised his convictions and ignored God's revealed Word, he never would have been the channel through which God poured tremendous and far-reaching truths, or the recipient of amazing, God-given, spiritual discernment. Jesus said: "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God." The voice of God is not directed first to the intellect—rather it is to the heart. "The secret of the Lord is with them that fear him."
- 5. Living Above Our Environment. The life of Daniel proves forever that a Christian can remain a Christian, and an influential one, in the worst of environments. "In all these things [including an unfriendly environment] we are more than conquerors through him that loved us." Rather than allow it to change us, by the power of the Spirit we can CHANGE our environment!

ISAW THE DARKNES!

We backed against the wall as 250,000 white-clad Moslems filled the streets with their prayer mats. The air was filled with shrieks and groans that caused shivers to run up and down my spine.

As Pastor David Wakefield and I stood there on the streets of Dakar, Senegal, my thoughts wandered back over the past two months. I had pastored the First Assembly in Cushing, Okla., for only nine months, and was struggling with financial obligations because of our new sanctuary. Yet God miraculously laid a burden upon the hearts of our people to send me to Africa to minister on the mission field.

My wife and I boarded a plane at Tulsa. Our hearts were pained with the emotion of leaving our two children and our church, even temporarily. But knowing that God had ordained it made our hearts rely on Him.

Later, as I stood with Missionary Glen Reeves on a homemade platform in an open field in Port Harcourt, Nigeria, and saw as many as 3,000 to 5,000 people come each night to hear the gospel, I shed tears of thankfulness to God for this miracle that had allowed us to experience these things. I saw 1,500 listeners answer the call of the gospel and follow personal workers aside for Christian instruction.

In Ghana we traveled inland 350 miles to minister in Tamale. We also had services in Kumasi and Accra. The Robert Cobbs (the missionaries we were visiting) have a great task to accomplish. Thank God, He is giving them strength.

In Liberia God was so good to us in granting results. Even the rough trail roads into New Hope Town (leper colony) seemed worth enduring when an old witch doctor came to Christ on the last night of our meetings. According to his own words, he had previously taken the lives of at least eight human beings. Wonderful is the grace of God.

But now I stood in Dakar, and I felt the oppression of Satan in a measure completely unknown to the majority of Americans. This feeling is prevalent in so many parts of Africa. You cannot escape it! The battle is not primarily against ju-jus, idols, and individual sins, but against the total powers of darkness. Christ became more real to us than He had ever been. We saw that He, and He alone, is the answer to the thundering sweep of Mohammedanism in Senegal.

Through the prayers of our people at home God gave us a great revival with the Wakefields in this new area where there has not been the challenge of a Pentecostal church for many years.





The building at left serves as a church in Dakar, Senegal, until the new evangelistic center (right) now under construction is completed. Missionary David Wakefield is supervising the construction.



On Pretense Road

In the famous story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) the Bible says that the priest and the Levite "passed by on the other side" when they saw the wounded man. It was as if they were going to pretend to themselves that they had not seen him. They thought that by staying on the farther side of the road they would escape the obligation of coming to his rescue.

Neglecting to help someone in desperate need is not what you would expect from two such religious men. It was not only cruel; it amounted to murder. Both knew he was still alive. Both had an opportunity to minister to him. Both knew their own guilt in failing to stop. But they tried to cover it up for conscience' sake by keeping away from the sufferer as they went by.

Perhaps each was thinking, "If someone should be watching, it's better if they do not think I am deliberately ignoring this man. I will just appear not to see the need!"

What excuse did the priest and the Levite have for leaving a man to die? That the thieves who beat him up would abandon him was to be expected. But why did the priest and the Levite act that way? No doubt these men spent a good part of their lives ministering in the temple in Jerusalem. Perhaps they felt that this service relieved them of any further obligation to do good. They would just leave this victim to be looked after by someone else without so many other noble duties.

It is easy for an individual Christian or a whole church to be like the priest and Levite in attitude. We can become so entangled in our "good" local activities that we cannot spare time, effort, or money to help the millions in heathen countries who are wounded by sin and are left alone on the highway of life to die.

There were only two sides of the Jericho road. The priest, the Levite, and the Good Samaritan each had a choice of sides on which to travel. Their opportunities were equal, but their responses were not. The one side was the side of service to the needy, and the other side was the side of indifference and selfishness.

There are just two sides of the road for us and our churches to travel. One is the side of genuine missionary outreach, and the other is that of our own interests. A church can choose either to spend all of its income on local needs or it can give a fair annual share to missions. I know more than one church which has an annual income of more than thirty thousand dollars, but which gives less than five hundred dollars a year to missions.

Most of our congregations carry great financial loads. We are building modern churches, new parsonages, beautiful educational buildings and it is well that we should. But it is easy to feel that because of these things we are doing enough. We take the attitude of the priest and the Levite—let some church which does not have such a financial load give to missions.

In what condition would your church be if the members decided to pay all their bills first before they paid their tithes? The work of God is never done by people who have time or money to spare. The missions cause is not financed by churches which have resources left over after meeting their own needs.

God's work is accomplished only as individuals and churches deliberately choose the side of the road where needs are found, even when those needs seem to have nothing to do with them personally. Which side of the road are you traveling?

Why We Favored an Assemblies of God College for Our Children

Sunsets viewed from our bedroom windows were most beautiful. Often we stood watching as the sun approached and then dropped below the horizon while shafts of brilliant color shot high into the sky. For long minutes the colors hung as though painted above the low-lying hills. One evening, as we stood watching the slowly changing colors, we discussed the most vital of our current family problems—what college should our children attend?

As the day had come and gone so quickly, fading now into the soft glow of twilight, so the years had slipped by faster than we ever thought they would. Only a few brief years before, we were tucking little squirming tykes into bed at this time of day. Now our oldest daughter was making plans for her college training. As parents what should we encourage her to do?

Nearby was a growing state university. A few minutes drive would take her to the campus. She could easily get an excellent academic education there. Was this the school to which we should send her?

A short distance farther away was a fine college of another denomination. Attending there she would not only receive good academic schooling, but some measure of Christian influence. The cost would be much higher than at the state school, but we conceded there were values to consider that were higher than the cost of the school. Would this be the school we would want her to attend? we asked ourselves.

Much farther away were some of our own Assemblies of God colleges. Their academic standing, as yet, was not as high as those colleges closer at hand. Nor could they claim as elaborate and modern campuses, nor provide so extensive educational equipment as some other schools. Their major attractions seemed to be that they were Assemblies of God colleges and exerted a strong spiritual influence upon their students.

As we watched the sun sink lower, the sky suddenly became a brilliant burst of color. Though night and darkness were swiftly approaching, a glorious sense of the Divine Presence was with us. This aura pervaded the whole horizon. Nothing else seemed so important at that moment. God was the All-important One. Around Him all of life was centered. Turning to each other we affirmed together, "Let's send our children to an Assemblies of God college!"

In this moment our minds became very clear, and our eyes viewed the whole of the future in a new perspective. We wanted our children to attend colleges where the whole life of the campus—academic, athletic, musical, social, and spiritual—was pervaded with a glorious sense of the presence of the Lord.

We saw in this time of divine illumination that the scholastic training of our children should not be stratified, i.e., secular here, religious there. Life must be considered as a whole and not as disjointed and meaningless parts. Academic training for the Christian then must be secured within the framework of a Christian college where Christ is honored and worshiped. For our children, brought up in the fellowship of our Assemblies

of God churches, it could only mean one thing—our children would attend our Assemblies of God colleges.

What were some of the reasons which led us to such conclusions?

Frequently we had suggested reasons but we had not arrayed them together at one time. Facing a decision, we were forced to bring all the arguments on both sides together for a showdown. We conceded there could be exceptions to each point we made, yet we were not guaranteed any. We felt that we could not afford to take any chances concerning this critical period in our children's lives.

Of most vital importance to us is that Assemblies of God teachers are Pentecostal in belief and practice. It is not enough that they are good Christians. They must be more. They must be Spirit-filled. There are Christian schools where Christian instructors, even in the classroom, repudiate the Pentecostal experience. We wanted our children at this period in life to be in an environment favorable to the fundamental Pentecostal doctrines.

The influence of a school is as strong as its faculty. Our children needed more from the faculty than just academic excellence. They needed spiritual leadership, both in the classroom and on the campus:

With a faculty believing in Pentecostal experiences, we agreed this would produce a favorable Spirit-filled environment in which our children could grow spiritually and academically. When both sunshine and rain come down upon the soil, the probability is high that good crops will result. We wanted our children to train in surroundings where the

deepest spiritual desires would be encouraged and not be made a butt of ridicule.

The friendships we make in life go far toward influencing us permanently. So many lives are shipwrecked on the reefs of mixed friendships. We preferred at this time in their lives to give our children the opportunity to develop strong abiding friendships with both students and faculty members who held similar convictions to our own. Such friendships would be life-long and would serve as steadying influences through difficult years ahead. Responsibilities later might take the children deep into nonspiritual associations but there would always be friends to whom they could turn for encouragement and advice.

Attitudes and decisions are often crystallized by forceful speakers. Important to our children is the kind of speakers they will hear. Our Assemblies of God colleges schedule the finest religious speakers who challenge the students to give the best of their lives to God. These speakers say accurately and forcefully the things we want to say to our children but have not been able to say.

A basic Christian principle demands we do our very best at all times. This principle must be carried into the classroom. The excellence of the faculties at our Assemblies of God schools assures that the academic standards will be high. While time is required to prove this to accrediting associations, our personal knowledge of the men and women who teach in our schools reveals the wide academic acceptance they receive in their own fields. So we are gratified our children can train in such stimulating academic surroundings and so prepare to meet people with the finest training on their own academic level.

Participation in wholesome student activities can be enjoyed by every student at our Assemblies of God schools. At other colleges Christian students are limited as to the activities in which they can take part. At the Assemblies of God colleges only activities are permitted that are suitable for Christians. Therefore, our children can enjoy the social and extra-curricular programs of the school and benefit from this side of the school life. Their lives can become more fully rounded because of these fine Christian activities.

In modern life, music is playing an increasing part in influencing people's lives. The kind of music a person hears predominantly will exert its power over that person. The music our Assemblies of God schools provide their students will greatly elevate their ambitions and desires. produces Christ-honoring music Christ-honoring listeners. We chose to place our children in Assemblies of God colleges because the music would edify their lives.

While we conceded that our chil-

dren are growing into young women and men who must make decisions regarding behavior for themselves, yet there are certain restrictions and boundaries necessary to help them regulate their lives. Christ laid down certain limitations upon our Christian behavior. It is logical and profitable that strong discipline measures be practiced at our Assemblies of God schools. These are both protection and train-

A Bible conference for all laymen and ministers who would like to attend will be sponsored by the council at the same time and place as the annual meeting. Carrying out the "Assignment: Tomorrow," theme, speakers A. D. Swarztrauber, Dr. Jere Melilli, and Robert Cooley will show how each layman can find in the Bible his divine assignment for today and tomorrow, and how to make the Bible live in his daily life. J. Robert Ashcroft will hold daily sessions on "Certain Secrets for Christian Success."

The development of the Council of Evangel College itself is an example of what can be accomplished by Spirit-filled laymen. The first meeting of the organization was held September 9, 1955, just one week after the college opened its doors for the first time. Sixty-six men attended. Also present were six ladies, who organized

the Women's Auxiliary. Since that time the Council, Auxiliary, and Associate Auxiliary have grown to a present membership of 811.

During the past eight years, members of the Council have sharply increased regular monthly church offerings for the college and scholarships for Pentecostal youth. They have sponsored fund-raising meetings and distributed information on the college to prospective students, assisted with placement of Evangel's graduates, and obtained equipment for the college. The new Evangel College library building was provided by the Council. Auxiliary members have made the campus a more beautiful place by helping to furnish dormitories as well as part of the new library building.

The mission of Evangel College is to give academic and spiritual training to lay leaders of tomorrow. This assignment for tomorrow cannot be carried out without the laymen of today.

A Superintendent Speaks

When people are sick, they go to the doctor and usually are glad to do what he advises even when it is unpleasant. And hardly anyone becomes angry with the doctor for telling the truth about his condition or for prescribing some expensive treatment. Rather, the sick person is thankful, feeling the doctor has his interest at heart. Now the trend is toward going for a yearly check-up just to make sure everything is all right.

This is the reasoning behind the annual Sunday School Checkup. In the church where I grew up the National Sunday School Standard was promoted quite strongly and it aroused within us a great desire to see our school increase in strength. Consequently, we enjoyed several years of Gold Crown achievement.

As a superintendent, I appreciate

the Standard for several reasons. First of all, I know it has made a better man out of me. I feel I must be a "gold crown" individual before I can effectively challenge others. Also it provides a workable guide for the majority of Sunday school problems. For example, it shows a school the best way to divide age groups, and how many absences are allowed for workers each year. If on rare occasions some area of the school needs extra encouragement, a superintendent can almost always deal with it through an emphasis of a particular phase of the Standard, thus leaving personalities out of the picture.

In August 1962 a quick glance at the Sunday school records of Bethel Assembly, Springfield, Missouri, showed we were running behind the previous year's attendance average, so we presented the problem and the Standard requirement to our workers and asked the Lord to help us fill the gap. We established class goals and presented the values of an increase to the people. By the end of September we had picked up a five-point average to go over the top.

We have found that for a sufficient cause our people will put forth genuine effort. The Standard has proven its worth to us.

Superintendents, you never will have to worry about a lack of cooperation in a growing school, for everyone wants to have a part in something that is successful.

The morale of the entire school is lifted when progress is made. The members will look at their award crown with pride and will make personal dedications to continued success. The Standard encourages a school to extend its outreach and evangelism, which gives more willing workers opportunity to work for the Lord and makes everyone happier.

Pastors appreciate the Standard because better schools make better churches. Charles Harris, our pastor, summarizes the matter well by saying that the National Sunday School Standard makes better individual Christians as it encourages them in overall Christian faithfulness.

As fellow workers in the Kingdom, let us use every means available to make our Sunday schools greater channels of ministry and outreach.

NATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL WEEK TO BEGIN SEPTEMBER 29

The Sunday schools of America will join together September 29-October 6 in the observance of National Sunday School Week, sponsored by the National Sunday School Association, Chicago, Illinois.

Mayor Richard Batterton of Denver, Colorado, stated recently, "If we are to preserve our freedom and our religious heritage, each of us must accept the responsibility to attend regularly the Sunday school, church, or synagogue of his choice and urge every American, young or old, to follow that example."

Governor Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon has said, "I believe the Sunday school is the greatest agency for reaching and training children and youth the world has ever known."

Pulitzer Prize-winning editorial cartoonist Vaughn Shoemaker, a Sunday school teacher himself, says, "Sunday school was important in my life, for most of what I learned about living

was taught me by the words and deeds of my Sunday school teachers."

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has consistently emphasized that children and young people who are brought up in the Sunday school seldom show up in the judge's chambers.

Clate A. Risley, Executive Secretary of the National Sunday School Association, reports that the theme of 1963 National Sunday School Week is, "For Times Like These . . . Exalt Christ." According to Dr. Risley, thousands of Sunday schools will cooperate in the nation-wide week-long Sunday school emphasis. Special pastoral messages will be delivered on the value of the Sunday school and varied promotional literature will be used to add emphasis to the special week. Many churches will be planning meetings and conferences during National Sunday School Week with the goal of bettering and enlarging Christian Education and the Sunday school.

California Section Helps First NEW MEXICO BREAKTHROUGH PROJECT

IN A MIRACULOUS WAY THE LORD opened the door for an Assemblies of God Indian Mission to be built at Bloomfield, in northwestern New Mexico. Under the leadership of Presbyter N. E. Carlson, pastors and laymen from churches of the Southern California Central Coast Section joined in building this mission for the Navajo and Apache Indian people.

About two-thirds of the building was completed in one week. A Home Missions Pioneer Plan was used.

Bloomfield borders the checkerboard area in the northeastern corner of the great Navajo reservation.

The first contact was made with Mrs. May, who had been ministering in this area for some time, by Oscar A. Elliott, pastor of Aztec Assembly of God. Mrs. May had gathered quite

a group of people who were well on their way to being established in the Lord. She requested that the Assemblies of God take over the work and establish a permanent mission.

Upon the district's assuming the responsibility for the project with Brother Elliott in charge, meetings were held in a store owned by Mrs. May. This Presbyterian lady, upon being baptized with the Holy Ghost, set out to do all she possibly could for our American Indian friends. She has worked wholeheartedly with the Assemblies of God Mission.

The first missionaries appointed to the station were Gene and Betty Steele, who stayed for several months and had a very rewarding ministry. They laid a good groundwork. The problem of permanent housing for the congregation was made a matter of prayer. The New Mexico Christ's Ambassadors paid for the lots.

In Portland, Oreg., there was a delightful development during the General Council. Neville E. Carlson, pastor of the Pentecostal Assembly of God, Fillmore, Calif., felt led of the Lord in the home missions service of the Council to do something for the American Indian friends. Brother Carlson wrote to Don Stover, a former coworker, now pastor of First Assembly in Farmington, N. Mex. Brother Stover, upon referring the letter to the district, learned of the need for a building in Bloomfield. Correspondence then began between the district superintendent and Pastor Carlson.

When he presented the need to his church, Pastor Carlson had a remarkable response. Even though the church had just come through a major build-

ing program and had quite an indebtedness of its own, it was ready to accept this challenge.

Joe and Betty Hanna came to assume responsibility of the Mission in January 1962. Brother Carlson flew to Albuquerque and drove to Bloomfield with me to look over the field as well as to meet Pastor Hanna and to renew fellowship with Pastor Stover.

On May 15, 1963, Pastor Stover and members of his congregation in Farmington poured the foundation and floor, and installed the plumbing rough-in for the building.

With this done in readiness for the construction of the building, Pastor Carlson encouraged a number of his laymen, along with a group of pastors from his section, to come to Bloomfield June 1. In one week they erected the walls and installed the roof of the building. This was a week of joyous fellowship and blessing as these brethren worked together day and night to erect this building as a sanctuary for our Indian friends in the Bloomfield area. They spent 1,870 hours on the project. Besides the time,

the churches of the section contributed money and some furnishings.

When time came for the brethren to return to their homes in California, the building was far enough along for Brother Hanna and the congregation to begin having services. Much finishing work remained to be done, however, and Pastor Hanna worked faithfully for many weeks completing the building.

The building was dedicated on New Year's Day 1963. Speakers for the day were J. H. McClendon of Ar-

tesia, N. Mex., a district presbyter; N. E. Carlson; and myself. It was a "happy new year."

A Ford Econoline bus was provided for Brother Hanna and family by Pastor Gary Nash of Barstow, Calif.

This is the first church built in the New Mexico District under the "Operation Breakthrough" program of the Assemblies of God. Valuation of the property is set at \$15,000. Average attendance is around 75.

A good number have been saved and filled with the Holy Spirit. Interest among our Indian friends in the area is very encouraging.





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
