GOD IS STILL ON THE

ong BEFORE THE DAYS OF RADIO, a man of God sat alone and heard majestic music coming from afar. The apostle John was on a bleak, surf-beaten island, but his ear was tuned to heaven.

His description of what he heard is graphic indeed. It was a choir composed of a vast multitude. The tones and volume were like the roar of a great waterfall or mighty peals of thunder. The anthem was a brief but soul-stirring and glorious truth. It was what John needed to know and what we need. It reaches us today through Revelation 19:6: "Allelujah: for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth."

John was given an insight and a revelation of the future. The fullness of what he envisioned is yet to come.

There is one simple key to understanding certain prophetic truths of the Scriptures. Whatever the world will have during the Millennium, individual believers may experience right now. The world will have peace during that time, but we can have personal peace today. Christ shall reign over the world during the Millennium, but He sits upon the throne of our hearts right now. That



period will be the Kingdom age; at present we experience the Kingdom of God within us.

Not only can we sing the hallelujahs now but we can also proclaim, "The Lord God omnipotent reigneth." In simplest language that means, "God is on the throne."

What do we mean when we say, "God is on the throne"? Is it just some little catch phrase to overwork, or something to use as the subject of a song? Is there not a depth of meaning in that brief sentence that is a stalwart support in our times of trouble?

When we declare that God is on the throne, we are reminded of certain pertinent truths.

SOMEONE IS IN CHARGE

Often our view of the world, through the peephole of our newspaper or radio, leaves us in confusion. The more we read or hear, the greater our pessimism. The black headlines frighten us, and we tend to feel responsible for the madness that grips the human race.

Suddenly we realize that Someone is in charge—and then our attitude changes. Although the world may be careening downward, it is not our responsibility to throw ourselves in its path. We need not brood over the screeching headlines as if they were our individual burden. It is useless to fight the inferno of sin with the few drops in our teacup. Neither is it our role to plug the dike against the sea of evil. Someone else is on the seat of

EXCEPT FOR THE CHARRED WALLS and smoke-filled house as a reminder, the roaring flames and splintering glass seemed a part of some strange nightmare that had come and gone and left me numb with relief.

"You are certainly a lucky person," the neighbors told me. My exit from the burning house had been made quietly and quickly, before the fire engines arrived.

I had then stood in safety on the far side of the street, my little grandson in my arms, and watched with numb compulsion while the wild flames, fanned by a stiff breeze, burned the high fence encircling the house and swimming pool area. The cabana burned next, the flames eating it in one great gulp. Then almost in systematic order the fire raced along the side and roof of the house. First one great plate-glass window shattered in the white-hot heat, and then another. That side of the large living room was all glass.

Then the fire trucks came, and firemen raced around the place, onto the roof, and inside the house, their giant hoses belching a torrent of water into the blazing fire.

After what seemed hours but was actually only an hour—or two hours at most—the men gathered their equipment together and rolled up the hoses. The fire was



authority—and that changes the whole complexion of things. God is on the throne!

SOMEONE CAPABLE IS IN CHARGE

History is an unbroken record of the failure of human government—the human element in it leads to failure. All of us have experienced feelings of confidence in some human leaders but have also had misgivings concerning others. Having certain human beings in authority would add to our fears!

Just having someone in charge is not enough. It must be someone capable. He who sits on the throne of the universe is not an erring man. He is God Himself. He is the Creator, so is He not the logical One to govern?

In our times of trouble, confusion, and uncertainty it is consoling to know that Someone capable is in charge. *God* is on the throne!

SOMEONE ALMIGHTY IS IN CHARGE

To be omnipotent is to have unlimited power. When One who is almighty sits in the place of authority, there is assurance. Nothing is outside His purveyance, either in knowledge or in ability to act. The fact that such an One is reigning portends eventual victory.

How can we rejoice in this staggering, confused, chaotic, mixed-up, riot-torn, war-convulsed world? Certainly we can't do it by viewing surrounding conditions.

Before the neighbors and curious onlookers left they again assured me I was a lucky person.

I went into the fire-gutted house and looked around. Drapes half-burned and sodden with water lay in an ugly heap on the living room floor. Glass from the shattered windows glistened everywhere, while great jagged fingers of it still hung in the frames. My eyes traveled to the ceiling and down black, charred walls, over furniture half-burned and water-soaked still lying where it had been shoved or thrown. The stench of burning rags, wood, and rubber still hung in the air.

Hours before it had been a beautiful home in an exclusive area in Palm Springs, California. It had been loaned to me for a much-needed rest to recuperate from a recent illness. I had arrived only a few days before with my small grandson to keep me company. How the fire started, no one knew: perhaps from faulty electric wiring or a cigarette thrown over the fence by an unthinking passerby. The firemen didn't know.

"Grandma! Grandma!" A little hand still held mine. "You're not afraid, are you, Grandma?"

I sat down on the nearest chair, lifted the little fellow up, and set him on my lap. "No, nothing will hurt us, Only when we lift our eyes from all these things and see that He is reigning do we have hope that everything will come out all right. God is on the throne!

SOMEONE COMPASSIONATE IS IN CHARGE

It is little comfort to the subjects if their king is an autocratic and dictatorial despot. If the best that can be said is that affairs are run with cold efficiency, much is left to be desired. If the ruler is only capable and omnipotent, there is still a major factor lacking.

But He who sits upon the throne is approachable. He can "be touched with the feeling of our infirmities." He is the essence of understanding, and the lowliest of us can approach Him with confidence. In our discouragement because of world conditions and our perplexity about what to do next, we see Him and take heart. In our dilemma we remember one great truth and then rejoice: God is on the throne!

This glorious truth is the foundation for a swelling doxology. After the heavenly throng sang, "The Lord God omnipotent reigneth," there followed the stirring admonition, "Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honor to him."

Even in the midst of the confusion of our day we have something to sing and shout about. Already we have started the crescendo of the heavenly hosanna that shall reverberate around the throne of God. We have a foretaste of what John was shown, and we sing because of it.

We sing in spite of war, bloodshed, strife, riots, and the very actions that some say prove the nonexistence of God. We sing although ridiculed by the skeptics, battered by persecution, and surrounded by worldliness. We sing in spite of frayed nerves, broken bodies, and dissipated vigor. We sing it because it is a truth and always shall be:

"Allelujah: for the Lord God Omnipotent Reigneth."

Tyler. Jesus took care of us, and the fire is all out now!"

I began to sing his favorite chorus very softly, and soon he was asleep, his little hand still holding mine, but confidently relaxed for he knew Grandma would hold him close and that Jesus was still there taking care of him.

After he fell asleep, I gently laid him on the bed. It was then I picked up the still undamaged telephone and called my husband, miles away, to tell how God had taken care of this little boy and me.

Was I lucky, as the neighbors said? No, I was simply in His care. I thought of Isaiah 65:24: "Before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear."

Surely it had been God's hand that had caused sleep to depart from a neighbor's eyes and caused her and her daughter to go for a midnight walk. Seeing the fire, the daughter had run home to call the fire department, while the neighbor had pounded on my door to awaken me and help us leave the house. Yes, I know God heard before I called.

Safe in His care, I lay down beside my sleeping grandson with the words of Psalm 3:5 before me: "I laid me down and slept; I awaked; for the Lord sustained me." *—Lucille Meyst, Riverside, California*

Our Daily Portion

THE DAMAGE DONE by flood waters in Florence and other parts of Italy during the past few weeks is most unfortunate. There is no city in the world, perhaps, where treasures of art are more appreciated than Florence. Some of its art pieces were damaged or destroyed in the floods. The loss reportedly was very great.

It reminded us of a story about a tourist from abroad who visited the Pitti Palace in Florence. After viewing the paintings there, he said to his guide, "Are these the great masterpieces that everyone talks about? I don't see why people get excited about them."

The guide answered, "It is not the paintings that are on trial, sir; it is the visitors who view them."

So it is with the Word of God. Some people may see nothing very significant about the Bible. Some even scoff at it, calling it a worthless book, a waste of time, but their estimate of the Bible does not change its real value. It is the Word of God and one day it will be our judge. The Bible is not on trial. It is our attitude toward the Bible that is being tried.

The "Great Chapters" program of Bible reading will soon be over. In 1967 we will begin a new program which will take us through nearly all the New Testament and half way through the Old by the end of the year. We hope every Evangel reader will take advantage of the program and promote it in their home, church, and Sunday school class. As John Wesley said, "Reading Christians are growing Christians. When Christians cease to read, they cease to grow.'

If we appreciate the worth of the Bible we will not fail to read a daily portion. Our spiritual health depends upon it. Therefore, keep thirsting for "the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby" (1 Peter 2:2).

The Gospel Publishing House has produced a number of items to implement the "Read the Word" program. A large poster similar to the cover of this Evangel has been printed for display in churches. There are buttons to be given to those who agree to join the program; also Bible Reading Guides listing all the daily readings (see ad-page 28).

One of the most helpful items is a self-standing calendar to put on the table. It will be a constant reminder of the daily Bible portion and the weekly memory verse. Then there are two items which provide additional incentive: a certificate of recognition for those who complete the reading program, and, in case it is desired, a Bible reader's pin or tie tack to be awarded at the end of the year.

It is appropriate to speak of this today for this is Universal Bible Sunday. This is the day to salute the American Bible Society, now 150 years old, and pray for its success. This year the Society's goal is to produce 75 million copies of the Scriptures. Most of these are in English; many are in foreign tongues. The Bible society is performing a great service to God and humanity by translating the Bible into new tongues, printing it, and distributing it on a non-profit basis so that all who wish to read the Word and be saved may do so.

Over a billion copies of the Bible have been printed since Gutenberg invented the printing press. However, only about a quarter of these are still in existence. In a world of three billion souls, the need of expanding the Bible-printing program and accelerating our missionary efforts is obvious.

May God help us to treasure the Word, nourish our souls upon it, and share it with others who have not yet tasted the blessing it brings. -R.C.C.

went to Ephesus. Meeting a group of people whom he supposed to be Christians, the first thing he asked them was, "Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed?" THE HOLY SPIRIT

A GOOD MANY YEARS AGO there lived in Ontario a dear old Irish saint whom people called "Holy Ann." A book was written concerning her life. At times Holy Ann was asked to speak to a group of ministers who appreciated the power and wisdom of her words in spite of her lack of education.

During one such address the old Irish saint pointed her finger at the clergymen and said, "My Father tells me that you don't honor the Holy Ghost as you ought."

Were Holy Ann called upon to address any group of ministers today—even Pentecostal ministers, perhaps she no doubt would do the same thing and say the same words. We do not honor the Holy Spirit as we ought.

We treasure salvation as God's priceless gift to man. "The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." It is an incomparable gift which, if received, means everlasting bliss, but if rejected, means everlasting sorrow and anguish. This promise of God is impossible to realize without the operation of the Holy Spirit. None can experience the thrill and joy of it without the aid of the Holy Ghost who came into the world to make men know the things of Christ.

The apostle Paul touched tremendous truth when he

Ephesian group, after Paul had laid his hands on them, enjoyed the scriptural Pentecostal experience.

Our Pentecostal movement was not ordered of God just to be another evangelical agency but to bring to the Church that Pentecostal blessing which it had mostly lost through unbelief. Our business is not only in the evangelical field, but it is to bring existing believers into the glorious experience of the baptism in the Holy Ghost according to Acts 2:4.

These are desperate days. On every hand Satan is attacking the Word of God, saying, "Hath God said?" In every avenue of life, from the lowest to the highest, the Word of God is being discounted and eternal truth assailed. The Son of God is stripped of His deity. His miracles, both then and now, are derided or explained away. The supernatural is pooh-poohed, and the new birth ridiculed.

God has a remedy—the baptism in the Holy Spirit. No modernists or liberal theologians are to be found in Pentecostal ranks. Why? Because Pentecostal believers have received the Holy Ghost and have spoken in other tongues as the apostles did. After such a supernatural experience, gospel truth is emblazoned on the soul of the recipient, and all doubts as to the deity of Christ and His glorious salvation disappear forever.

May Pentecostal preachers preach it: "Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed?" And may holy hands be dedicated and anointed to be laid on those who seek that they may be filled with the Holy Spirit.

RICH BLESSINGS ARE MANIFESTED TO MANKIND THROUGH THE INCARNATION.

THE WORD manifested is used in the New Testament a number of times in connection with the incarnation of the Lord Jesus Christ, and in most interesting and instructive ways.

"And ye know that he was manifested to take away our sins; and in him is no sin" (1 John 3:5). To deal with the sin question was one of the primary reasons for His manifestation. The original word for "take away" means "to remove the guilt and punishment of sin by expiation"; "to cause our sins to cease, that we no longer sin, while we enter into fellowship with Christ, who is free from sin—'in him is no sin'—and abide in His fellowship." Christ was therefore manifested "in the flesh" that sinners might also be delivered from the practice of sin.

"Now once at the end of the ages hath he been manifested to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself" (Hebrews 9:26, ASV). Here the word manifested is used in connection with the Incarnation in another sense. The Greek word for "put away" means to abolish, to annul, "to thwart the efficacy of anything, make void, frustrate." Christ was manifested in the Incarnation that through His sacrifice He might put away, abolish, annul sin.

III

"In this was *manifested* the love of God toward us, because that God sent his only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through him" (1 John 4:9). The incarnation of Christ was a manifestation of the love of God toward each one of us. The passage of Scripture, 1 John 4:7-21, is the inspired commentary on the words of John 3:16. A sentence summary of that verse is, "God so loved . . . that he gave." John the apostle saw a depth of love in the sending of the Son into the world.

Do you wish to know that "God is love"? That God loves you? Look at the incarnation of the Son of God; look at the holy birth of Jesus Christ. It spells out and it tells out love—the love of God. Adam Clarke says of the message of 1 John 4:9: "The mission (sending) of

Jesus Christ was the fullest proof that God could give, or that man could receive, of His infinite love for the world."

"For the life was *manifested*, and we have seen it, and bear witness, and show unto you that eternal life, which was with the Father, and was *manifested* unto us" (1 John 1:2). The Incarnation manifested a life, such a life was not seen before. That eternal life is what man must have if his original fellowship with God is to be restored.

The message of 1 John 1:2 "reiterated with redoubled force that the whole essence of the relation of God to man lies in the audible, visible, tangible, historical ap-

pearance of God in Jesus." The Incarnation was for the manifestation, and the manifestation was for the participation—the believer's participation—in "that eternal life, which was with the Father, and was manifested unto us," as John went on to say, "that ye also may have fellowship with us: and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ" (1 John 1:2, 3).

"I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do.... I have *manifested* thy name unto the men which thou gavest me out of the world" (John 17:4, 6). Jesus Christ was incarnated that He might manifest the name of God. This was a part of the "work" the Father sent Him into the world to do. "A *little* of the divine nature was known by the *works of creation;* a little *more* was known by the *Mosaic revelation;* but the *full manifestation* of God, His nature, and His attributes, came only through the revelation of Christ."

"After me cometh a man which is preferred before me; for he was before me. And I knew him not: but that he should be made *manifest* to Israel" (John 1:30, 31). He was especially promised to the Hebrew people. Isaiah 9:6 says, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given." That promise was fulfilled to the Hebrew people, as shown in the words of the angel to the Hebrew shepherds: "Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people [Greek singular, "the Hebrew people"]. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour which is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10, 11).

He was manifested to them to confirm the promises: "Now I say that Jesus Christ was a minister of the circumcision for the truth of God, to confirm the promises made unto the fathers" (Romans 15:8). In that statement "the apostle holds up Israel's salvation as the primary end of Christ's mission. But next, after this, Christ was sent to the Gentiles" (David Brown). Our Lord Himself testified, "To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth" (John 18:37).



"For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil" (1 John 3:8). The word *destroy* here is a wonderful and marvelous one. It is not the same as the word destroy in Hebrews 2:14: "That through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil."

The word in 1 John 3:8 is an entirely different one. It is luo. It means "to loosen one bound, to set free," as when the Lord said of Lazarus, "Loose him, and let him go." It means to free from the bondage of disease, as the woman whom Satan had bound was "loosed" from her infirmity. It means "to release one bound by the chains of sin," as in Revelation 1:5: "Unto him that...loosed us from our sins" (ASV).

The word in 1 John 3:8 also means "to dissolve something coherent into parts," as in 2 Peter 3:10, 11. It is a chemical term, and is used of the ways and means God will use to dissolve the elements of our universe until all that came through Satan and sin is changed.

God is the great Chemist of the universe and knows how to "destroy"-dissolve-all the "works of the devil," and to bring out of this dissolution the new heavens and the new earth. Although that work will be completed at His Second Coming, the words of 1 John 3:8 clearly state that "the Son of God was manifested [at His incarnation] to destroy [luo] the works of the devil."

May we all share in the rich blessings manifested to us through the incarnation of Him who is the only and uniquely "begotten Son of God."

Did the star guide the Wise Men all the way to Jerusalem?

The Bible says they had "seen his star in the east." One commentary says this means they had seen it while yet in the eastern country from which they had come. Apparently they did not have the star constantly before them. When they saw the star, they were convinced a king had been born to Judah and started out to find him. Later the star appeared again, this time to lead them to the house where Jesus was.

Where did the Wise Men come from?

Some believe they came from babylon, and others say Media. Tradition tells us they were descendants of Abraham through Keturah, according to Adam Clarke and the Cyclopedia of Religious Knowledge, (See Genesis 25:1-4 and 1 Chronicles 1:32, 33.) These writers advance the opinion that the sons of Keturah had been taught by Abraham concerning the covenant promise, and that this hope had been handed down by tradition. It is thought they were also informed concerning the prophecy of Balaam (Numbers 24:17). Probably their homes were in Arabia, or regions nearby.

Whether the Wise Men were from Babylon, Media, or Arabia is not important. The important thing is that they believed the prophecy and went in search of Him who was "born King of the Jews."

Did Jesus lay aside His deity when He became man, or was it the use of His deity that He laid aside?

Jesus did not lay aside His deity. Had He done so, He would have been no more than other men. He might have been the second Adam but would have had only human qualities.

There are those who believe He laid aside all use of His deity, and they have scriptures for their belief. They believe He lived entirely on the human plane, doing all that He did and teaching all that He taught through the power and direction of the Holy Spirit.

It seems to me that the safest and most satisfactory explanation is that given by Dr. Augustus Strong-that He made use of His personal deity, but only as guided and directed by the Holy Spirit. He had come to do not His own will but the will of the Father who sent Him. Therefore He did not act upon His own initiative, independent of the will of the Father, but acted as the will of the Father was made known to Him by the Holv Spirit.

The apostle Paul never tried to solve the mystery of the Incarnation. He was content to declare, "Great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh ... " (1 Timothy 3:16). The fact of the Incarnation is given in the Scriptures for us to believe and not necessarily for us to understand.

DID GOD FORGET SARDINIA?

Does God forget a people? Our immediate reaction is no! And that was our reply to an elderly lady who, upon hearing us speak of the love of God, said: "Our government ignores our existence; our church does not know we are here; and God has forgotten us!"

What a challenge it was to our hearts to hear these words. We had come to the island of Sardinia at the invitation of Vito Tambone—the only Assemblies of God pastor on the island. He had begun a church building; and although believers were doing their utmost, construction had bogged down. These people needed help—needed it desperately!

Brother Tambone met my wife and me, and in less than an hour we were in his little Italian Fiat 600 on an inspection tour of Sardinia. We traveled for many hours, and some of the scenes we saw have remained indelibly in our minds—poverty on every hand; the streets empty; only old people and children around. When we asked the pastor about this, he said that the younger citizens go away to Northern Italy or other European countries for work.

Sardinia, an island somewhat smaller than Sicily, is about 500 miles from the Italian mainland. It has a population of almost two million, and for centuries has continued in its primitive way of life.

It has a strange history. It was occupied by the Phoenicians over 4,000 years ago. Some strange, almost Stone-Age dwellings called *Nuraghes* still can be seen in the countryside, and traces of various civilizations and cultures can be seen on every hand.

While it is part of Italy, Sardinia's dialect is like another language—predominantly based on Latin with some Greek, French, and Spanish words interspersed. In fact, the Sardinians have their own dictionary.

They are a proud people and very nationalistic. Even though they are open to the gospel, they do not readily accept anything that isn't Sardinian.

While historically and culturally rich, this island is economically very poor—so poor that two years ago the entire population of a town called S. Vito marched out to the main highway and sat down on a three-day hunger strike to attract attention to their condition.

Brother Tambone and his wife Sarah felt a great burden for Sardinia and went there soon after they were married. They knew that others had attempted to establish a Pentecostal testimony there and had left discouraged. The obstacles were too great customs, language, and (hardest to overcome) the predominant nationalism. Yet they went. For seven long years they struggled through difficulties and privations; but they plodded on.

Then the break came. God began to work upon hearts in the town of Quartu S. Elena in the province of Cagliari. When we ministered there in the service, there were at least 75 Sardinian Christians all packed into a little storefront hall "like sardines." As they sang and praised the Lord, their faces were radiant with joy. It was thrilling to note that the congregation was predominantly young people.

Somehow God seemed to suggest to our hearts that if this island is to be evangelized, it will be done by the Sardinians themselves. They must consecrate themselves and go out to win their own. On this theme we challenged them, and their response was simply beyond description. A good number of them promised to put aside other plans of going to the continent in order to come to our Bible institute in Rome to prepare themselves. Others came forward to offer their humble talents to the Lord.

The church building that Pastor Tambone envisioned has become a reality. The people, although extremely poor, have learned to give generously, but their efforts were not enough. To complete the church building we had to help them with a \$3,000 revolvingfund loan. This church in Quartu S. Elena is destined to become the mother church of an island-wide movement that will spring up as the result of the consecration of the people, the vision and outreach of Light-for-the-Lost (which has provided funds for 50,000 portions of the Gospel of John), and the evangelistic meetings that will surely follow up this effort.

You can share in this great effort by praying for Sardinia and by giving as God leads you to help lift the burden of this church. Additional funds are urgently needed to increase the facilities of the work in Sardinia.

There are signs of abundant rain. A revival is in the making. God in His sovereign authority will yet prove that He has not forgotten anyone in His plan of salvation; for God is "not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance."

The Battle for Battle Ramsarran

THE BIBLE SCHOOL IN GUYANA IS TRAINING 59 YOUNG PEOPLE TO EVANGELIZE THEIR SOUTH AMERICAN REPUBLIC FOR CHRIST.

DESPERATELY Ramsarran Singh prayed, "I know that I must be trained, but how? God, if You want me to go to Bible school, You must make it possible."

That prayer has been answered. Ramsarran is completing his third year of training in the Assemblies of God Bible School in Georgetown, Guyana. He is also the pioneer pastor of a growing outstation church in a country rice village.

No Christian has ever witnessed to this former Hindu. He sought peace. Hibiscus-blossom offerings and predawn devotions by the seaside did not satisfy. His chanted prayers to the rising sun and ceremonial washings brought no answer. Questions directed to the village elders about how to get close to God were not taken seriously. *Perhaps,* he thought, *when I am old, I will find God.*

One day, however, a Hindu friend told this longing young man some things he knew about a Prophet named Christ. Ramsarran decided he would include prayer to Him along with his other gods.

Another day he was drawn by curiosity to a strange group of people standing on the street corner in his



village. They were "singing and talking good about Christ." This left a deep impression and stirred serious thoughts about what his Hindu friend had said.

Soon another non-Christian friend passed on a tract and a Bible which had been given to him but which he did not want. Ramsarran read and reread them. Fascination changed to conviction. He testifies, "It was this that made me realize I needed a Saviour."

The battle for a soul is never won easily. At this time Ramsarran was caught up with the cry of his countrymen for independence from colonial rule. He wanted to die for a good cause and threw himself wholeheartedly into politics. Yet while Ramsarran was enlisting other youth for the struggle, a Christian young man invited this zealous organizer to attend an Assemblies of God church in a neighboring village.

He recalls, "I went to be rude, but they treated me kindly." The next week he returned and surrendered his life to the Lord Jesus.

Threats, persecutions, and subtle attacks against this new witness only contributed to his vigorous determination to go all out for Christ. He says with deep conviction, "I found peace, and my life has been changed. Now I must know God's Word so I can live for Him and help others." If God has raised up the Bible school, He will send those He wants trained in it. This sacred trust has been recognized by those who have been engaged in a vital training program in Guyana since 1961. The evident work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of those who come is precious.

The school started in the third story of a frame building which was later demolished to make room for the new Evangelistic Center. For a while the school was crowded into rented quarters. Now it occupies a fine, new building next to the Evangelistic Center. The 30- by 50-foot structure has three classrooms, a library, and an office. Facilities will accommodate 90 students, although the present enrollment is 59. The new building was dedicated in June 1966 with Ward R. Williams, professor of Evangel College, Springfield, Missouri, as guest speaker.

Nearly 200 students have taken studies in the Bible school in the past six years, and 27 have completed three years of study. Nine have finished four years. The contribution that students have made to the work of God in Guyana has demonstrated the strategic usefulness of the program.

Sharing of vision, prayer, work, and finance by God's people in the United States and in Guyana has made the school possible. This ministry must be perpetuated to receive and train other eager students like Ramsarran.

NO ROOM IN THE INN?

EVERY CHRISTMAS we hear a great deal about the fact that there was no room for the Saviour in the Bethlehem inn. Sorrowful sermons are preached, sad songs are sung, and costumed children recite in their annual Christmas program that the doors of the inn were closed. Yet how little we hear of the open door to the manger.

While many people lament the closed doors of the world, the truth of the matter is that there never has been so many doors open to the gospel as there are today. Rather than major on the closed inns of the world, we ought to emphasize the opportunity of the open mangers.

This Christmas finds the Assemblies of God missions enterprise at an all-time high. Never in our 52-year history have we had so many missionaries in so many countries reaching so many people for Christ. At present we have 920 missionaries in 72 foreign lands, working side by side with 13,000 national preachers in 17,000 churches and teaching points.

There are 80 foreign Bible schools training nearly 3,000 students for the ministry in their own lands. Beginning with a handful of Pentecostal people in 1914, the worldwide Assemblies of God movement now numbers some three million.

The Foreign Missions Department is constantly looking for new open doors. Two missionary families are going into Panama to open a new work both in the English-speaking Canal Zone and the Spanish-speaking Republic. A fine staff of missionaries are returning to the Congo. A new work is developing in Tonga in the South Pacific. Also we have found a great open door for mass evangelism in Europe.

So it may be true that some have closed their doors to the gospel. The Assemblies of God missionaries are busy with the open doors of the world, bringing the humble shepherds and the more sophisticated wise men of this generation to the Saviour.



IN THE MIDDLE OF THE RIO GRANDE

Shall We Gather at the River? was sung one spring afternoon by three different groups of Spanish-speaking believers under unusual circumstances. One group was on the American side of the Rio Grande, another on the Mexican side, and still another in the middle of the river—all singing the praises of God together.

But there is a story behind all this.

The Holy Spirit had moved mightily in the little border town of Los Indios, 20 miles upstream from Brownsville, Texas. When the gospel got to this little village, the enemy had opposed it, not wanting to let go of these poor benighted souls. Two persons had even become demon-possessed but were eventually delivered in answer to prayer and fasting by the newborn assembly.

Eight couples living together unlawfully saw the need for legal marriage, so eight men in a wagon drove to Brownsville to get the belated marriage licenses. The night the eight couples lined up in the brush arbor for

So many young men were saved and baptized in the Spirit that the usual Saturday night dances were discontinued because there were no youngsters to take part.

Leaving my wife in Los Indios to continue the services there, I crossed into Mexico to hold services in Villanueva. The two villages were only about three miles apart, but by way of the port of entry the distance was some 40 miles, and on the Mexican side the roads were poor.

The afternoon I arrived at Villanueva quite a crowd gathered for the service, which ran well into the night. A great storm came up, and rain fell in sheets. But this only seemed to quicken the few believers, and the Spirit of God worked in many hearts that night. During those days eight more were saved on the American side of the river, and several received the baptism in the Spirit, while about the same number responded on the Mexican side.

I shall never forget my first night in Villanueva. After the service I was taken to a small grass hut. Without any kind of light I crawled up into a high cot. I began to hear noises and finally discerned there were chickens, pigs, ducks, and dogs sharing my hut for the night. But no offense was meant, for the next day I discovered that the same situation existed in all the other huts and primitive houses.

The believers in Mexico suggested that a water baptismal service be conducted in the middle of the river, which at that time was quite low; and that the candidates from both sides of the river meet in the middle. This was not hard to arrange, for the Rio Grande (Big River) is really not very big. So we met on a certain day at a given hour on the two banks of the river.

Some 50 from both sides of the stream, making a total of 100 or more, gathered for the service. We should to each other the hymns to be sung and we sang them in unison. I then preached to both groups from the Mexican side and was heard perfectly on the Texas side.

The candidates from Los Indios and from Villanueva then entered into the river and all three groups joined together in singing, "Shall We Gather at the River?" Those to be baptized gave their testimonies, and the strong voices were heard in both countries.

A shark was observed not too far from us, but we trusted the Lord to protect us—as well as to keep the Border Patrol from interfering with the service. Nothing happened, except that the rich blessing of the Lord rested upon us. When the new believers had been baptized, each group returned to its respective side of the river for services that night.

Several converts from the Los Indios meeting became ministers of the gospel and are still preaching. Many of the believers have moved to other parts, but there are still a few in Los Indios who remember that service in the middle of the Rio Grande.

H. C. Ball is a life-long leader in the Assemblies of God work in Latin America. For many years he was a missionary to Mexicans. Later he became Field Secretary for all Latin America. He directed the Spanish Literature Division of the Gospel Publishing House for 15 years. Upon retiring from this post in 1961 at the age of 65 he moved to San Antonio, Texas, and opened a new assembly. He now serves as editor of *La Luz Apostolica*, the Spanish District organ published in San Antonio.

ASSEMBLIES OF GOD FAR EAST CONFERENCES

ALL THE FAR EAST FIELDS HAVE FORGED AHEAD

DURING THE SUMMER of 1966 three Far East area conferences were held which were successful beyond our expectation. One missionary wrote: "The spiritual blessing received in this conference transformed my life. From here on I will be a more mature and spiritual Christian, and a far more effective and dedicated missionary."

One national church superintendent wrote: "This conference was the turning point on our field. We have been receiving; from here on out we will be giving."

The first of these was the Southern Area Conference held in Manila, Philippines (June 26-July 1) for Indonesia, Philippines, Hong Kong, Singapore, and Malaysia. The second was the Northern Area Conference at Tokyo (July 10-15) for Japan, Korea, and Taiwan. The Pacific Area Conference was held at Honolulu (August 5-8) for Hawaii, Marshalls, Fiji, American and Western Samoa, Tonga, and other islands.

PROGRESS

The first Far East conference was held in Hong Kong in 1960. Since that time, all the Far East fields have forged ahead. Here are a few of the more dramatic advances since that first meeting:

1. The Evangelistic Center established in the heart of Seoul, Korea. This is now the largest Pentecostal church in the Orient. It has approximately 5,000 members with between 5,000 and 6,000 people worshiping in the church every Sunday.

2. The new church building for the City Center Assembly of God in Taipei, Taiwan. The Congregation has grown appreciably since the construction of its new home.

3. The Far East Advanced School of Theology (FEAST) in Manila. The Hong Kong conference "demanded" establishment of a seminary-type institution to give advanced training beyond the normal three years of Bible school. FEAST has already justified the vision of its founders.

4. The newly begun Assemblies of God Bible Institute (AGBIM) in the southern part of Mindanao.

5. The new Central Bible School being built in Malang, East Central Java.

6. A new Bible school in Fiji to meet the needs for Bible training in the Southern Pacific area.

7. The development of a Bible school with over 100 students from the great revival in the Marshall Islands.

8. The establishment of Evangel Temple in Fiji.
9. The Pentecostal "tidal waves" sweeping throughout

the islands and atolls of Pacific Oceania.

10. The school in Kuala Lumpur known as the Bible Institute of Malaysia.

11. The building of the revival center in Hiroshima, Japan—the fulfillment of a long-standing dream.

12. The flourishing of the work of the Assemblies of God through the whole Far East.

UNITY

In one memorial service held in Tokyo, there were Americans, Japanese, Filipinos, Koreans, Taiwanese, and Mandarin Chinese all on the platform worshiping and ministering together in glorious harmony. In Christ we have a brotherhood that unites men of all nations.

During the course of these conferences there was not one discordant note. The disparity between sophisticated Mongolian cultures and the more easygoing Polynesian cultures was never noticed. A message in tongues would be given by a Korean brother; someone would give the interpretation in English, and someone else would give an equally authentic interpretation in Chinese!

MATURITY

Most Far East fields now have their own national superintendents—many of them young men who have risen through the ranks of their own people and have been educated in our Bible schools.

Cho Yonggi a few years ago was a staunch Buddhist (Continued on next page)

dying of tuberculosis. God saved and healed him; he graduated from our Korean Bible Institute; and he is now the aggressive superintendent of the Korean Assemblies of God.

Eddie Medina, a recent graduate from the Bible Institute of Manila, is the energetic superintendent of the Southern Luzon District of the Philippines.

Solomon Balimbin, a graduate of the Bible Institute of the Philippines, is the imaginative editor of *The Voice* —our Philippine monthly magazine which has been described by knowledgeable people as "one of the finest periodicals put out by Pentecostal circles anywhere in the world."

Another man of maturity is Leonard Caput, who once was a nearly naked aboriginal boy wandering around the gold mines of central Luzon. He was won for Christ in Sunday school, was educated, graduated from the Bible Institute of Manila, and today is the progressive superintendent of the Northern Luzon District.

Another is John Choy, an educated, cultured, dedicated young Chinese. He is a graduate of the Ecclesia Bible Institute of Hong Kong and now is dean of that school. John Yip is now pastor of the First Assembly of God in Kowloon, Hong Kong, one of the great Pentecostal churches of the world.

These men are examples of the new generation of leaders that has arisen throughout the Far East.

INTERNATIONAL ASPECT

The Assemblies of God churches in the Far East are very aware of the international aspect of our fellowship. They realize that the eyes of the world are focused on the Pentecostal movement. The leaders are determined to hold the standard high. They are dedicated to making the various Assemblies of God national churches an integral part of the tide of Pentecostal revival sweeping through the Orient.

FUTURE GOALS

Out of the conferences this year a number of recommendations eventuated:

1. All 18 Bible schools in the Far East must be upgraded.

2. All three-year Bible schools are to be integrated into the FEAST program so that graduates of the area schools may readily receive advanced training.

3. Other area conferences throughout the Far East are planned.

4. Evangelistic ministries are to be interchanged between the various fields to bring a truly Oriental flavor to the Pentecostal revival sweeping the Far East.

5. Definite schedules are to be prepared under which the support of all Bible schools in the Far East are to be assumed by the national churches involved.

6. Far East national churches will accelerate their mission programs.

What I Found at Shimmabuke



CAN NEVER THINK OF THE BOONS and benefits the Bible invariably brings without thinking of Shimmabuke, a tiny little village I came upon when, as a war correspondent, I was following on the heels of our troops beating out their tough and bloody victory on Okinawa.

It was an obscure little community of only a few hundred native Okinawans. Thirty years before an American missionary on his way to Japan had stopped here. He hadn't stayed long—just long enough to make a couple of converts, leave them a Bible, and then pass on.

One of the converts was Shosei Kina, the other was his brother Mojon. From the time of the missionary's visit, mind you, they had seen no other missionary, had no contact with any other Christian person or group. But in those 30 years Shosei Kina and his brother Mojon had made that Bible come alive. Picking their way through its pages, they had found not only an inspiring Person on whom to pattern a life, but sound precepts on which to base a society.

Aflame with their discovery, they taught the other villagers until every man, woman, and child in Shimmabuke was a Christian. Shosei Kina became headman in the village; his brotker Mojon, the chief teacher. In Mojon's school the Bible was read daily. To Shosei Kina's village government, its precepts were law. Under the impact of this Book pagan things had fallen away. In their place, during these 30 years, there had developed a Christian democracy at its purest.

Then after 30 years came the American Army, storming across the island. Little Shimmabuke was directly in their path and took some severe shelling. When our advance patrols swept up to the village compound, the GI's, their guns leveled, stopped dead in their tracks as two little old men stepped forth, bowed low and began to speak.

An interpreter explained that the old men were welcoming them as fellow Christians. They remembered that

their missionary had come from America. So though these Americans seemed to approach things a little differently than had the missionary, the two old men were overjoyed to see them.

The GI's reaction was typical. Flabbergasted, they sent for the chaplain.

The chaplain came, and with him officers of the Intelligence Service. They toured the village and were astounded at what they saw—the spotlessly clean homes and streets, the poise and gentility of the villagers, the high level of health and happiness, intelligence, and prosperity of Shimmabuke. They had seen many other villages on Okinawa—villages of unbelievable poverty and ignorance and filth. Against these Shimmabuke shone like a diamond in a dungheap.

Shosei Kina and his brother Mojon observed the Americans' amazement and took it for disappointment. They bowed humbly and said: "We are sorry if we seem a backward people. We have, honored sirs, tried our best to follow the Bible and live like Jesus. Perhaps if you will show us how...." Show them?

I strolled through Shimmabuke one day with a tough old Army sergeant. As we walked, he turned to me and whispered hoarsely, "I can't figure it, fellow—this kind of people coming out of only a Bible and a couple of old guys who wanted to live like Jesus!" Then he added what was to me an infinitely penetrating observation: "Maybe we've been using the wrong kind of weapons to make the world over!"

Whenever I think of what's wrong with our world and of all that must be made right if civilization is to survive, I can't help thinking of little Shimmabuke, of Shosei Kina and his brother Mojon. Nor can I help thinking of that Book that started it all, and of the Bible Societies which are struggling to meet the mounting demand for the Scriptures—a demand that is increasing from freedomhungry people all across the world.

I can't help relating Shimmabuke and the Bible Societies, for I held the Book in my own hands for a few memorable moments. At my request Shosei Kina reverently took it down from the pedestal where it rested, handling it with the loving care one would use with the original of our own Declaration of Independence. It was weather-stained and frayed. Its covers were almost off, its edges dog-eared from 30 years' use. Carefully I turned its pages. I couldn't read a word of it, of course. But I could read the inscription on the flyleaf. It said: "Published and distributed by the American Bible Society, New York."

This textbook of freedom had made a new little world of Shimmabuke.

Given proper distribution, could it not make a new big world of liberty and peace for all?

HOME FOR CHRISTMAS

BEING HOME FOR CHRISTMAS is an American tradition. Families that find a reunion impossible at any other time of the year try to gather at the holiday season.

In Springfield, Missouri, each year at least a score of furloughing and retired missionary families of the Assemblies of God are *home for Christmas*. For some, "home" is one of the 12 Mission Village cottages made available by the Foreign Missions Department and partially furnished by certain district WMC organizations. For others, it is a mobile unit, a rented house, or modest home of their own.

From the Southern Missouri WMC commissary, Mrs. Cleo Tapp, district WMC president, plans a package for every resident missionary family. The box may contain linens, articles of clothing, toiletries, or "little extras" chosen especially for each household. The commissary is replenished once a year by gifts of handwork from members of local WMC groups throughout the district.

Early in December Mrs. Albert Pyle, WMC representative of the Springfield Section, plans a banquet for local groups of the area. Besides completing the districtassigned Christmas project at the meeting, the women make special plans for the furloughing and retired missionary ladies of the city. Each local group chooses a lady to be its guest. The missionary sits with her hostesses and receives a personal gift from them.

Mrs. Stewart Robinson, wife of the pastor of Calvary Temple in Springfield, tells how their WMC group has given a Christmas aspect to the WMC motto, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do...." She says, "It would be rare to find as many missionaries as there are in Springfield, so our WMC ladies take advantage of the opportunity to be a blessing to them. Under the leadership of Mrs. Chester Adams, the WMC group-sponsors an annual Christmas tea for all resident missionary ladies.

"As a part of the program in 1965, each missionary told about Christmas customs of the land she represented. Billie Davis said that in Costa Rica so much confetti is tossed about that the streets look snow-covered.

"Angeline Tucker told how Congolese Christians spend the entire day in church, enjoying Christmas dinner together and bringing gifts to Christ. Esther Cimino said she missed the beating of the drums that marked Christmastime in Nigerian villages. Mrs. John Hall told of her delight of opening a Christmas package from home (when she was in West Africa) and finding a can of cranberry sauce—just in time for Christmas dinner.

"According to Ruth Phillips, the Japanese use more

elaborate decorations than Americans are accustomed to. The height of the Far East celebration comes on New Year's Day.

"Mrs. Vernon Pettenger said that the South Africans use few holiday decorations. Instead, they dress up, take a special offering, and attend church all day. Christmas is considered a special time for dedication and water baptismal services. Dawn Pettenger, daughter of the missionary, was dedicated at such a service.

"Mrs. Arthur Lindvall said to the WMC ladies, 'Never pity the missionary in El Salvador. To the Christians there, Christmas is more meaningful than in the States. In every home there is a manger instead of a gift-laden tree.'"

Christmas is drawing near; again, individuals have sent their gifts; the district office personnel have wrapped packages; and the sectional program is on the calendar.

The WMC's of Calvary Temple have sent invitations to their tea. Most of their guests will be new ones. Many of last year's guests have finished their furloughs and returned to distant fields. No doubt they will be remembering the fellowship of the Springfield WMC's and the personal token of love each guest received that day.

From the heat of the tropics, and from the frosty mountainsides, there will be missionaries lifting prayers in behalf of WMC's everywhere and saying again, "How much they do to make us feel at *home for Christmas!*"

THE KING'S HEARTBREAK

Sunday School Lesson for December 18, 1966

MATTHEW 23:25-29

BY J. BASHFORD BISHOP

THE MOST SEVERELY SCATHING DENUNCIATION Christ ever uttered was delivered against the scribes and Pharisees, religious leaders of Israel: "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites!" These words were repeated seven times in the course of His message.

Most people condemn hypocrites. However, we ought to take heed to our own hearts lest we be found guilty of the same sins we hate in these men. Consider some of the charges Christ made against them:

1. They failed to practice what they preached (vv. 1-3). They were not condemned because they held offices as expositors of the Law, for these offices were necessary. They were not condemned for their teaching insofar as it adhered to the Scriptures. Their sin was that "they say and do not." Those who allow sins in

themselves which they condemn in others are most guilty of all (Romans 2:1-3, 17-24).

2. They expected others to bear burdens they themselves would not bear (v. 4). To safeguard against such an attitude, the Christian's maxim ought to be: "Expect a lot more from yourself than you do from other people." To reverse the order is hypocrisy.

3. They were guilty of showing off. "All their works they do for to be seen of men" (v. 5). It is true that Jesus said, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." But we are not to parade our own virtues so men will glorify us. Pure motives are allimportant.

4. They desired places of prominence and titles of honor (vv. 6-10).

5. They used religion as a cloak to hide their evil deeds (v. 14). "Ye devour widows' houses." They were unmerciful in business relations and took advantage of defenseless people by overcharging them and demanding high rates of interest. Yet these scribes and Pharisees made long prayers. Christ did not condemn them for praying but for using prayer as a pretense of religion, for they were inconsistent in their living. A real Christ-tian puts Christ into all his business practices. His prayer life issues forth in honorable dealings.

6. They emphasized externals and minimized the importance of inward integrity (vv. 23, 24). They were very exact in giving tithes—even of the most insignificant items—and they were right in so doing, for Jesus said, "These ought ye to have done." They were wrong in omitting matters which are the essence of true religion—"judgment, mercy, and faith." True holiness is primarily a matter of the heart. Many men give thousands of dollars to church and charity, but their hearts are devoid of the grace and love and holiness of God. It is much easier to drop a dollar in the collection plate than to right a wrong and confess sin.

Verses 25-28 contain striking word pictures as Christ pointed out the folly of washing the outside of a cup while neglecting the inside. He likened the Pharisees to "whited sepulchres," beautiful on the outside but inwardly full of rotting corpses. What good is such hypocrisy and deception? The day is coming when whited sepulchres shall be opened and secret things revealed.

7. They pretended respect for prophets who had been slain by their forefathers while they hated and persecuted the living prophets (vv. 29-33). Notwithstanding all this, Christ would still send them prophets, Himself being the chief. What wondrous grace in His words! Though the scribes and Pharisees were hypocritical and their intentions evil, He would give them further opportunity to repent. He had called them serpents and vipers—strong language indeed. Yet He still extended mercy.

Christ concluded His message with some of the tenderest, most pathetic words which ever graced His lips, "How often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not!" And here is the most solemn sentence of all: "Behold, your house is left unto you desolate!"

To reject Christ's love means to become desolate. To receive His love means to possess peace that will last forever.

Something You Can Give This Christmas

BESIDES ALL THE GIFTS you will choose this Christmas season, there is something else you can give:

You can give the right-of-way.

This can be the greatest gift of all, for it can mean life for you and your loved ones, and life for a fellowman.

How does one give the right-of-way? What is it that prompts you to put this on your gift list? How much will it cost? What kind of wrapping will you use? When will you give it?

The gift of the right-of-way is a gift of attitude displayed in thought and action on the highways of our land. It is free.

The way you give the right-of-way at Christmas or at any other time of the year is:

To be more considerate of your fellow travelers than you usually are.

To give up your own right-of-way if necessary for the safety of all.

To be humble enough to allow another driver to get ahead on the road.

To be alert to all situations so you can make quick decision, when needed.

To give the other driver the benefit of the doubt. Giving the right-of-way is, in essence, trying to understand the other driver—his needs and the pressures



which may be upon him—even though you have never met him. It is a willingness to give up your own way for his way.

The law tells you when to yield the right-of-way, but it's something you must *want* to give. How about putting it at the top of your Christmas list?

SIN WAS MY FULL-TIME JOB

THANK GOD for lifting me out of the dark depths of sin into the sunlight of His wonderful love. With the Psalmist I would say:

"He inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings.

"And he hath put a new song in my mouth, even praise unto our God: many shall see it and fear, and shall trust in the Lord" (Psalm 40:1-3).

I am giving my testimony in the hope that those who read it may know that God is still able to reach down and save the most sinful soul and to set his feet on the path of life.

When I graduated from college, I looked around for the shortest possible route to the top of the ladder of success. Satan was close by to lend a hand, and a compromise here and there led me to become involved with certain elements of organized crime.

SEVEN OUT OF EIGHT CHRISTIANS in the world are without a New Testament, reports the American Bible Society. The Society is doing its best to get New Testaments and Bibles into the hands of many of these Christians as well as into the hands of the unsaved at home and abroad. Where people cannot afford to pay for Scriptures, the Society is able to provide some free of charge. In other cases the price is very low-often less than printing costs.

The Society's work has been of great assistance to our home missionaries among American Indians and Eskimos. Our foreign language groups have also received Scriptures for distribution.

Working with the Wycliffe Translators, ABS is providing the Scriptures in several Indian and Eskimo languages. The New Testament is now available in the Apache, Cheyenne, and Navaho languages. The Navaho New Testament, first printed in its entirety in 1956, was reedited in 1959. Members of Assemblies of God churches

on the San Carlos and Fort Apache reservations in Arizona helped Wycliffe Bible Translators translate the New Testament into Apache. Some members of our Navaho churches have also been helpful in translating their Scriptures.

Besides the New Testament, evangelical missionaries have translated Genesis, Exodus, Joshua, Ruth, Psalms, and Jonah into Navaho.

ABS also provides finger-fono kits for the Indian and Eskimo people. Each kit includes, along with the handoperated phonograph, records of Bible portions and books corresponding with the content of the records. One of our Indian Christians did much of the recording in the Apache language.

Our missionaries find the finger-fonos most helpful in teaching the Indian people to read the Bible. The Indians follow the recording in books provided by the Society.

Some American Indians read English, and ABS has provided many English Bibles and New Testaments for distribution by our missionaries.

There are 35 languages spoken by Indians in the United States in which some part of the Scripture has been published. Some Indian languages in which the Scriptures are in current use are Apache, Cherokee, Chevenne, Choctaw, Iroquois, Muskogee, Navaho, and Ojibwa.

Our missionaries to Spanish-speaking Yaqui, Pima, and Papago Indians in the U.S. are grateful for the Spanish Bibles they receive from the Society for dis-

tribution to their people. Most of these people could not afford Bibles otherwise.

Our Spanish-speaking branches have received assistance from ABS with Spanish Bibles and Gospels. The Society has also made Gospel portions available for Cuban refugees now residing in Florida and other states. The Assemblies of God operates the Evangelical Refugee Center in Miami.

The Bible Society publishes some part of the Scriptures in five Eskimo languages. Missionaries report that the Bibles provided by ABS in Alaska have been a great blessing. Not many of the Eskimos can read well, but by following the Scripture as the missionaries read it aloud, they are learning to understand portions for themselves.

The Books of Mark, John, Romans, James, Ephesians, and First John have been translated into the Point Barrow (Alaska) Eskimo dialect. People in Point Barrow pay only 50c per copy; if they cannot afford this the books are free. The whole New Testament will soon be available in printed form. In 1956, ABS published the New Testament which had been translated by Ferdinand Drevert, a Moravian missionary, for the 6,000 Kuskokwim Indians of Alaska.

Prison chaplains request Bibles, New Testaments, and

This Jewess wanted a true meaning of life

I WOULD LIKE TO SHARE a blessed experience I had in a Jewish home a few weeks ago.

A Jewish lady had written to me saying, "I read your little booklet, *Through Tears to Eternal Joy*, and at first pity filled my heart. I thought, *Another Jewish soul gone astray; another Jewess captured by the Gentile god!* However, my reading in your booklet about your deliverance (as you call it) from gambling prompted this letter.

"May I ask you a question? Is it possible for me to be delivered without sacrificing my Jewish *belief* in *my God*? In other words, could I be converted, I mean delivered, from gambling without being converted?

"I shared your booklet with two of my friends who also desire to be delivered from gambling. Would you be kind enough to accept my invitation and come to my house for lunch so that my friends and I may meet you personally and discuss this subject?"

Of course, I was delighted to accept her invitation; and two days later I found myself involved in one of the most blessed experiences of my life. special portions of Scripture from the American Bible Society for the nearly three million persons on whom prison doors swing shut each year. At present the Society is able to supply less than 25 percent of these requests.

ABS supplies the Prison Division of the Home Missions Department with quantities of Bible portions for distribution to prisoners. We also receive a 25 percent discount on Bibles and New Testaments we give to inmates. We dispense about 1,500 Bibles and Testaments a year in this way.

ABS is supplying Scripture passages in Braille for sightless children and adults, and Talking Bible Records for those who cannot read with their fingertips. The complete Bible in Braille comes in 20 volumes and weighs 90 pounds. It takes five and a half feet of shelf space. Ordinarily the Braille Bible costs \$90, but ABS sends one free to any blind person who needs a Bible and whose name is sent to them.

The Home Missions Department is happy to take this occasion of Universal Bible Sunday to say a hearty thank you for the great work of the American Bible Society and for the liberal assistance it has given our Assemblies of God missionaries in spreading the Light in the homeland.

When I arrived in her home, I was graciously received by the hostess and by her friends as well. I had never before seen such eagerness to listen to God's Word and to the testimony of His saving grace.

I testified and read the Word to them for four hours because their famished hearts were urging me on and on. Finally my hostess interrupted and said to me, "Frieda Neuhaus, I must confess that when I read your testimony, an inward battle began to rage. I lost my rest, and I am the most miserable person in the world."

When she finished, her colored maid, weeping and praising the Lord, rushed in from the kitchen with her hands raised. The colored woman's tears flowed freely as she put her arms around me and said, "Oh, Sister Neuhaus, the Lord answered my prayers in sending you here. I have been praying for my lady a long time. I prayed the Lord would send someone of the Jewish race to witness to her. I prayed and fasted for the Lord to save her soul. It was I who gave her your testimony. Thank God, He sent you here. I know she will be saved!"

When these Jewish women saw and heard this unusual plea, they began to cry and asked, "How can one believe like this?" Oh, how I wish you could have been with us to see the moving of God's Spirit in our midst! The women were mightily convicted of sin by the Holy Spirit. As I recited the sinner's prayer from Psalm 51, they repeated after me with all their hearts, "Have mercy upon me, O God, according to Thy loving kindness: according unto the multitude of Thy tender mercies blot out my transgressions."

And so, by faith in the blood of Jesus they were filled with rejoicing. Hallelujah! They had found freedom from sin. As one of them testified, "At last I have found a true meaning of life. I have found a deep satisfaction in Jesus."

Pray for these Jewish converts that they may grow in grace and in the knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The National Home Missions Department makes these guides available in Braille without cost to the blind. (The American Bible Society provides free Bibles in Braille for the blind.)

Table calendars will be available. These are especially convenient for families following the program.

Many of our churches will give members and friends an opportunity to sign pledges to read the Bible through under the two-year program. Those who read the Bible through will find it a rewarding experience.

Another feature of the *Read the Word* program is a suggested doctrinal verse to memorize each week. These will be listed in *The Pentecostal Evangel*, and *God's Word for Today*, as well as on the table calendar, in the Braille Reading Guide, and in other publications. The 104 verses cover all the major doctrines of the Bible. If faithfully memorized, they will add greatly to one's ability to give "a reason for the hope that is in you."

If you have already read the Bible through in the King James Version, you might consider reading it in one of the other versions available. *The New English Bible, The Amplified Bible,* and others offer the same message but in current English.

WHY READ THE WORD?

In an article^{*}, "Some of My Bible Reading Habits," *Revivaltime* Speaker C. M. Ward gives some good reasons and methods for reading the Word:

"I love to read the Bible. It fascinates me. I wear out a Bible every three or four years from usage.

"First and foremost, I read the Bible as I would any book, magazine, or paper of interest—for news, for discovery. I am always finding up-to-date penetration. I call it, 'Today's headlines written yesterday.' The Bible is never a relic to me. It is a 'lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path.' The Author made it fascinating reading. Nothing in the world of literature has ever approached its interest....

"Second, I read my Bible for God's message to me, and through me as well. In this I seek definite guidance from the Spirit, asking for 'catch things' to direct me. It is said that 'the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip.' I know by experience that it is possible for the Spirit to catch my interest, to carry me away so I am temporarily lost to everything else. I have been in this condition at times for several hours, deeply enmeshed in the truth of God's Word....

"And, of course, I study the Bible. I do this in several ways, ways that suit me. Others must find their own personal habits.

"I study the Bible as a Sunday school teacher. I have taught for many years. Since lessons are planned for a seven-year cycle, this leads me in a systematic, wellrounded course of study. It affords me a course of expository study, a theme based on verse-by-verse continuity. I know that should Jesus tarry and spare me, I will have covered the central truths of God's Word seven times in 50 years. When I stand before my God at judgment and am asked, 'Did you study My Book while you were on earth?' I want to be able to reply in the affirmative....

"I also study the Bible with a doctrinal inquiry especially the majestic doctrine of salvation. The gospel is like a magnificent gem with myriad shafts of light. I am anxious to explore each shaft. The answers to the eternal, lingering questions spawned in each imperishable soul are in the great doctrines of the Church. These doctrines are the Church's denial to the gates of hell. They are the levee against the erosion of a world system. They are the bulwark between the image of God and animalism....

"Finally, I study the Bible through the messages of others. That is why I need a pastor—his Sunday morning exposition of the Word; his Sunday night glimpse into humanity's hunger and thirst for the Bread of life and the Water which satisfies; his continued and planned studies in some section of the Word during the midweek Bible study.

"And what is true of my pastor is true of every minister I hear. I want his knowledge of the Word to increase mine. I want his discoveries to excite me to new adventures in the Bible. I want to go to service not to be amused or entertained, but to learn.

"Yes, I'm at it every day! And I've made just enough progress to make me want to venture farther and farther into the Book of books."

ENROLLMENT INCREASE REPORTED

Total enrollment in Assemblies of God colleges for the fall semester 1966 reached 4,551. This is an increase of 12.7 percent over 1965 and is the 11th consecutive year the department has reported an increase.

The freshman class leads in the number of students with 2,065. There are 1,143 sophomores, 673 juniors, and 523 seniors in Assemblies of God colleges this year. A faculty of 270 serves this host of young people.

The school with the largest enrollment is Evangel College, Springfield, Mo., with 820 students.

Enrollment figures for the other schools are: Bethany Bible College, 451; Central Bible College, 680; North Central Bible College, 421; Northeast Bible Institute, 214: Northwest College of the Assemblies of God, 460; South-Eastern Bible College, 456; Southern California College, 504; and Southwestern Assemblies of God College, 545.

A music survey was conducted to determine the musical needs of our fellowship. As a result of this and other surveys, further items

were produced including chorus | named. A music ministry bureau books, instrumental music, and numerous choir arrangements.

Through the work of Brother Anderson and a capable staff the program of the Music Division expanded rapidly to include sheet music (over 100 titles published to date) and books of vocal solos, duets, trios, and quartets. Easter and Christmas cantatas were produced, as well as anthems, and several arrangements for trumpet trios.

Other publications of the Music Division are orchestrations for various instrumental ensembles, and orchestrations of "Melodies of Praise" for a complete orchestra. The "Melody" trademark has become well known throughout sacred music circles.

A national music conference has been held annually since 1963. District music directors have been Mo. 65802

has been set up to assist churches in securing music directors.

One of the latest developments in the Music Division is the introduction of sacred recordings. Thus far two recordings have been produced under the "Melody" label.

Bert Webb, executive director of the Music Division, states that no successor to Brother Anderson has yet been named but further development of the Music Division's ministry is envisioned. Future plans call for a children's songbook for use in children's church, Sunday school, etc., as well as additional choir books and another book of trio and quartet arrangements.
