THE GRANDFATHER'S OFT-TOLD STORY INSPIRED THE WORK.

CAN WE EXPECT REVIVAL IN THE CHURCHES? IS THERE SCRIPTURAL EVIDENCE TO SUPPORT OUR HOPES AND PRAYERS FOR A GREAT OUTPOURING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT? THE ANSWER IS YES. THE BIBLE FURNISHES EVIDENCES FOR BELIEVING THAT THERE WILL BE AN OUTPOURING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT WHICH WILL CONSTITUTE REVIVAL. THERE ARE FIVE BIBLE PASSAGES IN PARTICULAR WHICH ARE BASES FOR EXPECTING REVIVAL WHEN CONDITIONS HAVE BEEN FULFILLED.

FIVE REASONS FOR EXPECTING REVIVAL

THE COVENANT OF RAIN

"Ask ye of the Lord rain in the time of the latter rain; so the Lord shall make bright clouds, and give them showers of rain, to everyone grass in the field" (Zechariah 10:1).

The periodic rains, in the natural, were so necessary to Israel; the former rain to start the crop, and the latter to swell the maturing grain. *Rains, too, represent all needful blessings.* And in the spiritual realm the term *rain* is considered to have reference to the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

God has promised showers of rain "in the time of the latter rain" to those who will ask for the rain. Constantly a cry is going up to God for revival. Revival is as necessary to the Church today as the natural rains were to Israel. God will not fail to give revival in answer to prayer.

James reminds us that the *husbandman* expects to receive "the early and latter rain" (James 5:7). "Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord. Behold, the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and latter rain." Baron, commenting on James 5:7, indicated, "It will be a cloudburst, a deluge in a day of storms, pouring rain." In answer to the prayer of faith undoubtedly there will be another outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Lord Himself is concerned; the coming of the Lord is contingent upon the rain.

"Elias was a man subject to like passions as we are, and he prayed earnestly that it might not rain: and it rained not on the earth by the space of three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth brought forth her fruit" (James 5:17, 18). We must pray for the spiritual outpouring. God has not changed; He is looking for those who will ask. It is in keeping with His character to reward those who ask.



THE COMMAND OF JESUS TO THIRSTY SOULS

"In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink. He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water" (John 7:37.38).

In the foregoing verses are found wonderful words of promise for the entire Church Age. Thirsty souls are to go to the Lord and drink. And from the very beings of such persons will "flow rivers of living water." They will be in a position to quicken others.

The tragedy in many quarters these days is that we are not thirsty enough.

In Jeremiah 2:13 God described the sins of Israel. "For my people," He said, "have committed two evils; they have forsaken me the fountain of living waters, and hewed them out cisterns, broken cisterns, that can hold no water." In Jeremiah 5 further description of Israel was given: "But this people hath a revolting and a rebellious heart; they are revolted and gone. Neither say they in their heart, Let us now fear the Lord our God, that giveth rain, both the former and the latter, in his season: he reserveth unto us the appointed weeks of the harvest" (vv. 23, 24).

The cistern of our own making will never satisfy. Where there is a thirst, God meets the need of the individual or the church in the most unexpected way. We may draw from our risen, ascended Lord, the smitten Rock, "rivers of living water"! He will meet the need of the thirsty.



THE DISPENSATION OF THE SPIRIT

"And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you forever" (John 14:16).

The abiding presence of the Holy Spirit was promised by Christ for this age. While organized Christianity seems to accept that truth, at the same time much of organized Christianity accepts Satan's lie that the manifestations of the Spirit were only for a transitory period. Consequently, every genuine movement of the Spirit, especially during the past 60 years, has been viewed with suspicion.

A sincere and thorough investigation into the subject would prove that the gifts of the Spirit have never been withdrawn. The usual argument to the contrary, drawn from 1 Corinthians 13, borders on the childish, for it is logical to affirm that if the gifts had ceased, knowledge would have ceased too. But knowledge within and without the Church is increasing; and so are the gifts in some places.

It can be stated that wherever and whenever true believers are right in heart and give the Holy Spirit His rightful place in their lives and in their assembly, there will be revival, accompanied by the miraculous gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Pentecostal fullness was not for just a few in the early days of the Church but for the entire Church Age. Almost the last words of F. B. Meyer were: "The Church needs another baptism in the Holy Ghost." Elder Cummin, in his book, *Through the Eternal Spirit*, states that God is willing to continue the miraculous gifts, but that in many places they have been lost because of a decay in the spiritual life of local churches. We must maintain the vision. The Holy Spirit is still with us; He waits to give blessing, joy, peace, and power.



THE RISING TIDE OF INIQUITY

"So shall they fear the name of the Lord from the west, and his glory from the rising of the sun. When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the Spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him" (Isaiah 59:19).

The promise of God that, when the enemy comes in with overwhelming power, He will lift up a standard against the enemy is one of the great reasons for believing in another revival. God has always intervened when His people have been weak and helpless. If, as we are led to believe, the present state of the world is a pointer to the near return of our Lord, how much more is it a pointer to the need for revival. God has done great things for His people these past 60 years. We must make the blessings of the past the platform from which to plead for the present and the future. In our petition we must remind God of the state of our land and that of our world, and we must tell Him that we expect Him to fulfill the promise of raising up a standard through the Spirit of the Lord. He will not fail the Blood-bought ones; He will be mindful of their needs and petitions.



GOD'S DESIRE FOR REVIVAL

"For I will pour water upon him that is thirsty, and floods upon the dry ground: I will pour my Spirit upon thy seed, and my blessing upon thine offspring" (Isaiah 44:3).

Here is another of those inspiring promises, revealing that God always is ready to send His blessing. He is the same God. The symbolic language of water, floods, blessing, saturated ground, and fruitful vegetation, used by the Holy Spirit in the Word of God, reflects God's deep desire to bless His people and the world. Has He not given us freely all things that pertain unto life and godliness; and has He not promised times of refreshing from His presence?

The five passages from the Word are foundations for believing that there will be a mighty outpouring. Let us hold them before the throne of grace.

Whatever our interpretation of the Parable of the Ten Virgins, there is one outstanding thought to be observed: they all arose and trimmed their lamps (Matthew 25:7). We should suggest that consciousness of deficiency comes with revival. We dare not, we must not, wait until the Bridegroom is sighted; we must arise now!

If we are honest, we will admit that the Church has not entered fully into her possessions. When we read the standard of the Epistles and the provision made to maintain that standard and then survey the present condition, we feel like crying with Isaiah, "Woe is me!" Were it not for the fact that we firmly believe that God wishes to send us revival, our hearts would fail us. But, even as for Isaiah, the vision heavenward and the picture outward are the very reasons for believing in and seeking after another revival.

At the Edge of the World

ONLY THREE MEN have ever gone out to the edge of the earth and come back to tell us what it's like. They are the crew of Apollo 8.

They tell us that, as they soared away, the view of the earth receding from their sight was a fascinating experience. "I could see all of Florida," Jim Lovell said. "As I watched, the entire east coast of the U.S. came into view, and the Caribbean, and Central America. I could see most of South America, almost to the South Pole. And there, as if I could put out my thumb and little finger to span the Atlantic Ocean, there was western Africa. All in one view."

Bill Anders, similarly, was "enthralled" by the sights as he looked down on Australia and other land masses.

The higher they soared, the fewer the geographic details they could see. Homes, factories, even the cities faded from sight. Finally only the mountain ranges, continents, and oceans stood out. "Some wayward stranger in a spacecraft, coming from some other part of the heavens, could look at the earth and never know that it was inhabited at all," said Frank Borman.

But the stars were still there-still in their fixed positions, no nearer than they were, and no farther away either. In such an awesome environment a person would feel very small and insignificant -and the words of Psalm 8:3, 4 would take on new meaning: "When I consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers . . . what is man, that thou art mindful of him? and the son of man, that thou visitest him?"

Finally the astronauts reached the dividing point between the pull of earth and the pull of the moon. In a sense, their situation was comparable to that of all spiritually minded Christian believers. For spiritual people are those who live at the edge of the world. Their interests, affections, hopes, treasures, and eternal destinies lie beyond the frontiers of this material realm. They are people who feel a certain tug of earth, but to whom the pull of heaven is stronger.

The life of holiness and prayer is the life lived far out on the frontiers of earthly things, free from the drag of sin and the cloying attractions of a busy world.

Jesus knew this life. He went up into a mountain to pray, and the heavens were open before Him.

The prophets knew it too. Habakkuk had to get up into his watchtower and talk to God in order to understand the course of events among which he lived.

David ascended the hill of Zion and found himself, not in the temple made with hands, but in the secret place of the Most High.

These persons lived far out. They deliberately separated themselves from the love of those things to which the hearts of worldlings were attached, that they might have the life of God.

Let us be more like them. When we get a taste of that fuller, more satisfying life, we too will see that time is too short to be wasted on earthly pleasures. When we view the smallness of earthly things in comparison with the things which God has prepared for them that love Him, we will agree there is no profit in gaining the whole world if a man loses his soul.

The Bible says our conversation (citizenship) is in heaven (Philippians 3:20). We live in two worlds. While the body goes about its earthly business, the spirit can soar into the presence of God. This is the life that overcomes and the life that influences sinners toward Christ. -r.c.c.

HERE IT WAS AGAIN! My daily devotions were in Ephesians, yet my Bible opened up several times to the same page in Isaiah. Each time my glance fell on the same verse: "For ye shall not go out with haste, nor go by flight: for the Lord will go before you; and the God of Israel will be your rearward" (Isaiah 52:12).

I sought the Lord to find some meaning for the occurrence, but it seemed to have no significance. Later when I drew the verse from my promise box, I considered it only a coincidence. I taped it to the wall by the kitchen door for no particular reason except that we used this door more than any other, and the verse referred to *going*. After a few days I forgot about it.

We had two young children, so home, school, and church activities kept my days full and rewarding. However, I occasionally found myself yearning for just one free evening to do exactly what I wanted to do.

The day finally came. My husband was asked to work overtime, and each of the children had an after-school activity.

As the day wore on, I was aware that the hand of Another was carrying my every burden. Household tasks were completed with very little effort on my part. There would be ample time to read in our room upstairs before the family came home.

I was surprised to see the school bus stop at the usual time. Our son got off and came into the house. "Decided not to stay," he explained casually. "I just wanted to come home."

Well, I would still read after I had finished the ironing.

Suddenly his excited voice at the foot of the stairs claimed my attention. "Mom! Our house is on fire!"

I thought it was a boyish prank, so I finished pressing the last garment and carefully put it on a hanger. "Dan is lonely with part of the family gone," I thought. "It *is* awfully quiet. It doesn't seem right to me either."

I decided not to stay in my room. Perhaps I should go downstairs and chat with him about his day at school. I had not given him much of a homecoming. I could read another time.

I was completely relaxed and unhurried as I went down to find him. He didn't answer my call so I decided he must be outside. I stepped through the kitchen door onto the back porch to call to him.

In shocked disbelief, I saw Dan frantically throwing water on our blazing home. As I watched, part of an outside wall fell away, revealing a solid mass of flames. I looked up and saw smoke curling from the eaves and the upstairs windows.

Ten or 15 minutes after I had emerged unaware, I tried to go back into the house to get my Bible and our daughter's mellophone. I opened the door to a roaring blaze and a room filled with thick smoke. A bleak shell of a house with gutted blackened walls bore silent witness to the headway the fire had made before the firemen arrived. They could do very little. They supposed that the fire had been burning slowly in the attic for several hours. The ceilings were almost ready to collapse when our son arrived home from school.

NFORTUNATELY much of the professing church has turned from the true gospel to another gospel. Having lost sight of salvation from sin through repentance and faith, they have turned to a humanized religion based on human betterment—better housing, better jobs, better education, and better social uplift for the poor and those who have been denied what they call social justice. Pointing to the usual church, they say it has outlived its usefulness, has deteriorated into a sort of religious social club.

Jonah was called to go to Nineveh and cry out a warning message. "Yet forty days and Nineveh shall be overthrown." It was a startling message. How could he deliver it?

Jonah was a man of God but got terribly tangled up as he considered the message. A devout Jew, he suffered, as many others of his race, from prejudice. God had called Israel to avoid contamination with evil such as was common among the Gentiles. But like many Christians of our day, he misread the divine meaning of separation.

"Be separate" does not mean to withdraw from all contact with those who know not the Lord. It means, Be not contaminated with evil.

Morally we are to be separate. "Come out from among them, and be ye separate." "Touch not, taste not, handle not" that which would corrupt holiness of soul. Even the appearance of evil is to be avoided, and there is to be "no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness."

But this does not mean we should live secluded lives. We are to be witnesses, carriers of the gospel, warning against sin, inviting sinners to change their ways, to accept the Lord Jesus that they might live for Him now and be prepared for the life which is to come. Jonah was to be pure in principles and habits, but free to reach needy men, a freedom which he came near throwing away.

Although Jonah was a prophet, the Book of Jonah is not a prophecy. It is the story of a man of God and some of his struggles.

Let us think of some of Jonah's possible reflections. What would his people think were he to defile his Jewish separation, as he understood it, by taking God's message to a heathen city? Then he feared that God, so tender of heart, might after all refuse to destroy the city. What would this mean to his reputation as a prophet? How distorted one's thoughts may become! What confusion wrongly directed thoughts may bring. Jonah so yielded to confusing thoughts that his soul sank into despair.

Jonah's message was a message of doom which God used to awaken the people of Nineveh to their need and peril. And when it was finally delivered, God was in it. It is not only what we preach, but how full of love and the Spirit we are. We have a message and a commission, "Go ye." If we have not been going, let us go.

Across the street from one of our older and wellattended churches lived a man. The church called a new pastor, and this pastor dropped in on this man, inviting him to the church, telling him about Jesus. The man said, "For twenty years I have lived in this home, and you are the first person who has spoken to me about church or Christ."

I wonder how many there are, right in our neighborhood, to whom we have shown no interest? We let opportunity after opportunity slip from our grasp.

Who can estimate the value of the personal touch? So much of the ministry of Jesus was personal. He touched the leper; He gave sight to the blind; He comforted a distressed woman. Over and over it was the personal touch. Let Him be our example.

When I was a lad, I was a sinner. I often attended Sunday evening services at a small church in the neighborhood. Thinking back, the minister was not a great preacher, but the warmth of his welcome endeared him to me. And in that church was an elderly man who sat on a side bench next to the wall. I do not recall ever hearing him testify, but there was something about him that impressed me as to his godliness. Later I worked with him for a time. He did not say much. From time to time he would speak a few words to me, telling me of Jesus and how I ought to give my life to Him. He may not have known it, yet his every word made its mark in my heart. We are to sow beside all waters.

Some years ago I met a minister in Iowa—an ordinary man who did not impress me in any unusual way. Then I was told that he pastored a rural church, visited among the people, looking on all the territory round about as his parish. And I was told that he had the most far-reaching ministry of any in the district. He loved and showed his love in the interest he showed for all. They called on him to pray for their sick, to bury their dead, and many gave their hearts to the Lord. He did not preach denomination, he preached Jesus.

We need a courage of faith. Jonah shrank—and when he shrank, he failed. It was when he obeyed the divine command that his message had success.

The world needs spiritual help. The Church needs fresh revival, a revival of divine power, of heart compassion, of unselfish zeal. Without this, men may be ever so learned, ever so naturally gifted, yet fail. We must remember the admonition of Jesus, "Without me ye can do nothing."

May God set our souls on fire and help us that we come not short in these days in which we live!



"He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy" (Proverbs 28:13).



What does "the uncircumcision of your flesh" in Colossians 2:13 mean?

The believers at Colosse were Gentiles, having no claim on the Abrahamic Covenant which was sealed by circumcision (Genesis 17:10-14). They were saved by the grace of God. Redemption had come to them not through Old Testament ordinances, but through faith in Christ and His work on the cross and by the indwelling power of the Holy Ghost. "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God" (Romans 8:16).

Can you explain what Jesus meant when He said, "I am not come to destroy [the law or the prophets], but to fulfill"? (Matthew 5:17).

Jesus perfectly fulfilled the Law and He fulfilled the prophecies that had foretold His coming. He must fulfill the Law, thus proving His sinlessness, before He could give His life as a ransom for you and me.

Since He fulfilled the righteousness of the Law, His crucifixion had power to save those who have violated the Law. Thus we are saved through faith in Christ, not by our merit. We are saved by His work, not by fulfilling the works of the Law ourselves.

But Christian believers are not lawless. They do right; the righteousness of the Law is fulfilled in them by the Holy Spirit (Romans 8:1-4). Christ's atonement has made us dead to the Law as a means to righteousness, "that [we] should be married to another, even to him who is raised from the dead, that we should bring forth fruit unto God" (Romans 7:4).

Can you correct the teaching that evil originated with God since He was the Creator of all things and the first Being to exist? Isaiah 45:7 says, "I form the light, and create darkness: I make peace, and create evil: I the Lord do all these things."

If God were the source of all evil, would He not be a wicked God? Why then should we pray, "Deliver us from evil"?

The source of moral evil is shrouded in mystery, but if its source is shown in Isaiah 14:12-14, it developed out of the spiritual ambition of Lucifer who said, "I will ascend above the heights of the clouds; I will be like the Most High" (v. 14).

The word *evil* is found in a number of Scripture passages, especially in the Old Testament, usually referring to distressing circumstances. *Cruden's Concordance* gives the following categories of evil: (1) Sin, moral evil—1 Kings 16:25; Ecclesiastes 9:3; (2) injurious or mischievous beasts or men—Genesis 37:20; 44:5; and (3) calamity— Proverbs 22:3; Job 2:10. Probably it is this third category of evil that is indicated in Isaiah 45:7 rather than moral **evil.**

Several cotton mills provide the economic base for the city and the surrounding villages.

On November 28, 1959, Adam came to Kovilpatty! Pastor S. Adam with his wife Glory had moved to Kovilpatty to take up duties as pastor of the small Assemblies of God church in that city. From the beginning the work was difficult and discouraging. Started in 1951, the struggling young church had already had five pastors when the new couple arrived—and he found only five families with about 15 members.

For the first two years, it seemed to Brother Adam that his work was moving in reverse. Five adult members left his church to go to Bible school and enter the ministry, which meant a loss of two families. Another lady member and her children were lost when her unsaved husband transferred to North India. The pastor was happy to have some of his members enter the Lord's work, but he was sorely disappointed to see his small membership depleted.

It was during this time that he made a decision that was to prove a great blessing for his ministry in the following years. He began an increased emphasis on teaching the Word of God. He based his decision on God's promise, "My Word shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing where-



to I sent it" (Isaiah 55:11), and he began to teach the Word of Truth each Wednesday and Sunday night. These Bible studies were balanced with a Saturday night prayer meeting.

Through the years he had written his own verse-by-verse commentary on the Bible. Each time he got a new thought from another preacher, from a book, or directly from the Lord he would add it to his commentary. Gradually, nominal Christians who were hungry for truth began to attend these Bible studies, and one of them testified, "Because of Brother Adam's faithful teaching of the Word, we all receive a Bible school education right in our own church."

Brother Adam and his wife Glory also went into the homes of Biblehungry families to teach and pray with them. In this way, a number of people were saved and received the baptism in the Holy Spirit in their own homes. One recently transferred government agriculture officer said,

SECRET FOR REVIVAL

"Pastor Adam tries to answer the questions and solve the problems of each individual member."

He has made a habit of visiting each week in the home of every family who attends his church.

As a result of this conscientious effort, the Kovilpatty church began to grow. By the end of 1967 his church roll showed 70 baptized members, most of whom had come one by one or two by two over the years.

But Brother Adam, not yet satisfied, continued to work and pray for true revival. God heard his prayers and saw his persistent dedication.

THE REVIVAL CAME!

Early in March, 1968, the church began a series of special meetings in a small, outdoor, bamboo-and-thatch, tentlike structure. By the third night they knew they had to enlarge the place, for God's Spirit had begun to move and the crowds packed into the semi-enclosed area. Many who had only attended the Bible studies came, and the Lord baptized numbers of them in the Holy Spirit. The days stretched into weeks, and still the fire of God fell.

One young man named Sekar, who had just been discharged from India's Air Force, came home while the revival meetings were in progress. Hearing of the campaign, he went with other young men to ridicule and upset the meetings. But God had other plans for him. Sekar was convicted of his sins and fell on his face to accept Jesus as his Saviour.

As a bold new Christian, he went to visit a young communist friend. He said, "God sent me to talk to you." The young man laughingly replied, "For so long I have wanted to see God, but He has not dared to see me or even speak to me."

Quickly Sekar spoke, "God cannot speak to you because you are such a wicked sinner. That is why God has sent me to you." Hearing this, the communist began to tremble, and like the Philippian jailer cried, "What must I do to be saved?"

They knelt, and Sekar told him to confess his sins and plead for forgiveness. He accepted Christ, and within a few moments began to speak in other tongues as God filled him with His Spirit. Taking this new believer with him, Sekar ran to the pastor's house, both of them speaking in tongues as they ran.

The next night the same thing was repeated as Sekar brought to the pastor two more young men who had just been saved and filled with the Spirit.

During the first six days of revival, 23 people received the baptism in the Holy Spirit, and Brother Adam baptized 26 in water.

Still the revival grew in intensity. Young men like Sekar continued to witness in the power of the Holy Spirit and to bring many more "sheep" into the fold.

In April, 1968, the Madras District Youth Camp was held in Madurai. Pastor Adam sent a group of his fiery young people to camp. God poured out His Spirit on the 200 young people in attendance. About 35 were saved, and 40 received the baptism in the Holy Spirit. Sekar was among those who felt God calling them into full-time ministry.

In five months the Kovilpatty Assembly of God had doubled its membership. Nearly 70 people were baptized in the Holy Spirit. Since that time these have been baptized in water and joined the church.

We thank God for this mighty revival, and we are happy to report that the revival fire is still burning in Kovilpatty. Sekar is now studying in Bible school, and one of his former Hindu friends wants to go to Bible school next year.

Praise God for prayerful, persistent pastors like Brother Adam. Please pray with us that this revival spirit will spread to all the churches of our Madras State District.

HEN THE SPANISH CONQUERors came to Latin America from the Old World, they brought with them the custom of the serenade. Here in Colombia the serenade is used in various ways, but most commonly it is a young man's way of doing something special for his novia (sweetheart). The real significance of the serenade is the surprise and joy it brings to the recipient.

True to reputation, the Latin Americans are great lovers of music, especially that of the guitar. The groups that specialize in the serenade generally consist of a male trio with at least two of them playing guitars. A young man who wishes to give a serenade to his novia will go to one of these groups, and after the customary haggling over the price, will set a date and time for the serenade -usually between midnight and three in the morning.

On the appointed night, the young man provides transportation for the group, and they approach the girl's house as quietly as possible. After they are as close to the girl's room as they can get, they begin to play and sing. If the girl is receptive to the serenade, she turns on her light to show that she is listening, and the music continues for about 30 minutes.

Not long ago the stillness of our night was interrupted by the strains of guitar music and a trio singing the traditional love songs. Rising out of curiosity, I noted that the serenading group was across the street under the glow of a street light. The young man was anxiously pacing up and



down the sidewalk while the songs filled the night. I looked up at the house and saw a light was burning behind the drawn blinds, telling the young man that his serenade was being received.

While the beautiful music still filled

the quiet night, I returned to bed and remarked at the skillfullness and harmony of the musicians. Then suddenly the Holy Spirit began to speak to my heart.

With the same unexpectedness as the serenade, one day the stillness

and tranquility of our lives will be changed by the sound of the trumpet of God. What a joy and privilege it is to know Jesus and to be ready for this event!

Yet, as I lay there meditating, my heart cried out for the thousands in this city of Medellín, Colombia, who have never heard the songs or the story of God's love. The sound of the trumpet will be a serenade in the night to the prepared, but what of those who have never had the opportunity to make their choice?

Medellín, the industrial capital of Colombia, is a spacious city nestled in a beautiful valley among the towering Andes Mountains. Its population is one million, and the vast majority of its people have never heard the gospel story.

It was to this city that my family and I had come in the first effort of the Assemblies of God to open this part of Colombia for God. We felt the leading of the Lord to go into a section of the city called Belén (Bethlehem), to begin the work of reaching this city. There are more than 50,000 people living within walking distance of our new location, and there is no other evangelical church in the entire area. So far this region had been untouched by the Word of God.

We were able to purchase property in the Belén section of the city through the kindness of the Alabama District. This district raised the money at its 1967 annual council, and a group of men from Alabama came to Medellín to help prepare the building for the opening GOOD NEWS CRU-SADE.

During the first week of meetings, Missionary Robert Krist preached and presented the gospel through chalk drawings. We had 180 people present, and more than 125 of them made decisions to follow Christ.

But then the opposition began. People wrote on our walls: *Down with the Yankees...long live the Virgin ...down with the Protestants...* and other unprintable things. They broke all the windows in the church, and burned the cloth sign we had hung on the front.

One night, a lady attempted to enter the church, but her husband would not permit her to come in. When she insisted on attending the service, he began to beat her, and continued striking her all the way up the street. Such is the resistance to the gospel in this city.

We believe that only a display of the power of God will convince the people of their spiritual need. All over Colombia God is pouring out His Spirit in a wonderful way, but apparently we are in a "drought" area here. Yet, we have the promise of God that if we continue faithfully, He will give us a harvest of souls.

With the pressures of the opposition, we have not been able to retain many of the converts from the original campaign. We are presently averaging 37 every Sunday morning; but we are praying to God for a real breakthrough in this city.

Please help us pray for people to be saved in Medellín. We know that those who receive the serenade of God's love will thank you during the ceaseless ages of eternity.

'FOREIGN' MISSIONS

NOT EVERYTHING foreign nations are sending us these days is received without problems. American automobile manufacturers resent the Volkswagen. Farmers lobby against Argentine beef. And what can be said for Hong Kong flu?

However, when foreign churches begin to export their product, this makes us all happy here in the Foreign Missions Department. There is a growing incidence abroad of national groups forming their own missions departments. Though they themselves are still the recipients of many favors from abroad, they now are reaching out to more needy areas. How grateful we are that the incentive and motivation comes not from us but from the Holy Ghost.

The Japan Assemblies of God has its own missions department and is sending missionaries. The General Council of the Philippines is in the formative stages of an outreach department.

What we Westerners sometimes fail to realize is that in areas where tribal arrangements and fragmented cultures still exist, foreign missions work need not include an ocean or a continent. In many areas of Africa a next-door neighbor may be as foreign in language, culture, and practice as any advanced nation in the West.

We here in the Foreign Missions Department are going to fan this flame with every method we know how to use.

Should our Lord tarry, we expect that within five years the major developing nations where we are privileged to work will themselves be sending agencies. In fact, we are already talking about a day in the nottoo-distant future when a vast, worldwide, simultaneous evangelism thrust, including not only American resources but those of every Assemblies of God church around the world, can be realized.

THE UNPAID GROCERY BILL

N 1959, I WAS CALLED to pastor a small church in North McAlester, Oklahoma. Since the congregation was small they were unable to support a pastor fully and it was necessary for me sometimes to secure employment as an auto painter.

In spite of this, however, it seemed almost impossible to make ends meet. Our grocery bill had reached the onehundred-dollar mark and was due the following Monday. I had no money with which to pay this bill and was very concerned about what I would do.

Sunday morning came, and while in prayer for the services of the day, this grocery bill returned to my mind. I went to the church and again I prayed, "Lord, I've never asked You for money before, but please help me to pay that bill."

As I was praying and weeping, a knock came at the church door. I opened the door and a young truck driver was standing there. After discovering I was the pastor of the church he told me he was from the east and was passing through our town and had seen our church. He said he had some money that belonged to God and something had told him to stop and give it to the pastor of that church. He handed me \$35 and slipped out.

Soon after this, people began to gather for Sunday school. A building contractor in the church came up to me and handed me a check for \$65.

The church offerings were only a little over \$16 that Sunday—but with joy and gladness in my heart I went to the grocery store the following morning and paid the bill. The words of David rang again and again through my heart, "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall *not* want" (Psalm 23:1).

STUCK IN THE MIRY CLAY

"MOM !" MY 11-YEAR-OLD SON was calling. His plaintive voice came through the kitchen window to where I was preparing the evening meal. "I'm stuck," he said.

He had been flying his kite, and it had come down in a field near our home. He was stuck all right, in the mud of the recently plowed field.

"Pull your feet from your boots and scoot to the house," I called to him.

Later I tried to get the boots loose, but they were held tightly in the mud. I dug the slimy muck from around them and pulled. As the suction was broken, they came free with a "slurp." At that moment the words of David's cry in Psalm 40:1, 2 came to my mind. "I waited patiently for the Lord; and he inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of a horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings."

I had heard the phrase "miry clay" many times, but not until that day in our oozing cornfield did I realize what the words really meant. The sticky mud clung to my hands. Soap and water had to be generously applied before they were clean again.

My son had gone into the mud to get his brightly

colored kite that had landed on the soft furrows. Without a second thought he started across the field to get it.

Often we may not be alert to the world's enticements, calling us into temptation. The Bible tells us to "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation" (Matthew 26:41). Without prayer and watchfulness we may find ourselves trapped in the slimy mud of sin. Only the love of Christ can loosen the grip of sin on our soul. It is the blood of Jesus alone that can wash our sins away.

Never again shall I read or hear the words "miry clay" without remembering the awful mud that trapped my son and stained my clothes. When I remember, I will shout in triumph with Paul, "Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:57).

MISSION FIELD PROFILE NO.25

PARAGUAY, roughly the size of California, has been described as "the most remote and picturesque state in the Americas." The republic has been endowed by nature with rich soil, hardwood forests, spectacular waterfalls, and excellent climate. Its eastern plains are admirably suited for agriculture and stockraising. The sparsely settled Gran Chaco region north and west of Asunción consists of grassy plains and dense forests,

laced with a network of rivers and swamps.

Although Paraguay is an inland country it is not landlocked, for the Paraná-Paraguay river system affords direct access to the Atlantic Ocean. Regular steamer service is maintained between Asunción, Paraguay, and Buenos Aires, Argentina. Paraguay joins Argentina and Brazil at the famous Iguazú Falls.

Asunción, the capital, is the most

important city. This busy river port has 500,000 inhabitants. While it retains the Spanish flavor of colonial days, modern features, such as a new 15-story air-conditioned hotel, have been introduced.

Colonial history began in 1537 when the Spanish established a fort on the site of present-day Asunción. Paraguay won independence from Spain in 1811. Dictatorships followed, culminating in the disastrous Five-Year War (1865-1870) which decreased the country's male population and its natural resources.

Long stalled in the 19th century due to its geographical isolation and disruption by wars, Paraguay today is adopting modern health, welfare, and educational programs. Transportation modes in the cities are changing but many horse-drawn wagons are still used in rural areas.

Bilingual Paraguayans are for the most part descendants of Spanish settlers and Guaraní Indians. Spanish is the cultural and commercial language, but the softly accented Guaraní has been retained and is commonly used.

Paraguay's population is estimated at 2,094,000. To strengthen its economy the country has opened its doors to immigrants. Mennonites from various European countries have established attractive farming communities. The promise of land has brought thousands of people from Japan.

Paraguayan women sell fruits, vegetables, and handmade *nañduti* lace in the city markets. Not an unusual sight is black-shawled women contentedly smoking crude homemade cigars while riding sidesaddle on small burros. A favorite drink is *yerba mate* served hot and sipped through a *bombilla*.

Roman Catholicism is the established religion, but the constitution guarantees full liberty to all creeds. In some areas Catholic religious practices verge on paganism.

Protestant missionary activities were begun in 1888 when the South American Missionary Society entered the country. Other societies followed.

The Pentecostal message was first brought to Paraguay by Christians from European Slavic countries who fled their homelands to escape persecution. In 1945 Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Stawinski, American Assemblies of God missionaries, were sent to Paraguay to help these groups of Slavic believers. The Stawinskis also extended their witness to Paraguayans. They established a church in Encarnación and also opened several outstations.

Five years later, under the ministry of the Anthony Giordanos, a church was established in Asunción. When the Giordanos returned to the States for furlough the Paul Hutsells transferred from Argentina to help organize the work.

The Paraguay Assemblies of God was formed in 1958 with 11 congregations and five pastors. The work now includes 26 congregations and 37 national pastors. With the exception of a one-year furlough period, Paul Hutsell has served as field chairman.

Our missionaries recognized the importance of training nationals for effective witnessing to their people. Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Emory were instrumental in opening Paraguay Bible Institute in Asunción in 1959. There

were only five students that first year, and the school functioned in temporary quarters. Now new buildings have been constructed, and between 20 and 30 students are expected for the next semester. Both day and night classes will be offered. The school's graduates are laying the foundation for an indigenous church. Stig Sundberg serves as principal.

The first Concilio Misionero Femenil (the equivalent of the American WMC) was organized in 1960 at Central Assembly in Asunción by Mrs. Stawinski. Since then many other groups have been organized. Ercilia Bogarín serves as national CMF president, Naomi Sundberg as vicepresident, and Dreta Hutsell as secretary. Under the leadership of Mrs. Bogarín, Bible studies are conducted in the capital and surrounding area. Each year the CMF ladies prepare packages of food and clothing for the pastors. This year some of the women delivered the gifts to the pastors at the annual conference, carrying the baskets of gifts on their heads, Paraguayan style.

Literature is an integral part of Assemblies of God missionary enterprise in Paraguay. Light-for-the-Lost provided funds for an extensive literature coverage of three sections of the republic. The evangelistic campaign which followed literature distribution in Caaguazú brought in large numbers of converts. A new church, *Tabernáculo de la Fe*, came into existence in the capital area as the result of a five-month campaign and widespread use of literature.

A new bookstore, called *El Faro*, is operated in the capital under the direction of Sam Balius. Mr. Balius also serves as director of the correspondence school and radio ministry. Seven weekly programs are on the air—six are releases of Paul Finkenbinder's *La Voz de la Conciencia*, and one is a local broadcast prepared by Mr. Balius.

The Sunday school received new impetus during the visit of George Davis (coordinator of Sunday schools in Latin America) and Juan Romero. To further promote Sunday school evangelism, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Balius conduct workers training courses in various churches. Sunday school enrollment is about 1,300.

Asunción Christian Academy was founded by Assemblies of God, Mennonite, and Free Methodist missionaries to provide an education for English-speaking children, and missionaries' children in particular. Paul Hutsell is president of ACA. Several denominations provide teachers. Assemblies of God missionary-teachers assigned to the school are Doris Mc-Clain, Marion Foster, and Marjorie Campion. Besides their teaching responsibilities, these women render valuable help in the local churches.

Paraguay, "Land of the Guaraní," provides unique opportunities to challenge the faith, zeal, and consecration of our missionaries. In the Gran Chaco are unreached Indian tribes. Along Paraguay's rivers are scores of cities, towns, and villages without a Pentecostal witness. Most are without any Protestant witness whatever.

SHOWING OUR GRATITUDE

Sunday School Lesson for February 16, 1969

BY J. BASHFORD BISHOP

LUKE 17:11-19

THERE IS AN OLD ENGLISH PROVERB, "Put a snake in your bosom, and when it is warm, it will sting you"—an example of base ingratitude. Yet that snake is no more base than the man who wounds the heart of God by failing to be truly appreciative of the innumerable blessings He bestows. "Oh, that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men!" (Psalm 107:8).

GREAT NEED

"There met him ten men who were lepers." Nine were undoubtedly Jews while one was a Samaritan. These ten were drawn together by their common misery which made them ignore the national enmity existing between them. How miserable was their plight! Cursed with an incurable and loathsome disease, they were separated according to Mosaic law (Leviticus 13:46) from the rest of society. Leprosy is symbolic of sin—the greatest of all diseases which separates men from God, and from the society of the righteous. It is contagious, loathsome, and humanly incurable.

GREAT DELIVERANCE

The lepers cried aloud to Christ for mercy. "And when he saw them, he said unto them, Go show yourselves unto the priests." There was great variety in the ways Jesus healed people. The healing of these men was not demon-

strated instantly as was the case of the leper in Luke 5:12, 13. Instead, their faith was tested. Even though there was no visible change in their condition, *they were to act as if they were healed*, and to report to the priest whose duty was to examine lepers and to pronounce them cured if such were actually the case. (See Leviticus 14:2-32.)

"And it came to pass, that, as they went, they were cleansed." It is evident that these men had faith, because they obeyed. Let us learn from them! Many lose faith and think they are not healed if there is no immediate change. But God's order is, "Believe . . . [and] see" (John 11:40). "Believe that ye [do now] receive . . . and ye shall have" (Mark 11:24). Smith Wigglesworth said, "I am moved by what I believe, not by what I see."

GREAT INGRATITUDE

"Were there not ten cleansed? but where are the nine?" Oh, the wistful sadness of the words of Jesus. Ten men had experienced His mighty healing power; only one returned to thank Him! So it often is today. For 20 years a certain minister kept an account of all the sick he visited. During this time he visited 2,000 people facing death, who supposedly gave themselves to Christ and were restored to health. But he knew of *only two* of these who proved by their future conduct that their repentance and gratitude were real!

GREAT THANKFULNESS

The Word significantly points out that the thankful leper was a Samaritan—a stranger to the covenant promises made to God's people. The lesson is evident. Recipients of the greatest spiritual blessings may take them for granted and be the most ungrateful. The Samaritan's healing accomplished its intended purpose: it drew him to the Healer. Thus it is God's intention that every blessing we receive shall bring us into more intimate relationship with Him and make us more useful in His service.

GREAT BLESSING

Jesus said, "Arise, go thy way: thy faith hath made thee whole." Unquestionably the Samaritan here received something additional. The other nine received healing for their bodies. The Samaritan received that into which the physical healing was intended to lead them all—the healing of the soul!

The Samaritan may never have read Psalm 103, but he certainly obeyed its exhortations: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits." Real gratitude for God's goodness, the kind of gratitude that really "blesses" God, is expressed with one's entire being. Someone has said, "Let your conscience bless the Lord by unvarying fidelity. Let your judgment bless Him by decisions in accordance with His Word. Let your imagination bless Him by pure and holy musings. Let your affections bless Him by loving whatever He loves. Let your desires bless Him by seeking only His glory. Let your memory bless Him by meditating on His excellencies. Let your every sense bless Him by its faithfulness, every word by its truth, and every act by its integrity." This is the mark of gratitude! THE TURKISH PEOPLE have made us take all religious programs off the radio. We don't even hear gospel music on the local station now. As far as I know, the children of those on the base will not even be permitted to go from house to house singing Christmas carols this year."

This bleak report came from Mrs. Marvin Huckaby in Karamursel, Turkey, where her husband serves at the U.S. Air Base.

However, despite being unable to air the gospel from transmitters on Turkish soil, *Revivaltime* still manages to reach Americans stationed in that Muslim land. Every week the Radio Department mails a tape recording of the latest *Revivaltime* broadcast service to the Huckabys for use in the chapel. In a recent letter they shared the story of this lifeline ministry:

"For several weeks after your broadcast tapes began arriving, we used them in various homes on Friday evenings. Lately, however, we have grown so in numbers that we now gather in the base chapel on Monday and Friday nights. After use in the chapel meetings the tapes are passed from home to home and also to the fellows in barracks. This is the only preaching and gospel singing that we get here.

"One young couple living off base in Yalova, a small town near here, told me they play all the tapes five or six times before they pass them along to someone else. So you can see your recorded gospel services are like water in a parched land."

From the other side of the globe, *Revivaltime* received a similar enthusiastic report from Mrs. Joseph Fulford whose husband serves as an advisor to the Thailand Air Forces in Bangkok.

"The taped *Revivaltime* broadcast services mean so much to us who are serving our Lord and country here in Bangkok," she wrote:

"We have many activities at the Assemblies of God

CHRIST'S MESSAGE TO CONDEMNED GENERATIONS

ESUS LEVELED A SERIOUS ACCUSATION against those of His generation when He stated, "This is an evil generation" (Luke 11:29). In fact, He felt their wickedness superseded that of the Old Testament Ninevites and the Queen of the South because "the men of Nineveh . . . repented at the preaching of Jonah" (verse 32), and "the queen of the south . . . came from the utmost parts of the earth to hear the wisdom of Solomon" (verse 31).

Yet the people of His day, although they had a greater than Jonah and a greater than Solomon in their midst, would not repent of their sins.

The Queen of the South who sought answers from Solomon stood to condemn those wicked generations who put forth no effort to determine the truth. The Ninevites, who repented when they heard the truth, would condemn the wicked generations who hear the gospel but do not repent.

Today's generation is no different than the generation of Jesus' day. Unconcerned and unrepentant hearts, today as then, are under more severe condemnation because they are rejecting a greater preacher than Jonah and a wiser king than Solomon.

The illustrations Jesus used afford some enlightenment as to why generations are condemned.

The Queen of the South had some difficult questions' she needed answered. This is nothing new. With today's

increase in knowledge, inquisitive minds are bound to come up with questions.

But the questions that arise today are no harder for God to answer than were those of this queen! God's omniscience makes Him the only true source of knowledge for all of life's questions.

One thing we note regarding this queen was that she would not accept answers from a second-rate source. She had questions which must be answered by an authority. Her example is worth following. She sought wisdom and so went to the wisest person she knew.

Today men seek answers to their questions from those who know. For legal advice, one consults a lawyer; for medical advice, a physician; and for financial advice, an expert in that field. By the same measure, spiritual questions should be answered by a qualified source. If you desire to find answers to your questions about life, ask God who is the Giver and Creator of life. Don't accept second-rate answers to your questions.

A difficult question about life once confronted King David. The question was: "Why did the wicked seem to prosper more than the righteous?" He admitted, "When I thought to know this, it was too painful for me" (Psalm men hear *Revivaltime* for the first time when they visit here. For some, these tapes provide the first evangelistic sermon they have ever heard.

"While in America many were 'too busy' or 'had no time' to hear the Word of God. But here in Bangkok servicemen on 'R and R' (rest and relaxation) visit the Christian Servicemen's Home which is under the direction of the Ervin Shaffers. While the men have this extra time it gives the home an excellent opportunity to witness through *Revivaltime* tapes. These tapes can be heard anytime a serviceman turns on the tape recorder.

An Air Force captain, possibly the one Mrs. Fulford mentioned, wrote to the *Revivaltime* office in Springfield, Missouri. His letter arrived a few days after her report. He writes: "I was listening to your broadcast (Number 778) and was most impressed with the message, 'Why Is This Earth the Size It Is?' I would like to get three copies of that sermon. This is the first time I've heard *Revivaltime*. I heard it at Brother Ervin Shaffer's Christian Servicemen's Home in Bangkok while on permissive TDY (temporary duty)."

In addition to Turkey and Thailand, *Revivaltime* tapes are sent each week to similar servicemen's groups in Argentina, Newfoundland, Keflavik, Iceland, and the Azores in the North Atlantic. Some military chaplains also receive tapes regularly, and some Navy ships play *Revivaltime* through their public address systems.

"Your *Revivaltime* messages have really been a blessing to the ship here in Vietnam," wrote Harold Behr. "More than 950 people hear the taped broadcast each week."

The Radio Department's high-speed Ampex tape duplicating equipment makes it possible to provide *Revivaltime* tapes at a minimum cost. Letters of appreciation like those included here provide ample reward for this "by-product" ministry.

As one veteran put it: "Hearing *Revivaltime* is like half an hour of home."

A^N URGENT CALL for concentrated prayer in the next seven months has been issued in behalf of the United States Congress on Evangelism by two key men mainly responsible for it.

Evangelist Billy Graham, honorary chairman, and Dr. Oswald C. J. Hoffmann, St. Louis, Mo., chairman of the 52-member National Committee, joined in the call to American churches and Christians to undergird the Congress with intercession. It will be held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in September.

Graham and Hoffmann presented the call for prayer to the National Committee on December 21 at a meeting in Chicago where it was approved and heartily endorsed.

Quoting Christ's promise, "Whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be

glorified in the Son" (John 14:13), the call for prayer is as follows:

"The urgency and need for a mighty moving of the Spirit of God in our nation and across the world is impressed upon us in every newscast. Our daily papers compel us to realize that we are at a crossroads and that our choice is either Christ or chaos.

"To meet this emergency and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit, a U.S. Congress on Evangelism is called for September 8-13, 1969, to meet in Minneapolis. It is anticipated that 8,000 participants from more than 100 denominations will gather to pray and study. One-third will be laymen and laywomen, one-third parish pastors, and one-third evangelists, educators, theological students, church executives, etc.

"What assistance can be given to the American home? How can the local church be mobilized to reach the community for Christ? What is the scriptural answer to the cultural, social, and moral upheaval of our day? How can the needy individual be convinced that Jesus Christ is the answer? We must have answers in our generation.

"Of the Early Church it is recorded that 'When they had prayed, the place was shaken where they were assembled' (Acts 4:31). 2 Chronicles 7:14 states, 'If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and will heal their land.'

"Church leaders from all across America are urgently requesting that you pray during these months ahead with an overwhelming faith that there shall be a spiritual awakening in our time."





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WHAT IS HAPPENING TO THE RURAL CHURCH?

EVERY MAN DESERVES A WITNESS, and the small rural communities are the grass roots of our nation. The manifold wisdom of God can only be expressed through the doctrines of Christ and will be effective only when motivated by the Holy Spirit. It is our aim to develop a witness in every community of our district.

The problem affecting us the most seems to be the lack of ministers with dedication, burden, and vision for the rural areas. Men without a burden and not willing to sacrifice—whether evangelist or pastor—will not succeed in evangelizing the rural communities of our land. The people must feel and know the minister has the love of Christ and has been compelled by God to come to their community.

It is said the rural parts of our nation are being abandoned, and that you cannot build without people. True, but we are finding in Mississippi that if we can maintain a strong rural church, people will commute many miles for employment, build nice homes, and support the church. But once they move to the city, many will not drive 10 blocks to attend church.

People in Mississippi are accustomed to rural church life. We are moving more and more toward rural sophistication, the one thing that largely separates city and county. We need to grasp our opportunity.

I kept searching for the solution to the rural church problem. Some might think it is mainly a financial matter. But a good salary is not a proper motivation for pastor and evangelists. There must be a spiritual burden —and a preacher with a burden seldom fails. This is why I preach missions as strongly as I do. Once a minister is moved by the Holy Spirit in this direction, he will evangelize an area and build a strong work. May God continue to give us such men.

In Mississippi we do not depend altogether on young ministers just out of Bible school, or retired ministers, yet we do use these where possible. We depend more on the mature ministers who are already pastoring or evangelizing.

Ezekiel 22:30 states, "I sought for a man among them." God still seeks for a man to make up the hedge and to stand in the gap. Jeremiah 5:1 reads, "Run ye... and see... if you can find a man." You may ask how we find this mature man who will move from a good pastorate to the rural church. We stir them up by presenting a challenge. We find this in 2 Peter 1:13, "Yea, I think it meet... to stir you up." We stress the situation as a missions need. I pray God to stir us even more.

Another problem is the lack of support where the communities are sparsely settled. This is the position many of our churches are in or will come to as the people continue to move into the cities. Yet, this does not excuse us from helping these churches to have an Assemblies of God witness. Only in rare cases are communities in Mississippi completely left without it.

Where necessary, services are so arranged that one minister can serve more than one church. At the present, we have two ministers each caring for two small works. We also have two laymen caring for two small churches. We find that time brings on changes. If we keep a work alive, in due time it will rise again.

This is a condensation of the address given by Frank Langley on Thursday afternoon, August 22, at the Home Missions Leadership Seminar, Springfield, Mo.

Due to a lack of vision on the part of the established churches to see clearly the need, in Mississippi we have been compelled to move away from the mother-church plan. It just did not work for the rural area. We plan each new work on its own merits, moving away from patterns and methods as such. This has provided flexibility, allowing a work to be built where and when the interest is found and can be supported by a substantial number of people. This way, harmony and enthusiasm are better promoted with the pioneer pastor and local congregation.

Finance is a great factor with the rural church. Several pastors in Mississippi live on small salaries, \$65 per week and under. Some of these men eat from their own gardens. Congregations are faithful to bring the fruit of their labors. Without a genuine missionary call these men would fail and return to the city.

In our district we use all available help: BGMC literature, hints from *Advance* magazines, Home Missions monthly publications, and National Home Missions loans and grants, where possible. We start churches in storefronts, old homes, abandoned school buildings, VFW clubs, cottage prayer services, etc.

For example, in Silver Creek, Miss., we are now using an abandoned store building until the first unit of a new facility can be erected. We could cite other situations, such as Starkville, where the state college is located. We stayed out of Starkville too long because some said our church approach must be on a college level. We went in and used an old ten-room home for a year. We now have a lovely church and a fine congregation including college students. Build we must, so by faith we build and God honors.

I do not believe that I am an alarmist; neither do I believe in being a pessimist in God's work. Yet we must cry aloud and spare not, lest we miss the opportunity to win our generation and set the course for the future.

I will not soon forget a statement made by Arthur Graves at our District Council in 1966. After a Home Missions presentation, he remarked to the people that the response of mature ministers to the Home Missions call, in his opinion, was the answer to the problem facing our Movement.

At the same time, the *layman* is a great factor. This is his home. He knows better than outsiders what will be acceptable in his community. If the pioneer pastor is wise he will work very closely with the local laymen.

As already stated, the community must feel there is a compassion on the part of the pioneer pastor. Communities will help God's men evangelize and build. In our district we use laymen to the fullest degree feasible.

To evangelize our nation, we must use all means available. The *missions conventions* are instrumental in creating vision and burden. No longer can we afford to limit our witnessing. Missions conventions help give direction in this respect. Witnessing to *all* (at home, as well as abroad) is our commission.

We are all aware of the migration from rural areas to the larger cities and towns. Yet we cannot neglect the small towns and rural communities. They need churches, and a call to a small church is just as important in the eyes of God as a call to a larger church. Only God can reveal what has been accomplished in the small congregations of our movement.



A DREAM COME TRUE

W OULDN'T IT BE GREAT if we could start a branch Sunday school?" was the question Everett Olp's assistant pastor, Ernie Rose, asked. Although it was at that moment only wishful thinking, God began to open the way for this dream to come true.

In June 1963 the Assembly of God in North Bend, Oregon, held a Kids Krusade with Mrs. Otis Triplett. The ladies of the church had canvassed the area and found a fertile field of prospects in Cooston, which is across the bay from North Bend. Before the crusade closed, 10 carloads of children from Cooston were attending. Not wanting to lose these prospects, the church established a bus route to bring children from Cooston to North Bend for Sunday school.

As the need for a branch Sunday school became more and more apparent, it came to Pastor Olp's attention that an old building and an acre of land belonging to the Cooston Community Club was falling into disrepair through lack of use. When the members of the club were approached by the Assemblies of God congregation, they agreed to sell the property for the amount owed in back taxes—\$172! The fact other churches had tried previously to purchase this same property and failed indicated that God's approval was on this project.

But that was only the beginning. When the community learned of the church's intention to renovate the old building and use it for a Sunday school, things really began to happen. Local lumber yards donated hundreds of dollars' worth of materials. Landscaping machinery and a backhoe were lent to the church. Eighty yards of gravel for the parking lot was given. The material that was purchased was bought at a discount from Christian businessmen. With donated labor of the men of the church the finished building, valued at \$45,000, had cost the congregation only \$12,000.

What began as a wishful thought in the heart of Ernie Rose is now a growing, thriving witness in this community. It is truly a dream come true.

IS SEPARATION STILL RELEVANT?

HE LINE OF DEMARCATION between the Christian and the unbeliever should be clearly perceptible, for separation is unmistakably commanded in the Scriptures.

This scriptural separation may be defined as Christians avoiding participation in anything the Bible indicates is sin. It means that believers should not be in close allegiance with people who would drag them down spiritually. Separation means that Christians must abandon ideas and philosophies that would corrupt their faith. It means that followers of Jesus should not affiliate with individuals or organizations that are avowedly hostile toward Christianity.

There are probably a number of reasons why some are afraid of the idea of separation. Without question some have heard presentations on the subject that have dismayed them. Others, almost intuitively, shy away from anything that speaks of negativism and are perplexed by Scripture that seems to encourage the direct opposite of separation—such as Jesus' admonition to Christians to be the salt of the earth (Matthew 5:13). Some deem it permissible to purposely choose to live in an unspiritual environment in hopes of changing it, and there are those who insist that the practice of separation is impractical for today.

But separation is required of every Christian. We must not be unequally yoked with unbelievers. We dare not dilute the duty of separation by relating it only to the more evident forms of sin. May God give us the grace to eliminate from our lives anything that would cause people to stumble.

Wisdom must be used in practicing this separation. For one thing, we are not called to be hermits. In the complex world in which we live, it is inevitable that Christians will come in contact with the unsaved. And we dare not separate ourselves from the task of evangelism in our daily contacts. We must be in the company of people if we are going to win them.



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In what sense, then, are we to be separate from the world? The words *fellowship* and *partakers* may serve as guidelines here.

There is a vast difference between *contact* with the world and *fellowship* with it. *Fellowship* implies a mutual sharing of activities and interests. But believers and unbelievers live in totally different realms. Therefore, for Christians to be *partakers* of the unfruitful works of darkness is even more inconceivable than for them to *fellowship* with the unsaved in such activities.

If we neglect the duty of separation, we will surely penalize ourselves and our usefulness. Our lives will not make an impact on unbelievers if we scorn separation. Our words will lack that keen edge that is so necessary if we would penetrate the sensibilities of the ungodly. If we discard separation, we may well become like the compromising Samson who went out to shake himself, "and he wist not that the Lord was departed from him" (Judges 16:20).

Some would object to the idea of separation because they feel such an emphasis would result in a loss of crowds.

When Israel left the land of Egypt in the days of the Exodus, a "mixed multitude" accompanied them. These were people who had no sympathy with the spiritual aims of the Israelites and who became the first ones to complain about God's provision of manna. Their presence was no boon to Israel. On the contrary, they were a constant hindrance to the welfare of God's people.

Because Israel joined with the mixed multitude in the murmuring against manna, God sent a plague which reduced their numbers. Israel's accommodation of the mixed multitude did not increase the crowd; instead there was a decrease.

Worldliness leaves the church vulnerable to decrease. Slack standards may often bring a mushroom growth, but such an unstable increase is often short-lived. Church history warns us that dissolution and division invariably follow compromise.

There is a higher motive than these for observing separation, however. We should practice separation because it pleases the heart of Jesus. He wants us for Himself. He is our heavenly Bridegroom, and we are His Bride. When you look at it in that perspective, separation is not too big a price to pay. Is our love for Jesus so shallow that we hesitate to obey His call to separation?

In this day when so many are bowing at the shrine of conformity, a call to separation may come like an unwelcome voice in the wilderness. But if we presume to discard the truth of separation, we do so at our peril.

According to the apostle Paul, we have no alternative to separation. "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers," he wrote. "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you" (2 Corinthians 6:14, 17).

ELEPHANT IN THE MOON

SIR PAUL NEAL, a 17th-century amateur scientist, announced a startling discovery: he had seen an elephant in the moon. The idea of the "man in the moon" wasn't new. But an elephant in the moon—that was something else.

Then the amateur scientist made another discovery: the object he saw wasn't an elephant at all. It was a mouse that had crept into his telescope!

Our problems are often like this. We are so close to them we cannot see them objectively. We cannot get a proper perspective. The mouse becomes an elephant.

That is why it often helps to talk to someone who can look at the situation clearly: an earthly friend and also our Heavenly Father. God hasn't promised to provide a supernatural solution to all our problems. More often our talk with Him helps us get away from the situation far enough to begin to see it as God sees it—and to see how, with His help, a solution is possible.

You may discover your elephant is only a mouse!

NERVOUS CONDITION HEALED

LONG, WEARY, SLEEPLESS NIGHTS and days spent in crying are over for me since the Lord healed me. I am like a different person.

In 1966 I had a nervous breakdown. It came as a result of five years of difficult experiences in helping our son-in-law recuperate from a serious accident. He spent nine weeks in the hospital fighting for his life. For two years he underwent plastic surgery. During this same time I had major surgery three times. When the nervous breakdown came, I had to return to the hospital for about a month of shock treatments.

Upon returning home my nerves weren't much better. I was still under the care of a psychiatrist. For almost two years I lived with strong tranquilizers and sleeping pills. Our drug bills were never under \$40 a month. I was becoming quite a strain on my family. Many times my husband had to go to work, leaving me walking the floor crying. As sleepless nights continued, I became so depressed I prayed to die.

I had been prayed for so many times I was ashamed. Then one Thursday morning in the late summer of 1968, I asked for prayer in the Women's Missionary Council meeting. Pastor Joseph Hardt was there that morning. I told him and the WMC group that I just couldn't get victory over my nerves and they prayed for me again.

The following Sunday night the pastor had a prayer line for the sick. Again I went for prayer. When Brother Hardt came to me, he asked, "Is it your nerves again, Sister Palmer?" I told him it was. When he anointed me with oil and laid his hand on my head a warmth went slowly down over my body as if something were being poured over me. In the days that followed I discovered I no longer needed tranquilizers. I was able to sleep without sleeping pills. The depression was gone. I was happy again.

Once more I was able to do my household chores and to work in the flower garden. Also, since then I have been working one day a week in the hospital as a volunteer Red Cross worker.

Thank God, the days of miracles are not past. Jesus is so wonderful to me. I shall always be grateful to Him, to my pastor and church, and to my family for standing with me.—Mrs. Lois Palmer, Brandon, Fla.

HEALED OF SEVERE KIDNEY ATTACKS

EVER SINCE GOD HEALED ME two years ago I have had no aches or pains and I work hard all the time. Praise His holy name.

My sickness began on Sunday, October 23, 1966. I was awakened at about 3:30 a.m. with extreme pain in the lower left side of my back. At first I thought I must have been lying in a twisted position; but after trying several positions and then walking and sitting, I still had the pain. It felt as if my flesh were being torn.

After suffering for two hours I called my son and asked him to bring my pastor to pray for me. When they anointed me and prayed, the pain left immediately.

But on Monday I had another attack so my son and daughter-in-law took me to their home. That night a much worse attack struck me. Again the minister came and prayed, but I had no relief. So early Tuesday morning I was taken to the hospital.

Because I was so weak I again went to my son's home. I took three capsules but then felt condemned because I was not fully trusting God. So I stopped taking them.

When I went to see the doctor for a checkup on Wednesday, November 2, he told me the X-ray specialist had discovered my left kidney was enlarged and it appeared there might be a growth in it. He scheduled me to return to the hospital in two weeks for more X rays. He also gave me a large box of a different kind of capsules to take. Each time I took one I would have a weak spell afterward.

On Friday morning, before I took a capsule, I prayed and asked the Lord to show me by letting it react if I was not supposed to take them. When I took it, I got so weak I could hardly stand. This convinced me it was not God's will to take them and I didn't take any more.

When the time came for me to return to the hospital, I was feeling well, eating anything I wanted, sleeping well, and working all the time. So I called the doctor and told him I would not have more X rays.

For the past two years I have felt real well, with no aches or pains of any kind, and I work hard all the time. I thank and praise God for His wonderful healing power and for the strength and good health I enjoy. He is my all in all.—Mrs. Irma L. Mull, Salem, Ind.

The young men have come to New Caledonia from New He-brides for temporary work. They have left their wives and families on their home islands while they

ing center. Nearly a dozen men will rent one house so they can save money to take back to their islands.

The Killingbecks have shown love and concern for these men, and there has been a good response. About 60 men attend their services, half of which are in English and half in Pidgin English. Missionary Lawrence Larson wrote, in a letter dated October 9: "Just this past weekend I was in Noumea for services. There were about a dozen decisions for Christ. One man said he feels he should go to Bible school in Fiji next year. Three were filled with the Holy Spirit-one was a man in the French Navy, and the other two were New Hebrides men. These are the first New Hebrides men to be filled with the Holy Spirit in the ministry of the Assemblies of God. Praise the Lord !"

The Killingbecks have also obtained permission to distribute literature and conduct services in the hospital. Brother Killingbeck says, "The hospital response has been very encouraging, and we thank the Lord for this another opportunity of spreading the gospel here in Noumea."

ditional tent for evangelistic meetings may be numbered. The oncefamiliar tent may be replaced by an inflatable plastic fabric church.

The Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God now has one of the inflatable churches in use at San José, Costa Rica, with Missionary-Evangelists Elmer and Lee Bueno.

This first "air cathedral" complete with "stained-glass windows" is 200 feet long, 60 feet wide, 30 feet high, and can seat 3,500 persons. The church is inflated and ventilated by three squirrel-cage blowers.

Regardless of whether doors are left open or if the structure were slashed allowing air to escape, it would take 30 minutes for the huge bag to deflate, explains Richard Headrick, a research consultant for the Firestone Coated Fabrics Company of Los Angeles, the manufacturer.

The huge structure is made primarily of nylon-reinforced vinyl equipped with gold and white plastic panels designed like stainedglass windows.

The building incorporates four emergency booth or air locking gelistic crusade in San José.

AKRON, Ohio-Days of the tra- | doors plus an air locking revolving door assembly as the main entrance.

As it is now used, the cathedral is equipped with two direct gasoline engine generator/alternators to provide electricity, five mercuryvapor light assemblies, a sound system with tape playback and stereo capabilities, a 16mm sound movie projector, a slide projector, and a backlighted semiopaque screen projection.

The church is secured to the ground by water bags in two rows around its base, and also by 60 ground augers. The entire structure will withstand winds up to 110 miles per hour. Weight of the total package is 17,000 pounds.

Richard Headrick and Merritt Yancey, chief engineer for Firestone Coated Fabrics, directed the building and testing of the structure as a volunteer project for the Assemblies of God.

"While all the work was done in our spare time, the project had the full support of Firestone," Headrick said.

The entire project cost approximately \$40,000. The cathedral is now being used for a citywide evan-

Missionary-Evangelist Anthony Piraino organized the campaign and for the first five nights was the main speaker. Roberto Bracco spoke for the remainder of the crusade.

He was prayed for during the meetings, and the next morning the mother took him to the doctor for a scheduled visit. After carefully examining the boy, the doctor said, "Your boy's heart is fine and perfectly normal."

One man testified, "I have heard your messages every night, and tonight I want you to know that I abandon my old religion to embrace your faith and accept salvation through Jesus Christ."

The congregation in Siracusa has raised the sum of two million lire (\$3,300) toward a building fund. Their hall is now inadequate, and funds are needed to purchase or build a church.

New Bible School **Open** in Spain

RONDA, Spain-Missionary Sam Johnson reports that Spain has its first Assemblies of God Bible school located here. In December 1967 Missionary Kerry González was appointed director of the school when the Assemblies of God missionaries in Spain voted unanimously to establish the school by faith.

The organization purchased property in Ronda, where the Roy Daltons lived until Brother Dalton's death. In 1968 the Bible school board of directors met to draw up the constitution and bylaws for the school.

Mr. Johnson, who arrived on the field in January 1968, informed the missionaries that people in America were interested in the project and had given \$4,500 to help repair and remodel the existing buildings.

The small chapel was made into living quarters for the director and his family. A former two-story chicken barn located on the property was transformed-the upstairs into dormitory rooms, the downstairs into classrooms.

The inauguration service was held on September 19, 1968. Near-

Year of Revival

As we enter the first year of the Five-Year Plan of Advance, I am praying it will be truly a Year of Revival, as designated.

I have not forgotten the challenge that was presented to us at the Council on Evangelism. I thank God for realistic leaders in our Movement who are not mesmerized by the numerical advance and popular acceptability we enjoy, but are concerned lest we be reduced to a lifeless religious machine that operates but has no soul or breath.

The Assemblies of God is much like other denominations in doctrinal beliefs and administrative procedures. But there is a difference-a big one. Our mission, which is to minister to God, to the saints, and to the world (which incidentally is the scriptural mission of the whole Church) is not to be implemented by human ways and means alone but by the direction and anointing of the Holy Spirit in the life and practice of each believer.

We need a revival-not merely in the sense of protracted meetings or evangelistic crusades, important as these are-but particularly in a personal sense-a renewal, an awakening of our love and devotion to the Saviour. 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WAS LINCOLN A CHRISTIAN?

BRAHAM LINCOLN never joined a church, yet he privately professed to be a Christian. Contrary to the position of some professing Christians, he based his spiritual standing on his personal relationship to Christ, rather than on such things as charity, good conduct, or church attendance.

The great emancipator, born 160 years ago this month, had some misgivings about churches and clergymen. When he debated Stephen A. Douglas in 1858 on the issue of human slavery, there were many church members and clergymen in Illinois who refused to side with him. A close friend of his recorded a conversation he had with Lincoln on the matter. Newton Bateman, Illinois superintendent of public instruction, said his conversation with the Senatorial candidate took place in the State House at Springfield.

Taking a New Testament from his pocket, Lincoln said, "Mr. Bateman, these men well know that I am for freedom everywhere, as free as the Constitution and the law will permit, and that my opponents are for slavery. They know this; and yet with this Book in their hands, in the light of which human bondage cannot live for a moment, they are going to vote against me. I do not understand it."

Bateman said that Lincoln paused for a long minute, his features charged with emotion. He arose and walked up and down the room. Tears filled his eyes. With a trembling voice, he continued, "I know there is a God and that He hates injustice and slavery. I see the storm com-



ing and I know that His hand is in it. If He has a place for me, I believe I am ready. I am nothing, but truth is everything. I know I am right because I know liberty is right, for Christ teaches it, and Christ is God. I have told them that a house divided against itself cannot stand; and Christ and reason say the same and they will find it so.

"Douglas does not care whether slavery is voted up or down, but God cares and humanity cares and I care. With God's help I shall not fail. I may not see the end, but it will come, and I shall be vindicated; and these men will find that they have not read their Bibles aright."

In his early days Lincoln reportedly held skeptical views concerning Christianity. But after he became president his heart was changed and, according to friends who knew him well, he came to believe in Christ as his personal Saviour.

His impeccable character won him the name "Honest Abe." His courtesy and compassion are well known. He loved the Bible, which he called "God's best gift to man," and quoted from it freely in public speeches. And yet, for many years he knew he was not a Christian.

He had great faith in the power of prayer. He confided to friends that after moving into the White House he continued his habit of praying every day. During the dark days of his administration he proclaimed days of fasting and prayer for divine intervention to save America.

"I have been driven many times to my knees," he said, "by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go." But a man may believe in prayer without being a Christian.

Though he never joined a church, he attended Presbyterian services regularly while living in Springfield and continued to do so after moving to Washington. He had a growing appreciation for the church. In fact, Edginton's history of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington discloses that Lincoln planned to become a member of the church on Easter and was assassinated four days before that Sunday.

But a man may attend church regularly—may even be a member—and not be a true Christian.

Historians are divided over the question of whether Lincoln was a Christian or not. They cannot find any public confession to this effect, either in his writings or in the records of his public speeches. But numerous friends of Lincoln have testified that as he matured he definitely embraced the Christian faith. Noah Brooks, for one, said President Lincoln had "a hope of blessed immortality through Jesus Christ," a fact made clear in private conversations he had with him.

His pastor, Dr. Phineas D. Gurley, also said he had frequent private conversations with the President in which the subjects of the Bible and Christian faith were discussed. "I considered him sound, not only on the truth of the Christian religion, but on all its fundamental doctrines," the pastor said. "And more than that, in the latter days of his chastened and weary life, after the death of his son Willie and his visit to the battlefield of Gettysburg, he said, with tears in his eyes, that he had lost confidence in everything but God, and that he now believed his heart was changed, and that he loved the Saviour."

A Christian is one who knows Christ as personal Saviour and who trusts in Him alone for cleansing from sin and for the gift of eternal life. Are *you* a Christian?
