WEEK OF PRAYER - JAN. 5-12

From Flaming Death to Eternal Life

THERE WERE TEN OF US IN THE MILITARY HELICOPTER that morning, flying from Bethel, Alaska, to outlying Eskimo villages on a National Guard inspection trip. Suddenly the helicopter veered sharply to the right and started losing altitude.

Conversation ceased! We knew we were in trouble!

Then we crashed. When it was over, someone was lying across me and my right leg was pinned under a 55-gallon oil drum. I could only move my arms and head.

I smelled smoke and saw fire burning its way toward the drum of gas. I started to pray for someone to help me, not knowing that only two of us out of the ten were still alive.

In desperation I started slapping the unconscious man lying across me. He revived and I directed him to put his feet against the drum and push. This he did and I was free. He was bleeding from the eyes and nose, and later I was to learn he had a broken neck. After leading him out of the aircraft, I tried to pull out the body of the man lying near the door, but could not. Knowing the drum of gas in the aircraft would soon explode, I left to do what I could for the man who was alive.

It was April 1962. There was snow on the ground and it was very cold. When the aircraft stopped burning I tried to find something to keep us warm in case we should have to stay overnight. But everything was burned. The crash had occurred around noon and I knew it might be hours before anyone would be looking for us. The prospect of spending the night in the snow and cold, injured and without adequate clothing, was not a pleasant one.

I did not know the Lord as my personal Saviour, but I could remember going to church and Sunday school with my mother. How she used to sing and pray! I prayed aloud for help, and sang such songs as, "Take My Hand, Precious Lord," and, "The Old Rugged Cross."

The wind began to blow and the snow to fall. Around 4 P.M. I started to dig into the snow to make a place for us to spend the night. Then I looked up and saw an Eskimo man some distance away, driving a dog team. Calling as I went, I started toward him. He stopped to help us.

The Eskimo, Robert Jimmie, helped me put my friend on the dog sled and took us to an old camp where we found shelter and warmth. We were at least thirty miles from a village, and the weather was too bad for him to go for help that night.

The next morning our Eskimo friend cut a supply of wood for us and went for help. Several times we heard planes, and I tried in vain to attract their attention. Finally, about 5 P.M. a pilot saw me and landed.

In an hour's time we arrived at the hospital in Bethel. I had a broken bone in my leg and my left side was so bruised and sore I could hardly move. But I only had to stay in the hospital for a week.

When I got out of the hospital I asked the Lord to forgive me and take away my sins. Sad to say, it took the death of eight men whom I knew well to make me realize my need of a Saviour.

Truly, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1).

NEW POWER FOR THE NEW YEAR

Through a Regular Schedule of Prayer

ABRAHAM LINCOLN FACED ONE OF HIS MOST DIFFICULT experiences in the delivery of his annual message to Congress reporting on the year 1863. The United States was involved in civil war. One of his sons had recently died, and another lay at death's door. In spite of these problems, Lincoln walked into the Capitol and delivered his address with such composure and conviction that the audience felt it witnessed a miracle.

That morning before going into the packed Senate chamber Lincoln had conducted family worship as usual. Then he retired alone to his room, and falling on his knees pleaded with God for divine guidance and strength. Lincoln had learned what the prophet Daniel and all effective Christians eventually learn. Everyone needs a regular time with God.

Daniel was a busy statesman in the great Medo-Persian Empire, but Daniel knew he could not manage without a regular prayer schedule. When a law was passed forbidding prayer to anyone except the king, Daniel "went into his house; and, his windows being open in his chamber toward Jerusalem, he kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks before his God, as he did aforetime" (Daniel 6:10). Because of his faithfulness Daniel enjoyed special enablement and help from the Lord.

STRENGTH IN THE TESTING HOUR
Daniel must have passed through many trying situations during the seventy years of Babylonian captivity.

The first test came when he was a young man. It involved what many might have considered an inconsequential phase of God's ordinances. The king appointed Daniel and his friends "a daily provision of the king's meat, and of the wine which he drank" (Daniel 1:5). What there was about the diet that was in violation of God's commands we are not told. Daniel, however, recognized that the diet would be defiling to him in spite of the fact that it was a king's menu. He firmly resolved that he would not defile himself. In the testing hour Daniel received strength from above.

Years later Daniel faced another test. Jealous officials conspired to have him removed from office. After failing to find any fault in his personal and business conduct, they arranged for the signing of a decree which would make it unlawful to pray to anyone except the king. Daniel knew that the death penalty would be imposed if the decree was ignored. By now, however, he had learned that it was more important to maintain a regular prayer schedule than to live. He prayed "as he did afore-time" (Daniel 6:10). In this testing hour he again found strength. His regular prayer life provided the stamina needed.

Jesus, who spent much time in prayer, also found strength in the testing hour (Matthew 4:1-11). After He had fasted for forty days, Satan came to tempt Him. When Satan suggested that Jesus turn the stones to bread, Jesus in spite of His physically weakened condition found strength to quote from the Old Testament, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God" (Mat-

A Time to Pray

If ever there was an hour when Christians needed to humble themselves, and pray, and seek God's face with fasting and tears, it is at the start of a new year such as 1964, for it may be the most momentous year any of us has known.

The fact that we are entering the 50th anniversary year of the Assemblies of God gives us added incentive to search our souls at this season. It is a time to re-examine our mission in the world and take our bearings. What progress are we making in our evangelism program?

Have we as a Movement advanced as far as we ought in the past half-century of opportunities? Narrowing it down to the past 12 months let us ask ourselves, Have we invaded the territory of Satan and occupied new ground for the Kingdom of God, or have we merely engaged in a holding action?

What efforts have we made to evangelize our own communities and what have we done to reach souls in other unoccupied fields? Has the local church grown? Have we as individuals made solid spiritual growth? Have we done all we could to win our loved ones, neighbors, and other friends to the Lord Jesus Christ?

There are more people living without Christ today than at any time in human history. This is true in each town and each city, as well as in the nation and the world at large. If we do not lead these people to Him they will be lost forever.

Recognizing these facts, the Executive Presbyters of the Assemblies of God have proclaimed January 5 to 12, 1964, to be a Week of Prayer (see front cover) and they suggest that this concerted prayer effort be implemented in the following ways:

- 1. That prayer chains be organized in our constituency around the world.
- 2. That churches remain open for continuous prayer during this time.
- 3. That our people be encouraged to fast and "afflict their souls" to seek God.
- 4. That churches be encouraged to arrange daily prayer meetings during the Week of Prayer.
- 5. That one all-night prayer meeting be scheduled in each church.
- 6. That all Assemblies of God colleges and Bible institutes cooperate in the Week of Prayer.
- 7. That we join our faith believing God to move upon us in this Golden Anniversary year and use us in a mighty worldwide surge of evangelism.

In many localities the Spirit already is moving mightily. Surely God wants to send a general revival to His Church. He has promised to pour out His Spirit "upon all flesh." Let us ask Him to do this, being sure we do our part.

Churches of many denominations will be observing this Week of Prayer. It is a time for all believers to fall on their knees and wage war for God. The Lord has provided spiritual armor and armaments for the battle. One powerful weapon He has placed in our hands is "prayer and supplication in the Spirit." If we will use this weapon against the forces of darkness 1964 will be a year of spiritual triumph in every heart, every home, and every church.

ASSURANCE FOR THE NEW YEAR

No matter what the circumstances, we Christians should keep our heads. God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power, of love and of a sound mind. It is a dismal thing to see a son of heaven cringe in terror before the sons of earth. We are taught by the Holy Spirit in Scriptures of truth that fear is a kind of prison for the mind and that by it we may spend a lifetime in bondage.

God keeps His people and there is nothing in earth or in hell that can harm a trusting soul. The past is forgiven, the present is in God's keeping, and a thousand bright promises give assurance for the future. Yet we are sometimes terrified by the adversary. This is not uncommon but it is unnecessary. We should not excuse it, but rather acknowledge it as evidence of our spiritual immaturity.

Through the Blood of the Everlasting Covenant we are as safe here on earth as if we were already in heaven. We have not passed beyond the possibility of physical death, but we have entered a sphere of life where we can afford to die, knowing that for the Christian death is a bright portal to the ineffable glory.

It is entirely possible to reach a place in grace where nothing can panic us. We can have an understanding with God about our yesterdays, our today and our tomorrows.

A Crack in the Walls

SIX MILLION SOULS IN MALAYSIA ARE CONSIGNED BY LAW to a Christless eternity! These are the Malays, the country's native race, comprising approximately one-half its population. Since Islam is the state religion the Malays are Moslems by birth and by law. In most of the territories of Malaysia it is illegal to approach a Malay with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The federal government of Malaysia is presently engaged in a large-scale mosque-building program. Millions of dollars are being spent to provide houses of worship for the followers of Mohammed. Under construction in downtown Kuala Lumpur is a majestic national mosque that will cost more than five million dollars. The architect's design shows this to be one of the most beautiful structures in the world.

In practically every population center in Kuala Lumpur, as well as outlying areas, a mosque has been built or is in the process of being erected. Near our own Bible Institute of Malaya the government is preparing to erect a massive college for the training of Moslem devotees. No efforts, money, or time are being spared in this grand scheme to make Islam the strongest religious force in this part of southeast Asia.

During the more than 100 years that Christianity has been at work in Malaysia a considerable number of converts have been won, but they have been almost exclusively from among the Chinese and Indian populations, and not among the Malays. The total number of Christian Malays would probably amount to no more

than a two-digit figure. Somehow Christianity for a century has been unable to reach them.

But God has not given them up! In His great mercy He is making a way for these sin-darkened, religionfettered souls to find eternal life. In recent public meetings where prayer for the sick was being offered, a large number of Moslem Malays came for prayer.

More recently, when we applied for the use of a large downtown hall for public meetings, the government insisted by letter that all printed advertising in the vicinity of the hall must be in both Malay and English. How thrilling the thought! The same law that says we cannot approach the Malays with the gospel now insists that we advertise Christian services in the Malay language. This has developed from government effort to establish Malay as the national language. Praise God for this crack in the walls!

We find that whenever the full gospel is emphasized in a public meeting some Malays will come. This type of meeting is undoubtedly one way of breaking through to these precious souls. The Malaysia Assemblies of God has been hindered in making this kind of appeal due to the lack of facilities. Buildings and halls large enough to accommodate such a meeting must be booked months in advance and at a high cost.

Once again God is coming to our help. Kuala Lumpur is one of the present Global Conquest project cities. An all-out effort is being made to erect in this strategic city a building that will accommodate a large public meeting. Of course, the building will also be used to house our growing English-language congregation which is presently meeting in rented facilities. It will serve the Chinese language group also, and we pray and believe that before very long we may have the beginnings of a Malaya congregation.

Your help is needed in this important effort. Buildings are extremely important here in Malaysia. The local government recognizes this and is building furiously in order to keep Islam secure as the state religion. Please join your efforts with ours that together we may see the spiritual walls of this modern Jericho tumble down as the walls of our Global Conquest church rise up!

The amazing story of how the gospel message changed the pitiable life of—

A NAZI-GERMAN SAILOR, AN ATHEIST, SETTLED IN CHILE. He married a Roman Catholic Chilean schoolteacher. Five children were born to them. He ruled his home with the iron fist of military discipline.

In this atmosphere Molly, one of the children, grew up to be a proud, haughty woman. She married a traveling salesman and they seemed as happy as two unsaved, violent-dispositioned people can be.

Their first child was the idol of her mother's heart. But when, in a few months, Molly learned that another baby was coming, she resented the idea. This child, a boy, was not welcomed into the family circle. In fits of temper the mother punished him severely for the most trivial offenses. One day when he was about two years of age she beat him with her shoe heel until he died. Hastily, before her husband returned home from one of his business trips, she had the baby buried.

Some of the relatives became suspicious and had the body removed from the grave for an autopsy. This disclosed the real nature of the baby's death and Molly was jailed for the murder of her child. She still cannot explain her exact thoughts but she says something inside her seemed to compel her to beat the child. It was not until Molly realized her baby was dead that she began to come to her senses.

Some time previously a friend had invited her to attend home Bible classes and Molly become very interested. This was all the gospel she had ever heard. Now, alone in her prison cell, she begged God for forgiveness. But she did not know how to be saved. Everyone turned against her except her husband and her mother.

Molly had been in jail only a few days when we returned to Chile from furlough. On hearing of her plight we had a strong desire to visit her. The women's jail in Concepción is operated by Roman Catholic nuns so we could only see her on the regular visiting day. We talked to her through the iron bars in the presence of the nun.

The great Deliverer met Molly and forgave her. She literally devoured the Word of God. As we continued to visit her, the nun was kind and permitted us to enter the reception room for our visits. It was remarkable to see Molly grow in grace and the love of God.

All this time the lawyer was working on Molly's case. Finally Molly was sent to Santiago where seven psychiatrists examined her over a period of five months. In the Santiago penitentiary they took the Bible and all



gospel literature away from her. However, she had memorized so many of the Bible verses that she was able to keep true to God. Because of the Word hidden in her heart she was able to confound the priest. The matron even sent the bishop to try to convince Molly that the evangelicals who had taught her to follow the gospel were in error.

For three months Molly was free on bail. During this time she was filled with the Holy Spirit. She then had the power and strength that would be needed in the months following.

Because of a great deal of criticism and opposition, Molly was returned to the jail in Concepción. She was a shining light for Jesus there and the nuns said they could not understand how such a sweet person could commit such a hideous crime. Molly replied that they did not know her when she was possessed by the devil and obeyed his every wish.

Finally the court condemned Molly to death. Radio and newspaper headlines stated that she was to meet the firing squad. We went to visit her. Naturally, she was sad for her children's sake (another had been born shortly after she entered jail). However, she said she had peace of heart and was ready to meet God.

Then her sentence was changed to life imprisonment. Again Molly was ready to accept God's will for her. She was anxious, though, for a definite decision to be made regarding her sentence. The lawyer could only say he was doing his best.

One Thursday night during a Sunday school teachers meeting a man came and asked for Molly's husband. (He had been saved and had become one of our Sunday school teachers.) He left and returned shortly with Molly at his side. She had been completely exonerated on the testimony of the psychiatrists who came to the conclusion that for a short time Molly had gone berserk and temporarily insane, but now her condition was normal and there was no danger of a return attack!

We took Molly and her husband to our home because none of their relatives or friends outside of the church would receive them.

Molly was freed just two weeks before the great Chilean earthquake. If she had still been in jail at the time of the earthquake she probably would have been killed, because the entire side of the jail where she had been for three years was completely destroyed and many of the inmates were killed.

Molly now is devoting her life to serving the Lord who has done so much for her.




Light-for-the-Lost literature arrives in Lagos, capital of Nigeria, by Speed-the-Light truck from the Assemblies of God printshop in Aba.

The shipment includes the Nigerian Evangel, which is printed in Nigeria and features news of national pastors and churches.








Missionary Robert Webb inspects the literature as it is being unloaded in Lagos.

PRAYER BRINGS REVIVAL TO LAGOS

Eastern Province, NIGERIA, IS POOR AND OVERCROWDED. Her people, the Ibo Tribe, are often hungry. Because of the hardships they have endured, the Ibos are hard workers, full of drive and initiative. Many of them have left Eastern Province to go to other areas of Nigeria where they can find work.

Assemblies of God missions in Nigeria were first opened in Eastern Province. As the Christians left the Province to find work they carried the gospel message with them.

Many Ibos settled in Lagos, the capital and largest port city in Nigeria. The Christians among them witnessed to others and pioneered Assemblies of God churches in the city.

Lagos is a strategic area not only because it is the capital and largest port but also because it is the center of a large metropolitan area. It is situated on an island formed by a branch of the Ogun River just before it flows into the ocean. On the mainland and surrounding Lagos are other large, bustling cities.

In February, 1963, we arrived in Lagos to supervise the growing churches in this area and to pioneer new ones. Even before our arrival we planned key evangelistic campaigns for the Lagos churches.

During these campaigns the center of the services seemed to be at the altar of prayer. Scores of Nigerians testified to deliverance from sin and sickness, and thirty-six testified to being filled with the Holy Spirit. Many others were freshly anointed for Christian service.

One of the forces helping combat communism and evil in countries like Nigeria is Light-for-the-Lost, the missions arm of the Men's Fellowship Department. Through Light-for-the-Lost the Minnesota District has pledged \$3,000 for an extensive literature campaign in Lagos. Due to the urgency of the need, the money has been advanced, and we are now implementing literature distribution as well as using the literature for Bible study courses. Through these Bible courses we believe the effectiveness of this literature program will be far-reaching indeed.

Just as prayer was the key to revival on the Day of Pentecost, and just as prayer preceded the Pentecostal outpouring at the early part of this century, so missionary zeal today must be centered around altars filled with hungry hearts. While racial turmoil and international crises seem to be constantly in the spotlight, we earnestly covet your fervent prayers for continued revival in Lagos.

This Ad Will Cost \$999

THAT'S RIGHT! THIS AD TWO INCHES WIDE WILL COST \$999. It was run in two Indian vernacular periodicals having a combined circulation of 322,000. Publishing cost was \$17.68. But the big cost is not the publisher's charges.

This is an ad for our Highlights Bible correspondence course. From it we received more than 2,000 inquiries.

(When I told our advertising agent this, he exclaimed, "From such a *little* ad!") Answering these inquiries required 2,000 envelopes, 2,000 postage stamps, 2,000 instruction sheets, and 4,000 lesson sheets (each inquirer gets an extra lesson sheet to give to a friend).

It took a week's work just to type the addresses on the envelopes, not to speak of stuffing and record-keeping.

Later there will be lessons to grade, additional lessons to send, reminders and tracts to mail, and Gospels and certificates to give.

Our records show that about one-third of all inquirers earn certificates. The average cost to us for each one who earns a certificate is about \$1.50, including sending lessons, tracts, and reminders to those who do not finish.

This means that of these 2,000 inquirers we can expect 666 to cost \$1.50 each, or a total of \$999—the price of our small ad in two publications!

There's a moral to our experience: When we advertise the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ, we must mean business. We must expect it to cost! People are hungry for the Word and they respond eagerly to the smallest invitation. Advertising the gospel costs—but it pays dividends that make the cost seem insignificant.

"More and more people are coming to believe that the Holy Spirit ministering through Teen Challenge Centers is a totally new and effective approach to the problems of delinquency, narcotic addiction and all troubled youth," says David Wilkerson, New York Teen Challenge director.

Reports from the three Teen Challenge Centers in Brooklyn, Chicago, and Los Angeles indicate very good progress following successful summer campaigns. Winter programs are now in full swing.

The new Training Farm Center in Rehrersburg, Pa., sponsored by New York Teen Challenge, is also gaining ground. This work of rehabilitating youth who recently have been rescued from teen-age gangs and drug addiction is attracting nationwide attention.

Several thousand young people made decisions for Christ during the summer crusades in the three cities. An encouraging number of these show signs of having been genuinely converted and they are growing spiritually. The staffs of the Centers are limited and it is, of course, impossible for them to check on all decisions.

The Los Angeles Challenge

Following many months of prayer and preparation Teen Challenge was officially launched last June 17 in Los Angeles. The burden of many local pastors was realized as 25 Bible school students, converted juvenile gang members, and former drug addicts moved into the Teen Challenge

Center, a rented University of Southern California fraternity house right in the middle of the metropolis.

Duplicating the work of Teen Challenge in New York and Chicago, these dedicated young people invaded the turfs of feuding teen-age gangs and addicts. Each day they hazarded their lives entering gang hideouts, staging street rallies and distributing their shock-type literature to thousands of young people. At least 700 responded for salvation during the summer!

The establishment of a Teen Challenge ministry in Los Angeles actually began several months earlier. During the 1962 fall term personal evangelism teams from Southern California college and Latin American Bible Institute engaged in active ministry among "jitterbugging" teen gangs and drug addicts on the wild east side of

Los Angeles. Then in January, upon the invitation of the Southern California district officials, Dave Wilkerson, accompanied by Howard Bush, Assistant General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, came to Los Angeles and spoke to a group of interested pastors. From this meeting came the unanimous decision to initiate a full-scale Teen Challenge program. Don Hall left the evangelistic field to accept appointment to this work.

Since that time God has led in a miraculous way. A modern fraternity building was leased as a temporary Center. An attractive building was also rented on the Long Beach Nu-Pike for a Teen Challenge Chapel. Local C. A. groups joined the Teen Challenge Staff in conducting services and leading teen-agers to Christ.

During the Billy Graham Crusade in Los Angeles, Teen Challenge was able to take several hundred gang members to the meetings on chartered buses. Dozens of these young people were wonderfully saved!

The Spanish team, directed by Dave Torres, once a confirmed drug addict, saw many saved in the Spanish sections of Los Angeles. Thousands attended the gang services and hundreds of gang members, leaders and young addicts were wonderfully delivered. Teen-agers threw away their sniff rags and narcotics. Numbers quit gang life and started preaching the gospel.

Many are now filled with the Holy Spirit and are attending a Bible-believing church. One former gang leader and drug addict, who had been in jail over 20 different times, enrolled in Bible school and is now studying for the ministry.

Much of the success of the summer program can be attributed to the faithful prayers and dedication of each worker. A 24-hours-a-day prayer chain was initiated and one day a week was set aside for fasting and prayer. Because of this and the support of many pastors and churches, the very gates of hell were shaken as sin-bound teen-agers were transformed by the power of God.

The Chicago Challenge

God gave Teen Challenge Center in Chicago some wonderful young people for last summer's work. Sixteen fellows and thirteen girls, including four married couples, a cook and assistant cook joined the staff. They were dedicated youth from Southwestern Assemblies of God College, North Central Bible College, and Central Bible Institute.

A high school teacher from Wheaton, Ill., newly converted and filled with the Spirit, also joined them for the summer. He felt it would give him invaluable experience in counseling and dealing with his students.

By the end of April, the staff realized the Center would no longer accommodate the crowds, so they divided the small group of workers into teams and took the gospel to the youth in their own neighborhoods. In the first such service in the little church that was opened to the workers, the crowd was so large they had to divide it.

As summer workers came in, they were divided into three teams of ten members each. Each team had a leader, a pianist, and a song leader. On Thursday nights they conducted three simultaneous Negro meetings in different areas of the city. Saturday night was given to the Spanish areas; Tues-

How a True Christian Regards the Jews

From the MIDDLE AGES TO MODERN times there have been many instances of discrimination, persecution, and even atrocities committed against the Jews by so-called Christians or Christian nations. The question that concerns us here is: Have these acts been committed by true Christians? The answer is an emphatic No!

There is a radical difference between a true believer and one who is a Christian only in name or by profession. Jesus declared, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven" (Matthew 7:21). He also said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35). A real Christian manifests love for all men. He loves the Jewish people and prays for their welfare.

The true Christian regards the Jews with a sense of gratitude. We see this expressed in the writings of Paul, known earlier as Saul of Tarsus, who was both a Jew and a Christian. He writes: "What advantage then hath the Jew? or what profit is there of circumcision? Much every way: chiefly because that unto them were committed the oracles of God" (Romans 3:1, 2).

Christians are indebted to the Jews for both the Old and the New Testament Scriptures. We hold in high esteem such men as Moses, David, Isaiah, and the other Old Testament writers. We are also grateful for the inspired writings of Jewish men of God who have given us all the books of our New Testament. We feel that the Old Testament Scriptures would become more meaningful and significant to our Jewish friends if they would also read the New Testament.

Christians are aware that they have received not only the Holy Scriptures from the Jewish people, but also their Saviour. Paul, writing of the Israelites, said, "... of whom as concerning the flesh Christ came, who is over all, God blessed for ever. Amen" (Romans 9:5).

Christ descended from the seed of Abraham and the seed of David. He came not to be the Saviour or Messiah of the Gentiles only, but of the Jews also. The *Good News* of His redemptive work is "the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Romans 1:16).

Christianity did not begin in Rome but in Jerusalem. It was dedicated Jews who brought the Christian message to the Gentiles and not the other way around. Historically as well as Biblically, Jews have every right to believe in Jesus Christ.

Then, too, a true Christian regards the Jews with a sense of kinship. Jews and Christians have much in common. Both acknowledge the same God. Both accept the Old Testament as the inspired Word of God. Both emphasize love for God and love for one's neighbor. The culture of both Jews and Christians has been influenced by these points of agreement in their spiritual heritage.

Both Jews and Christians expect the Messiah. Nowhere does the Old Testament teach that the Messiah was to be the deliverer of the Jews only. God chose Israel as the channel for the coming of the Messiah in order that they might thereby bring blessing

1445 Boonville Avenue Springfield, Missouri 65802 to all nations. God said to Abraham, "...in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed" (Genesis 12:3). All nations are to call the Messiah blessed. (See Psalm 72:17.)

There is not to be one Messiah for the Jews and another for the Gentiles. Jesus is the true Messiah for both Jew and Gentile. Christians believe that He has already come once and has fulfilled such great Messianic passages as Isaiah 53 and Psalm 22, thereby making salvation from sin possible for all mankind. They also expect Him to come again, not to suffer this time but the sign.

this time, but to reign.

The works of Sholem Asch, the well-known Jewish writer, reflect his deep respect for Jesus of Nazareth. Though he regarded Him as the Messiah of the Gentiles, nevertheless he intimated that when Jesus comes again the Jews will then be able to accept Him as their Messiah too. This is in accord with the words of Jesus to the Jews, "... ye shall not see me, until the time come when ye shall say, Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord" (Luke 13:35). We look forward to that day when Jew and Gentile alike will acknowledge Jesus as Messiah.

Finally, the true Christian regards the Jews with a sense of deep concern. The desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved (Romans 10:1). This is the desire of every genuine believer. A Hebrew-Christian couple wrote to Shalom Center in Chicago saying, "How we often long and pray that more of our Jewish brethren according to the flesh will come to know personally their own revealed Messiah."

God is willing and ready now to save every Jew who will accept Jesus Christ as Saviour. "For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek (or Gentile); for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Romans 10:12, 13).

Jewish friend, why not call upon Him now and receive complete forgiveness and cleansing from sin? Christ will also give you fullness of joy, a peace that passes all understanding, and a hope beyond the grave.

Missionary Christmas in Carlsbad

Our women's missionary council groups are beehives of activity during the fall months as they prepare Christmas gifts for home missionaries. In First Assembly we have several women's groups: the regular WMC, the young women's Auxiliary, the Senior Missionettes and the Junior Missionettes. Each group begins at the first of the year to plan its own missionary projects for the year. We have always packed our boxes for home missionaries the first of December and mailed them to our 13 mission stations in New Mexico.

Last year, as president of our local WMC, I felt that our whole church should have the privilege of seeing the beautiful gifts the ladies were sending. The Lord had impressed me with the Scripture, "The time of her harvest shall come" (Jeremiah 51:33), so I mentioned my idea for a Harvest Time gathering and they approved. We sent invitations to all the churches in the city and surrounding towns, and also invited several women from other denominations in the city to participate in the program.

At our service November 29 people

from every church in the city and other towns swelled our attendance to over 300. We hoped that other women would catch a vision of what they might do for home missionaries.

Our display included: 36 quilts (made from blue jeans, khakis, and new print scraps); stuffed toys (made from old nylon hose); piggie banks (made from plastic jugs); beautiful vases (made from plastic bottles); nearly a hundred pretty aprons; 46 pairs of pillow cases; much food; and baby clothing. We find use for many things people ordinarily throw away.

We opened our program with prayer and songs. Both Missionette groups sang special numbers. All the different groups had special speakers who gave reports of their work for the year. I then read a poem, "Harvest Time," which I felt the Lord had inspired me to write. After the service we served refreshments in the Fellowship Hall.

This year our service was held here in the church November 21 and the display was even larger. We had more quilts and more cans of food. Dora Mayo of Odessa, Tex., secretary-treasurer of the West Texas District WMC, was our main speaker.

Since I am now WMC representative for this section of New Mexico, I invited all the other councils of the section to join us. The WMC Rally and the display have created a great interest in the town among the other denominational churches, as well as among our own churches in New Mexico and Texas.

Our WMC's realize that in providing for others who are in need we are serving the Lord.

WHERE YOUR TREASURE IS

I ONCE WORKED FOR A FARMER WHO played the stock market. He was a shrewd investor and often made substantial profits.

The one thing in particular about this man that fastened itself upon my memory was his constant and avid interest in the stock market. He seemed to live for the moment when the daily paper arrived so he could observe the latest trends.

Now there is a close relationship between investment and interest. Usually where there is no investment there is little or no interest. Jesus said, "Where your treasure is there will your heart be also." Let a man make an investment in some project and in all likelihood he will have a special interest in that project thereafter.

For this reason it is important that we provide opportunities for folk to invest in Home Missions. There may be interest before there is opportunity for investment, but unless there is opportunity for investment there will soon be little interest.

The potential for church extension is almost unlimited, from both the standpoint of the need of the field and the resources within our movement. But resources uninvested yield no dividends.

One of the great areas of need is support for pioneer pastors. There is danger that we allow the pioneer to do all the sacrificing while the rest of us enjoy the fat of the land. Why should an able, experienced man be expected to receive less if he is willing to pioneer than he would receive if he were pastoring an established church? In a movement's infancy this is necessary, but when a movement has potential which it fails to use, progress is impeded.

Paul taught, "The laborer is worthy of his hire." Four churches giving \$100 each a month could support a pioneer quite well. Only 100 people giving \$4 each a month could do like-

REVIVALTIME SENDS GOSPEL WHERE OTHERS CANNOT GO

Many millions of People in the world will not hear the full-gospel message until it reaches them by radio.

In the seclusion of their own homes and the confines of their community they have little contact with the gospel of Jesus Christ. Only as it comes to them by radio are they ever aware that there is such a Saviour. Many barriers prevent them from receiving the gospel any other way—racial barriers, remoteness from more traveled routes, and religious prejudices.

In its evangelistic outreach Revivaltime has touched the hearts of those who have not heard before. A listener from the Philippines writes, "Since listening to your radio broadcast, I and others have gained very much from it. We were led to Christ by way of the radio. Thanks for your heavenly advice."

From Colorado a listener writes that Revivaltime was recently released over the local station. She says, "We enjoy the anointed preaching and singing so much. It has been estimated that 85 per cent of our population here is Catholic. No doubt many will hear Revivaltime who will never come to

our church."

At this time of year it is necessary to reassess the value of this radio ministry. It is easy to take *Revival-time* for granted. It has been on the network ten years, but it has required much prayer and great sacrifice to sustain it. Many friends have given sacrificially to help us remain on the air. A woman wrote, "I am an 80-

year-old widow. I am not rich and never will be, this side of heaven. I am taking \$7 out of my burial fund of \$51 to send you." How much does it mean to you that those who have never heard should have an opportunity to learn of Jesus Christ?

Never has the challenge to reach the world with the gospel by radio been greater. God has called *Revivaltime* to use the "winds" to herald the full-gospel message to multiplied millions at home and abroad. But every "friend of *Revivaltime*" must continue to give faithfully if we are to maintain our outreach.

We must look ahead. Changes in network policy have upset our coverage pattern. Some persons who used to hear *Revivaltime* cannot hear it at present. We must blanket these areas again. Many opportunities for releases are open to us—but they are expensive. There is only one way to go and that is forward. We must build the Revivaltime network. Jesus said it! "Occupy!"

A woman in New York City wrote, "Many times I have wanted to write and send in a love offering, but I just never got around to it. Now that you are off the air (WABC, New York) I realize that God's work needs the support of Christian people to carry it on. I am enclosing \$5 for the support of your ministry."

Your support is needed as we come to January. This is ordinarily a low month in giving, but this January can be different if every reader will respond at this time. We ask you to prayerfully consider the singular evangelistic ministry of *Revivaltime* and its need for support. "Don't Beg! Believe!" God Whispered to This Southern Baptist Pastor

ROBERT A. LAWRENCE, OF WESTWOOD, California, is rejoicing in the reality of the baptism of the Holy Spirit as a result of earnestly seeking after

"For three years I longed for a deeper walk with God," he writes. "On July 10, 1963, I received a letter from a very dear friend who had received the baptism in the Holy Spirit. This intensified my hunger to know God in a deeper way."

As he prayed, the Lord directed him to contact an Assemblies of God pastor, Donald J. Enders, who was then in Westwood (now at Rupert, Idaho). But this was not an easy thing to do.

"Because of pride, I hesitated almost two weeks. But the hunger for God increased until I was willing. "The holy spirit in the contemporary church" furnished the theme of the 16th annual convention of the Pentecostal Fellowship of North America, held in Montreal, Canada, October 29-31. Delegates from places in the U.S. and Canada over 5,000 miles apart assembled in the city which has more French-speaking people than any other except Paris, for three days of prayer, worship, fellowship, and Spirit-anointed preaching.

In addition to the main sessions there were separate meetings for youth leaders, foreign mission officials, and women. Young people from 13 to 24 years attending a youth banquet were stirred by the message of Vic Gardner, Foursquare minister from Dover, Ohio. Some 300 women attended a Women's Auxiliary luncheon.

Chairman of the Women's Auxiliary is Mrs. Carl F. Isaac of the Pentecostal Holiness Church. One of the projects of the Auxiliary is to sponsor an annual day of prayer on the Friday preceding Pentecost Sunday under the general theme, "Perpetuating Pentecost Sunday Through Prayer."

Speaker at the Women's luncheon was Mrs. C. B. Smith (the former Beulah Argue) who is an instructor at the Eastern Pentecostal Bible College, Peterborough, Canada. Her message, "Lost from the Steps of the Church," was a heart-searching appeal to Pentecostal women to recognize and accept responsibility in relation to the youth, especially the girls, of our churches.

Brother Synan reported there are now 28 local chapters of the PFNA. Three were organized in the past year, including one in Alaska. Representatives of a number of chapters brought greetings at the convention.

Business transacted included reports from standing committees and commissions promoting Pentecostal cooperation, election of new officers, and selection of Springfield, Missouri, as site of the next convention to be held October 27-29, 1964.

A resolution was adopted calling for the placement of religious and other wholesome literature in all public libraries to counteract the U.S. Supreme Court ban against prayers and Bible reading in public schools.

Two new Pentecostal groups were accepted into membership in the PFNA which now represents a combined constituency of approximately two million members. Member groups include the Assemblies of God, Church of God (Cleveland, Tenn.), Church of God (Mountain Assembly), Congregational Holiness Church, Elim Missionary Assemblies, Free Gospel Church of North America, Free Will Baptist Churches of the Pentecostal Faith, International Church of the Foursquare Gospel, International Pentecostal Assemblies, Italian Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, Open Bible Standard Churches, Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, Pentecostal Assemblies of Newfoundland, Pentecostal Church of Christ, Pentecostal Free-Will Baptist, and the Pentecostal Holiness Church.

On the Alert for Sudden Changes

This article was written before the assassination of President Kennedy. It is peculiarly appropriate for this critical period in the history of our nation and of the world.

LET US EVER BE PREPARED FOR SUDDEN CHANGES AND never be caught off guard! Let us ever be found with our loins girded, our shoes (so to speak) upon our feet, and our lamps trimmed and burning—undeceived by this world's charm and glitter!

If men of this world are fooled by its luxury and the cry of, "Peace, peace," let us recall there is no peace until He comes, whose right it is to reign!

Locally, the recent explosion in the Indianapolis Memorial Coliseum has a fresh message for us all. It was a thrilling and relaxing evening; the skaters had done brilliantly. Then at three minutes before closing time came the *unexpected*—the great explosion, hurling bodies and great slabs of concrete high into the air, killing scores, wounding others, and shocking the nation. Mink stoles lay scattered on the ice.

On a worldwide scale, the South Viet Nam overthrow proclaims the same: "Calamity comes SUDDENLY," and its damage is without remedy (see Proverbs 6:15). It is a warning to us all! Proverbs 29:1 repeats that destruction comes SUDDENLY and without warning.

Earthquakes come SUDDENLY (Acts 16:26). How well this is known to our generation. Whether in Agadir, Morocco, with its twenty thousand lives lost; or in Chile where it took so many lives, laid homes low, and started tidal waves that reached to Hawaiian and California coasts; or in Turkey with its recent disaster—all bear witness to Christ's prophecy foretelling "earthquakes in divers places."

Salvation also may come SUDDENLY, as it did to Saul of Tarsus on the Damascus Road. For "suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven!" Take heart, downcast soul winners!

The coming of the blessed Holy Spirit is sudden. "The Lord, whom ye seek, shall SUDDENLY come to his temple." How often has this passage from Malachi 3:1 fortified my heart in helping some seeker for the Comforter. Suddenly, He comes!

Christ's second coming likewise will be sudden. Mark 13:36 admonishes us: "Lest coming suddently he find you sleeping." Two words, "watch" and "wait," apply. Note "Watch ye therefore" (Mark 13:35) and "What I say unto you I say unto all, Watch" (Mark 13:37). Christ also said, "And ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their Lord, when he will return...they may open unto him immediately" (Luke 12:36).

Never let luxuries deceive us, but remember the many mink stoles that were scattered with the dismembered bodies upon the ice in Indianapolis. The explosion was under the section where the elite were sitting in special boxes, and this is in keeping with the words of Jesus, "Woe unto you that are rich" (Luke 6:24). Southern Californians cannot but recall that when the sudden flash fires came in the fabulous Bel-Air area about three winters ago, the homes that were utterly razed to the ground were the luxurious ones of Hollywood celebrities. In an instant their cherished treasures of a lifetime were obliterated.

So our earthly homes and our wardrobes should not demand an undue share of our attention at this vitally critical time, lest they entice us from our alertness. Jesus admonishes that at any second we may be summoned from them. He employed the strongest language to make this clear and warned that "in that day," if one is on the housetop, he must not come down "to take anything out of his house," or if he is in the field, he is not to "return back to take his clothes" (Matthew 24:17, 18).

Alertness! Readiness is most important! We know not what the next day or the next hour may bring!

Television audiences may be blinded by luxury, by offers of mink stoles, and other temporary baubles, but let us not be blinded or deceived—let us have our loins girded with God's truth and the gospel "shoes" upon our feet!

"Wherefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope to the end" (1 Peter 1:13).

thew 4:4, Deuteronomy 8:3). When taken to the pinnacle of the temple with the suggestion that He cast himself down, Jesus had strength to say, "Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God" (Matthew 4:7; Deuteronomy 6:16). Satan's last suggestion was that Jesus bow down and worship him in return for all the kingdoms of the world. Jesus again responded with Scripture, "Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve" (Matthew 4:10; Deuteronomy 6:13).

While Jesus felt the pangs of hunger and suffered from pain as all men do, He had special strength for the time of testing. He derived this strength through prayer.

HELP FOR THE CRISIS HOUR

People who usually ignore a regular, daily time of fellowship with God are the ones who suffer most in crisis times. Those who maintain a regular prayer schedule find the help they need for the crises of life. When Daniel was thrown into the lions' den, the help of the Lord was present. When the three Hebrew children were thrown into the fiery furnace, divine help was present. Even when men have been called to seal their testimonies with their lives, as Stephen did, God provided special help. Stephen was given such a sight of heaven that he prayed for the forgiveness of those who stoned him (Acts 7:54-60).

The unnamed Shunamite woman must have been a devout worshiper (2 Kings 4:8-37). Her concern was for the work of the Lord. One day a crisis developed. The son whom God had miraculously given her died. It would have been easy to panic, to become bitter, to indulge in self-pity. Instead, this woman, fortified by the many hours she had spent with God, rose for action. Instead of expressing doubt and fear, she expressed faith. Her immortal statement, "It is well," has become the affirmation of faith of many other praying people called to face the crisis of life.

The story behind the writing of the gospel song entitled, "It Is Well," illustrates the special help we all may enjoy in the crisis hour. A Chicago attorney by the name of H. G. Spafford had sent his family to England for a vacation. Because of many pressing responsibilities he could not sail with them. During the voyage, the ship on which Mrs. Spafford and the four daughters were sailing collided with another ship. On deck, Mrs. Spafford knelt in prayer with the children asking that God save them if it was possible, and that all be made ready to die if that was His will. In a short time the ship sank. The children were lost, but a sailor rowing over the area found Mrs. Spafford who was sent on to Europe in another ship. When Mr. Spafford heard the tragedy he hurried to join his wife. There was no bitterness in the hearts of these devout people. Instead, Mr. Spafford wrote the beloved hymn entitled, "It Is Well." Regular fellowship with God provided help for this crisis. He was able to say, "Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say, 'It is well; it is well with my soul."

INSIGHT CONCERNING THE PROPHETIC HOUR

As a result of Daniel's meditation he was given a special insight concerning the prophetic hour in which he lived. Others could have known that it was time for the return of Israel from captivity, for it was contained in the writings of Jeremiah (Daniel 9:2). But this insight was given only to the man who prayed as "he did aforetime."

People who maintain a vital relationship with God always seem to have a special awareness of what God is doing. When Jesus was taken to the temple by His parents to fulfill the rites of the law, there were many people present. Only two, however, seemed to be aware of the significance of the infant child. As Simeon took Jesus in his arms he said, "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word: for mine eyes have seen thy salvation" (Luke 2:29, 30). Anna the prophetess also recognized the tremendous import of the Baby in Mary's arms (Luke 2:36-38).

The world is once again face to face with epochal events. To many people world conditions simply represent an unfortunate trend. The child of God who maintains a regular schedule of fellowship with God, however, recognizes the similarity between the prophetic words of Scripture and current world events. As the Holy Spirit whispered to Simeon and Anna that theirs was a momentous day, so devout believers are made aware of the fact that we must be living in the moments preceding the coming of the Lord.

Some know about God's prophetic program in an intellectual way. Those who maintain a regular prayer schedule know about it in a vital way. They faithfully serve the Lord, while they longingly anticipate His return.

The daily time of fellowship with God will result in a relationship which provides poise for every situation in life. People come to know Christ intimately and find their lives revolutionized.

The story is told of a young businessman who had given his heart to Christ. Each day he stopped by the church during his lunch hour for just a moment or two. The pastor noticed that Jim came to the church, knelt at the altar, and almost immediately got up and went out again. One day the pastor asked the new convert what he did when he came into the church.

"Why, I pray," responded the convert.

"But you can't pray in such a short time as that,"

the pastor responded.

"Well, you see," said Jim, "I don't have a lot of time at noon so I just come in and say, 'Jesus, it's Jim.' He knows all about me so that's all I need to say."

"Thanks," said the pastor. "You have taught me a great lesson."

In time Jim became ill. When it was known that he could not recover, the pastor asked, "Jim, do you know?" "Yes," replied Jim.

"Are you afraid?" the pastor asked.

"No," said Jim. "Just last night it seemed that the Lord stood by my bed and said, 'Jim, it's Jesus.' I know all about Him and that is all He had to say."

A vital devotional life brings believers into such a real relationship with Christ that He becomes adequate for every vicissitude of life.

TOGO-DAHOMEY

ASSEMBLIES FLOURISH IN BOTH OF THESE NATIONS

Togo and dahomey, two newly independent nations in West Africa, occupy a narrow strip of land between Ghana and Nigeria. Neighboring countries to the north are Upper Volta and Niger. To the south is the Gulf of Guinea.

Togo and Dahomey have a combined area of 65,000 square miles and an estimated population of 3,500,000.

The natural resources are mostly agricultural. Palm kernels, cocoa, peanuts, and copra constitute nine-tenths of the total exports. Fruits and vegetables are raised for home consumption. A large fishing industry has developed in the lagoons. Although these two republics have not shared the economic advance of neighboring countries, progress is indicated since their independence.

Early European contacts were made primarily to obtain slaves for the plantations in the New World. German occupation of Togo began in 1884 and continued until World War I when Togo came under a League of Nations mandate. In 1946 the country was placed under a United Nations trusteeship.

Independence for the Togolese was achieved on April 27, 1960. Lomé, a city of 110,000, is the capital and busy seaport.

Dahomey, formerly an independent Negro kingdom, was for the past century a French colony. On August 1, 1960, Dahomey gained its independence. The capital, Porto Nova, is a city of 32,000. Cotonou, the largest city, has a population of 85,000.

More than 40 tribes live in the two republics. While many tongues are spoken, French is the language of commerce, government, and schools.

The peoples of Togo and Dahomey are extremely superstitious and have a deep belief in spirits and fetishes. Sacred groves are found everywhere. Witch doctors are the spiritual leaders of the people.

Islam is strongly entrenched in the north, propagated by enterprising Arab traders. The Roman Catholic Church is ever alert to gaining adherents. Its emphasis on education makes a strong appeal to the awakened African mind.

Protestant missionary activities were begun by the North German Mission along the coast of Togo in 1847. Dapango


Some time later the Methodist Missionary Society and the Paris Evangelical Mission sent missionaries. The Assemblies of God was the first Protestant organization to undertake work in the neglected northern sections of the two republics. Since this pioneer move, other missions have entered.

Our first contacts were projections of our work in Upper Volta. Two African evangelists are credited with bringing the gospel to northern Togo in 1936. When a church was established in Dapango, the Paul Weid-

mans, our first missionaries to Togo, moved there in 1940. Under their ministry a number of other villages were reached. The Murray Browns, who succeeded the Weidmans, gave 13 years of service to the area. Twelve different tribes were reached as evangelism was extended to fifty-two villages in the district. The John Halls, who formerly worked in Upper Volta, now supervise the Dapango area.

Sansanne Mango was the second station to be opened. A church was constructed while the Melton Hills were there. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Creel now serve the Sansanne Mango church besides supervising the area outstations.

Mr. and Mrs. David Wakefield were instrumental in opening the Bassari area in 1951. An evangelistic center seating 600 people was built and many preaching points were opened. The converts came from seven different tribes. Now the Melton Hills are stationed in Bassari.

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Turner pioneered in Sokode. Services were held on their verandah before a suitable building was rented and remodeled for the growing congregation. Togo's Day of Independence was also dedication day for the new church. The building later was purchased and a score of outstations were opened. The Bennie Tiptons now serve there.

When the government invited the Assemblies of God to enter southern Togo, the capital city of Lomé was chosen as the logical site for the first church. The David Wakefields were assigned the task. When they later transferred to Dakar, Senegal, to open an evangelistic center there, Mr. and Mrs. William Lovick were given the responsibility of the Lomé project. Through the help of Global Conquest funds an evangelistic center will be built in this strategic capital.

A new work has been launched in Palimé, another city in southern Togo, by the Murray Browns. They report: "We live over a mile from the center of town but that does not deter people from walking or riding their bicycles to our home to ask about 'this way.' Like the apostle Paul we receive all that come to us, 'preaching the kingdom of God, and teaching those things which concern the Lord Jesus Christ, with all confidence.' We just rented a building in the center of town for a revival center. Palimé presents a great challenge to us."

Our work in Dahomey was spearheaded by the Arthur E. Wilsons in 1945. They located in Natitingou, a government center. After a couple of years Mr. Wilson reported: "These wild, primitive people, so unfriendly at first, now beg us to come to their villages." The Wilsons were alone until 1948 when the Charles Petroskeys joined them. The year 1950 saw further advance as the Charles Greenaways located in Tanguieta. Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Metz followed the Greenaways and built a church there. The James Chaneys tell of God's continued blessing on the Tanguieta church, "We have carried the gospel to 58 villages. Of these, 15 heard the gospel for the very first time."

In 1950 the Petroskeys moved to Kouande, a difficult place of labor for it was predominately Moslem. There they were able to build a church and open 24 preaching points.

Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Schultz were given the task of establishing a church in Boukombe in the heart of the Somba tribe. The people were responsive to the gospel and the Millard Pipkins, who followed the Schultzes, reported, "These primitive people pack the church at each service."

Early in 1961, the Eugene Bascues, also from Upper Volta, went to Cotonou, a rapidly growing seaport in Dahomey. A centrally located building was rented for services. The city and surrounding villages responded to the preaching of the gospel and many people accepted Christ. To conserve the results of revival an evangelistic center is being erected. One thousand indigenous Pentecostal believers from the Cotonou area were recently received into Assemblies of God fel-

lowship. When the Bascues returned to the States on furlough, the Wayne Turners transferred to Cotonou.

The Bible school which was opened in Natitingou by the Petroskeys in 1949 with five students enrolled, currently has 35 students, representing 19 different tribes—all preparing for Christian service. A three-year course of study is provided. Classes are taught in French. The school is directed by Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Metz. Helene Iselin, from Switzerland, has been on the teaching staff since the school's inception.

Graduates of the school are courageous and faithful workers who make a valuable contribution to our work in the two republics. One young man, who was in line for the chieftainship in his tribe, accepted Christ and entered Bible school. Upon graduation he first pastored a bush village church and now pastors the church in Tanguieta.

The Assemblies of God of Togo and Dahomey has extended its work until it includes seventy-four national workers, thirty-three organized churches, and 154 preaching points. This is the fruit of spiritual revival. John Hall currently serves as field chairman.

Our missionaries have not been alone in the task of evangelism. Hardships and joys have been shared by faithful African workers.

National and political currents are hastening the day when the African alone must evangelize his people. Our Bible schools are preparing him for the task. Training leaders for indigenous churches characterizes today's relationship between missionaries and national workers.

Simeon and Anna Testify

Sunday School Lesson for January 5, 1964 Luke 2:25-38

Our lesson illustrates the truth that a glorious revelation of Christ is granted to very ordinary people provided they walk with God and keep open to the leading of His Spirit.

SIMEON'S CHARACTER (v. 25). Simeon was "just" in relation to his fellowman. He was upright, good, kind, merciful, generous, and benevolent. In relation to God he was "devout"; that is, he lived in the consciousness of God's presence, loving Him, and thinking and acting to please Him. He was "waiting for the consolation of Israel," which means that he was one of those godly Jews who believed and looked for the coming of the Messiah.

SIMEON'S RELATIONSHIP TO THE HOLY SPIRIT. He was:

- (1) Spirit-anointed—"the Holy Ghost was upon him."
- (2) Spirit-taught—"And it was revealed unto him... that he should not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ." We cannot disassociate Simeon's Spirit-anointed life from his Spirit-inspired revelation. The former was prerequisite to the latter. The truly Pentecostal life lived in the realm of divine revelation calls for a truly Pentecostal consecration.
- (3) Spirit-led—"And he came by the Spirit into the temple: and... the parents brought in the child Jesus." Not by chance did Simeon enter the temple at this particular time! Unless he had received divine guidance he would have missed his great opportunity. And unless he had been living in sensitive relationship with the Lord he would have missed that guidance. Said Spurgeon: "We must submit ourselves to the divine teaching and drawing, or Christ may come to His temple, and we shall not perceive Him."
- (4) Spirit-inspired—"And when the parents brought in the child Jesus...then took he him up in his arms, and blessed God." As he held the infant Christ in his arms, from the lips of Simeon there poured forth a stream of prophetic song. Given by the Spirit, it concerned the future life and ministry of Jesus—a prophecy far beyond the grasp of his own mind!


SIMEON'S PRAYER. "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace... for mine eyes have seen thy salvation." Simeon knew by the Spirit that the Babe he held in his arms was the promised Messiah. His cherished ambition fulfilled, Simeon was ready to die in peace. This teaches: (1) Our last days should be our best days. (2) Death holds no terror for those who have seen Christ. (3) Those who have served God most faithfully in life can look forward with keenest anticipation to the life beyond. (4) Not until a man has seen Christ is he ready to die, nor can he die in peace.

SIMEON'S REVELATION (vv. 32-35). Simeon's revelation of Christ is most amazing in that he saw what even Christ's own disciples did not fully see until some



time after His ascension: that He came to save the Gentiles as well as the Jews! Christ would adapt Himself to the needs of both. To the former, enveloped as they were in spiritual darkness, He would be "a light to lighten the Gentiles." To the Jews, abased and downtrodden, He would be "the glory of thy people Israel." The greatest honor to the Jewish nation is the fact that the Messiah was born among them; and the greatest tragedy of their history is that they failed to recognize Him and "crucified the Lord of glory" (1 Corinthians 2:8).

Simeon foretold what Christ would be to different people: (1) A Stumbling Stone. "Behold, this child is set for the fall . . . of many in Israel." The proud Jewish religious leaders stumbled at Christ's humble origin, at His love for sinners, at His opposition to their traditions. They continued to stumble at the message of the Cross (1 Corinthians 1:23). Then the judgment of God fell, and Jerusalem was destroyed. Likewise, men who for various reasons reject the gospel today are doomed to a terrible fall (see Mark 16:16). (2) A Stepping Stone. The same Christ who is set for the fall of many, is also set for the "rising up again of many." Those who believe on Him find that He lifts them from the miry clay of sin to solid rock; from the depths of hopelessness and despair to glory and faith; and from earth to heaven!

Mother Pours the Cement

MY SON'S BRIGHT BLUE EYES LOOKED blank. "Name some children from the Bible?" he said solemnly. "I don't know any."

"Sure you do!"
"Well," he thought harder. "David!"

"More," I coaxed.

He rubbed his blond hair and thought. "I don't know any more."

I was disturbed. I knew he could easily have named a dozen television personalities. All seven years of his life he had attended Sunday school and church regularly. Often we told him Bible stories or helped him study his Sunday school lesson at home.

But teaching my children about God and His Word at home had never seemed a compelling need. When I found my son was not retaining much of what he was taught at church, my attitude changed. I realized that an hour on Sunday was not enough. He needed spiritual truths kept near his heart every day.

I began to wonder what would happen to my children if all the Bibles were destroyed. Would they have enough of God's Word sealed in their hearts to lead them to heaven? If persecution became severe, would they be willing to suffer and even die for their faith if necessary?

God grant that these things shall never happen. But these are days when atheism is becoming more apparent. The theory of evolution is being regarded as fact by many, and lawlessness abounds. To offset these prevailing trends, Christian parents should give their children training that will establish their belief in God.

Mothers can pour the cement into

a child's spiritual foundation by teaching him the things of God in his early life. The Roman Catholics say that if they can have a child for the first few years of his life he will always be a Catholic. They do not underestimate the importance of a child's early training, and neither should we.

One young mother of my acquaintance has trained her children so thoroughly that even her three-year-old son can quote Scripture emphasizing doctrine, and give the references. For these children family worship is the highlight of each day. Bible storybooks with pictures help hold their attention.

The mother asks questions on the stories to help them get more of the significant facts. Each night the children work on their Bible verses. She started with basic things, such as the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes, and the Lord's Prayer. Every night they review some of the verses they have already learned.

Timothy, Paul's companion and assistant, was given religious training from his childhood by his mother Eunice and his grandmother Lois. Paul commended the unfeigned faith of Timothy's mother and grandmother, and also Timothy's own faith which was based on his early training. "From a child thou hast known the holy Scriptures which are able to make thee wise unto salvation" (2 Timothy 3:15).

Children without a firm foundation may seem for a time to be no different from those who have. The difference usually shows up in the teen years. Alfred L. Murray, in *Psychology for Christian Teachers*, states that 70 per cent of boys and girls raised in Sunday school forsake the church in their teen years, most of them never to return. It could be that their foundations do not contain enough of the cement of the Word of God, because their parents fail to teach them.

A teen-ager who had been reared in Sunday school and church became a slave to smoking, drinking, and even marijuana. He was finally involved with the law. But his Sunday school teacher never gave up hope for his salvation, and prayed for and witnessed to him faithfully.

In her work with the boy, the teacher learned he had spent his time in Sunday school daydreaming, paying little or no attention to what was be-

ing taught, and he had not been taught God's Word at home either.

When the teacher quoted something from Scripture that particularly interested him, he would say, "Does the Bible say that? Why, I didn't know that!" The boy stumbled along like a blind man, seeking to find God and deliverance, but it was difficult because there was no "concrete" of the Word of God in his background on which to build.

Spiritual training in the home is the cement which stabilized many great men of God. Let Christian mothers consider the rewards which a few minutes a day of teaching God's Word can bring both to them and to their children. Let them not underestimate the tragedies that take place in the lives of children who have not had a firm foundation in the Word of God.

A child's religious life and training in the home will mean the difference between satisfaction and regret on the part of the parents, once the time of training is over. The precious moments when the young boy or girl can be molded will soon be past. Only what we teach in the child's early years will remain as a foundation on which he can build his life.

Saved from Death

A gentleman traveling in Norway went to see the church in a certain town. Looking up at its tower he was surprised to see the carved figure of a lamb near the top. He inquired why it was placed in that position, and he was told that when the church was being built a workman fell from the high scaffold. His fellow workmen saw him fall, and rushed down, horrorstricken, expecting to find him killed, but to their surprise and joy he was almost unhurt. A flock of sheep was passing at the time of his fall, and he fell upon the crowded flock, and right upon the top of a lamb. The lamb was crushed to death, but the man was saved. So they carved a lamb on the tower, at the exact height from which he fell, to commemorate the miraculous escape.

Your fall to certain eternal death was averted at Calvary when the Lord Jesus Christ interposed Himself between you and the wrath of a just and righteous God. The Lamb of God was crushed for your sins. The punishment which was your due He bore Himself, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." (John 1:29).

A Meditation for Christians

CONFORMED or TRANSFORMED?

Transformation may be painful. It is easier to conform. It is more comfortable to blend with the world and to surround ourselves with those who condone our weaknesses; but what does God say about it?

Salvation is a translation. God "hath translated us from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of his dear Son" (Colossians 1:13). This places us in a unique position: we are sons of God, yet we live in a world ruled by "the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience" (Ephesians 2:2).

A desire to conform to our surroundings is a very natural one. It begins early in life, this adhering to the standards around us. To make matters more complicated, we live in a constantly changing world, and we cannot remain static. Each new year brings more changes. Now that another new year is about to dawn we again face the problem of conformity, the question of when it is right to conform and when it is wrong.


Are the changing standards of the world a sufficient guide? No. God's laws, clearly set down in His Word, are higher and purer than the best man's mind can produce. They do not change

It is God's plan that we "be not conformed to this world," but be "transformed by the renewing of your mind" (Romans 12:1). This "mind" is not only memory, opinion, or the ability to reason. This mind is one with the heart, the seat of affection, and, "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he" (Proverbs 23:7). If God rules this mind it will be renewed. Every thought is brought into captivity to Christ. Then transformation begins. The work is not completed in a moment. It will only be effected on a spiritual battleground where we "prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God," not just His permissive will.

The acceptable will of God is not acceptable to the world, for "the friendship of the world is enmity with God," and, "If ye were of the world, the world would love his own; but because ye are not of the world, ... therefore the world hateth you."

Resist conformity with the world. Begin to be transformed by surrendering to God's will. Surrender is submission and submission is costly. It took Christ to the cross. Submission to God is at cross purposes with conformity to the world. Yet this submission to His will is the beginning of transformation.

Transformation proves His perfect will for us, because part of the process is waiting on God and reading His Word. Just as in the tabernacle worship the layer reflected the washer's



defilement until he cleansed himself, so we receive "the washing of water by the Word" (Ephesians 5:26).

The Word of God is the searchlight of divine omniscience turned upon the heart. It is hard to rationalize sin in that divine light. A woman once testified, "When I began to seek God, no one told me what was wrong; I knew." So it will be with all who seek Him with a whole heart.

There is no easy road to transformation. It is far easier to conform. It is easier to blend with the world around us, to acquiesce, to offer no protest. To stand for what God's Word teaches will take courage and conviction.

So often it is said, "We need men with convictions!" But do we want such men? Do we want transformed men around us, or are we more comfortable with people who demand less? Do we prefer people who condone our weaknesses?

If there is no transformation, conformity is the only alternative. Conformity in thought, in word, and in deed will be the pattern of our lives until the present world and not Christ will rule in our hearts and dictate our actions.

Jesus could say, "The prince of this world cometh, and hath nothing in me" (John 14:30). Oh, that at the beginning of this new year we all might cry with Bishop Spencer:

More and more like Him, repeat the blest story,

Over and over again, Changed by His Spirit from glory to glory,

I shall be satisfied then.

Church Member Finds Surgery Unnecessary After Special Prayer

IN MAY 1963 MY BLOOD PRESSURE was 230/120, and our family physician warned of the possibility of a fatal stroke. Our pastor, Wilson Shabaz, visited and prayed with me and my blood pressure dropped 50 points. The head surgeon in the hospital stated that I must have surgery as soon as the swelling subsided. I was sent home for two weeks. An examination was set for July 17. On July

Teen Challenge Marches On!

day, Wednesday, and Friday evenings to the white areas.

Churches opened their doors so that after street work the teams could take the young people right into churches and have services ending with oldfashioned altar calls. This procedure has a dual purpose. It gets the teenagers off the street and into a church; and it gives them a pastor and a church family when they are saved.

On at least two occasions, teenagers came into the meeting with the express purpose of breaking it up. The Holy Spirit moved in such convicting power that those who did not mean business got up and left and those who stayed were gloriously converted. Souls were saved in every service. These new converts are introduced to their new pastor and all the members present. They are made to feel loved and wanted.

There is one white area in South Chicago where literally thousands of teen-agers roam the streets. Our nearest Assemblies of God church is five miles away, so the workers had to rent a hall at \$75 per month where they held services every week.

After the teams finished with their respective services in different areas, they converged on one park to "sow it down" with Chicken booklets and then showed a film on drug addiction. At the close, they gave a short message and made an altar call.

The children's courts have become vitally interested in this work. They have awarded the Center two young boys, one 13 and one 16. Neither one is a "bad" boy but due to environment, lack of love and lack of discipline at home, both have gotten into minor trouble.

During the summer, the teams conducted 48 street services and 151 church rallies. Approximately 15,000 to 20,000 people heard the gospel. Although between 2,500 and 3,000 made decisions for Christ, the workers are counting 233 they are absolutely sure experienced genuine salvation. They are confident many more are going on with the Lord.

There seems to be no limit to this ministry. It is so tremendous that at times the directors feel frustrated that their regular staff is so small and that funds are so limited.

The Center needs your help in financial support and in prayer, that the staff may be able to meet the great challenge of ministry among needy teen-agers of Chicago.

"I pleaded to return to earth, and my prayer was granted"

On the afternoon of May 10, 1910, edward neer's wife was dying after a long illness. Relatives and friends gathered about her bed and she asked them to sing. "We sang through tears as we watched death creeping up," he wrote later. "She became rigid and cold and the death rattle that had followed each long breath finally ceased. She lay in this condition for some time. Then suddenly to our great joy she turned over and took my hand. From that hour she was well."

Mrs. Neer is now 82 years old, and is assisting some of our missionaries to the American Indians in New Mexico. In recalling her experience of being raised from the dead she does not dwell on the physical miracle, but rather on what took place during the interval when she was "absent from the body." She writes:

"Oh, that I could tell of the abundant life into which I entered! There was an intensity, an open vision which made true the words of Paul in 1 Corinthians 3:12: 'For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face.'

"As my spirit rose from the shadow I discerned a lighted pathway leading upward. Pausing an instant I looked back at my body, but with no desire to return. My spirit went out in praise to Him who had redeemed me from eternal death. I felt distinctly the immediate presence of Jesus and started forward to cast myself at His feet in worship. Suddenly a great sorrow settled over me. As I questioned what this meant, I beheld Christ. He looked as if His heart was breaking. I cried out to know why, and in sorrow came the words, 'Nothing but leaves,' (Mark 11:13).

"My life unrolled as a scroll before me, from the time when as a child I first found Jesus, until the time of my sickness and death. It was all there except the sins. Though my sins had been many, yet they were all blotted out true to God's precious Word (Isaiah 43:25). I saw my good works, my prayers, my testimonies and I saw the intents and purposes of my heart written plainly. Then I realized that I had done them not for Jesus' sake alone but also as a proof of my righteousness. Oh, how like mockery it seemed in the light of His wonderful eyes. I tried to turn from it but could not. I saw that my life, which I had thought so full, was barren and

empty. When it should have been yielded through the Spirit to work the works of Him that sent me, I had wrought my own way. In contrast I beheld His life! He had come to me with hands overflowing, bringing me forgiveness and peace.

"Then so clearly came the knowledge that He was made unto me wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption. He was to have been my words, my deeds, my separation, my life. This was the Christ to whom I had yielded so little of the life He had redeemed! Then to my wondering vision opened the possibilities of that abounding life through me for others. 'As he is,' at the right hand of God, making intercession, yearning, strengthening, and lifting, 'so are we in this world' (1 John 4:17).

"With what sorrow I saw the bruised, burdened lives of those He would have loosed through me! Then I knew that 'no man liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself.'

"I pleaded to return to earth, and when I knew my prayer was granted I gave my life to Him in a new way. As I had felt those wonderful eyes piercing the shallowness of the past, so I felt the eyes of love looking into the future, putting within my spirit a great yieldedness to His will. Then with a look of love (which brings tears of joy as I recall it) He gently motioned me back with nail-pierced hand. As I turned earthward, I could not but pause for one more look at my dear Redeemer. Through the sweetness of love which surrounded me and filled my spirit, I heard the command, 'Be thou faithful!'

"My spirit quickly returned to earth and into my body amid the rejoicing of those who had watched me pass out a short time before. And I was well! The same living Word that had sent me back had spoken soundness to my body and it was entirely well.

"How changed my life has been since that day! He has given me the Holy Spirit to reveal the Christ, to teach me to know and do His perfect will. And could I speak a word more, it would be, 'Yield yourselves unto God' (Romans 6:13). He will do for you what you cannot do. He will make you alive unto Himself."
