A CAMP MEETING SERMON

PSALM 61 WAS THE CRY of David's heart at the time of Absalom's rebellion and Ahithophel's treachery. David had fled from Jerusalem to Mahanaim east of Jordan and was in exile when he wrote:

"From the end of the earth will I cry unto thee, when my heart is overwhelmed: lead me to the rock that is higher than I."

One translation reads, "Lead me to the rock that is too high for me."

But how can we put our feet on a rock that is too high for us? Simply because God is there beside that rock to pick us up and put us up on it when we cannot get on it ourselves.

Have you ever felt like praying, "Lead me to the rock that is too high for me, and then pick me up and put me on it, Lord, because I can't get on it by myself"?

Let us think for a few moments of what it means to be overwhelmed. David's son had raised an army against him, but David was still strong. He could have raised an army and gone against Absalom, but he did not want to lift his hand against his own son. He turned to God.

Are you letting circumstances get you down, circumstances where you live or where you work? Do they press in upon your soul until you are overwhelmed and feel it is no use to persevere in the Christian faith? Do you bring these circumstances to church and often miss God's Word and the Spirit's power and blessing because of them? Does business crowd in upon you to the extent that Christ has been given a secondary place in your time and affection?

There may be a mother who has become overwhelmed by home responsibilities. I know of no more exacting job than that of a housewife. I have said to my wife more than once, "Thank God I was born a man." When she was sick and I had to take over housekeeping, cooking and washing, I was ready in a few days to turn the job back to her.

There may be young people who have become overwhelmed by the dark outlook of this present age. You have certainly entered life's arena when the fight is at its height and clouds are settling down upon the nations of the earth, but I also believe there is a greater challenge to serve Christ than there has been at any other time since our Lord went back to heaven. Yours is a glorious day. Instead of being overwhelmed by the darkness that is covering the face of the earth, look up to heaven. Ask God to lift you up and put you on the rock that is higher than you are and make out of you a vessel of honor in the house of God.

Perhaps there is someone that is overwhelmed in the service of the Lord. I knew a young man who pastored a church in the hills of West Virginia. It was a church that voted on its pastor every year. Things had been going well as far as he knew, so the night of the business meeting he decided just to let them conduct it. He walked outside of the church and waited for them to come back and tell him he had been elected to serve for another year. But there was one person in the meeting who got up and spoke against him because of his youth. She said that he was not able to give them the leadership they needed, and that they required spiritual food he could not give them. (How can a young man get experience and learn to minister God's Word if somebody is not willing to sit and listen to his first sermons? Whenever I go back and see some of the people that listened to me in the earlier years of my ministry, I feel like putting my arms around them and thanking them for tolerating me.)

This young man went back inside and found he was out of a pastorate. He became overwhelmed and left the ministry.

How different his life could have been had he cried to the Lord, "I am in a circumstance that I cannot pull myself out of, but won't you take hold of me and pull me out and put me upon the rock?"

I have had to pray this kind of a prayer more than once.

You may be a Sunday school teacher, a Bible class leader, a minister, or even a missionary that has been overwhelmed by circumstances you didn't count on.

A teacher came to me once. "I'm all through," she blurted. "I can't teach that class any longer: they won't behave."

Yes, it's possible to be overwhelmed in the service of God. It may be that we are overwhelmed from the pressure of the enemy. Or it may be through the indifference on the part of those to whom we minister. It may be that we are overwhelmed because we are leaning too much on everything and everybody else instead of on the Lord. If we don't wait in His presence and pray and seek the face of God, the quality of our ministry gets a little thin and we find ourselves becoming overwhelmed.

King David once said, "If I just had the wings of the morning, I'd fly from this circumstance and go to some island in the middle of the sea where they couldn't find me."

Then all at once it dawned on him that it didn't matter where he went—God would be there too. You can't get away from Him. You can leave the church where you have been worshiping because things did not go as you thought they should, or your preacher didn't

preach the way you wanted him to preach, but you can't get away from God and you can't get away from yourself.

This ministry sometimes saps your physical, mental, moral and spiritual strength until you feel like an old dishrag, all wrung out. Think of the prophet Elijah who stood alone against 450 prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel. After a great victory, with the anointing of God upon him, he killed the enemies of God. He told Ahab that the storm was coming, and was even caught up by the Spirit and went to the city and got there first. Then when he heard that Jezebel was going to kill him, the anointing somehow lifted and he was just Elijah! He was no longer Elijah the prophet; he was just Elijah the man, and he ran from the city and went out on a mountainside and hid there and began to pray that the Lord would let him die. But Elijah didn't mean that anymore than you mean some of the prayers you pray. If he had really wanted to die, all he had to do was stay in the city and Jezebel would have taken care of it! But you see, when we are overwhelmed, sometimes we become fussy in our spirits. We complain about life, we complain about other people, we criticize our leaders and other church people, we feel everything's wrong.

When I know people are not themselves and they are speaking out of a frustrated spirit, I pray for God to give me grace not to judge them at that time. I know that if they ever get around to praying to the Lord to lift them up and put them on a rock so they can see those circumstances as God sees them, they will no longer complain about their lot. They'll work in harmony with the people of God.

The Lord broke up Elijah's prayer meeting by giving him work to do. There are times to pray, then there are times to get up off our knees and get busy about the King's business. There are things to be done; there is a ministry to be performed.

If you are a discouraged Sunday school teacher and



you feel that your class does not pay any attention to you and you are not getting the message across to them, get up next week after you have had a time of prayer and ask God to put you on a rock. Go visit those pupils and let them know that you love them and are concerned about them. You will soon find a different atmosphere in your class.

May I ask you as a Christian, have you discovered the "rest" in the word "wrestling"? Have you learned to rest in the midst of wrestling? And though we wrestle not against flesh and blood but against principalities and powers and spiritual wickedness in high or heavenly places, you and I need to rest in the midst of our wrestling. Like the eye in the middle of a hurricane, there is a place in God where you can rest in the midst of the battle.

It may be that your husband or wife, or the one you work with on the job, is your overwhelming problem. Pray, "Lord, lift me to the rock that is higher than I." Or perhaps you are overcome by temptation and sin. The Samaritan woman came out in the heat of the day because she didn't want to meet the others who came to the same well to draw water. She was ashamed of her past. As she drew near the well one day she saw a young Jew sitting there. When the Jew turned and asked her for a drink of water, she got the shock of her life.

She said, "I'm surprised, you a Jew asking for water from a Samaritan woman."

And He said, "If you just knew who it is that speaks to you, you would ask me for a drink of water. And once you drank of that water you would never thirst again. The thing that has put you where you are is the thirst that you have. You've tried to satisfy it with other things, but you haven't had a drink from my well yet. If you would just believe on me, I could put something into your life that would be a fountain of living water springing up unto life everlasting."

She didn't know what it all meant, but she said, "Give me then some of that water to drink."

Jesus lifted her up on a rock that was higher than she was, and the woman who had been ashamed to face her neighbors ran down into the city and told everybody to come and see a man who told her everything that she had ever done. What had happened was that she had been put on a rock that was higher than she was. She had prayed to the Lord and He had lifted her up.

Whatever your need is, whatever has overwhelmed you, there is One who waits for your cry. He is saying to you, "If you will call on me, I will answer you and I will show you great and mighty things which you don't know. For I am able to do the exceeding abundant above all that you are able to ask or think; but I limit my power to your willingness to give yourself to me and let my power work in you."

God has thus limited Himself. But once you open your life as David did, as the woman at the well did, and as millions and millions of people have done since our Lord went to Calvary, He will lift you above everything that has overwhelmed you and will put you on a rock.

Run For Your Life

SOMETIMES THE ONLY WAY to win a battle with temptation is to run from it. That may sound like a cowardly thing to do, but actually it's the scriptural course of action.

One of the grandest verses in the Bible is 1 Corinthians 10:13 and it tells us that when we are severely tempted we should look for a way of escape. It states that God will not let us be tempted beyond our ability "but will, with the temptation, also provide a way of escape, that ye may be able to bear it.'

It is true, the Word says we should "resist the devil," but wisdom is the greater part of valor. It's better to withdraw from a hopeless situation than to perish and never fight again. Wellington is quoted as saying, "The best general is he who knows when and how to conduct a retreat."

There is a mark on the bow of merchant ships just above the waterline to indicate how heavily they can be loaded. If a ship is weighted down beyond that maximum load mark it isn't safe. The Lord knows exactly how much temptation each of us can stand, and He doesn't ask us to face any situation we cannot handle.

Since He told us to pray, "Lead us not into temptation," we know He never leads us into circumstances where we are tempted to sin. Instead He directs us to withdraw from dangerous places, persons, and practices. "Enter not into the path of the wicked, and go not in the way of evil men. Avoid it, pass not by it, turn from it, and pass away" (Proverbs 4:14, 15). One of the secrets of victorious Christian living is in deliberately avoiding temptation.

Some Christians are not doing this. They are deliberately exposing their souls to danger by running with the wrong crowd, reading the wrong kind of magazines, indulging in the wrong pleasures. They are tempting the Lord-acting as foolishly as the little boy who put his fingers in the flame and prayed they wouldn't get burnt!

They need to learn a lesson from Jesus who said to the tempter, "Get thee behind me, Satan." In other words, He turned His back on the devil.

The Bible says, "Flee youthful lusts" (2 Timothy 2:22). "Flee fornication" (1 Corinthians 6:18). "Flee from idolatry" (1 Corinthians 10:14). Some may call this an escapist philosophy, but it's better to run and live than to stay and fall into sin.

Joseph ran for his life. When his master's wife tried to seduce him, he fled from the scene of temptation. He was not a weak man running from a duty but a strong man running from sin.

Everyone is tempted one way or another. There's no sin in being tempted. Sin comes when we yield to the temptation. But we don't have to yield-there's always a way of escape, if we'll take it. The wise old Negro Christian said, "When I pass a watermelon patch, I can't keep my mouth from watering, but I can run."

God's wrath is about to be poured out upon a wicked world, as surely as it fell upon Sodom and Gomorrah. There was a righteous family in Sodom. The Lord did not want this family of Lot to perish with the wicked, so He said to Lot, "Escape for thy life." He is saying to us, "Run for your life. Come out from among the wicked, and be separate. Have nothing to do with the ways of this impure world. Keep yourself clean, and I will preserve you, and you shall live with me forever."

In the day of judgment, those who have not run from sin will run into the caves, hoping to hide from the divine anger, but it will be in vain. Now is the time to run-from sin to God-if you want to escape the judgment that is coming. -R.C.C.

T HE MARTYRDOM OF STEPHEN and the persecution of the saints that followed served to get the lay-Christians, the amateurs, out of Jerusalem and on the move (Acts 8:1; 11:19). It had been seven years since Pentecost, and they had been around the home church long enough.

The term *scattered*, which occurs three times in the early chapters of Acts, is taken from the Greek word *diaspeiro* (to scatter like grain). The grain in this case was the seed of the Church—the disciples.

The Book of Acts is a thrilling record of the conquest of Christianity throughout the Mediterranean countries. However, not all the credit for these victories belongs to the chief apostles; much of it goes to the amateurs. An amateur athlete enters a contest because of his love for it, not for personal gain. The amateur evangelist enters the field of Christian witness for love of Christ and His cause.

One of the early amateurs had an urge to go to Samaria. It was obvious right off that he was a novice. No experienced Jewish apostle would have gone to Samaria to hold a revival, what with the prejudice and ill-feeling between the two groups. However, the deacon-turned-evangelist felt that his six colleagues were enough to look after the indigent saints in Jerusalem. To Philip, the Lord's command, "Preach the gospel to every creature," included the Samaritans.

For an amateur he had quite a revival. It stirred the entire city. Then this layman got another call. This time an angel told him to take the road southward into the desert. (Where are all the directing angels these days? Maybe if there were more amateurs willing to go, there would be more heavenly messengers to direct them to the next field of labor.) Philip obeyed the angel, even though it meant leaving a good revival. That was one of the characteristics of those inexperienced laymen: they went ahead with a blissful unawareness of impossibilities and with simple faith in Christ accomplished things.

Who were they? Just ordinary believers with ordinary talents, from the rank and file. Their names are recorded in the Heavenly Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Some of them, or at least some of their converts, may be identified in Romans 16. The third verse gives quite an insight into the character of these dedicated laymen: "Give my greetings to Priscilla and Aquila, my fellow-workers in Christ Jesus, who risked their lives, endangering their very necks—for my life" (A.N.T.). In verse after verse Paul commends these workers for their "labor" and "work in the Lord."

The word *amateur* is derived from the Latin *amator*, meaning "lover." These disciples fit the description. They risked their lives for love of the brethren and worked without thought of reward because of their love for Christ. Amateurs indeed!

They were seldom hampered by prejudice and Jewish tradition. "Some of them were men of Cyprus and Cyrene, which, when they were come to Antioch, spake unto the Grecians, preaching the Lord Jesus" (Acts 11:20). These Greeks were Gentiles, not Greek-speaking Jews. The church at Antioch was a strong church, second only to the assembly in Jerusalem. It had a number of apostles and prophets among its worshipers.

Who but inexperienced amateurs would have gone to that city to hold a revival? Yet to the Greek quarters they went with the message of salvation. "The hand of the Lord was with them; and a great number believed, and turned to the Lord."

News of this revival disturbed the elders back in Jerusalem, and they sent Barnabas to investigate. But then, Barnabas was more or less an amateur too. Seeing how God had poured out His Spirit upon the meeting, he got blessed and exhorted the Gentile converts "that with purpose of heart they would cleave unto the Lord."

No doubt his report to the apostles in Jerusalem was favorable, assuring them that everything in Antioch was under control, and that souls were being saved even if they were Gentiles.

Perhaps it crossed his mind that he too might have to face the credentials committee when he returned to headquarters—as Peter had done some time previously

for ministering to the household of Cornelius. If so, he did not let the thought bother him.

An amateur, like young David, cannot do battle clad in the armor of the seasoned professional, and he knows it. But let him go forth with the sling of faith and the stones of confidence, and no giant can stand against him.

In the early days of the twentieth-century Pentecostal outpouring it was the amateurs, the laymen, who carried the message throughout the United States and into foreign lands. We thank God for the experienced leadership that has developed as the movement has grown and matured, and for our full-time evangelists, but they cannot carry all the load. The church needs more amateurs—laymen who feel a sense of personal responsibility for the lost and who witness wherever they go because they are constrained by love.



IFE OFFERS MANY THINGS we simply can't afford in terms of either time, money, or effort. We know the possibility of going financially bankrupt, but it is also possible to go broke mentally, physically, and spiritually through unwise use of time, talents, and energies.

A 28-year-old father of three small children could have been transferred to another state along with others in .his company. He declined.

"It would have meant considerably more money than I am earning right now," he reflected. "But I would have been separated from my wife and family for months at a time."

He decided he couldn't afford to miss seeing his children grow up.

Parents sometimes discover too late that they made decisions, wasted time, or fostered attitudes they couldn't afford.

For a long time a mother, whom we shall call Nelda Anderson, blamed her poor disposition on the fact that she was overweight. Her husband was a traveling salesman, out of town more than he was at home. Their two children, Lucy, 12, and Mike, 15, were involved in church activities along with their mother, and the Andersons were considered a good Christian family.

But Nelda was a complainer. She grumbled about the church finances. She fussed about the sermons. She criticized the church soloist. The ushers were lazy. The minister's wife was too active. Of course, Nelda's neighbors were no good either. They didn't bring up their children right. Their yards were a mess. And she was sure they were gossiping about her.

Nelda tried to appease her gnawing resentment against the world by eating more, and her weight problem increased. Her husband began to spend even more time away from home, for Nelda's complaints exhausted him.

Her children reflected her attitude, and Lucy developed a scowl like her mother's. She found Nelda a good listener for complaints against the church youth leader. When the girl didn't get a front seat in the youth choir, she made up stories about some of the young people in it, influencing others to quit with her. Like his father, Mike soon found refuge outside the home. But he and his companions didn't take out their grudges against the world in mere words. Starting with small deceits such as skipping school, they worked their way up to shoplifting and joyriding in stolen cars.

When Nelda's pastor counseled her about her problem, she recognized and admitted she could not afford to continue to influence her children to be complainers and critics. But this hasn't changed their course. It may be too late.

John Matthews (this is not his real name) was considered a fine Christian man in his community. He was the first to volunteer for all worthy projects. His name was well known in business circles, and in the church John was something like a pillar.

But John wore his Christianity like a coat. At home he took it off. There he was his real self. He often bragged about the way he had "pulled a fast one" on his boss and joked about the pencils, stationery, tools, etc., he had pilfered from his company.

This bighearted public benefactor was a tyrant at home, and his wife and four children bore the brunt of his meanness.

John is paying dearly for this reckless investment of his life and influence. His children have discovered that the saint-and-sinner routine lets them get away with all kinds of poor heart attitudes. Hypocrisy has become their way of life.

"John knows he can't afford this," Mrs. Matthews confided to her pastor. "But somehow he feels that his goodness cancels out the bad, and hopes for the best."

Parents can't afford to neglect giving their children a clear-cut set of values. If we fail to do this when they are growing up, we will regret it. When her son was drafted recently, a mother became hysterical. "He is only 19!" she cried. "He is not ready to meet life on a battlefield."

We all hate war. But this mother's statement echoes what many parents fear about their young people in general. Some fear their sons and daughters are not quite ready to meet life on a college campus, or hold a job, or fulfill the demands of marriage. But why aren't they ready? How many years does the parent have to get the job done? Some sociologists say that by the time a child is 12 he has all the character traits he will ever have in a lifetime. What goes into his life from then on is only an increase or decrease of the traits that are there.

In preparing our children to face life—and death we can't afford to waste time. Have you ever told yourself you don't have time for family prayer and Bible reading? Someday you may wish you had found time to afford that special privilege. It is a great comfort in the hour of trial, separation, and sorrow. You can't afford not to give this source of strength to your children.

"I knew my mother was praying for me the day I was wounded," a soldier wrote his minister from a Vietnam hospital station. "We used to pray every night just before the supper hour at home. It is just natural for me to take the time to talk with God when the sun goes down over here. I've always done it."

Establishing communications between a family and their God is a parental responsibility. It is a high privilege to lead your own child to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. You can't afford to hope someone else will do it.

A couple we shall call Herb and Verna Johnson were actually so busy in church work that they had little time for their son Allen. Somehow they hardly noticed when he slipped away and into the wrong crowd.

"I hate that church," Allen spat with vengeance in a private talk with his probation officer. "My folks practically live there. They don't care whether I live or die, just so I sit somewhere in one of those pews and don't disturb them."

"You would almost think that going to one of my school functions was something sinful," the boy continued painfully. "My parents never came to any of mine. I played a solo with our concert band once, but they never heard it. I won the district speech championship. I was the only contestant who did not have a parent there. They even missed my baccalaureate service...."

At 19, Allen got the attention he longed for by becoming a drug addict and stealing narcotics. His mother and father realize sadly that they could not afford to neglect their son. But it is too late. Allen doesn't want their help now. He is making his own decisions. One of them is to avoid church and to leave God out of his life. This is an extreme case, but it should stand as a warning to parents that we can't afford to neglect our parental responsibility for any reason.

The list of things Christian parents can't afford is long and varied. It will pay to check up on your own use of time, money, and influence where your children are concerned. Perhaps there are things you can't afford, lest you lose your children in the bargain.

As a Christian you are responsible to bring up your children to be good Christians, good citizens, and good parents of the future. The best way to do this is by setting them an impeccable example of what Christ wants them to be.



What do you think of the theory of final reconciliation, which does away with the idea of an eternal hell?

Sinners who wish to persist in their sins like to hear a gospel which says they can be saved in the hereafter. It makes them feel they can reject salvation now but be sure of it in eternity.

The Bible says, "It is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment" (Hebrews 9:27). "Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2). The Bible also speaks of a time when the Son of man shall come in His glory and all nations will be gathered before Him. He will separate them one from another. The wicked "shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal" (Matthew 25:46).

In Exodus 20:5 God says he visits the iniquity of the fathers upon the children. Does this mean that innocent children must bear the guilt for what their fathers have done?

According to Ezekiel 18:20, "The son shall not bear the iniquity of the father, neither shall the father bear the iniquity of the son." "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." Children who have not sinned as their fathers have will not have to bear the judgment for their fathers' sins. But children naturally suffer many things in this life because their parents sin, even though they do not share their guilt.

In 1 Corinthians 14:18, Paul said, "I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all." He also said, in verse 22, "Tongues are for a sign," a sign to unbelievers; but he added that if all speak with tongues, unbelievers will say, "Ye are mad." These references seem contradictory. Can you clear this up?

The believers at Corinth were abusing a precious gift by unregulated speaking in tongues in their public meetings. Paul would have them know he was not opposed to speaking in tongues, for he spoke in tongues more than any of them. Yet he said that in the church he would rather speak five words with his understanding, that he might teach others, than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue (v, 19).

In 1 Corinthians 14:22-25 he explained that speaking in tongues was not merely a novelty but a sign of God's presence and working. He warned, however, that if everyone spoke in tongues, the unbeliever who comes into the meeting would only see confusion.

The languages spoken in Acts 2:8 were understood, but as a general rule speaking with tongues is not understood unless it is interpreted. Therefore, much of our speaking in tongues should be done in private. Those who speak in tongues in a public meeting should pray that they also might interpret (1 Corinthians 14:27,28).

CONGRATULATIONS, GRADUATE! You are to be commended for your accomplishments.

But what about the future? Choosing college or a career is a big step, and your decision may take you into a completely different environment. In your adjustment to a new way of life, it may become easy to neglect your spiritual life. It can happen so gradually you scarcely realize other activities have taken the place of the close presence of Christ in your life. This need not happen!

Following are some suggestions to help you maintain a vibrant, aggressive Christian life in the face of these new challenges.

Develop devotional habits. I recently observed a teenage romance blossom and then die. The young couple had pledged their loyalty for the rest of their lives. Then the girl and her family moved away. The letters were frequent at first but they became fewer and fewer. One day the news came that the girl who had promised her love forever had found another boy.

What had happened? Because they were apart, there was no opportunity to talk to each other or to share their lives. As a result, new people and interests replaced their close relationship.

This may happen to your friendship with Christ. Regardless of how close you are to Him now, you must communicate daily or new interests will take the place of this valued friendship. No friendship can survive without communication, and God cannot talk to you unless you stop long enough to listen and respond.

Setting aside time for personal prayer and Bible study is, I suppose, one of the most difficult habits to form. We are always too busy or too tired. But this daily encounter with Christ is not optional; it is the lifeline of Christian strength.

Choose friends carefully. You have often heard, "You can tell what a person is by the company he keeps." This is true because most people have friends who are like themselves. A Christian, of course, must be friendly to everyone; but when picking those special friends,

it is important to choose wisely. Because friends influence your attitudes, it is best to choose close friends among Christians. As fellow Christians, your activities and goals will be similar, and the fellowship will be an encouragement.

This does not mean you should not have friends outside Christian circles. An effective way to witness for Christ is to be friendly to the unsaved, win their confidence, and show through your life what Christ can do for them. Christ Himself was often found among the sinners. When rebuked by the scribes and Pharisees, He answered, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."

But in any friendship with the unsaved, always remember that your goal is to lead them to Christ. The first indication that they are influencing you away from Christ should be the danger signal. With an open heart before God reevaluate your purpose and actions. You may find it necessary to relax the friendship and spend more time with other Christians.

Learn to say no. Many young people are afraid to do this. They are afraid of what the crowd will say, what it will do to their social standing, and what their friends will think. It takes a special kind of courage to say no. It can mean the difference in losing your purity, your Christian testimony, and your self-respect.

Never say no with a "better-than-thou" attitude. Neither should you hang your head as in shame when you find it necessary to refuse an invitation. A Christlike attitude is essential. Sometimes simply saying, "No, thank you," is enough. At other times an explanation of your refusal may be the opportunity for witness you have been waiting for.

Even when saying no you can let others see by your life that there is far more positive than negative in Christian living.

Find a church home. If you are going away for college or employment, the adjustment may be quite difficult. The strength of your family and church will seem far removed. No one will know what you are doing. You will be faced with new ideas and moral concepts coming from people who would destroy your faith in God. These circumstances can make temptations harder than ever to turn aside.

One of the greatest helps will be to find a church where you feel you can belong and have a part in the ministry. It is easy to be a drifter and never really become involved in a church, but responsibility and ministry to others will help you grow spiritually.

Ministry encourages spiritual growth through personal blessing and uplift. Have you ever felt depressed and discouraged, and then visited someone in the hospital? Didn't you come away feeling you were the one who had been blessed rather than the one who was a blessing? You always reap benefit from helping someone else and this is an excellent cure of homesickness.

You've come a long way through life and have overcome many obstacles. You know a little about what is facing you in the future. Remember the words of God, which are as real to you today as to the Israelites, "Be strong and of good courage, fear not, nor be afraid of them; for the Lord thy God, he it is that doth go with thee; he will not fail thee, nor forsake thee" (Deuteronomy 31:6). A NEW WAY OF LIFE, not creeds, codes or cures, is offered by Philadelphia Teen Challenge workers as they point their "congregation" to the Lord Jesus Christ. Director Robert Bartlett claims Teen Challenge is reaching the *positive* subculture, some of whom live in alleys, on rooftops, or in holes in the wall.

Operating the *Hidden Manna Coffee Shop* in central Philadelphia provides an opportunity for Teen Challenge staff members to mingle with and minister to dope addicts, homosexuals, gang fighters, alcoholics, and other derelicts of society. Coffee, tea, and doughnuts are free. As six or eight workers station themselves at separate tables, they seek to engage their guests in conversation about life in Jesus Christ.

Over 3,000 pass through *Hidden Manna* every year, They come from all religions and cults. Because 50 percent are Jewish, "The Lord our God is one Lord" (Deuteronomy 6:4) is painted on the wall in Hebrew characters together with the Star of David and other Jewish symbols.

The purpose of the coffee shop is "to take the church to young people who do not go to church anywhere." *Hidden Manna* is known as "a beatnik coffee shop," an image it has desired to acquire. Brother Bartlett states the Teen Challenge workers have the respect of those who frequent the place even though the subculture may not agree with their teachings.

Nothing shocks these young staff members anymore, although many of them grew up in a sheltered Christian atmosphere. "Love is a vital healing ingredient, but faith and hope must come large when you get out where there are pain, hurt, and tears—when you see your friend die from an overdose of drugs, and are burdened when another becomes terribly swollen by venereal disease," Bartlett confided in an interview with Herschel O. Engebretson, associate editor of *The Sunday Times*. (Engebretson's article on the Teen Challenge ministry appeared in the February 18 issue of this Christian weekly, formerly called *The Sunday School Times*.)

In his files Bartlett has case histories of dope addicts who are delivered from the habit today. One man was a successful machinist. Although addicted for 15 years, after contacting Teen Challenge members he came off drugs "cold turkey" without the usual withdrawal period or agony. (Sometimes withdrawal accompanied with excruciating pain can last 30 days.) Previously

this man had sought release through medicine and psychiatry, and was in the U. S. Government rehabilitation unit at Lexington, Ky.

Another man, 24 years of age, high on pills and on the verge of suicide, stumbled down the flight of steps at *Hidden Manna* to find complete deliverance. Both of these converts are now attending Bible school.

Bartlett accepts no one at the Center who is not desperate. "Don't expect to be trusted or babied," he warns applicants. "We don't have any easy withdrawal program here. We stop bad habits 'cold turkey.'" However, workers at the Center, many of whom have "kicked" drugs or alcohol themselves, often sit and pray for a couple of days and nights with a newcomer who is going through the agony of withdrawal.

Men and women alike who profess faith in Christ, and who need help to find a new way of life, come to live at the Teen Challenge Center at 1620 N. Broad Street in North Philadelphia. There they conform to a strict schedule of work, prayer, and recreation. In addition they receive follow-up counseling and instruction in the Word of God. One of the Bible study courses furnished by the Prison Division of the Home Missions Department is used. The Center also attempts to rehabilitate converts and guide them into useful lives.

The Center presently has room for 40 fellows, 15 girls, and 3 married couples.

An active ministry among the children in the streets is directed by Norman J. Cole, graduate of Northeast Bible Institute. He and his wife conduct weekly story hours in three areas of North Philadelphia. The Coles plan week-long Kids' Krusades at the conclusion of

each summer and invite parents and older brothers and sisters to attend them.

Besides the story hours, this couple, accompanied by a team of workers, hold evening street-corner rallies with the children. Many times more than 100 children attend these services.

During summer, members of the Philadelphia Teen Challenge minister each Monday night on the boardwalk at Atlantic City in cooperation with ministers of the South Jersey Section of the New Jersey District. The choir, under the direction of Richard Davis, presents a concert. This service includes preaching and testimonies by the workers. Teen Challenge members return on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday of each week to again minister in song and testimony. Large numbers of people from Philadelphia are among the thousands who frequent the Atlantic City area during the summer months. For this reason Teen Challenge uses this opportunity to give the gospel to an otherwise unreached audience.

The Home Missions Department sponsors Teen Challenge Centers in the following cities: Boston, Chicago, Dallas-Fort Worth, Detroit, Los Angeles, New York, Philadelphia, Phoenix, San Francisco, and Seattle.

With the approach of summer each of our ten Teen Challenge Centers will accelerate its program. Scores of Bible school students will join the Teen Challenge staffs to engage in concerted evangelism thrusts. Many of them receive little or no remuneration because of the limited finances of the various Centers. However, their assistance to the Centers is invaluable; their dedication to the work is exemplary.

Your Child and the Christian Camp



"Oh, oh, I was afraid of this! But we'll still be pals no matter who wins." Rain or shine, there's always something to do at camp.

G AMPING IS A PART of the American way of life. More important, Christian camps have been and are a major event in the lives of thousands of boys and girls and youth. Camping is as much a part of their summer as is the Fourth of July.

As a parent, you may be asking, "But why a Christian camp? What does it offer beyond organizational and agency camping?"

The Assemblies of God Youth Camp Commission sets forth these objectives for Boys and Girls and Youth Camps.

1. To provide learning opportunities which will lead the camper to the experience of accepting Christ as Saviour and Lord.

2. To promote the growth of Christian character; encourage Christian living and Christian service.

3. To give instruction concerning the Spirit-filled life and provide opportunities for prayer.

4. To present Bible-centered, life-related lessons.

5. To provide an opportunity to live in the out-ofdoors, gain new knowledge of its resources, and develop skills in using these resources.

6. To enable campers to have a wholesome, happy time.

In a Christian camp, effort is made to bring out Christ in every element of the program. Old lives are made new by the power of the Lord. Some problems can only be solved in real life situations rather than the more formal teaching situation. Camp provides this informal, real life situation. The camp possesses an environment for growth and commitment which is hard to describe and

identify, yet we know it exists because we see the results.

Ask your child about his week at camp. Most likely he will say, "We had fun." This "having fun" may also include his religious experiences. This is how he describes the deep satisfaction he felt when God's presence became very real to him.

Camps are a vital part of the overall Christian outreach to youth. More time is spent in one week at camp than in a whole year at Sunday school. This is consecutive and consistent time, and the impact of these hours can be deep and effective. At camp there is time to deal with campers as individuals; spiritual decisions are encouraged and habits of prayer and Bible reading established. Camp offers a priceless opportunity to show that Christ can be in every phase of living.

Last summer 18,019 teen-agers attended 104 youth camps. Statistics compiled by the National C. A. Department reveal that in these camps 1,777 were saved and 2,489 filled with the Holy Spirit. Camps in the South Texas and Northern California-Nevada Districts earned the Youth Camp Commission certification.

Attendance at boys and girls camps is on the increase. Eighty camps for pre-teens reported 13,169 campers enrolled, 2,092 saved, and 2,198 filled with the Holy Spirit.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS OF THE MISSION FIELD

T HE DAY HAD COME, and we were finally on our way. After waiting all night in the Miami International Airport, we at last heard the announcement that the plane that would take us to the land of our calling was ready to leave. We were very excited, for over 11 years had passed since my husband Charles had received his missionary call to South America.

It was five in the morning when the plane took off, and we felt a little sad as we realized we were leaving our families and friends. Little did we know what was ahead for us as, from sheer exhaustion, we dropped off to sleep.

Our plane arrived in Lima, Peru, three hours behind schedule. Unable to communicate with anyone in Spanish, we had to wait for the officials to find someone who could speak English to tell us that we had missed the flight to La Paz, Bolivia, and that there would not be another for two days. While we rested in Lima, we were privileged to visit with one of our Assemblies of God missionaries, Edith Hall.

The missionaries in La Paz and Santa Cruz, Bolivia, were at the airport when we arrived. We were very thrilled to see the Monroe Grams, the Harold Carpenters, Pearl Estep, Flora Shafer, and Fran Frigoli all waiting there for us even though we were two days late! It was more like a homecoming, because they were to become our family in Bolivia.

The altitude at the La Paz airport is over 13,000 feet, and many people become ill with "altitude sickness." After our rest in Lima, however, we arrived without any ill effects.

The three days spent in La Paz were exciting. Some parts of the city are fairly modern, but most sections are at the other extreme. We had arrived during a week of celebration when the country was inaugurating its new president. All of the city had a festival atmosphere.

While on a tour of La Paz with Monroe and Jane Grams, we drove through a street where drunken Indians were dancing. Some were wearing beautifully decorated costumes that they had rented. This ceremony, called the *Diablada*, is a demonic dancing session in the name of religion. How we longed to tell them of the Saviour's love!

As we left La Paz to fly to Cochabamba, we were amazed at the mountainous scenery below. This trip by plane took less than an hour, but by the road below it stretches into a

long ten-hour trip. The mountains are barren but beautiful.

Dropping down from the mountain ranges into the lush valley of Cochabamba—which itself is over 8,000 feet altitude—we were glad the long journey to our new home was ending. The Ollie Johnston family was there to meet us. They took us home to a lovely dinner and then to the house that they had already rented for us.

We had one week to get settled before language school began. The girl who helped me get the house in order could not understand English, and I could not understand Spanish, so we had some good laughs and some frustration, too. Even in church, my husband and children and I sat without understanding a thing.

We put the girls in a nursery school near where we were studying Spanish. Dianne would get very upset at first because she could not communicate with the neighboring children; but since being in nursery school with both Spanish-speaking children and English-speaking, she is learning Spanish very fast. Charissa seems to think it is something to play with and she is always making up her own Spanish words.

The most difficult adjustments we have faced have been in getting our children settled in their new role in life, and in not being able to express our thoughts and feelings with words to the people around us. Language study is a full-time job, and we are looking forward to the day when we can proclaim the gospel of our Lord to the needy people of Bolivia.

One of the biggest upsets that can happen to a missionary happened just one month from the day we arrived. My father went to be with Jesus on Labor Day. It was impossible to get home in time for the funeral, yet it seemed that even this was the way the Lord had planned. It was amazing to feel His strength during the following days as we continued our language studies.

Cochabamba is a nice town with an ideal climate and many kinds of people. We enjoy living here and appreciate the language school with the Christian atmosphere. Remember us in your prayers as we continue our eight-months course of study.

Church Begun in Bonn Through Tent Meetings

T WAS THE CLIMAX of the preaching service in the tent in Troesdorf, Germany—a town of about 15,000 population near Bonn—when a strong, deep voice from outside the tent began to fume, bluster and rage. There was nothing else to do but close the meeting quickly to prevent distraction.

Pastor Waldemar Sardaczuk went directly outside the tent, and a very large woman approached him, crying: "You are responsible that my husband has become what he now is. He is no longer a man. He doesn't drink... he doesn't smoke...he doesn't get mad and pound the table with his fist." For an hour the woman blustered. Neither the evangelist nor his co-workers could say anything.

A year before this a young man had found the Lord in the tent meetings in Bonn, and he told his fellow workers about his experience. Among those who heard his testimony was this woman's husband. When the tent was set up in Troesdorf that summer he came and accepted the good news of salvation. Such a change took place in his life that his wife was furious.

That night outside the tent she threatened to kill her husband if he continued to come to the meetings. It seemed she could easily do it, for she was so big and he such a thin little man. She even threatened to wreck the tent, but eventually she quieted down and went home.

On two other evenings she came with others to disturb and cause trouble; but God was working in her heart. At last she called for some of the tent workers to visit her, and before long she found her way to the Lord and began attending every possible meeting. Today she is witnessing to her neighbors of what the Lord has done in her family.

In June three years ago Pastor Sardaczuk set up an evangelistic tent in Bonn, the seat of government for Germany. Formerly we had no church in this area, but by the end of that summer a church was established with 35 members. For the past three summers tent meetings have been held with the help of German young people who have offered their vacations in order to join in the meetings, distribute gospel literature, and do house-tohouse visitation.

The tent itself was purchased by the young people in Germany. They raised \$5,000 for the tent and equipment.

The meeting place for the main church in Bonn is completely inadequate. It was a shed between two other buildings. Once hay and animals were kept there but the pastor and people have remodeled it into a meeting hall and small apartment for the pastor. Recently the congregation bought a lot, and plans to build its own church with a seating capacity of several hundred, as soon as funds can be secured. Five outstations have been established.

Among those saved is a young Catholic priest who is zealously witnessing for the Lord. In the last three months 27 members have been added to the church, bringing the total membership to about 120.

B EFORE THE NEW school term opened we began to pray that God would give us a Holy Ghost revival during this year.

The Assemblies of God Industrial School in Shencottah opens its doors each year to more than 90 students from villages all over Madras State. More than 80 percent of the boys come to us from non-Christian homes. Here we seek to prepare them to live useful lives in their communities, and we ask God to help us impart His truth to them.

Just after Christmas we invited two Indian pastors to come and hold daily meetings with the students to prepare them for the revival we expected from God.

The first week of January, Evangelist Quentin Edwards came for a week of special meetings in a large city 40 miles from Shencottah. We traveled there each night and brought Brother Edwards back so he could hold services in the school each morning. God began to move, and two students received the Holy Ghost. At the end of the week 13 were baptized in water.

The third week of January, Evangelist Eddie Wilson came for a campaign in another city about 35 miles distant. He also conducted morning services in our school. By this time the students had begun to fast and pray around the clock. Morning, noon, and night they were giving their hearts to Christ and receiving the baptism in the Holy Spirit.

Pentecostal fire continued to fall and by the end of January, 32 had received the baptism in the Holy Spirit and an equal number had been baptized in water. One month later we can say that God has done a mighty thing among us, for the fires of Pentecost are still burning here in the school. As I write this report I can hear coming across the fields the voices of prayer and praise going up to God from the chapel. This past Saturday and Sunday there was a group of the students continually in prayer that God would fill the students who have not yet been filled.

As an example of what God has done, let me quote one young man's testimony:

"I was born in a Hindu family. My father has several wives. I am just one of many children. My father was a Hindu priest, but now he is a magician and fortune-teller.

"My father gave me the name *Pathalalingam* which means 'God of hell.' I lived up to my name, for I was a bad boy, disobeying my parents and doing a lot of mischief.

"I thought that I should learn a trade, so I came to the Assemblies of God Industrial School. I had never studied in a Christian school, and had no prior knowledge of Christ.

"During Eddie Wilson's meeting I confessed all my sins to Jesus, who forgave my sins and saved me. Then He graciously filled me with the Holy Spirit. I took water baptism and changed my name to Paul Andrews. Please pray for me that I will be faithful till the end and receive a crown of life. Also please pray for my parents that they will accept the same Jesus who loved me."

The many prayers which the veteran Missionary Doris Edwards and my wife Lois and I have offered for the students have been answered in a wonderful way by our Lord.

THE PROBLEMS OF SUCCESS

AFTER CAREFULLY analyzing detailed annual reports from all of our foreign fields, the Foreign Missions Department can now declare that 1966 was a year of great victory for our overseas enterprise.

At year's end there were 100 approved missionary candidates preparing to go out to the fields of their calling. This brought our number of foreign missionaries to 884. By the help of God we now have 1,670,688 foreign members and adherents in 75 countries of the world; 17,331 churches and preaching points pastored by 13,395 trained national workers; and 86 Bible schools with 3,104 students learning to take the gospel to their own people.

Since 1960 the number of our foreign believers has increased by an average of 103,093 yearly.

But success also presents problems. The larger our overseas work becomes, the more home support it needs. Last year the Lord enabled our movement to give over seven and one-half million dollars to foreign missions! Yet, 738 of our churches did not participate, and 32 percent of our churches did not give every month. We praise God for the 7,051 churches which gave to foreign missions last year, and invite the nonparticipating congregations to assist us in fulfilling the Great Commission.

Another problem of a growing missions program is the danger of measuring our successes by our own past performance rather than by the immense totality of the unfinished task. Thrilled as we may be with the increasing number of sheaves we are gathering, we must continue to look with humble awe on the vast proportions of the waiting harvest.

"Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest" (John 4:35).



SAMUEL'S FAREWELL

Sunday School Lesson for May 28, 1967 1 SAMUEL 12:1-5, 18-24

THE TITLE OF OUR LESSON may be misleading. Samuel's address to Israel makes it clear that although he was stepping aside as God's appointed leader in favor of Saul, he had no intention to cast off his concern for the people's welfare.

At Mizpeh Saul had been publicly presented to the people as their king, but he evidently went back to his farm work without taking up the responsibilities of kingship. This may have been due to the opposition of some who were called "children of Belial" (10:17-27).

It was as a result of defending the city of Jabeshgilead and winning a victory over the Ammonites that Saul became a hero and was gladly acclaimed by all as king. It was upon this occasion that Samuel delivered this address to the people, not, as some have supposed, to give vent to wounded self-love, but to produce in the people a penitent spirit for having sinned against

God, and to engender loyalty and obedience to their invisible King!

A DECLARATION OF PERSONAL INTEGRITY (vv. 1-5)

Was Samuel out of order or boastful in his statements in these verses? Not in the least! His life and ministry had been without reproach. Evidently he received no retirement pension; but he did carry away what was worth far more—a pair of clean hands and a pure heart.

Said Dr. Alexander Whyte, "As far as Samuel is concerned, Saul and his kingdom shall not only have fair play; but they shall have Samuel's influence with God and man. It is only a great man and a noble who can act that way.... It takes the very finest natures to pass over from one generation to another, and to work in a new generation as they worked in the old. It was splendidly done by Samuel. And it has been done, now and again, since Samuel's day."

AN EXPLANATION OF SACRED HISTORY (vv. 6-15)

History can be one of our best teachers. Samuel therefore reminded the Israelites of God's past mercies in view of their oft-repeated cycle of sin, servitude, sorrow, and salvation. Since God on every occasion of their oppression had sent them a deliverer, why then had they asked for a king? There could only be one answer. Their lack of faith in the invisible King caused them to demand one they could see—one in whom they could take pride and upon whom they could depend for security.

Israel's bargain was a bad one. Let us beware of similar mistakes!

A CONFIRMATION OF NATIONAL FAILURE (vv. 16-18)

Israel was spiritually immature and needed signs to illustrate and emphasize a message, just as children do today. In order to prove that what he had said was the Word of the Lord and not his own words, Samuel asked God to send rain. It was practically unheard of to have rain between April and October, especially during the wheat harvest (between the middle of May and the middle of June). The rain and thunder which came as a result of Samuel's prayer was a miracle—a sign of God's confirmation upon Samuel's words. "And all the people greatly feared the Lord" (v. 18).

A PLEDGE OF FUTURE FAITHFULNESS (vv. 19-25)

In these verses we have: (1) Israel's repentance; (2) God's grace; and (3) Samuel's intercession.

Samuel's wholehearted concern for the people and his intention to continue to pray for them is noteworthy. He made it plain that prayerlessness not only is to fail people but is sin against God. "God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you" (v. 23).

Says Dr. Whyte: "Samuel said that was his answer to...banishment from being their head....Samuel, then, stands among them that pray for their enemies and for them that despitefully use them. Samuel stands among them that cease not to pray for the prosperity of those who have taken their place in the world and in the church and in the hearts and mouths of men. Samuel stands among them who have such a pure heart that nothing will ever turn their heart to gloom, bitterness, discontent, retaliation, or to anything else but to still more prayer."

MISSION FIELD PROFILE NO. 4

DOMINICAN Republic

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC, said to be "the land that Columbus loved best," occupies the eastern two-thirds of a beautiful Caribbean island located halfway between Cuba and Puerto Rico. To the west it shares a 193-mile border with French-speaking Haiti. Within its 18,816-square-mile area the Dominican Republic offers a wide range of climate and altitude, from deep valleys to 10,319-foot-high Mount Duarte.

When Columbus discovered the island in 1492 he claimed it for Spain and named it Hispaniola, or "Little Spain." Settlements were made and the Spanish began a ruthless conquest of the aboriginal Indians. Today practically no trace of the Indians is left. Large numbers of Negroes were imported to work on the plantations.

The Dominican Republic was variously under Spanish, French, and Haitian domination until it established its independence in 1844. An unstable political history followed, and the country was occupied by United States Marines from 1916 to 1924, when a constitutional government was installed. General Rafael L. Trujillo was president from 1940 until his assassination in 1961. The political situation again became precarious when a civil war was ignited in Santo Domingo in April, 1965.

In the Spanish-speaking republic live four million people. Approximately 28 percent are Negroes, and the balance are *mestizo* (of mixed blood). An indelible Spanish imprint is seen in the language and culture of the people. The typical Dominican is friendly, vivacious, and extremely fond of music.

Santo Domingo, the capital, founded on the bank of the Ozama River on





August 4, 1496, by Bartholomew, brother of Christopher Columbus, is the oldest city in the Western Hemisphere. It is today a modern, progressive city of 500,000 inhabitants.

The Dominican Republic, like many Latin American countries, has a oneproduct economy. Sugar, introduced by Columbus on his second visit to the New World, is the country's chief source of agricultural wealth and accounts for three-fourths of its exports.

Roman Catholicism, mixed with many superstitious practices, is the religion of the majority. Samuel E. Mills, an independent lay missionary, became the forerunner of Protestant missionary enterprise in 1889. The churches he established were organized as the Free Methodist Church of the Dominican Republic. Gradually other Protestant societies entered the country.

Assemblies of God work was begun by a Puerto Rican minister who held evangelistic services and organized the first assembly in 1933. Encouraged by news of his success, other Puerto Ricans went to help him and, within a matter of months, a number of other churches were established. In 1941 the Puerto Rican brethren turned the supervision of these churches over to the Foreign Missions Department of the U. S. Assemblies of God and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Perrault were appointed as our first missionaries to the republic.

During the past 25 years a number of Assemblies of God missionaries have served on this field. Currently three couples are under appointment:

Mr. and Mrs. Einar Peterson, Mr. and Mrs. Larry Cederblom, and Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lestarjette.

Enrique Suáez is field superintendent of the largely indigenous work. Eighty-seven national pastors have the care and oversight of 80 organized churches and 250 other preaching points. An intensive outstation program is being promoted to reach new areas with the Pentecostal message. Approximately 3,500 children are enrolled in the Sunday schools. Six Sunday school rallies were conducted in the republic this past year by George Davis, coordinator of Sunday schools in Latin America.

Before the political upheaval in the country many citywide evangelistic campaigns were conducted by visiting American and Puerto Rican evangelists, as well as by missionaries and local ministers. Thousands heard the gospel and large numbers were saved and healed. A recent campaign by a

Dominican evangelist in the capital resulted in a great influx of new converts. Dominicans are responsive to the gospel. Everywhere spiritual hunger is evident.

The evangelistic center in Santo Domingo, dedicated in 1954, houses the district offices as well as a bookroom for the sale and distribution of Bibles and Christian literature. The Sunday school at the center ranges between 400 and 650. An hour-long radio program is produced each Sunday evening by the Christ's Ambassadors.

To conserve the results of evangelism and house the fast-growing congregations, new buildings are being erected. Even the largest churches are too small. In an uncertain economic environment, these building projects are acts of faith.

One of the factors contributing to the growth of the work has been the Dominican Bible Institute, founded in 1945. The school is located on a 30acre farm on the main highway of the country, 15 minutes from downtown Santo Domingo. More than twothirds of our preachers received their training there. The school is co-educational, with 54 students enrolled. This year's student body includes three married couples. These more mature students are a decided asset. Each weekend students are assigned to evangelistic work. Some go to organized churches to help strengthen and encourage pastors and believers. Others engage in pioneer evangelism with a view to starting new outstations. The Einar Petersons are currently directing the school.

Literature is an important phase of evangelism outreach in the republic. Pastors spearhead literature crusades and their members saturate the towns with the Word of God.

Christ's Ambassadors and Women's Missionary Councils have been organized on a national scale. C.A.'s conduct a national convention each year. The WMC's are making plans for a five-day retreat this summer. The women are most eager for this opportunity for concentrated study. It will be the first retreat of its kind in the Dominican Republic.

GIRL'S FOOT SPARED THROUGH PRAYER OF FAITH

"DADDY, WILL I LIVE? Will I ever walk again?" These terrifying screams came from the lips of our 11-yearold daughter as we rushed to where she was holding her foot which was nearly severed at the ankle joint.

She had climbed to the top of a large bull exerciser (similar to a "merry mix-up") on the playground. Sitting on one of the huge spokes to ride, she placed her feet on the next one. Then her left foot slipped off the pipe. Her bobby sock caught in the huge gears, which pulled her ankle through.

Two inches of her ankle was ground through to the ankle joint. When the screams reached our ears and we rushed to her, we immediately prayed the precious blood of Jesus would avail for this, His child.

The entire church went to prayer in Nancy Jo's behalf and Christian friends all over the state prayed with us. At the hospital we were asked to sign amputation papers before they took Nancy to the operating room, for the doctors did not give us much hope that her foot would be saved. The medical staff said it was the worst accident of this type in the history of the hospital.

Our pastor and his dear wife waited with us while Nancy Jo was in surgery. After two and a half hours a nurse came out to inform us that they were pinning

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the foot back on. She said there was a slight chance that it could be saved and they were going to take that chance.

Our pastor shouted, "Praise the Lord. That's all God needs-that one chance!"

Thank God for a pastor who stood with us in faith in our hour of trial.

For three days the doctors checked every hour, but did not touch the wound. They marveled that the circulation, temperature, and color were remaining normal.

God miraculously healed this foot, and in 16 days Nancy was released from the hospital. However, the doctors said we would have to bring her back for skin grafts as soon as the flesh filled in enough to warrant it. Nancy overheard the conversation and said, "Jesus healed my foot, and He will cover it with new skin! I know He will!"

Oh, for the faith of a little child! That is exactly what happened. The next week the wound was more than half covered, and in six weeks the entire wound was covered with new skin.

The doctors also said Nancy would have to have an operation when she became mature in order to be able to walk normally, but after 16 months she walks only with a slight limp. A Tribute to the Men Who Planted the Acorn-Seed Some 50 Years Ago

> THE mighty oak-tree movement of the Assemblies of God did not come in a package with easy-to-scatter instructions; it was not a quicksprouting, overnight vine guaranteed to grow fast and be short-lived. It came into being with firm planting, careful tending, and patient years of care when there was almost nothing to encourage those whose faith in its future ministry led them to dedicate life and energy to its cause.

> Today it is mature and its branches reach out in every direction-to every creature everywherewith the message of eternal life. We who live within it know nothing of the days when it was too young to provide even for those who tended it. We must now guard against permitting those who were closest to its heart from being forgotten outside its shelter.

B EDOUINS ARE CONTENT to dwell in tents; they actually prefer their collapsible shelters to permanent housing; but most of us find tent life a bit distasteful. We may be willing to "rough it" for a camping trip but we are always glad to get back to the comforts of home.

Life is like that. It's a "camping trip" of limited duration. It's a transitory experience, as Paul pointed out in his letter to the Corinthians:

"The visible things are transitory; it is the invisible things that are really permanent. We know, for instance, that if our earthly dwelling were taken down, like a tent, we have a permanent house in heaven, made, not by man, but by God" (2 Corinthians 4:18 to 5:1, Phillips).

Paul knew about tents, for he had made them. He knew the feel of the fabric in his hands and knew the best of it would get frayed and worn out in time. So it was natural for him to compare our earthly human bodies to tents.

The fabric of "our earthly dwelling" does wear out. It cannot withstand the ravages of time forever. The day will come when our "tent" will be folded and laid away. "For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality."

And tents are so uncomfortable—hot in summer and cold in winter, unstable in the wind and unpleasant in the rain. So disease, pain, sorrow, burdens, and various circumstances of life beat upon these bodies which house our souls. We pamper them with vitamins and lotions; we resort to diets and a thousand other things to extend their usefulness, for we know there will not be any new tent for us here on earth. We must make the present one last a lifetime.

But eventually the tent must come down. Moving day must come when the soul changes its place of residence for eternity.

If we have trusted in Christ here, we may look forward to a "permanent house in heaven, made, not by man, but by God." There's something better than a tent at the end of the road.

Is there a traveler anywhere on the road of life, footsore and weary, cramped in a fraying tent, who is not refreshed and encouraged by the thought that home awaits at the end of the journey?

The Prince of Life who pitched His tent among men for a little while in order that He might redeem us from sin, and who extended to us the invitation, "Come, travel with me," has also given this wonderful promise: "In my Father's house are many mansions.... I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."

Our new home will be in an immaculate city where there will be none of the inconveniences of "camp life." There will be no more curse, no more decay, no more death. Our Lord Jesus Christ will be there, and we shall see His face.

"See! The home of God is with men, and he will live among them. They shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and will wipe away every tear from their eyes. Death shall be no more, and never again shall there be sorrow or crying or pain. For all those former things are past and gone" (Revelation 21:4, Phillips).

This marvelous Saviour is saying to you, "Come, travel with me." He offers you His companionship while camping on earth, and His companionship in heaven when your tent is folded and put away. What thinking person would refuse such an invitation as this?
